

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

Out The In Gate Ualt

I've been witness to many a posts about two feet in loose wreck during 35 years of working livestock auctions. These wrecks have ranged from the fender-bender variety to the head-on version with multiple injuries. Without exception all these mishaps occurred at onthe-ranch auctions where people erected a temporary sales ring to sell their purebred livestock once a year. So whenever anyone asks me for advice on how to stage a sale I tell them to pay for the services of their local auction yard and leave it in the hands of professionals who do this kind of thing for a living.

It's the little things that usually cause the worst wrecks. Like using cables instead of bars on a sale ring and then forgetting to tighten the turnbuckles. This resulted in a big bull lunging through the cables as if they were cobwebs. Those in attendance that day dispersed in all directions in on their picnic. I heard later that there were several lawsuits as a result but I don't know if it was the legal settlements or the fact that the wife found her husband in bed with someone else, but whatever the reason, they never had another sale.

Then there was a Longhorn sale years ago in Elko, Nevada, where a group of breeders sold their animals INSIDE a county fair building normally reserved for selling docile 4-H lambs and pigs. The ring consisted of panels that were wired together. One of the Longhorns lifted up the entire ring with her horns and escaped to terrorize the crowd. In a bit of brilliance one of the consignors closed the door to the building not escape, which meant that everyone was trapped inside and subject to being shish-kabobbed and tenderized. Many observers ran to to the top of the bleachers to escape which caused the bleachers to tip over backwards.

People have no idea of all the little details in staging a successful sale. Like cementing the posts of the bullboard which serves as a buffer between the breeder I know lazily buried the dirt and then put his best friend behind the bullboard during his sale. The breeder meant to convey a high honor to his friend by placing him there but I am told the two never spoke again after a mad bull started battering the bull board with his head. Every time the bull hit the bullboard the posts would give another inch in the loose dirt and the crease in the ex-friend's considerable midsection got deeper and deeper until he had a severe case of furniture disease: his chest got pounded into his drawers.

I almost got decapitated once at a bull sale where I was working ring. Trying to be considerate to those who sat on the front row the breeder had placed sheets of Plexiglas on the outside of the ring bars so that the patrons would not get hit with flying sawdust and recycled hay. Instead they were hit with sharp edged flying pieces of Plexiglas when a bull kicked the plastic and shattered it into a million pieces.

Poor ring design results in cattle that refuse to leave the ring after they're sold. Usually they want to exit through the in-gate. One commonly used trick that seldom works is to let another bull into the ring to lead the way out but what you end up with is two animals that won't leave. Whenever my friend Skinner had an animal that refused to leave the ring at his auction market he'd turn out all the lights. The animal would see the light coming from the out-gate and would vacate the premises immediately.

Another mistake people make is building their auction block too low. Many times I have seen bulls try to escape a ring by jumping up on the block with the auctioneer. I saw an auctioneer get two teeth knocked out in this manner which hindered his chant somewhat. He just sort of whistled the prices after that. Usually the cattle don't succeed in actually getting all the way on to the block but one time I did see it happen. Then the big riddle became... how do you get a 2,000 pound bull off the auction block?

DPS: Hire only licensed locksmiths

Since January 2004, the Pri- censed locksmiths will be able vate Security Act has required that individuals and companies performing locksmith services in the state of Texas be licensed by the Department of Public Safety.

As part of the licensing process, fingerprint criminal history checks are performed on applicants to ensure they do not have criminal convictions that would prohibit them from receiving a license.

However, many individuals and companies are still performing services without the required license-and the required criminal history check.

Giving an unlicensed locksmith access to your home or business places you at risk of criminal acts against you or your property.

The Department recommends that before you allow a locksmith access to your home, business or other property, you ensure he or she is licensed. Lito provide you a Department-issued license number.

You should also check our website using the search feature at http://www.txdps.state.tx.us/ psb/ to verify an individual or company's licensed status.

The Department has 27 troopers located throughout the state who investigate violations of the Private Security Act. Among the violations they investigate are allegations of individuals or companies performing locksmith services without a license, which is a class A misdemeanor, punishable by a jail term up to 1 year and/or a fine of up to \$4,000.



FORMER LAWMAKERS LAID TO REST

Former state Sen. Frank Madla, D-San Antonio, was laid to rest in the Texas State Cemetery on Dec. 1.

Madla, 69, and two close family members died in a house fire a week earlier.

Madla served in the Texas Legislature from 1972 to 2006.

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Former State Sen. Temple Dickson, D-Sweetwater, died Nov. 29. He was 72.

Dickson served in the Senate from 1989 to 1993. His funeral was at the family ranch in Nolan County on Dec. 2.

GIFT DISCLOSURE STANCE STAYS SAME

The Texas Ethics Commission voted 5-3 to stick with its earlier position that state officials do not have to disclose the amount of cash gifts they receive.

A cash gift simply may be reported as "currency," "check" or "money order" under the Nov. 26 ruling.

The agency earlier ruled that State Employee Retirement System board member Bill Ceverha of Dallas did not have to report a \$50,000 check he received from Houston homebuilder Bob Perry as anything other than a "check."

Government watchdog organizations and several of the state's larger newspapers criticized the ruling.


