

Early voting for school bond begins

Early voting started this week for the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District \$10 million bond elec-

Voters can cast their ballots from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. at the Crockett County Courthouse Annex. Early voting will continue through Tuesday, May 6.

Voters who wish to cast their ballots on Election Day, May 10, can do so at their precinct locations from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Precinct 1 is at the Crockett County Courthouse; precinct 2 is at the Crockett County Senior Center; precinct 3 is at the Crockett County Civic Center and precinct 4 is at Ozona Primary School.

The final public meeting will be from 2-4 p.m. Sunday, May 4. This meeting will be a tour of the primary school. Free pizza will be provided by Ozona Woman's League.

School board approves bid for Heritage windows

A \$199,000 bid to install new windows at the Ozona High School Heritage Building was approved Friday during a called meeting of the Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees.

The bid, from Odessa Glass, came in \$80,000 less than what the district was originally quoted from the company, said Superintendent Abe Gott.

Odessa Glass is also the manufacturer that the Texas Historical Commission called. Gott said he has not heard from THC and that he plans on going forward with the installation of the windows.

During the March 26 meeting, the board approved advertising for bids for the widows. The board also approved to reimburse the district's fundbalance for the cost of the windows if the \$10 million bond passes on May 10.

Gott said installation of the new windows may not be completed by the time school starts in August, due to it taking 12 weeks to manufacture the win-

At the called meeting, the board also approved a \$100,000 budget amendment for the architect fund. The money is being transferred from the district's fund balance.

The district has spent \$160,000 so far from the architect fund.

The board discussed looking into placing one of the old charter buses into a bus auction or advertising for bids again with a minimum of \$5,000 for the bus if the auction doesn't work out.

The district received a \$2,702 bid for the bus, which was declined by the board.

The next school board meeting will be at 6:30 p.m. May 21 at the Administration Building.

Their wedding will take place Aug. 16, 2008 in Alto, N.M. They plan on residing in Farwell and Ozona.





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



What they did not know was that the river was crossable but you had to know where the narrow underwater path was. The path angled down the river for a short distance and not straight across as most would assume. There was only one place and one path that would allow you to cross to the other side. That reminds me of the pathway to God. The Bible plainly teaches that there is only one-way to God and that it is through Jesus Christ, (John 14:6, Acts 4:12). Brother J.

The standards have changed so much in the past 10-15 years that they are more difficult to fit into an older building," said Architect Douglas Koehne.
