

Johnson did not call any witnesses for the defense.


In her closing argument, District Attorney Laurie English said that the media coverage of Tobar's case, along with testimony in the hearing was enough to grant the change.

Editor's note: Here is one of the many columns Oscar Kost wrote for The Ozona Stockman. Oscar was a great person to Crockett County and will be missed.

Claude Hudspeth made history for the newspaper business when he arrived in Ozona with a printing press.

It is said he came with equipment on a barrow. He was a man to give the community the news.

Ozona's first newspaper was The Ozona Kicker, now The Ozona Stockman.

This was in 1892 by Claude B. Hudspeth who became a rancher and was later elected to the United States Congress from his district. His ranch was 40 miles south of Ozona in 1895.

Hudspeth sold the business to the Metcalf Brothers.

Dodson bought the paper.

Miss Dodson served her apprenticeship on the Uvalde News. She owned the Sonora Courier for a short time.

In 1906, Miss Dodson bought a rival paper to The Kicker. There had been no opposition to Claude Hudspeth until that date. Miss Dodson became the wife of Will C. Easterling, a printer and editor. During the same year, she sold to publisher Hunt of Menard and he sold to Christian Myers, a graduate of Ozona High School. F.L. Burchett bought the pa-

per from Myers and installed a flatbed press for printing the paper. Financial difficulties fell on Mr. Burchett and G.L. Bunger and Judge Chas Davidson acquired the paper.

Judge Davidson acquired Mr. Bunger's interest in the paper and associated with Tom Nolen. Finally, one Smith Jones became editor.

While Davidson and Smith On Sept. 10, 1903, Clemmie were in charge of the paper, the name changed to The Ozona Stockman. The name change became effective on March 27, 1914

It was sold Feb. 23, 1923 to R.J. Cooke, meat market operator in Ozona for many years.

The meat market and paper were on the south side of the square next to the bank in the Davidson Building. His son-in-law John H. Sawyer ran the paper.

On Sept. 15, 1924, mr. W. Evart White purchased the newspaper. Ruth, an Ozona native and Evart's wife, helped and made the newspaper a success.

They published the paper for 46 years. Evart graduated from the University of Texas and worked for the Quero Record in Quero, Texas.

The meat market was in the front of the building, while the paper was in back. Mr. Cooke moved to the Perner Building when completed.

When Evart got the paper, it was hand set. The first paper White put out, he had set at the Standard-Times in San Angelo.

In 1970, the paper production changed to the offset method of printing. They took the paper to Big Spring for printing.

In April 1987, Scotty and Linda Moore purchased the paper from Mrs. Montgomery.

Scotty purchased a threesection press and used it 10 years. He then purchased a later model four section press.

He printed the paper and other surrounding town's papers. Before that, they took the paper to San Angelo for printing.

They both worked hard and made a success of the paper.

They sold to Melissa and Pablo Perner on Jan. 2, 2004. They are young and doing a good job.

AUSTIN - Secretary of State Phil Wilson said he received in recent days many inquiries about a statewide proposition to provide school tax relief to elderly or disabled taxpayers.

Voters will find no such proposition on their May 10 ballot.

"Information being circulated across the state regarding a constitutional amendment election to provide school property tax relief is inaccurate," said Wilson, the state's chief elections officer. "Texans are heading to the polls to cast votes for many important initiatives and races, but there will not be a statewide proposition on the ballot."

Early voting for the May 10 elections began April 28 and ended May 6.

## Secretary of state sets record straight on May 10 ballot

On April 30, Cockerell told the Senate Health and Human Service Committee that state investigators are still checking for evidence of various forms of child abuse that may have been committed at the 1,700-acre compound.

The focus had been on minor girls, but the agency turned some of its attention to minor boys

The number of ranch children in state custody and placed in foster care increased to 464 when one of the girls delivered a healthy baby boy at a hospital in San Marcos on April 29.

Custody hearings for ranch children are to be completed in early June, Cockerell said.

LT. GOV. SUPPORTS **VOTER I.D. RULING** 

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst on April 28 made public his support of the U.S. Supreme Court's

April 27 ruling in Crawford v. Marion County Election Board, upholding Indiana's voter identification law.

The Indiana law requires citizens voting in person to present government-issued photo identification at the poll. The main stated purpose of the law is to detect and deter voter fraud.

The ruling, Dewhurst said, "is a victory for democracy in our

investigation of the polygamist nation and I'm pleased that the court agreed with the vast majority of Texans who want to protect the sacred American principle of 'one person, one vote.

With this legal challenge now behind us, I look forward to passing a fair voter I.D. law in Texas next year that fully protects the voting rights of all U.S. citizens registered to vote in Texas."

### **STATE LAWMAKER ARRESTED FOR DUI**

State Rep. Mike Krusee, R-Round Rock, was charged with drunken driving in north Austin on April 30.

Krusee, a House member since 1993, was booked into the Williamson County jail late in the evening and released on bail the next morning.

He is chairman of the House Transportation Committee and also is a member of the House Judiciary Committee.

### **DELISI NAMED TRANSPORTATION CHAIR**

Gov. Rick Perry appointed his former chief of staff, 35-yearold Deirdre Delisi of Austin, as chair of the Texas Transportation Commission, the five-member board that oversees the Texas Department of Transportation.

Former chair Ric Williamson died in office in January. Hope Andrade of Boerne served as interim chair after Williamson's death.

Perry also appointed William Meadows of Fort Worth to the commission.





Our activities are for those of you 50 or over (we are flexible). Come out and join the fun.


DBITUARIES **Oscar Floyd Kost** 

Oscar Floyd Kost was born to Glenn and Ruby Kirkendall Kost. In 1933 he moved to Ozona with 35 cents in his pocket to begin working at Jones Saddlery. He purchased the shop in 1940 and changed the name to Ozona Boot and Saddlery where he made boots, saddles and other tack for people all over West Texas. He continued to own and operate the shop until 1977.

In 1955 he and three other men formed the Ozona TV System bringing cable television to Ozona for the first time. He built, operated and managed the TV system for 31 years and continued to sell and install TV satellite dishes making numerous trips to ranches all over Crockett and surrounding counties until he was 81 years old.

He was an outstanding civic leader. His many activities included being a charter member and first president of the Ozona Chamber of Commerce and a charter member of the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department. He was a long time member and past master of the Ozona Masonic Lodge No. 747 AF&AM receiving the 60-year service award in 1998. He was a 32nd Degree Scottish Rite Mason, member of the Ozona Lions Club, supporter of 4-H, FFA, rodeos and ropings for many years. He announced Ozona High School football games and was a member of the Crockett County Fair Association. He was a driving force in the organization and building of the Ozona Civic Center and the Ozona Senior Center. Oscar kept every speaker PA system in the town running, especially at the Civic Center.

He was historian and advisor for The Ozona Stockman for many years until his death and authored many columns over the years. One of his last big endeavors was compiling, writing and the charity of your choice.

The Ozona High School Computer Science Team finished off the 2007-2008 year with another exciting competition at the State UIL Meet in Austin. The group had qualified to compete under the UIL Wild Card rules. A Wild Card team advances to state as the highest scoring second place team in the four regions of Texas. After the regional competition, the OHS team actually arrived in Austin ranked third, behind the teams from Wall and Refugio High Schools.

The programming component lasts for two hours. During this time, the students are given twelve problems of varying difficulty.

For each correct program the students earn up to 60 points - if the program runs perfectly the first time. If there is a problem with the program that has

been turned in, the students are for this state competition, but points each time it is submitted incorrectly.

The OHS students managed to complete six programs, earning a total of 355 points which were added to the morning's written test scores. When all of the team totals were finally computed at 8:30 that evening, the Ozona High School team placed second overall with a combined total of 817 points.







In fact, mold can be seen on some of the classroom walls. In one Pre-K class, students can see right through the brick and onto the playground.

"This has been a good school, but it's time for something else, but that depends on the votes," she said.

## **KOST: Civic member, writer, Oscar did it all** from page 1

As a charter member of the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department, Kost was about to get off patrol on the morning of Monday, June 28, 1954, when the flood crested.

"I had got off of patrol with the volunteer fire department at 2 a.m. Around 6 a.m., they woke me up again and told me to get out of the house," Kost said in a 2004 Stockman article.

The flood of 1954 is considered one of the biggest events and the largest natural disaster in the county's history. At least 15 people died in the flood.

"At that time, Johnson Draw was a little channel that rushed through from hill to hill," Kost said in the article. "The water was up to the ceiling in some homes."

Kost was also active in the Masonic Lodge, Ozona Lions Club and was a charter member and first president of the Ozona Chamber of Commerce.

Kost could also be seen supporting the 4-H, FFA, rodeo, ropings and announcing games for the Ozona Lions football team.

Kost also had his great stories. He was sneaky enough to take a photo of the actual Mona Lisa at the Louvre on a trip to Paris.


