

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

graduated a few years before me from the same school his degree was in Animal Husbandry, while mine was in Animal Science. So, we all know who is the smarter of the two, right? Don't get me wrong, we both had the same teachers, took the same classes and used the same textbooks but prior to my enrolling the college changed the name of the major. They also changed the institution from a mere college to a University making me much more high-

ly educated. Because I am an animal scientist and ReRide is merely a husbandman I feel it is my duty to keep him updated on the latest science in our industry. Now, in my neck of the woods we've had the worst grass season on record and as a result local ranchers are being forced to make some very difficult decisions in severely culling their cow herds. Because of my superior education ReRide asked me to help him cull his

"What's your plan," I asked ReRide as we appraised his cows in the corral.

"Being merely an animal husbandry grad I figured we'd just cull them on age.

"Not wise," I said in a conly I was reading an article about research done at Mississippi State from which I concluded that disposition is a far more important than all other traits. You see ReRide, we build up our herds using EPD's for weight, carcass traits and feedlot performance but if the cow has a nasty disposition all that goes to waste. The professors found that there can be over a \$40 difference in profit between the bad actors and the docile animals."

"I believe that," said ReRide. "And that probably doesn't even Dianne Lott take into account the broken fences, hospital bills and dark cutters you get from wild cattle."

> "Very good ReRide, that's very observant for an animal husbandry graduate."

> "But how do you propose we cull my cattle on disposition?" he asked.

"In the Mississippi study they used three factors: how the cattle behaved in the pen, in the leaving the squeeze chute."

"Exit velocity! That's a good one," said ReRide. "But how do we measure that?"

"Initially I thought we'd borrow one of those radar trailers the cops put by the side of the road to tell how fast over the speed limit you're driving."

"That's a good idea," said

"It would be if I knew any Highway Patrolman but the only ones I've met were for a brief time. And not under the best circumstances, if you know what I mean? But I do know a baseball coach and he let me borrow the radar gun he uses to measure how fast his pitchers throw."

"You're a genius," said Re-Ride, seeming to get smarter all

The hypothesis that bad actors in the pen and the squeeze chute would also have the fastest exit velocity was proving correct as we worked ReRide's cattle. That is until we got a real nasty cow in the chute who disproved the theory. This was primarily because she got so excited she had a fatal heart attack and failed to leave the chute at all. At least under her own power. But the rest of the time there was a direct correlation. One man-killing cow that

we named Fastball, for reasons that will soon become apparent, proved the validity of the Mississippi research beyond a shadow of a doubt. After nearly dismantling the chute we expected Fastball to exit faster than a cut cat but her fleetness surprised even ReRide, who had not quite finished checking Fastball's dentition when I prematurely opened the head gate. According to the radar gun Fastball had an exit velocity 40 miles per hour over the speed limit and was picking up speed! Although, in all fairness to Fastball, I should say that it may have been a false reading as the radar gun could have actually have been measuring the speed of ReRide, who was trying to outrun the hard charging cow. Anyone who has ever met a Highway Patrolman, however briefly, is familiar with the concept that radar guns often give false readings. Right?

They did a random sampling of every category of the collection and used statistics from the Annual Report to the Texas State Library to compare our usage to other libraries in the System.

The results are great. Our library's collection is 86 percent in good or excellent condition. In comparison, CCPL has a higher than average circulation, circulation per capita, and collection turnover. These figures indicate that the library is performing well in its endeavor to provide the informational and recreational reading needs of our community

This type of evaluation is very important for our small library. It gives us guidelines to follow to provide the best service for our community according to their library usage. The evaluation showed that use of the Adult Fiction book collection was almost 30 percent of the total annual circulation, followed by the Children's book collection


Colin Trevor Williams

with open arms.



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Storm brings sheets of rain, flooding

Water seemed to flow everywhere last week in Crockett County.

A severe thunderstorm on May 9 not only brought moisture to the ground, but also in many homes and local businesses.

With much of Crockett County already damp from rains earlier in the week, the four inches that dropped in one hour on that Wednesday quickly began to rise on streets and in the draws. Shelly Childress said that the ranch she lives on has received 7.1 inches in the past two weeks.

A wave of water hit Avenue H, a brick wall was knocked down in front of the Heritage Building at the high school and even the bridges crossing the draws saw water being swept up on them.

The storm also hit right at the time Ozona schools were getting ready to dismiss for the day.

Superintendent Abe Gott directed all schools to be on a lockdown, which meant the students were to remain at school unless the parent physically came in and demanded to take their child.

In the worst of the storm, school officials encouraged parents not to take their students, but for the parents and children to stay inside the building, said Primary School Principal Carole Allen.

When the tornado sirens were activated, teachers and staff immediately got students into the areas designated in each school for tornado drills.

According to the National Weather Service, a tornado was reported 11 miles west of Sonora. In Crockett County, several weather spotters reported seeing rotating clouds around town.

At the intermediate school, Principal Manley Holmes blew his whistle down each hall and calmly got students and teachers into the two main hallways.

At the middle school, students gathered into the center of the building and at the high school students headed for the basement of the Heritage Building.



Tornado Safety -

• IN HOMES AND SMALL BUILDINGS – go to the basement or a small interior room such as a closet, bathroom or an interior hallway on the lowest level. Protect yourself from flying debris with thick blankets, sleeping bags or mattresses.

• AT SCHOOLS, HOSPITALS, FACTORIES AND SHOPPING MALLS - Go to the designated shelter areas, usually an interior hallway on the lowest floor without windows. Kneel on the floor against the wall and place hands over your head to provide some protection for your head.

• FOR MOBILE HOMES, PORTABLE CLASS-ROOMS OR VEHICLES - leave them and go to a strong building for shelter. If there is no shelter nearby get into the nearest ditch or depression. Lie flat with your hands shielding your head.

Flood Safety -

• If flooding occurs get to higher ground. Get out of areas subject to flooding. This includes dips, low spots, canyons, washes etc...

• Avoid areas already flooded, especially if the water is flowing fast. Do not attempt to cross flowing streams.

· Road beds may be washed out under flood waters. Never drive through flooded roadways.

The Siren system in Ozona:

• Three blasts - the fire department has an incident to respond to. The siren is used only from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. and the department tries not to use the siren during church times and funerals.

• One long siren - weather alert and when this siren is used, it is too late to go anywhere. Everyone should take cover until the bad weather passes. Never try to outrun a storm.

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

SB 103 by Sen. Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, is crafted

to enhance transparency of its operations, prosecute offenses committed within the agency, and improve the hiring practices of guards.

The bill's House sponsor, Rep Jerry Madden, R-Richardson, said, "The abuse and poor performance identified at the TYC cannot be allowed to continue. This bill reforms the structure, management and oversight of the commission to provide true rehabilitation, not just the punitive warehousing that characterizes the system today."

In related news, Will Harrell, executive director of the Texas chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union, was named ombudsman for the TYC, contingent on passage of SB 103. His job will be to evaluate and secure youths' rights.

AGENCY WOULD SEND **BORDER FUNDS**

The House on May 7 passed its version of the border security

HB 13 by Rep. David Swinford, R-Dumas, creates a border security council to oversee distribution of more than \$100 million to border law enforcement

Swinford's bill encourages cities and counties to cooperate with federal agencies in immigration matters.

The bill also provides for a study to evaluate expedited deportation of illegal immigrants held in state jails and prisons for criminal offenses.

Speaker Tom Craddick said, "This is one of the most important pieces of legislation that we will pass this session as it affects the safety of every citizen of this state and country.'

The bill moves to the Senate for further consideration.

BILL TIES TEACHER RAISE TO TAX RELIEF

Also moving to the Senate for further consideration is HB 2785, legislation reducing the school property tax rate to 91 cents per \$100 valuation in the 2008-2009 biennium.

An amendment to HB 2785 by Rep. Jim Dunnam, D-Waco, prevents the state from reducing property taxes further without giving school districts and openenrollment charter schools as The House on May 7 ten- amount equivalent to \$6,000 for every full-time teacher, librarian and counselor.

> Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, who presides over the Senate, said Dunnam's amendment "tacks on \$4.4 billion in other costs which would likely gut tax relief that we promised Texans last year."

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
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
