Principals switch campuses

Allen to high school, Webb to primary

Three out of the four campuses will have new principals this fall.

Dan Webb and Carole Allen have switched duties, with Allen taking over as Ozona High School Principal and Webb going back to being principal at Ozona Primary School.

Webb and his wife Cynthia Webb, were offered jobs with Fort Davis Independent School District. Dan Webb

was offered to be the principal at Dirks Anderson Elementary School, while Cynthia was offered to teach at the junior/senior high school in Fort Davis.

Superintendent Abe Gott said Allen wanted the high school job, and that he approached Dan Webb about staying in Ozona and being the primary school principal.

The Webbs have been in Ozona since 1999.

Dan Webb taught biology, physics and chemistry before becoming Ozona Primary School Principal in 2004-2005.

He was then appointed Ozona High School Principal in May 2005.

Allen was principal of Ozona Primary School last year. The year before that, she was counselor at OHS.

Prior to coming to Ozona, Allen spent four years as Pre-K through 12th grade principal in Lohn.

Benny Granger was named principal for Ozona Middle School at the June board meeting. Granger has spent the last two years as Athletic Director in Ozona.

State approves funding for Crockett County Airport

The Crockett County Airport has received approval for \$85,140 by the Texas Transportation Commission at its June meeting.

The funds will be used for planned airport improvements, which includes an automated weather observing system.

A contract for the project is expected to be awarded this summer.

Project costs will be funded through TxDOT's Aviation Facilities Grant Program, which

preserves and improves the state's general aviation system, and Crockett County.

This year, TxDOT expects to provide approximately \$60 million in funding for planning, constructing and maintaining community airports.

Approximately 275 community airports in Texas are eligible for funding.

Arrivals and departures from community airports account for more than three million flight hours per year and provide aircraft facilities for agricultural, medical, business and commuter use.

Commissioners vote to wait on reimbursement of attorney fees

Hearing both sides of the story is what the Crockett County Commissioners want to do before reimbursing a county commissioner for attorney fees.

The commissioners voted to consider reimbursing a county commissioner's attorney fees after the case is resolved in court. Commissioner Alfredo Tobar abstained from voting on the motion.

Tobar had requested the reimbursement be placed on Monday's meeting agenda. The request stems from a recent arrest, where Tobar was charged for allegedly impersonating a law enforcement official and for allegedly possessing another person's social security card.

County Attorney Jody Upham presented an opinion regarding the reimbursement matter that stated the county has the authority to reimburse a county employee or official's legal fees, as long as the commissioners feel that it serves a public purpose.

Upham also said that there is an opportunity to reimburse after the case is settled.

In a letter to the editor from Tobar's daughter, Vanessa Tobar Guadarrama, Tobar claims that he was serving a purpose as a commissioner by checking chemicals and the employees' certifications on a site where Amigo Chemical Control Inc. was spraying.

"We just hear one side of the story. I don't want to vote on something if I just hear one side. We need to know how it could benefit the county. You need to hear both sides and you need to listen to what has happened," said Commissioner Frank Tambunga.

COURTHOUSE ROOF & RESTORATION

A compromise with the Texas Historical Commission is the next step the county is pursuing to try and get a new roof on the Crockett County Courthouse.

Deaton said in the 1901 courthouse plans, the roof was a combination of barrel roll and standing seam shingles.

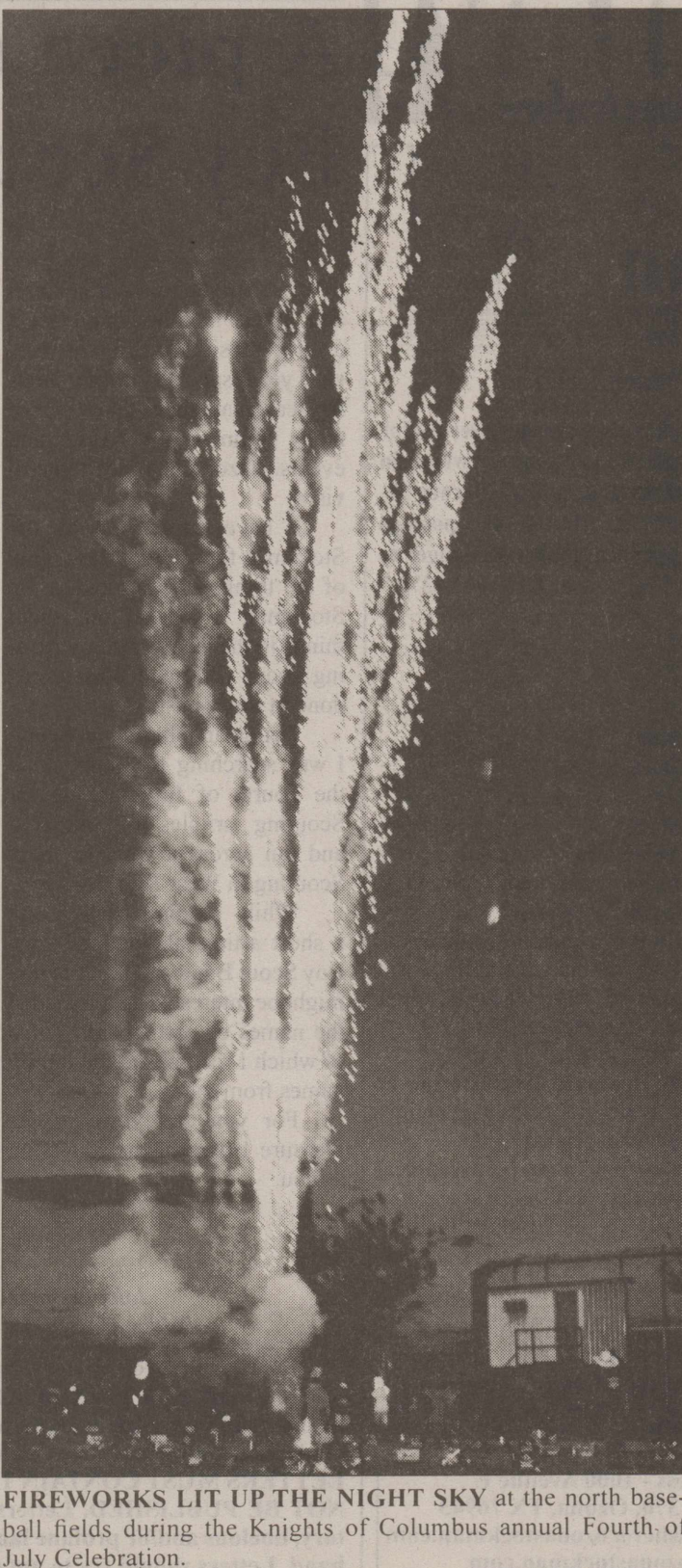
The standing seam area is the largest part of the building, which is the part that has the potential to leak.

The THC has stressed to the county to apply for the next round of Courthouse Preservation Grants, a program the THC has established to restore Texas Courthouses.

Commissioner Pleas Childress III said he has talked to people in several counties that went through the restoration program, and they are not happy with the results.

"I've heard a couple of judges state they wish they hadn't done it, which kind of makes me wonder," Childress said.

Take time to attend meetings

Nearly every week I load up my laptop and head off to another meeting.

Meetings where issues are discussed and policies set that affect our county, our schools and sometimes our wellbeing.

While the board members or county officials are always present at these meetings, the one thing I find disturbing is not a lot of the public is there.

As a journalist, it is my duty to attend these meetings to inform the public about what issues are discussed and actions are taken that can affect the citizens of Crockett County.

I understand that everyone's lives are busy and that finding the time to sit in a meeting is not always practical.

However, the people of Crockett County should not be intimidated in attending these meetings. School board meetings, county commissioners meetings, any meeting of a governmental body are open to the public.

Often times, government groups try to hide or intimidate the public from coming to their meetings. No one should ever be frightened to attend a public meeting.

Remember these are people that you, a voter, elected. They are members of our community just like anyone else.

In the next few months, our school board will be discussing a possible bond issue. A bond issue that the voters of Crockett County may have a chance to cast ballots on in November.

Meetings for this bond issue will be public. Whether they are regularly held school board meetings or special meetings, all these meetings are open for the public to attend and get their questions answered.

The county commissioners are also looking at the possibility of building a new jail. County Judge Fred Deaton has said that it will be up to the public to decide if a new jail is built or not.

Once again, the public can educate themselves through reading this paper or attending meetings to obtain the facts.

Elected officials often try to challenge the act. Last year, two city council members from Alpine challenged the act that prohibits discussing public business in secret. The judge ruled in favor of the Texas Open Meetings Act.

The state of Texas finds the act so important that starting in 2006 elected and appointed public officials are required by a state law to receive training in Texas open government laws. The Office of the Texas Attorney General offers free video training courses.

There is no punishment for not completing the training, but the Texas Attorney General's Office states officials should be cautioned that a deliberate failure to comply with the training requirements could result in an increased risk of criminal prosecution should they ever be accused of violating the Open Meetings Act.

The act is there to protect the public. The act is there to give the public a chance to hear what their government is doing.

Someone once asked me if I enjoy covering all these meetings. I will admit not all meetings are a joy, but covering them is my job to be the public's eyes and ears.

Time is precious to all of us. Taking the time to attend local meetings is not time wasted for anybody.

BOY SCOUT BAND AT OZONA

Several publications published over the years on the history of Ozona made mention of a Boy Scout Band in Ozona in 1926 and 1927. A story in the Crockett County Golden Anniversary Historical Edition of 1941 stated "The first band in Ozona was organized by Mrs. "Red" Smith in November 1926. It was organized as a Boy Scout Band comprising school students and made its first public appearance in the town park on July 4, 1927, during the rodeo. The band was sponsored by the P.T.A. as a school band in 1927-1928.

"Members were Eugene Montgomery, P. C. Coates, Pleas Childress, Tot Grimer, Clifton Monteith, Bill Friend, Slick Miller, Bert Kincaid Jr., Batts Friend, John Kirkpatrick, Billy Baggett, James Baggett, Cam Longley, Billy Childress, Marvin Graves, B. B. Ingham, Bud Coates, Woodrow Wilson, Massie Ray Smith, Joe Billy Keaton, Miller Robinson, Lee Dudley and Roger Dudley."

We do not know how many of these band members were Scouts but we suspect most of them were being as it was a Boy Scout Band. Apparently the band only lasted a year as a Boy Scout Band.

Man Made

Recently scientists have discovered 20 new species of salamanders and a new species of elephants. Did they find them in Africa or the Brazilian rainforest? No, actually they were man-made. With the salamanders they took one species and, as if by magic, turned it into 20 new species. In the case of the elephants they simply added a new trunk to the African elephant's family tree.

We're always told about species going extinct but did you know that at least 25,000 new species are named every year? This is not an act of Mother Nature but of human nature. Environmentalists are busy upgrading subspecies into full fledged species so they'll have more habitat to protect. #6 Representation: A subspecies has a much better chance of becoming a full fledged species if it has a good public relation firm and lawyers behind it. Just look at the success of grey wolves and bears. Even if they kill somebody their people are always there to stand up and defend their endangered species status.

#7 Politics: For some unexplained scientific reason more species seem to be discovered during Democratic administrations than Republican ones.

#8 Is It A Pest? In the Bahamas the greenies were very protective of their endangered species of raccoons but when they started turning over their trash cans and digging up yards, presto, they discovered the raccoons were actually part of the northern raccoon tribe and "downsized" them through "aggressive abatement."

Superintendent to discuss bond, history of school at chamber luncheon

Superintendent Abe Gott will answer the questions the community has been raising at a luncheon sponsored by the Ozona Chamber of Commerce.

The luncheon will be held at 11:30 a.m. July 24 at the Visitor Center Conference Room.

The meal will be catered by the Ozona Chatter Box and will consist of King Ranch Chicken, rice, refried beans, Mexican salad, banana pudding, hot sauce and tea. Cost is \$8 per person.

What is the history of our schools? Why do we need a new school? If a bond passes, how will it impact my taxes?

These are some of the questions Gott plans to address during the luncheon.

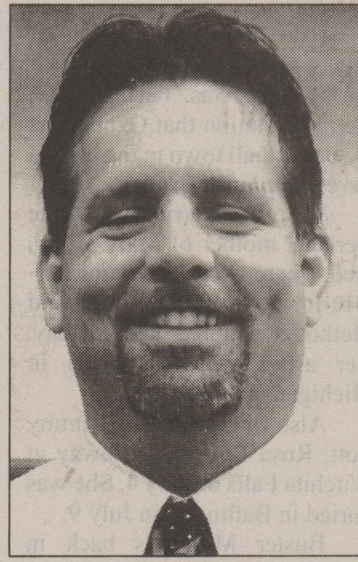
During a June 7 meeting, members of the School Facilities Committee voted to build a new primary school on the existing primary school site.

An estimated figure of 40,000 square-feet was determined as the size of school the district would need for a new primary school.

This amount did not include a new gym but included keeping the existing first grade classroom wing.

With an estimated \$130 per square-foot, the total cost is estimated at \$5.2 million.

With the \$250,000 estimated

for new windows in the Heritage Building, and \$300,000 for two new buses, the total cost for the district was estimated at around \$5.7 million.

Gott said the cost to demolish the existing primary school is estimated around \$450,000.

The Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees now takes the committee's recommendation and gather information from architects to get an exact figure.

At the June 20 board meeting, the board approved Gott sending out applications to several architects.

The latest the board can call for a bond for the November election is the first week of September.

Gott began as Superintendent of the CCCSD Feb. 1,

2005.

He moved to Ozona from Cherokee where he also served as school superintendent.

He has 19 years experience in education

He is a graduate of Baylor University with a master's degree in education from Tarleton State University.

He has three children: two at the intermediate school and one beginning in kindergarten.

His wife Laura will teach eighth grade science next year at the middle school.

Abe also serves as Board of Director for the Ozona Chamber of Commerce.

Executive Director, Shannon Biggerstaff will also update members on the status of chamber projects.

The chamber of commerce hosts community luncheons:

It was a sad day for her when her eyesight failed and she could no longer do this.

She was a member of the Ozona United Methodist Church, attended Sunday School there as long as she could, was a working member of the Helping Hands Board for many years, mem-

bership secretary of the local chapter of AARP and a member of Eastern Star for more than 60 years. She was a willing helper for her daughter when Mary worked at the museum, where she enjoyed visiting with people from all over the world. In May of 2002, she joined the family of residents at the Crockett County Care Center, where she lived until her death. Surviving are her daughters and their families, Mary Welty of Ozona, Ruth Schmidt, Martha and Ron Szymarek and Arnetta and John Stone, all of Michigan, nine grandchildren and many great-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by her parents, her brother George Macklam, husband Arnold Gerlach, sons-in-law Arthur Johnson, Jerry Kunde, Rick Chmielowski, Len Hillman, Merle Welty and Chris Schmidt.

Memorial service was held Sunday, July 8, at the Ozona United Methodist Church. She will be buried next to her husband in the family plot in Michigan at a later date. Arrangements are by Preddy-Funeral Home.

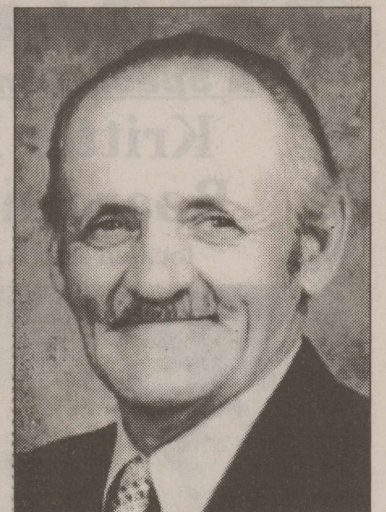
James Cullins was born Dec. 1, 1924 in Coleman County, Texas, a son of the late George A. Cullins and Dillie Edith Pride-more Cullins.

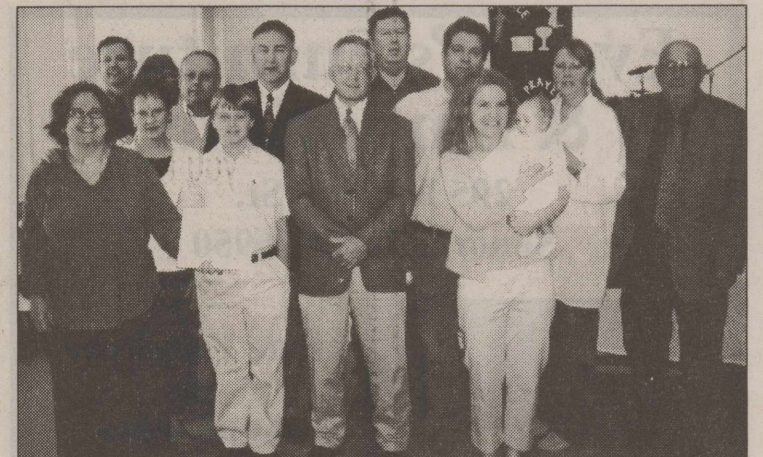

Deaton said if the THC agrees, the county would furnish the money to replace the roof. He also said he would ask THC to recommend one of their architects for the job.

"We could have a very beautiful roof on our courthouse if they would compromise there," Deaton said. "This will be a better roof than the original."

The commissioners vote to allow Deaton to pursue this type roof with the THC.

AGREEMENT TO HOUSE INMATES

The commissioners voted to accept agreements for Crockett County to house inmates in Upton and Reagan counties.

Cost for Upton County will be \$37.50 a day. For Reagan County it will be \$33 a day.

Both counties will provide transportation when they can. However, the agreements do not state that there will be a certain

number of beds available for Crockett County, said Sheriff Shane Fenton.

TAX REPORT

In her annual report, County Tax Assessor-Collector Rhonda Shaw said that out of a total tax roll of \$38 million her office has collected all but \$200,000 in taxes, which is around 99.6 percent.

County Auditor Sandy Stokes said out of the \$38 million, the county receives \$9 million and Crockett County CCSD receives \$29 million.

The school district then gets to keep \$10 million and then sends \$19 million to the state due to being a Chapter 41 "rich" school district.

Shaw's report also stated that her office is expecting the mineral roll to decrease 4 percent for next year's tax roll.

Governor issues state disaster for 44 counties



AUSTIN - Rainy weather hasn't let up here in central Texas. Lakes and dams are full and river systems saturated.

Central Texas hasn't been alone, weatherwise, with severe storms and flooding continuing to hit just about every zone from the Rio Grande Valley to the Oklahoma border.

Gov. Rick Perry, has dispatched relief agencies to many scenes.

In the process, he said, "Rather than celebrating Independence Day at backyard barbecues with families and friends, many Texans spent the Fourth of July holiday battling the dangerous weather events that continue to impact their communities."

"We will continue to help local communities respond to emergencies and recover from the heavy storms and rains that have saturated a large part of our state and we will make sure the necessary resources are in place if the situation worsens."

Perry also urged Texans "to heed the warnings of their local leaders and take all possible precautions to stay out of dangerous situations as this severe weather continues."

Since mid-June, Perry has issued a state disaster declaration for 44 counties, namely:

Archer, Baylor, Bell, Blanco, Bosque, Brown, Burnet, Callahan, Coleman, Collin, Comanche, Cooke, Coryell, Denton, Grayson, Lampasas and Tarrant Counties. U.S. Sens. Kay Bailey Hutchison and John Cornyn, who toured stricken areas, co-announced President Bush's disaster approval.

Among things the disaster approval does is allow uninsured individuals and families in eligible counties to apply for assistance in the form of financial aid, temporary housing, tax relief, legal services, crisis counseling and disaster unemployment assistance.

There is still time left for certain folks to take advantage of Texas Comptroller Susan Combs' offer of a limited-time waiver of penalties and interest on unpaid taxes.

The waiver, which expires Aug. 15, is available for all state taxes administered by the comptroller, except unclaimed property and the Public Utility Commission gross receipts assessment.

Eligible liabilities can relate to sales or purchases of taxable items. Reports originally due before April 1 are eligible. But the waiver does not apply to assessments already identified by the comptroller, to taxpayers under audit or review, or to taxpayers the comptroller has already contacted about an audit or possible deficiency, the Office of the Comptroller said.

Among things the disaster approval does is allow uninsured individuals and families in eligible counties to apply for assistance in the form of financial aid, temporary housing, tax relief, legal services, crisis counseling and disaster unemployment assistance.

There is still time left for certain folks to take advantage of Texas Comptroller Susan Combs' offer of a limited-time waiver of penalties and interest on unpaid taxes.

The waiver, which expires Aug. 15, is available for all state taxes administered by the comptroller, except unclaimed property and the Public Utility Commission gross receipts assessment.

Eligible liabilities can relate to sales or purchases of taxable items. Reports originally due before April 1 are eligible. But the waiver does not apply to assessments already identified by the comptroller, to taxpayers under audit or review, or to taxpayers the comptroller has already contacted about an audit or possible deficiency, the Office of the Comptroller said.

NEW TAX LAW TAKES EFFECT
Legislation redefining "occasional sale" took effect July 1, and it has an impact on people who sell their personal property.

HB 373 by Rep. Scott Hochberg, D-Houston, amends the tax code to allow non-business sellers to sell up to \$3,000 in a calendar year in certain merchandise without paying state tax if their items are purchased by Texas buyers.

DPS ADDRESSES NEW LAW HOAX
The Texas Department of Public Safety responded to false information about "new traffic laws" spreading quickly on the Internet and other media.

"There are no new traffic laws going into effect in July," the DPS said. "More specifically, there are no new laws going into effect in July related to cell phones, seat belts or carpooling. No cell phone bills were passed this Legislative session."

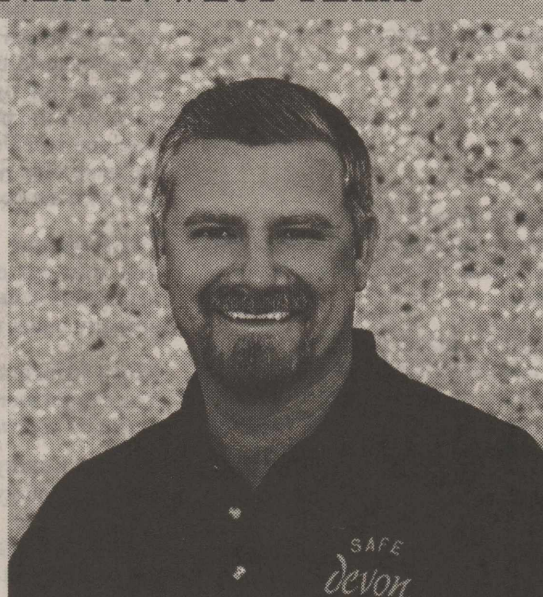

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or appraised value of your property
- the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- the ownership of property
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affects you.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board
If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator
After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. As an alternative and within the same time period, you may file a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district in certain cases.

Tax Payment
You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline
On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines
For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.
