## Commissioners discuss repairs to courthouse roof, air conditioning

Repairs and renovation of the Crockett County Courthouse is a goal the Crockett County Commissioners' Court has set for 2007.

During Monday's monthly meeting, the court discussed two major areas of the courthouse that need immediate attention, the roof and air conditioner system.

County Judge Fred Deaton said that he has talked with officials at the Texas Historical Commission about getting on their courthouse renovation grant program.

Deaton said that officials at the commission told him that the grant money probably wouldn't be available until 2008, but that the Texas Historical Commission is interested in coming to look at the courthouse and the immediate repairs that need to be done.

Normally, the historical commission recommends using a boiler system and chilling water system, which is very expensive, Deaton said.

Historical commission officials said they have had a lot of reported problems with this type of system, and there is no one available locally to maintain it.

Deaton said.

"We could probably use an air cooled unit and run the lines through the mechanical room into the attic," Deaton said. "We need to meet with the engineering firm who did our master plan."

The county paid \$75,000 in 2000 for an engineering firm to construct a master plan to renovate the courthouse. The county applied to the historical commission several times to be a part of the courthouse renovation grant program, but was turned down for a variety of reasons.

"Clean up a lot of the side of the building with this right here," Deaton said referring to working on the air conditioning system. "I think this would really make the historical commission happy since they've already seen the problems with the boiler and chill system."

As for the roof, Deaton said the historical commission officials said the county could go ahead and proceed with a basic roof and then wait for the grant money to add any historical embellishments.

The county has budgeted \$500,000 for courthouse renovations and \$225,000 for building renovations.

Deaton said he would arrange a called meeting for Jan. 29 to meet with the engineering firm of the master plan and officials from the historical commission.

"We know we have problems and we need to fix some things on this," said Commissioner Pleas Childress III.

### SKATEBOARD PARK LOCATION APPROVED

The commissioners approved turning the old south swimming pool location into a new skateboard park.

The plan is to fill in the pool park, lay some cement around it and design a course with proper ramps and jumps.

"These kids are going up and down our sidewalks," Childress said. "This area would be good because it is near the new swimming pool."

Commissioner Alfredo Tobar said that the skateboarders should be required to wear helmets and shoulder pads. Tobar also asked about putting in a basketball court, similar to the skateboard park San Angelo has.

Commissioner Frank Tambunga said that Monday's meeting was just to approve the location and that at future meetings cost and design would be worked out.

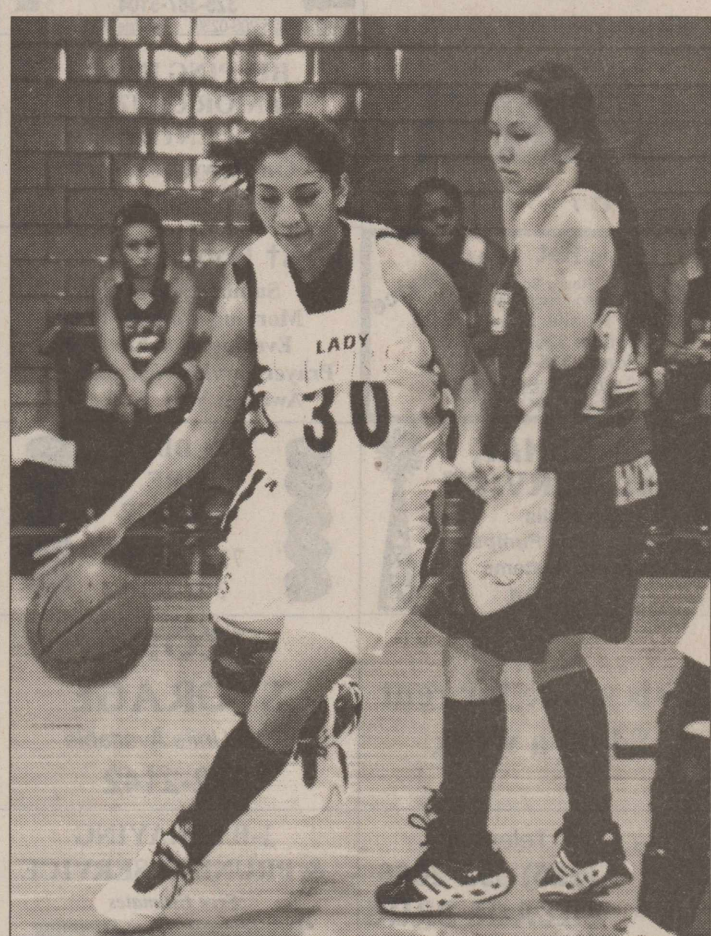
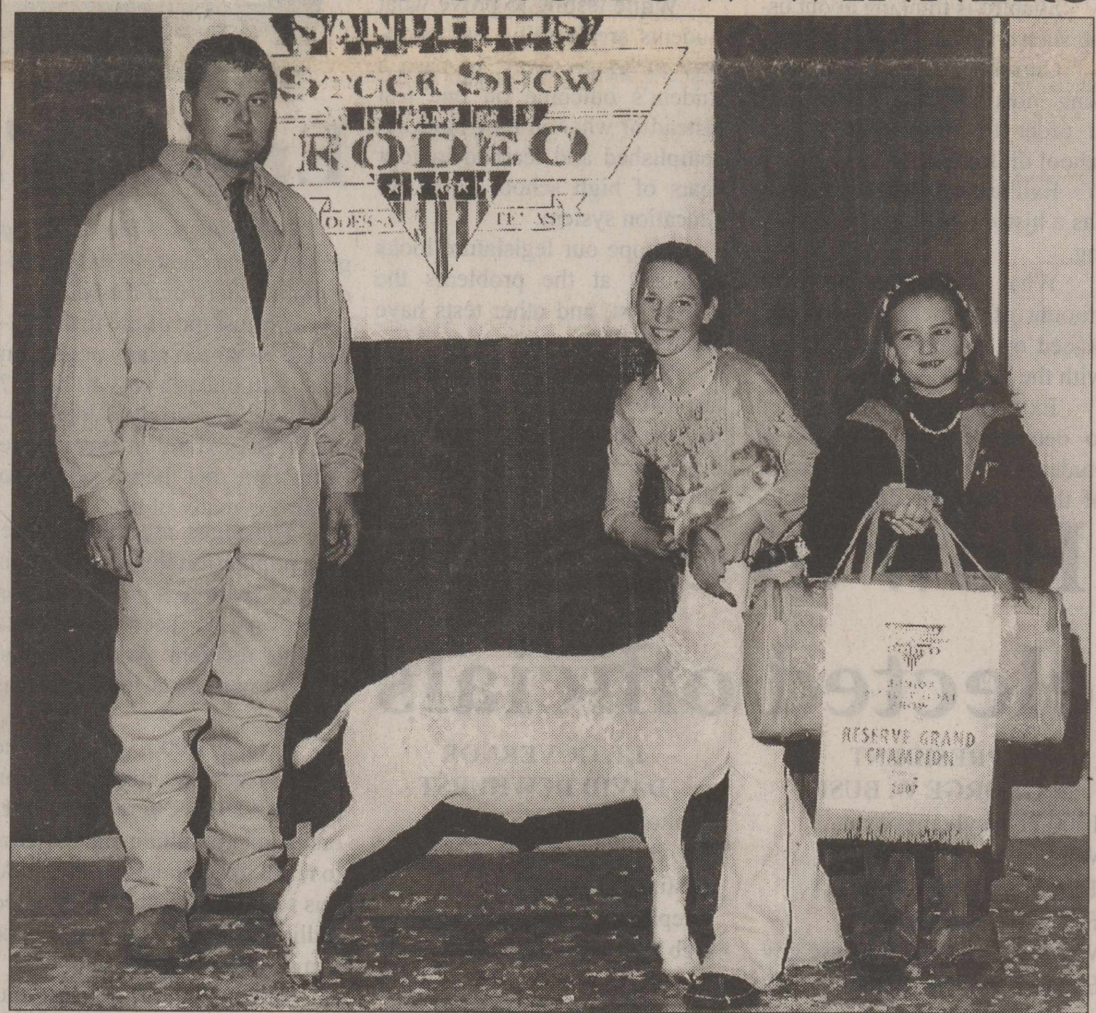

## Country music star Jamie O'Neal to perform for Rehab 2007 telethon

"Be somebody's hero!" That's the plea being made by Kay Stewart and volunteers in Ozona who will be manning telephones during West Texas Rehabilitation Center's 37th annual telethon on Jan. 20.

Located at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce/Visitor Center, the local phone bank will be in operation from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. that night.

The telephone number to call to make a pledge will be 392-3737.

Originating live from the Abilene Civic Center, the telethon will be carried by 10 television stations covering Texas and portions of New Mexico and Oklahoma.

KLST-TV in San Angelo and KTAB-TV in Abilene will be among host stations. Also, the show may be viewed via satellite on Galaxy 11, Transponder 16.

Country music star Jamie O'Neal, who made "Somebody's Hero" popular, will be the show's featured entertainer for the five-hour television special and will be joined by hosts Red Steagall and Charlie Chase. Other performers include Rehab regulars Bill and Susan Hayes, Brad Maule and Anacani.

In addition to entertainment, the telecast includes an auction of more than 400 items

donated by businesses and individuals. Items range from agriculture items to travel packages, a pickup truck, boat, paintings, handmade quilts, shopping spree and many more. Items can be seen—and bids placed—on the web site from now until midnight on January 20 at www.rehabauction.org.

An auction catalogue and toll-free bidding numbers will be published in the San Angelo Standard-Times and the Abilene Reporter-News on Jan. 20.

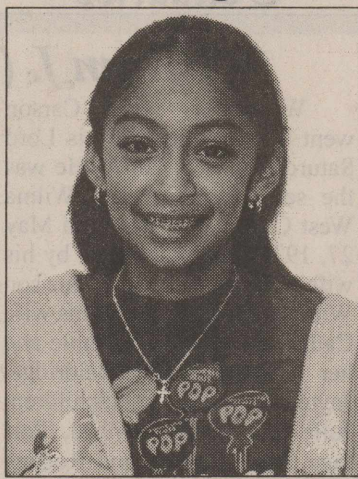
Sierra Trevino attended the Junior National Young Leaders Conference in Washington, D.C. on Dec. 9-14.

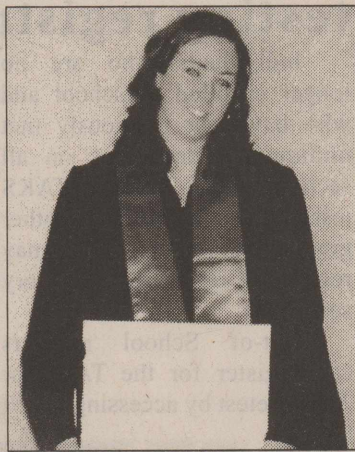

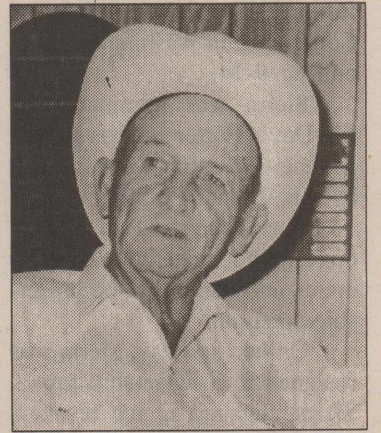

### Obituaries

#### William J. (Bill) Carson



William J. (Bill) Carson went home to be with his Lord Saturday, Jan. 6, 2007. He was the son of Ira M. and Wilma West Carson. He was born May 27, 1925. He is survived by his wife of 60 years, Norma, one son William J. Jr., Billy, and his wife Cathy, one daughter Bonnie and her husband Buddy Baldrige, Jayton, Texas, six grandchildren: Julie and Greg Lawford, Portage, Mich., Haley and Rodney Najar, San Antonio, Amanda and Jason Green, Denton, Texas, Barbi and Nate Sprinkle, Waco, Brook and Justin Culbertson, Jonesboro, Ga., B. J. and Jessica Baldrige, Abilene, Texas, 10 great-grandchildren, Abbey and Haley Lawford, Chelsey Najar, Brienna, Noah, Kira, and Micah Sprinkle, Cali, Carson and Katie Culbertson; two sisters: Crystelle Childress and Eloise Clegg, one sister-in-law Nola Morgan and adopted brother Ralph E. Simon, six nieces and five nephews.

Bill grew up in Ozona, graduating from high school in 1942, attending New Mexico Military Institute. He was drafted Sept. 1, 1943. He became a member of the 29th Infantry, landed on Omaha Beach in the third wave, on D-day, fighting in four major battles and one too many night patrols. As sole survivor of the last, he was sent behind the lines with other battle fatigued men to Paris. There the 75th Military Patrol was formed of the front line battlefield veterans. Bill became an M.P. serving in Fontainebleau and Rheims, France. Just before V - E Day, they received orders to escort a company of Army nurses to Burma, shipping out from Marseille when V-E Day was declared. They crossed the Atlantic, went through the Panama Canal, and survived a typhoon in the Pacific before V-J Day was declared. Orders were received to put into port in the Philippine Islands. They finally received orders to be shipped home Jan. 31, 1946. He was discharged Feb. 4, 1946.

He returned to ranching in Val Verde and Crockett Counties. He married Nov. 8, 1946. One year was enjoyed before the drought of the '50s began. He purchased an old truck and trucked feed for other ranchers while he ground sotol to feed his stock and raised pigs on the free feed. He bought a home in Ozona in 1952 so his children could attend school there. He became active in civic affairs when the family moved to town in 1954. He was a member of the first volunteer fire department, charter member of the Lion's Club, became a Mason, and became

a member of the school board, serving as president from 1961 to 1969. He helped with the building of the airfield and flew the doctor and medical supplies to Sanderson when they had their big flood. He became an active member of the Civil Air Patrol, flying many search and medical missions to Fort Worth and Houston. He served 20 years as a special deputy for the Crockett County Sheriff's Department. A man of many interests: he loved flying, hunting, fishing, boating, golfing, roping, and enjoyed traveling with his family in the States, Mexico, Canada and Alaska. He also farmed and ranching in Burnet County during the time his family was in school. In the fall of 1969 as chairman of the board of a life insurance company, he was appointed to replace their retiring president. He served seven years, resigned in 1976, and returned to the Val Verde ranch.

Bill was a member of the First Baptist Church of Ozona. As a youth he attended Paisano Baptist Encampment in Alpine, he became member of the board of directors in 1980 and served as treasurer for many years until he realized he must retire. He was diagnosed suffering from Alzheimer's disease in the fall of 1999. Since that time he has served as a Director Emeritus of Paisano.

Pallbearers are his grandsons. Honorary pallbearers are L.B. Cox, Gene Lilly, Harold Shaw, Gerald Sedlacek, Charles Gilchrist, Alton Ludwig, Gil Thuet and Robert Wycoff. 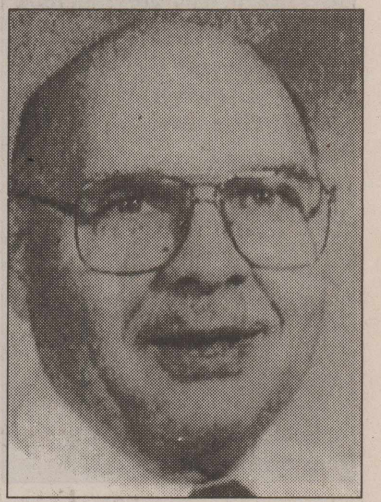
#### Pedro Cisneros 'Mr. C'

McALLEN - Pedro "Mr. C" Cisneros, 72, died Tuesday, Jan. 2, 2007 at Alfredo Gonzales Texas State Veterans Home.

Born in Ozona, Pete had been a long time resident of the valley. He served in the Army Military Band based in Washington, D.C., and was the band director in the Pharr-San Juan-Alamo school district for 35 years where he was lovingly known as Mr. C. He served as President, Vice President, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Secretary-Treasurer of the Texas Band Director Association, which has over 3000 members and in 2006, he was inducted into the Rio Grande Valley's Band Directors Hall of Fame.

Mr. C will always be remembered as the best high school band director in the valley. He not only made a difference in the lives of young people, but reached out to new band directors coming into the profession.

He was fondly known as a disciplined and dedicated musician who demanded the best from his students. The pride he instilled in his students will never be forgotten.



He was preceded in death by his father Reyes Cisneros of Ozona.

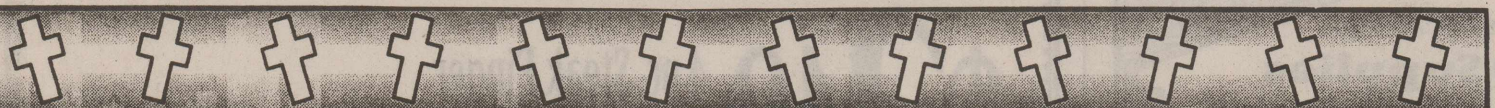
