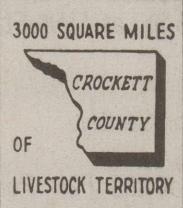

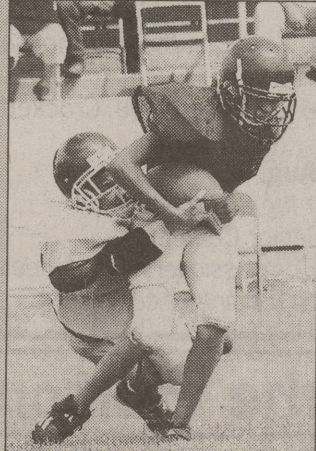

Former Wool Growers manager faces October sentencing date

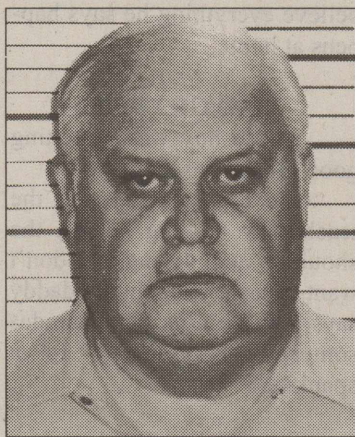
A sentencing date has been set for the former manager of Wool Growers Central Storage Co. who took \$2 million in a fraud scheme.

Donnie Laughlin is scheduled to be sentenced at 10 a.m. Oct. 12 in the United States District Court in Lubbock.

Laughlin, 60, pled guilty to engaging in monetary transactions in property derived from specified unlawful activity on May 31 in a Lubbock federal court. Laughlin is currently out on bond.

Laughlin is facing a maximum imprisonment of up to 10 years, a fine not to exceed \$250,000 or a fine not more than twice the amount of criminally derived property involved, possible restitution and a mandatory term of supervised release of no more than three years, according to the plea agreement that was filed in federal court.

Laughlin was formerly

charged by the U.S. Attorney's office on May 17 for carrying on a scheme to defraud and obtained \$2,072,326.56 from the producers/owners of mohair and wool stored at the Ozona and Sanderson warehouses, according to court documents.

Beginning in March 2000, Laughlin carried out the scheme by selling producers' wool and mohair, and not paying the producers the money they were owed, the documents state. Laughlin also sold the products

without the producers' knowledge or permission.

Instead of deducting fees for storage and commissions from these sales, and paying over the balance to the producer, Laughlin would either keep the money for himself or transfer the money from the mohair/wool sales bank account to the bank account of the Wool Growers retail business, the documents state.

Once the money from the fraudulent sales had been transferred and deposited into the Wool Growers retail business bank account, Laughlin would then order the money to be used for regular business expenses of the Wool Growers retail business or would be used by Laughlin in the form of unauthorized additional salary checks and cash, the documents stated.

The documents also state that Laughlin committed mail fraud by authorizing approximately 34 envelopes from five buyers of wool and mohair that were addressed to "Wool Growers Central Storage" in Ozona.

The envelopes contained approximately 34 checks payable to "Wool Growers Central Storage" or "Sanderson Wool Commission" totaling approximately \$758,552.63.

Each of the envelopes, and its contents, were to be sent and delivered by the United States Postal Service, the documents state.

The mail fraud scheme allegedly took place between Feb. 1, 2002 and May 25, 2006, the documents state. Laughlin was hired in 1991 as manager of Wool Growers.

Former bookkeeper Tonya McGuire Stalcup, 39, was sentenced to 33 months in the Federal Prison Camp at Bryan, Texas for frauds and swindling and aiding and abetting, during a federal court hearing on July 19.

After serving the prison sentence, Stalcup will then be placed under three years of supervised release.

As part of the supervised release, Stalcup was sentenced to pay \$200,000 in restitution to Wool Growers.

Rankin man found guilty in capital murder trial

A 24-year-old Rankin man was found guilty of capital murder on Aug. 3 by an Upton County Jury.

A jury of three men and nine women found Albert Vasquez Munoz guilty for the murder of 11-month-old Xavier Jonathan Flores.

According to medical testimony, Flores suffered blunt force trauma to the head which caused a two-inch fracture on the right side of his skull and a hemorrhage to the left side of his brain.

Munoz is facing a prison sentence of life without parole.

Laurie English, 112th District Attorney, elected not to seek the death penalty in this case due to Munoz not having a criminal history.

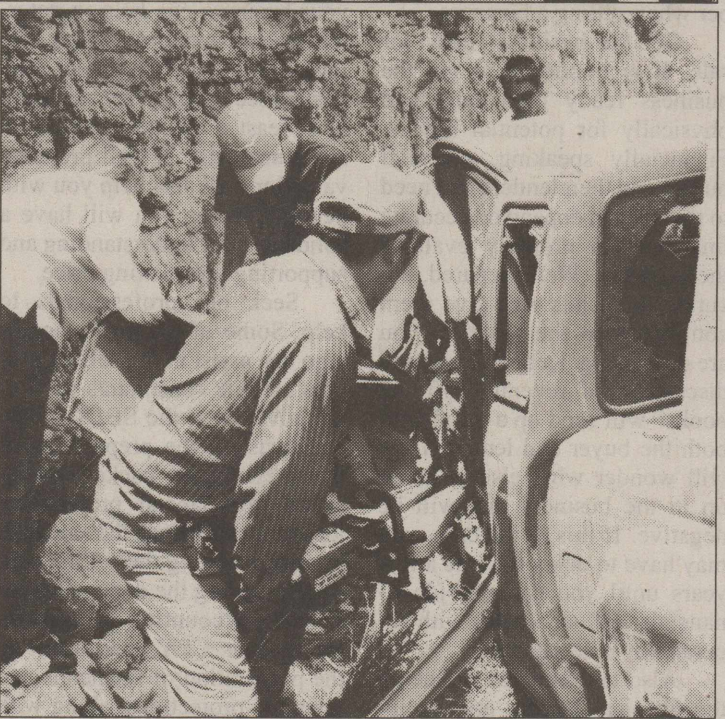
In order for the death penalty to withstand legal challenges on appeal, the state must prove, with legal suf-

Rice suffered only a hurt ankle.



School board approves bus repairs, discuss new transportation

Around \$25,000 in bus repairs were approved during a special called meeting of the Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees.

The repairs were to one of the charter-style buses the district owns.

The meeting, held on Aug. 14, also included a budget workshop.

During the workshop, the board discussed the purchasing

of a new bus for the upcoming school year.

The board will look a approving the 2007-2008 budget during the Aug. 29 meeting.

At the meeting, the board also authorized Superintendent Abe Gott to pursue legal advice on strategies to reduce the district's recapture amount.

Each year, the school district must send around 76 percent of its money to the state due to the state's Robin Hood funding plan.

The board approved a reso-

lution implementing the Religious Viewpoints Antidiscrimination act.

House Bill 3678 mandates that students in classroom settings and named as speakers at school events should be granted the same leeway to express their religious views as would a student expressing a secular view about the same subject.

Further, the law mandates that students be allowed to gather for religious meetings, such as prayer groups and "See You At the Pole" gatherings,

with the same protections as students participating in other campus organizations.

Gott said Gina Hochreiter has been hired as the high school Business Computer Information Systems teacher.

At an Aug. 15 meeting, the board interviewed architects for the building of a new Ozona Primary School.

Architect firms that were interviewed were CADCO, HKS, Randy Fromberg & Associates and Douglas Koehne.

When it's time to sell

The time may come when a business owner is ready to sell in order to cash out and transfer ownership to someone else. When this time comes, it is important to remember selling a business requires preparation to sell quickly and at the price you want. Also remember you are marketing a product, which just happens to be your business, so marketing the sale is important. Below are some tips to remember when selling a business.

Get the business ready for sale. It is important to get the business ready financially and physically for potential buyers. Financially speaking, potential buyers and their lenders will need to review and depend on accurate financials to properly evaluate the business. Well prepared, accurate financials will give them confidence in the numbers you are discussing. Keep in mind any discussion of revenue "off the books" will send up a red flag to both the buyer and lender. They will wonder what else is going on in the business that will be negative. If this is the case, you may have to delay the sale a few years until you can provide financials and tax returns with accurate revenue numbers.

Also take time to spruce up the physical facility and equipment. It is much like selling a home, the better it looks the more a buyer will be willing to pay for it.

Prepare a presentation of your business. Many entrepreneurs will prepare a business plan prior to opening their business. And many will use the plan as a presentation to secure financing to start or expand. The same is true when selling your business. A presentation packet is a marketing tool that helps tell the company story and bring your business to life for potential buyers. It also provides a written discussion of your business the buyer can share with those who are helping with any evaluation and financing. The sections for a good presentation packet of your business include: the reason you are selling; history of the business; discussion of customers, products, competitors and suppliers; discussion of the location

and facility if it is applicable; and a discussion of the assets to be purchased. You should also include the past financials along with any conservative financial projections. A brief, well written overview of your business and its associated financials will be a powerful marketing tool when selling your business to serious buyers.
Have your business valued. Having a valuation prepared on your business can help in determining and supporting your asking price. A buyer's lender may wish to see a third party valuation or at least a valuation based on some analysis. A well prepared valuation will also help you with negotiations as you will have a solid basis for understanding and supporting your asking price.
Seek out professionals to help. Some of the professionals who can assist in the selling process include consultants such as the advisors at the SBDC. They can assist in the preparation of the presentation packet, preparation of financial projections, ideas for promoting the sale, and in understanding the selling process including the documents involved. Accounting professionals such as CPA's can assist in the preparation of financials and financial projections, along with the preparation of a business valuation. Attorneys are valuable in assisting with the preparation and structure of the purchase/sale agreement along with assisting in the closing and transfer of funds. Attorneys and CPA's can also advise on structuring the financing of the deal and explain the associated tax consequences.
Selling a business successfully requires a plan of action, an eye towards preparing a good marketing presentation, and the use of professional assistance in order to achieve the results you want in terms of timeliness and the price you desire.

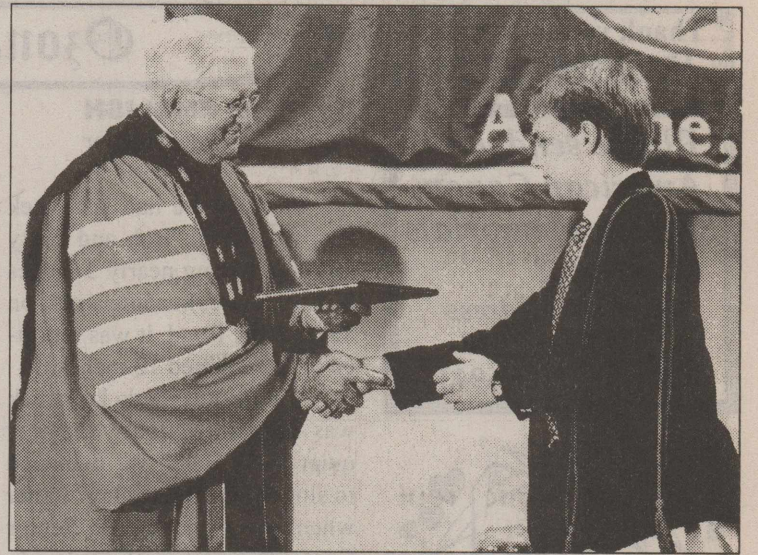

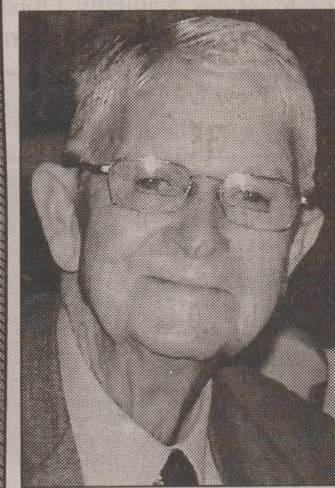

Report from the Crockett County Attorney's Office

From March 17 through Aug. 17, I have filed a total of 131 new cases in County Court. In that same time period, I have closed a total of 291 cases. These cases range from recently filed cases to cases that have been on the docket for a while.

To give the citizens of Crockett County an idea of the type of cases dealt with most often, below is a breakdown of the total number of new cases and cases recently closed sorted by the type of offense.

Alcohol offenses include furnishing alcohol to minors and driving while intoxicated (first and second offenses).

Drug offenses include possession of marijuana and possession of a controlled substance. Assault offenses include assault causing bodily injury and assault causing bodily injury-family violence.

Other cases include evading arrest, resisting arrest, criminal trespass, failure to identify, reckless driving, terroristic threat, telephone harassment, theft and theft by check.

Of the cases closed in the past five months, 68, or about 23 percent, were cases that had been pending for five years or more. This office closed 152 cases that were no more than one year old; this is about 52 percent of the total closed cases. Because of the hard work of everyone involved in the court system, we have reduced the caseload down to primarily current cases.

In addition, this office has filed 35 motions to revoke probation/motion to adjudicate. The defendants in these cases have been on community supervision (probation) and have failed to abide by all the requirements of their probation. As a result a warrant was issued for their arrest, and after a hearing, their probation can be extended, amended or revoked and the defendant can then be fined and/or sentenced to jail.

iciency, that the defendant is a future danger, English said in a press release.

"Although the murder of a child under age six warrants the death penalty in many cases, Munoz did not have a criminal history. That fact prevented the state from proving that Munoz was a future danger," English said. "The appeals process for capital murder cases where the death penalty is sought is time consuming and very expensive for the county. I believe that the life without parole sentence is justice in this case because Munoz, who is currently 24 years old, will serve every day of the rest of his life in prison."

English also said that the jury kept focused attention to the facts and evidence presented during the trial, and that the jury served the Upton County citizens well in a very difficult case.

Munoz was represented by J.K. "Rusty" Wall from Midland. The trial was presided over by 112th District Judge Pedro (Pete) Gomez Jr.

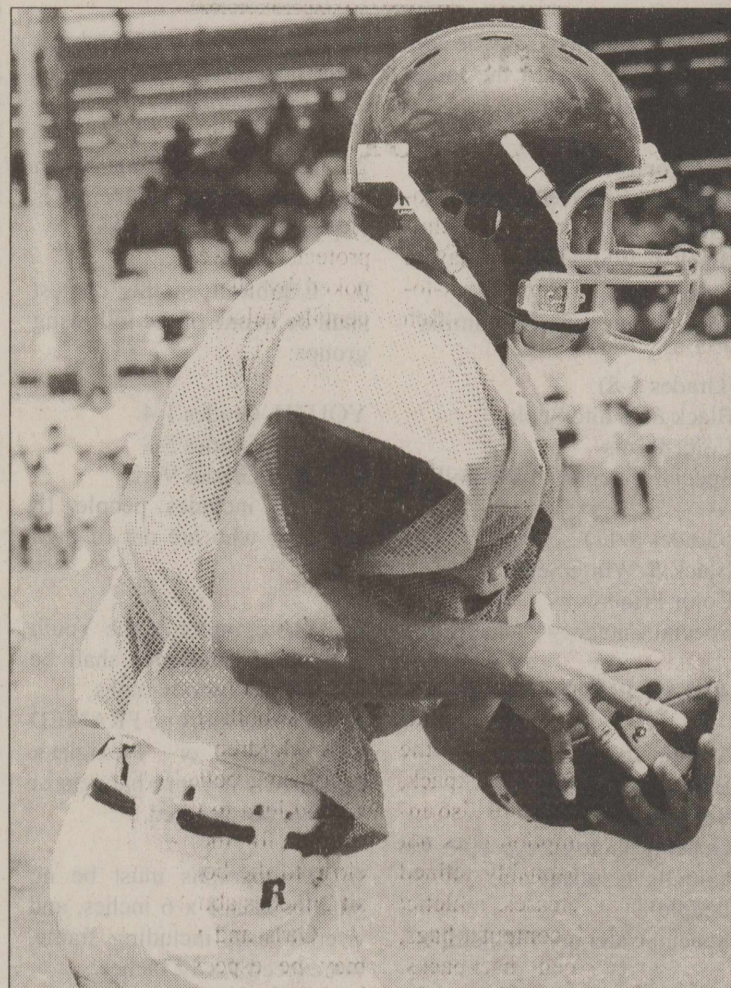

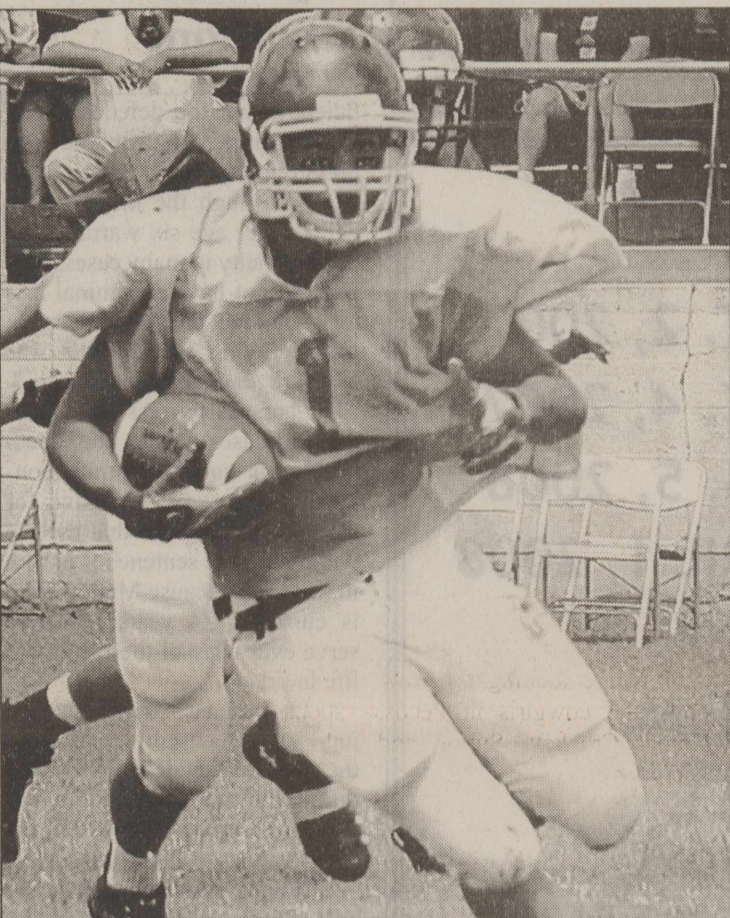

Choosing the correct backpack for your child

It's that time-back-to-school! Many parents and children prepare for the first day of school by doing some back-to-school shopping, which often involves buying new clothing, pens, pencils, paper, markers, etc. Texas shoppers got a break from state and local sales taxes this weekend during the state's annual tax holiday. This year, backpacks under \$100 and used by elementary and secondary students were added to the list of permissible items.

A backpack is a pack with straps one wears on the back. Backpacks with wheels, provided they can also be worn on the back like a traditional backpack, and messenger bags are also included. The exemption does not include items reasonably defined as luggage, briefcases, athletic/duffel/gym bags, computer bags, purses or framed backpacks. Ten or fewer backpacks can be purchased tax-free at one time without providing an exemption certificate to the seller.

As practical as backpacks are for those who use them, backpacks can cause strained muscles and joints and back pain when worn incorrectly.

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends you use the following five criteria when shopping for a backpack:

- Choose a lightweight backpack that doesn't add a lot of weight to your child's load. For example, although leather backpacks look cool, they weigh more than traditional canvas backpacks.
- Choose a backpack with two wide, padded shoulder straps. Straps that are too narrow can dig into shoulders.
- Choose a backpack that

has a padded back, which provides increased comfort and protects the wearer from being poked by sharp edges (such as pencils, rulers, notebooks, etc.) inside the backpack.

- Choose a backpack that has a waist belt, which helps distribute the weight more evenly across the body.

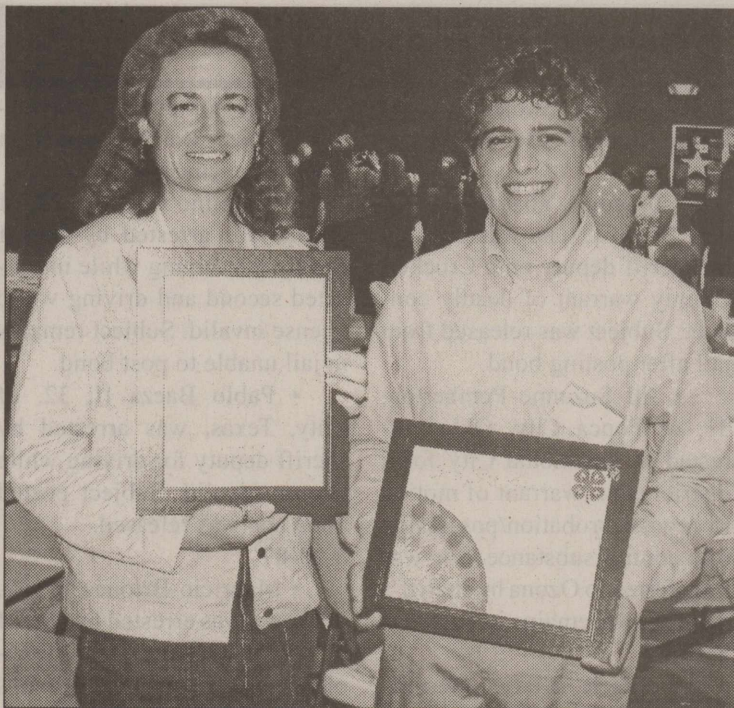
- Choose a backpack that has multiple compartments, which also helps distribute weight more evenly.

Although most backpacks come with two shoulder straps, this doesn't mean that your kids will use both straps! Make sure your children wear the backpack using both straps. It's also a good idea to tighten the straps enough for the backpack to fit close to the body, and it should sit 2-inches above the waist.

Girls and younger children may be especially at risk for backpack-related injuries because they're smaller and may carry loads that are heavier in proportion to their body weight. Doctors recommend that people carry backpacks that are no more than 10-15 percent of their body weight. For example, an 80 pound child's backpack and its contents should not weigh more than 12 pounds.

Another option is a backpack on wheels. However, these types of backpacks may be less practical than traditional backpacks because they're difficult to pull up stairs. Also, you will want to contact the child's school first to be sure that they are allowed. Many schools don't allow rolling backpacks because they pose a tripping hazard in the hallways.

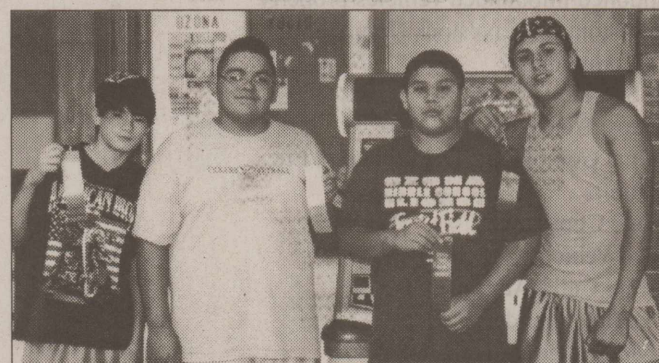

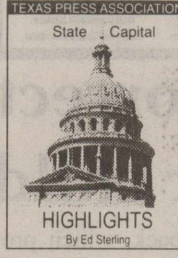

State honors WWII veterans with Capitol monument



HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Steffing

AUSTIN - Texas veterans of World War II are now honored with a new monument located near the east entrance of the Texas Supreme Court Building in the northwest quadrant of the Capitol grounds. Thousands of people attended the Aug. 15 dedication, the 62nd anniversary of the victory over Japan and the official end of the war.

More than 830,000 Texans served in the armed forces in the war, and 22,000 were killed. Donations from corporations, associations, foundations and individuals paid for the 17-foot-tall, 22-ton monument.

TXDOT DELIVERS REPORT ON BRIDGES

Is a bridge you've been using for years sturdy enough to deserve your confidence? Are you sure?

The Interstate 35-West bridge collapse in Minnesota on Aug. 1 made people wonder.

Soon after the event, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst asked the Texas Department of Transportation to produce a report on the status of Texas bridges.

TxDOT responded with a 92-page report released Aug. 16, saying 4 percent of the state's 50,000 bridges are listed as structurally deficient.

However, the first line of the report says "All bridges open to traffic on Texas public roads in the State of Texas are safe."

The report, readily available at www.txdot.gov, includes a list of structurally deficient bridges.

A few points made by TxDOT:

- "Structurally deficient" is a term the Federal Highway Administration uses to classify and prioritize bridges for federal funding.

- Structurally deficient bridges receive priority for limited rehabilitation on replacement funds from the federal government.

- Bridges that are unsafe or present an imminent public danger are closed to traffic.

- Of the state's bridges classified as structurally deficient, 445 are on the state highway system and 1,579 are off-system structures.

- Some 282 bridges classified as structurally deficient are currently under contract to be fixed or replaced.

- Another 1,303 structurally deficient bridges are under development as part of the state transportation plan.

- The remaining 439 structurally deficient bridges are not scheduled for rehabilitation or replacement, and no funding has been identified for them, TxDOT said.

PROGRESS REPORT ON SCHOOLS IS IN

The Texas Education Agency reports 86 percent of school districts and 79 percent of schools met the state's 2007 standards for "Adequate Yearly Progress."

The state standards tie into the federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001.

Public schools and districts tested students in kindergarten through 12th grade. At least 60 percent of the students had to pass the reading/language test and at least 50 percent had to pass the math exam.

Attendance and graduation figures also figured into the calculations.

Schools that do not meet the state's Adequate Yearly Progress standards two years in a row are placed in an improvement program.

OFFICIALS DISCUSS VETOED FUNDING

The Senate Higher Education Subcommittee met Aug. 14 to address Gov. Rick Perry's veto of \$154 million in community college funding.

Subcommittee chair Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, and Lt. Gov. Dewhurst spoke positively about prospects that funding would be restored.

Details on how to restore the funding are still to be negotiated, Zaffirini said.

ORGAN REGISTRY SITE GOES ONLINE

The Department of State Health Services announced the online availability of the Glenda Dawson Donate Life - Texas Donor Registry.

People may register as organ, tissue and eye donors via www.DonateLifeTexas.org. The site also provides information about organ donation.

The donor program pays tribute to the late State Rep. Glenda Dawson of Pearland, a donor recipient who raised public awareness about the organ donor registry in Texas.

Dawson was elected to House District 29 in 2003 and was re-elected in 2005. She died in 2006.

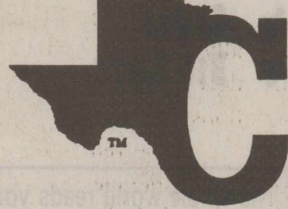

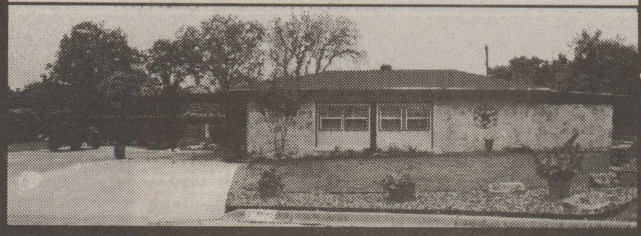
