

Angel Food Ministries currently taking orders for January

Angel Food Ministries is currently taking orders for Janu-

The program is sponsored by

the Ozona Ministerial Alliance. Angel Food Ministries is a non-profit, non-denominational organization dedicated to providing grocery relief and financial support to communities throughout the United States.

The program began in 1994 with 34 families in Monroe, Georgia (between Atlanta and Athens), and has grown to serve thousands of families every month across 17 states.

Angel Food Ministries crosses denominational lines and has spread the good news of the gospel of Christ through salvation tracts that are placed in each food order.

Angel Food's groceries are sold in a quantity that can fit into a medium-sized box at \$25 per unit. Each month's menu is different than the previous month and consists of both fresh and frozen items with an average retail value of approximately \$50.

Comparison shopping has been done across the country in various communities using a wide range of retail grocery stores and has resulted in the same food items costing from between \$42 and \$78.

Generally, one unit of food assists in feeding a family of four for about one week or a single senior citizen for almost a month. The food is all the same high quality one would purchase at a grocery store. There are no second-hand items, no damaged or out-dated goods, no dented cans without labels, no day-old breads and no produce that is almost too ripe.

Adapting to change

For many years I managed autonomous retail stores as a manager and district manager.

The stores were in the building material industry and were comprised of multi-acre lumberyards and large indoor showrooms. The company that owned these stores was national in scope and in business for over 75 years. Now it no longer exists as a company.

What happened? The big-box, warehousetype building material retailers like Home Depot and Lowes changed the industry for those pursuing do-it-yourself customers. We were unprepared for the change because we did not realize the industry was rapidly evolving around us. If we had carefully scanned our environment, we would have noticed

have adapted to the change. Instead, we were unaware of — or maybe ignored — the changes in methods of doing business and customer preferences. As a result, and as they say, the rest is history.

How do you keep your company from suffering the same fate? The answer is simple, but like everything else in business, difficult to execute consistently. The answer is to regularly scan the environment in which you do business, allowing you to understand changes in your industry in regards to customer preferences, customer makeup, technology and product or service innovations.

How do you scan your industry's environment?

You can attend trade shows and other venues that bring firms and customers in your industry together. They often are a hotbed of what's new and different and can be on the cutting edge of

changes in the business. Attending these events will give you a chance to talk to customers and competitors in order to get a sense of what is going on.

You can become a member of trade organizations related to your industry. These organizations are in business to provide members with the latest information and statistics on customers, trends and new products and services. They also can provide information on the general economic, political and legal environment in which you do business. These same trade organizations often have online or hard copy publications that can give you up to date knowledge in these areas.

You will also want to scan the local environment in the trade area you conduct business. Seek out information about your local competition through visits, if appropriate, or through customers and vendors. This will keep you up to date on what they are doing. Take time to understand your local economic conditions and political events. Most importantly, regularly talk to your customers so they can give you accurate and informal feedback into their needs and wants.

To notice the gradual changes — or sometimes the quick ones — in your industry, it is important to regularly scan the environment. Doing so will enable you to stay competitive and continue as a successful business. If my former company had done so, I am certain it would have still been in business today.

Group tours Crockett County flood channel and dams

Maintenance and upkeep of the town's flood channel and county dams were discussed during a local tour on May 17.

The tour, hosted by the Crockett County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Natural Resource Conservation Service took participants around to the various dams and along the channel.

Don Ford, a zone engineer for the NRCS, and Ty Williams, district conservationist for the Crockett County SWCD, said that brush removal along the channel banks is needed to allow for smooth, unimpeded flow of water in the channel.

Vehicles, including all-terrain vehicles and motorcycle traffic, can cause damage to the channel such as the formation of mud holes and damage to the banks, Ford and Williams said.

The use of education to inform the public of vehicles, ATV and motorcycle damage to the flood channel was also discussed among the group.

There is also a pipeline in the channel that can catch debris

In a full flood, the deepest points of the channel can handle up to nine feet of water.



Governor grants Christmas season pardons



Gov. Rick Perry on Dec. 20 pardoned Billy Wayne Miller of Dallas after DNA testing proved

his innocence and the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles recommended his case for clemency.

Miller, who was released from the prison system seven months ago after having served 22 years, was convicted of aggravated sexual assault in Dallas County in 1984 and received a life sentence. Post- conviction DNA testing showed that Miller was innocent. The district attorney, district judge, sheriff and police chief all supported the

Perry also pardoned 14 other current or former Texas prison inmates - 11 from Dallas County, counting Miller - following recommendations by the Board of Pardons and Paroles. Most were in their teens or early 20s more than a decade ago when convicted of minor offenses.

AG FILES SUIT AGAINST **POLLUTERS**

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott on Dec. 20 sued Houston-area chemical plants owned by Lyondell Chemical Co. and subsidiaries.

Court papers filed in Travis County say the plants repeatedly failed to prevent harmful air emissions and are in violation of Texas environmental laws.

Negotiations to settle with the four chemical plants reached an impasse earlier this year. In its lawsuit, the state is seeking civil penalties ranging from \$50 to \$25,000 per day, per violation.

Abbott's office said the lawsuit is the first in Texas arising out of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's initiative to cut air pollution at chemical plants across the nation.

FUTURE COMPTROLLER HIRES DEPUTY

Newly elected State Comptroller Susan Combs, who will be the state's chief accountant, named Martin A. Hubert deputy comptroller.

GAMING GROUP TO MAKE PROPOSAL

The lobbying group Texas Gaming Association announced a plan to use casino revenue to pay college tuition for high school graduates.

Details of the plan have not been finalized by the group, but a tuition-paying plan would be tied to the Legislature's acceptance of the group's proposal enabling the construction of ca-

The idea is to embed casinos in 12 "casino destination resorts," three of which would be located on Indian reservations within the state.

For the plan to come to fruition, the Texas Legislature would have to pass legislation requiring an amendment to the state constitution, and Texas voters would make the final decision at the ballot box.

OFFICIALS' TRAINING **DEADLINE TO HIT**

IF YOU OR YOUR COMPANY DOES EXCAVATION WORK, WE NEED YOUR HELP TO AVOID DAMAGE TO OUR PIPELINE

To determine if there are pipelines in the area where excavation is planned, look for pipeline markers at nearby roads, railroads and fences. Don't try to guess the route or location of the pipeline. Call the pipeline company toll free at the number shown on the marker at least 48 hours before you dig. They will send a representative to mark the exact location, route and depth of the pipeline at no charge.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE DIGGING AND DISTURB A PIPELINE

Even if you cause what seems to be only minor damage to the pipeline, notify the pipeline company immediately. A gouge, scrape, dent or crease to the pipe or coating may cause a future break or leak. It is imperative that the pipeline owner inspect and repair any damage to the line.

HOW TO RECOGNIZE A PIPELINE LEAK

LOOK - A pool of liquid on the ground, a white cloud or fog, persistent bubbling in standing water, or discolored vegetation are signs of a possible leak. Fire or explosion occurring near a pipeline facility should be reported.

LISTEN - Listen for any unusual noise like a hissing or roaring sound. SMELL - Notice any unusual odor.
