OZONA HIGH SCHOOL CLASS OF 2007

Commissioner arrested for allegedly Stockman to be closed portraying a law enforcement official

Crockett County Commissioner Alfredo Tobar was arrested last week for allegedly impersonating a law enforcement official and for allegedly possessing another person's social security card.

Tobar was arrested on May 14. He is currently out on bond.

He was charged with impersonating a public servant, which is a third degree felony and is punishable up to 10 years in prison and a fine not to exceed \$10,000, according to the Texas Penal Code.

lobar was also charged with fraudulent use of possession of identifying information, a state jail felony that is punishable up to two years in prison and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

According to an affidavit filed in the Crockett County Justice of the Peace Office by Chief Deputy Ron Hawthorne, Tobar talked to two employees of Amigo Chemical Control, while they were working at the gate to the Devon gas compressor station on May 13. The station is located 3.5 miles south of Ozona.

Tobar approached the employees and said that he was working with the law, the affida-

men stated that their employer, Brooks Long, had a license.

lobar also asked both men for their social security cards so he could photograph them. Jose Antonio Rivera gave

Tobar his card for the photograph, as well as a sample of the chemical they were using, the affidavit stated.

Rivera said he thought Tobar was a law enforcement official, the affidavit stated.

The other employee, Armando Prado, refused to give Tobar his social security card, the affidavit stated. Prado also told Tobar that he worked for Brooks Long who also works for law enforcement. Long is the Texas Ranger for Crockett County and other areas counties.

Prado then called Long on a ployees if they had a license to telephone. Tobar spoke to Long spray, the affidavit stated. Both on the phone and then left, the

Prado's son, Armando Prado Jr., saw Tobar arrive in a black pickup truck and start taking photographs of the site, the affidavit stated.

Prado Jr. said he thought Tobar might be a safety officer, the affidavit stated.

Prado Jr. also said he saw Tobar take a photograph of an Amigo Chemical Control business card that his father presented to Tobar. Also, Prado Jr. stated he saw his father call Long about Tobar being there, the affidavit

The former manager of Wool Growers Central Storage Martinez also said that as Co. has been officially charged by the U.S. Attorney's Office.

Donnie Laughin is facing a federal felony charge of allegedly engaging in monetary transactions in property derived from specified unlawful activity, which falls under racketeering, or conspiring to organize a

According to court documents filed May 17 in the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Texas, Laughlin carwould not have cooperated with ried on a scheme to defraud and obtained \$2,072,326.56 from

and wool stored at the Ozona and Sanderson warehouses.

Laughlin allegedly carried out the scheme by selling producers' wool and mohair, and not paying the producers the money they were owed, the documents state. Laughlin also sold the products without the producers' knowledge or permission.

Instead of deducting fees for storage and commissions from these sales, and paying over the balance to the producer, Laughlin would either keep the money for himself or transfer the money from the mohair/wool sales bank account to the bank account of the Wool Growers retail business, the documents

Three campus options include outstanding musician building a new primary school

Four options, including one that will build a new school for Pre-K through fifth grades on the primary school site, were presented to the School Facilities Improvement Committee and the Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees during a meeting on May 17.

Architects from Pfluger and Associates presented options that also included Pre-K through fifth at the primary school and fourth through eighth at the middle school, Pre-K through fifth at the intermediate and fourth through eighth at the middle school and Pre-K through fifth at the intermediate school.

The options also included new kitchens for the Pre-K through third or the Pre-K through fifth campuses.

At an earlier meeting, the committee and the board voted to go to from four campuses to three.

Cost for the building of a new school on the primary site was estimated at \$9.5 million. This price also includes the cost of demolishing the current pri-

To keep the primary, while splitting grades with the middle school, it was \$9.4 million.

To keep the intermediate, while splitting grades with the middle school, it was \$8.165 million.

The classrooms at the middle school would be added on to the back of the school, and would be adjacent to the cafeteria and gymnasium. The property across from the middle school would be designed as a new playground area.

To house Pre-K through fifth at the intermediate, it was \$6.836 million.

The last two options did not include costs for possible demolition to the primary school. The prices are only con-

struction costs. Around 18 to

23 percent needs to be added to count for surveys, architect fees and inflation, said Kent Niemann with Pfluger and Associates.

"All of the amounts are close and based on the amount of work that we do," Niemann said.

During the meeting, a vote was taken by the group as to which option was liked best. Thirteen people voted for building a new school at the primary site, six people voted to have Pre-K through third at the intermediate and fourth through fifth at the middle school and four people voted for Pre-K through fifth at the intermediate.

At the end of the meeting another vote was taken again. This time 14 people voted to build a new school, six voted to house Pre-K through fifth at the intermediate and one voted to have Pre-K through third at the intermediate and fourth and fifth at the middle school.



Green: As In Cash

to be "carbon neutral". Theoretically you do this by canceling out your carbon emissions with carbon credits. The best example I can think of to explain this concept is to use the man who started all this with his horror-documentary about the world-ending possibilities brought about by global

Shortly after Al Gore's movie won two Oscars for begging everyone to become carbon neutral journalists discovered that Al's electricity use in one of his three houses was twenty times the national average. Gore tells consumers to change their lives and to curb use of "dirty energy" but according to the Nashville Electric Service, the Gore family mansion uses 221,000 kilowatthours of electricity compared to 10,656 kilowatt-hours for the average American household. The Governator of California, for example, can still be the "green king" so long as he buys brownie points to offset all the hot air produced by his speeches and his fleet of Hummers. The trade in carbon credits would be sort of like the futures markets, with tradable certificates, corrupt CEO's and billionaire carbon traders. What a brilliant concept! Why didn't I think of this? With this idea someone is going to become seriously green... as in cash.

Airlines are even talking

The big fad these days about giving carbon credits inamongst politicians, Hollywood stead of frequent flyer miles and actors and environmentalists is a new car company figures it will lose thousands of dollars on every green car it sells but make a profit by selling carbon credits to GM and Ford.

Homeless people could get rich off this deal. Because they walk instead of drive, have no air conditioning or forced-air-heating and recycle cans and bottles they can sell their unused carbon credits. The cold, hard concrete floors they live on are actually heat sinks and the cardboard appliance boxes they live in are made of recycled materials. Instead of begging for quarters they can just sell their carbon credits to rich people who need them to remain guiltfree. Like magic, our homeless problem is solved! Old hippies are another group who will prosper. Because they eat tofu, live in hemp houses, and don't work, they produce no greenhouse gases and therefore would be eligible to trade in their carbon credits for more hemp.


Hester-Armstrong to wed June 30

The couple will marry at 3:30 p.m. June 30, 2007 at Calvary Baptist Church in Ozona.





Craig Deaton said he voted to house Pre-K through fifth at the intermediate school because that is the newest building in the district.

"If we are going to add on to something, we need to add on to our newest building and get rid of our oldest building," he said.

Bernice Fierro said she doesn't like have Pre-K students in the same building with fifth graders. She said she would rather see the forth and fifth grades at the middle school.

Fierro also said it would be easier to sell the intermediate campus than the primary because the primary needs so much

Board member Tom Anderson said the district is lacking in housing, and that the district could convert the property into apartments.

fraudulent sales had been transferred and deposited into the Wool Growers retail business bank account, Laughlin would then order the money to be used for regular business expenses of the Wool Growers retail business or would be used by Laughlin in the form of unauthorized additional salary checks and cash, the documents stated.

that Laughlin allegedly committed mail fraud by authorizing approximately 34 envelopes from five buyers of wool and mohair that were addressed to "Wool Growers Central Storage" in Ozona. The envelopes contained approximately 34 checks payable to "Wool Growers Central nally derived property involved Storage" or "Sanderson Wool Commission" totaling approximately \$758,552.63.

Laughlin was hired in 1991 as manager of Wool Growers.

Former bookkeeper of Wool Growers, Tonya McGuire Stalcup pled guilty during a May 3 hearing to frauds and swindling The documents also state and aiding and abetting, court documents stated.

Central Storage Co.

Stalcup is out on bond awaiting sentencing, but is facing a possible prison term of 20 years and a fine to not exceed \$250,000, or a fine not more than twice the amount of the crimiin the transaction.

There's also the possibility of an initial term of supervised

In the plea agreement, Stalcup agreed that the total loss amount is approximately \$200,000 and that she owes restitution

Wool Growers filed for bankruptcy in April 2006. A hearing on the bankruptcy reorganization plan was held May 3 in the U.S. Federal Courthouse in San Angelo.

The majority of creditors have filed to approve the plan, but a group called the Wardlaw Creditors filed an objection and voted against the plan.

The Wardlaw Creditors consist of Jack David Wardlaw, Jesse Lem Wardlaw and Warlaw Brothers, which is composed of Jack David Wardlaw III, Mack Miers Wardlaw and William Chase Wardlaw, all of Sonora.

As of press time Monday, U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Robert L. Jones had not issued an opinion, ruling on the plan.







May 18 Gov. Rick Perry vetoed HB 1892, legislation that would have preserved local control over toll road

Perry wants a bill that will centralize control through the Texas Department of Transportation. TxDOT would execute his Trans Texas Corridor plan, a statewide matrix of toll road projects to be built and run by Zachry, a San Antonio-based firm, and Cintra, a Spanish company.

In his explanation of the veto, Perry said HB 1892 "jeopardizes billions of dollars of infrastructure investment and invites a potentially significant reduction in federal transportation funding.

JESSICA'S LAW HEADS TO GOVERNOR

The House and Senate agreed to compromise language on HB 8, "Jessica's Law" legislation enacting new charges and tougher penalties for sexually violent acts against children younger than 14.

The bill, by Rep. Debbie Riddle, R-Houston, will make sexually violent offenders subject to penalties ranging from a 25-year minimum sentence on a first offense to the death penalty for repeat offenses.

Certain offenders also would be denied parole and subjected to GPS monitoring should they ever be released from prison, the author said.

And, HB 8 directs the Texas attorney general's office to support local prosecutors in pedophile cases.

Gov. Perry is expected to sign the bill, which is written to take effect Sept. 1.

In a related matter, Perry already has signed another piece of legislation that requires the Department of Public Safety to collect detailed information on sexual assaults that occur in Texas.

HB 76 by Rep. Eliott Naishtat, D-Austin, and Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D- Laredo, addresses a lack in statewide statistics on sexual assault.
