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

Commissioners discuss repairs to LADY LION HUSTLE courthouse roof, air conditioning

Repairs and renovation of the Crockett County Courthouse is a goal the Crockett County Commissioners' Court has set

During Monday's monthly major areas of the courthouse that need immediate attention, the roof and air conditioner system.

County Judge Fred Deaton said that he has talked with officials at the Texas Historical Commission about getting on their courthouse renovation grant program.

Deaton said that officials at the commission told him that the grant money probably wouldn't be available until 2008, but that the historical commission happy the Texas Historical Commission is interested in coming to look at the courthouse and the immediate repairs that need to be done.

Normally, the historical commission recommends using a boiler system and chilling water system, which is very expensive, Deaton said.

Historical commission officials said they have had a lot of reported problems with this type of system, and there is no one availably locally to maintain it,



Located at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce/Visitor Center, the local phone bank will be in operation from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. that night.

Originating live from the Abilene Civic Center, the telethon will be carried by 10 television stations covering Texas and portions of New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Fast-forward 11 years later. Students of today are now faced with a test that makes the one I took look like joke.

The Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills test, or TAKS, is now the new four-letter word to many students.

This year, the Texas Legislature will look at a bill proposed by State Sen. Florence Shapiro, R-Plano, that wants to replace the TAKS in middle and high school with an end-of-year course exam in various subjects.

Shapiro is thinking about using such an exam as an exit test. Currently, high school students must pass their TAKS tests in order to receive their high

Eleven years ago I eagerly This happened in Ozona last year. While the two students have now passed the TAKS, they were denied walking across stage with their classmates because of not passing this test.

> According to the Texas Education Agency, 11 percent, nearly 28,000 students, of the 2006 graduating class didn't get diplomas because they flunked the TAKS. That was their sixth try at passing it.

> These are not all students who just goof off. Many of these students do attend class, study hard and pass their classes.

While students are given many chances to pass this test, a student's graduation should not come down to just one test.

TAKS testing needs to be removed. I see this type of testing as harming our students and our teachers.

Teachers are often forced to "teach the test" which leaves behind skills that students need to be taught to help them when they graduate.

I have seen this test hurt other school programs, such as vocational studies, because schools have to schedule extra periods for students for TAKS tutorials.

The State doesn't help either by basing how much funding a district receives on their TAKS test scores.

While testing to prove what students are learning will probably never go away, to base a student's outcome on one test instead of what all they have accomplished and learned in four Exit tests are not new. Texas years of high school hurts our

They finally received orders to be shipped home Jan. 31, 1946. He was discharged Feb. 4, 1946.

He returned to ranching in Val Verde and Crockett Counties. He married Nov. 8, 1946. One year was enjoyed before the drought of the '50s began. He purchased an old truck and trucked feed for other ranchers while he ground sotol to feed his stock and raised pigs on the free feed. He was fondly known as a disciplined and dedicated musician who demanded the best from his students. The pride he instilled in his students will nev- dens Cemetery in McAllen







County Road Superintendent Eddie Moore said one of the road department's goals for this year is to finish the new softball park south of town.

Texas Energy has donated the new scoreboard and now the county needs to finish building the stands, concession stand and restrooms, as well as installing the sprinkler system.

'We need to get this field ready to play," Moore said. **NEW ROOF FOR JAIL**

Crockett County Sheriff Shane Fenton presented the commissioners about a new roof on the jail.

Fenton said the last time it rained, it cost his department \$45,000 due to leaks ruining equipment. Since that time, Fenton said he has fixed what he could, but there are some leaks that he couldn't fix.

Housing is also a problem, with the jail averaging 20-25 inmates. The jail can only legally hold 17. Last month the sheriff's department housed 12-13 inmates out-of-county.

Fenton said he thinks the state could cut the capacity down

"Jail inspection has been put off for two months now. I don't think we'll have any problem in passing, but I do think they will cut us down on inmates," Fenton said.

Fenton said he would like the commissioners to contact the company the school has been using for their roof repairs.

"I know the possibility of a new jail is 2 to 3 years down the road. I need something fixed quickly," Fenton said.

Childress said he wants the jail roof to be placed on the agenda for next month for the Feb. 12 meeting.

'Even if we build a new jail that is our building and we need to do something now," Childress said.



McCall backs Pitts in campaign to unseat current House Speaker



stated in this column a week ago, when the Texas Legislature convenes Jan. 9, the 150 members of the Texas House

of Representatives will choose who among them will preside as speaker.

Last week, it seemed state Rep. Brian McCall, R-Plano, was going to give incumbent Speaker Tom Craddick, R-Midland, a run for his money. But Rep. Jim Pitts, R-Waxa-

hachie, said he would challenge Craddick for the post. And then McCall, who claimed support from Republicans and Democrats, said he would support Pitts. In effect, Pitts said he

would preside over the House in a kinder, gentler fashion than Craddick, whose strongarm tactics have been described in many journals.

Pitts also told reporters he guaranteed he would win, but he declined when asked to produce a list of members who pledged to support him.

But it is votes on the House floor, not pledge cards, that matter. Whoever wins will need 76 votes - 50 percent of 150 seats in

the House, plus one. Craddick, 63, was elected speaker in January 2003 after serving 34 years as a House member. He was re-elected

speaker in 2005. Pitts, an attorney by trade, turned 60 years old on Jan. 1. He has been a House member for the last seven sessions, having been elected in 1992.

BUDGET BOARD MEETING IS MOVED

Meanwhile, on a less political front, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and Speaker Craddick on Jan. 3 jointly announced the postponing and rescheduling of a meeting of the Legislative Budget Board.

They said: "We are firmly committed to delivering the nearly \$14 billion in local school property tax relief approved by the legislature last May and promised to the people of Texas for the next blennium.






