HOW SCHOOL PROPERTY VALUATIONS HAVE GROWN

Since 1949 with no increase ir the rate, property valuations for school tax purposes in Muleshoe Independent School District have grown nearly \$2 million.

Figures for the six years, thru 1954, are as follows: 1949, \$8,253,626; 1950 \$9,144 320; 1951, \$9,426,616; 1952, \$9-592,245; 1953, \$9,747,350; and

1954, \$10,216,851. Actually, the figures for 1954 will be more than \$11 million, because, whereas the valuation rate has always been 75 per cent of actual value, the rate for this unusual expenses like the gymnasium building, etc.

But as rapidly as valuations, due to improvement of property in the district, have increase, enrollment has kept pace and increased even faster, so that now the district still doesn't have enough housing for its pupils.

The first \$1200 of retirement income received by retired employees is not subject to income

Working mothers, widows and widowers who pay for the care of their children under 12 years of age will get some tax relief. Up to \$600 paid for this purpose in any year will be free of tax.

The bill provides more liberal deductions for medical expenses. Under present law, the taxpayer can deduct only those medical expenses amounting to more than 5 per cent of his income. Under the Senate bill, he can get a deduction for all medical expenses totaling more than 3 per cent of his income.

Exemptions for dependents under 19 years of age, or who are students, are permitted even though they earn over \$600 a The bill provides that foster parents and foster children may be claimed as tax dependents.

Farmers can spend up to onefourth of their farm income for soil and water conservation purposes and not pay taxes on income spent in that way.

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WASHINGTON, D. C., July 8-Senator Lyndon Johnson's bill to extend additional payments from Federal funds for aid to the aged, blind and disabled and to dependent children has been incorporatd into the overall Social Security bill, and Senator Johnson has filed a statement with the Senate Finance Committee urging approval of the increase.

The Texas Senator introduced his bill in May. He obtained as co-sponsors all Democratic members of the Senate.

is measure is designed to meet a serious crisis", Senator Johnson said. "Two years ago, Congress approved legislation increasing for a two-year period the Federal share of public-assistance payments to States. The increase was \$5 a month for aid to the aged, blind and disabled and \$3 a month for grants to dependent children.

"This increase will expire Sep nber 30 unless it is extend.

"Unless legislation extending the increase is approved, Texas will lose approximately \$13,-400,000 a year in Federal funds for old-age assistance.

'Certainly this increased pay ment must be kept in effect. It should be larger. Failure to act during this session of Congress would mean a sharp reduction in the fiving standards of many thousands of worthy Texas citi-
