

and Development (RC&D) Council is sponsoring the meeting at 9:30 a.m. March 20 at the Iraan Civic Center.

The purpose of the meeting is to provide an open forum for landowners, lessees (land managers) that operate along the river, and other interested parties to address concerns and issues along the Pecos River, and to see if


there is an interest in developing an organization for addressing those concerns on a large geographic scale.

A stakeholder would be any person who feels that they have a stake in what happens in the watershed. They could be concerned about the amount of water in the river or concerned about uncontrolled access to the river.

A stakeholder could be a person who The Pecos Valley Resource Conservation wants salt cedar treated or a person who wants salt cedar left alone. It could be a government employee who needs to deliver information to land users or a person looking for information on history along the river.

In short, a stakeholder is anyone who is interested in the Pecos River for whatever rea-

ceptance of Levi English into the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md. Since 1845, this venerated institution has educated young men and women with the results being the world's most formidable Navy. Technologies, tactics and the advancement of Naval strength necessarily change through the years, but the qualities of leadership, steadfastness and integrity are above all else and never change.

So far, as I know, Levi is the first in the 115-year history of the Ozona School System to be accepted into the Naval Academy. Other Ozona High School students have graduated from other service academies and have done well, but this is a first.

Having said that, I feel it is necessary to point out the headline "Anchors Away" is erroneous. The correct term is "Aweigh" and denotes that the ship's anchor is clear of the harbor bottom and the ship is free to maneuver, thus instantly coming under a different category of "rules of the road." This term is incorporated into the school's song "Anchor is aweigh..." and goes on to extol one's personal career advances as his anchor is clear and becomes aweigh.

In any event, we congratulate soon-to-be Midshipman English and our fervent hope is that some 30 years hence he will return to his Crockett County roots as Admiral English to receive additional honor and respect due a distinguished officer.

Museum to showcase traveling ASU wool and mohair exhibit

"Clipped: Sheep Shearers and the West Texas Wool Industry" an exhibit utilizing materials and research from Angelo State University's West Texas Collection (WTC), will be on display through the second week in April at the Crockett County Museum.

The exhibit focuses on the role of the region's sheep shearers, 99 percent of whom were Hispanic, and follows the evolution of the West Texas wool industry from its beginning in the 1870s until the present.

The exhibit will also include the display of a bronze sculpture of a sheep shearer by San Angelo artist Raul Ruiz, whose family has been involved in the industry for many generations. The sculpture will be the centerpiece of the exhibit, which debuted in July 2006 in Kerrville at the anand Goat Raisers Association mohair. (TSGRA).





House 'busts' spending cap with senior citizen property tax break



a measure guaranteeing a property tax break for senior citizens by "busting" the state spending cap.

Warren Chisum, R-Pampa, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, said it wouldn't be a problem to devote \$14 billion to tax relief for seniors now, before the House gets any deeper into the budgeting process.

Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville, voted in favor of the bill.

SCR 20 passed on a vote of 95-50, drawing opposition from House members who felt it would be better to wait until:

(1) State Comptroller Susan Combs delivers a revenue estimate, and (2) the House Appropriations Committee prioritizes and funds all of the demands in the state budget.

Reps. Jim Dunnam, D-Waco, and Pete Gallego, D-Alpine, said passing SCR 20 was putting the cart before the horse. Both lawmakers said the House, like a family, has to know how much money is in the bank before deciding how to spend it.

COAL PLANT PLAN SLOWS DOWN

Austin State District Judge Stephen Yelenosky in effect said "not so-fast" to Gov. Rick Perry's executive order to speed up by six months the permit process for the building of 11 coal-fired power plants on sites across Texas.

Yelenosky instructed judges with the State Office of Administrative Hearings to ignore Perry 's executive order. That office conducts the public hearings, and the input from those hearings is supposed to go into the decision-making process. The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality has the final say.

Groups of citizens have been protesting the construction of new coal-fired power plants, arguing that the plants pose health hazards by dumping toxins and particulate matter into the air.

Activists staged anti-coal demonstrations downtown and a small plane putted along in the sky above the Capitol dome, dragging a banner picturing a child 's coal-smeared face with the words "Coal Is Dirty."

LAWMAKERS FIGHT **HPV ORDER**

Gov. Perry's early February executive order requiring girls entering the sixth grade to get vaccinated against Human papillomavirus raised a ruckus in the Texas Legislature.

Lawmakers are moving toward passing legislation to override Perry's executive order.

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Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Lewisville, and others, criticized the chief executive for trying to legislate and for trying to seize parents' authority to make decisions concerning the health of their children.

The governor's connection to pharmaceutical giant Merck, the manufacturer of Gardasil, the vaccine for HPV, has prompted questions on his motive for issuing the executive order.

DEFIBRILLATOR LEGISLATION IS FILED

Texas schools that don't already have Automated External Defibrillators would be required to get them under legislation sponsored by Rep. Juan "Chuy" Hinoiosa, D-McAllen.

Hinojosa's Senate Bill 7 is part of Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst's sweeping "Texas Children First" package of legislation.

The devices, which cost about \$2,000, are capable of restarting a stopped heart. The need for them at school athletic functions has been widely publicized. Co-authors of SB 7 include

Sens. Jane Nelson, R-Lewisville; Leticia Van de Putte, D-San Antonio; Bob Deuell, R-Greenville; and Florence Shapiro, R-Plano.

About half of the state's 8,000 public school campuses do not have the lifesaving devices, the Texas Education Agency reported **BILL ADDRESSES**

FUTURE WATER NEEDS

Sen. Kip Averitt, R-Waco, on Feb. 22, filed legislation to develop, manage and preserve the state 's water supply decades into the future.

Senate Bill 3 addresses flow requirements and water rights permitting and includes measures to manage existing and future water supplies.

Texas must encourage land use practices that maximize water availability for generations to come, said State Senator Carlos Uresti, R-San Antonio.

Texas' millions of acres of open, rural land can significantly help "create" more water, reduce flooding, replenish aquifers, and release water more slowly and steadily into springs, streams, rivers, lakes, and, eventually, our bays and estuaries, Uresti said.

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, lauded Averitt for filing SB 3, saying, "By the year 2060 our population will have more than doubled, yet the amount of available water will remain the same.

"That means unless we take the necessary steps today, we will lack the water we need to support our fast growing population tomorrow."
