
GENERAL SCHOOL TRAFFIC TIPS

Commissioners to hold tax hearings tonight, Monday

The Crockett County Commissioners' Court will host two public tax hearings starting tonight, Aug. 20 at the courthouse annex.

The hearing will start at 6 p.m. The second hearing is set for 6 p.m. Monday, Aug. 25, also at the courthouse annex.

Both tax hearings are due to the commissioners' voting to go above the effective tax rate of .38798 per \$100 evaluation to .4205 for 2009.

This rate is still lower than the 2008 rate of .46485.

In a letter to Crockett County citizens, the commissioners state that the reason for the tax decrease this year is due to property values increasing.

However, for the county to keep the same amount of services the commissioners decided to they had

to go above the effective tax rate, said County Judge Fred Deaton.

The letter also states that Crockett County still maintains one of the lowest property tax rates in the state.





AUSTIN - In 2006, Texas lawmakers rolled back school tax rates for maintenance and operations by one-third over the next two years in an initiative that was to provide \$7 billion in annual property tax relief.

A study released Aug. 14 by Texas Taxpayer and Research Association shows how Texas taxpayers actually did get \$7 billion in property tax relief.

The study, Property Tax Relief: The \$7 Billion Reality, by the non- profit non-partisan association's research arm, concludes that "The average Texans' property tax bill may not be lower today than it was two years ago, but it is unmistakably much, much lower than it would have been."

The study points out that relief was made possible by a swap that included "a complete restructuring (and increase) of the state's business tax, an increase in the state's cigarette tax, and a commitment of surplus funds in the State Treasury sufhelping to destroy Mother Earth."

TXDOT SIGNALS CONSOLIDATION PLAN

The Texas Department of Transportation says it is considering the creation of four regional centers to house support functions presently located in 25 districts across Texas.

"The consolidation of support functions could create a more efficient working environment and generate a cost savings estimated at \$35 million," said TxDOT executive director Amadeo Saenz.

Saenz said restructuring would not result in a reduction of services at the district level.

DPS PROMOTES ONLINE RENEWAL

The Texas Department of Public Safety reminds Texas residents they can renew their driver's license "without leaving the comfort of your computer" by going to the In-

ternet site www.TexasOnline.com. Driver's license and identification card holders are required by law to renew their license and ID card every six years. State law also requires that they change the address on their license or ID card within 30 days of moving to another residence.

The DPS has offered eligible Sites for the regional centers individuals the option of renewing their license or ID card over the Internet since 2001. Individuals are eligible to renew online as long as they are 18 years of age, within one year of the license or identification card expiring and did not renew online, by mail or telephone at their last renewal

TSTA argued that Texas Education Commissioner Robert Scott did not have authority to award grants allowing \$6 million in state funds to be awarded to private schools.


200TH MISSING PREDATOR ARRESTED



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

State, national representatives visit Ozona

Hilderbran, Rodriguez discuss issues while talking with local citizens

Issues around the state and the country were addressed last week in Ozona.

State Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville, and U.S. Rep. Ciro D. Rodriguez, D-San Antonio, both made stops in Crockett County to visit with local citizens.

Hilderbran spoke on Aug. 12 at the courthouse annex.

During his visit, he said the State Legislature will be looking at pursuing a bill to restructure the Texas Department of Transportation.

"TxDOT is not being responsible to the Texas Legislature," Hilderbran said.

During the discussion, Hilderbran said many in his district have been concerned about the Trans-Texas Corridor which has been proposed as a plan to reform the state's traffic problems.

"The Trans-Texas Corridor will never come west of Interstate-35," he said. "They are going to build where they need more traffic flow and that is Dallas San Antonio and Houston."

Hilderbran also discussed health insurance reform and a new parks bill that will be coming up in the legislature.

• All school zone speeds of 20 mph are posted by signs, and traffic signals.

• Some speed zones are in effect during the entire classroom day, 8 a.m.-4 p.m. (Avenue D, Avenue G and Martinez Street).

• Speed zones with traffic signals are in effect whenever the signal lights are activated.

• DO NOT ILLEGALLY PARK VEHICLES (ESPECIALLY IN THE AREA OF THE HIGH SCHOOL PORTABLE BUILDINGS) in the middle of street lanes, double park, park in private driveways, park in school bus loading areas and do not block the emergency vehicle driveways (fire trucks/ law enforcement).

• DO NOT PASS parked school buses when the bus has it's RED flashing lights activated - vehicles traveling in both directions on street or highway have to stop, until the RED lights are turned off.

• All vehicles must stop whenever pedestrians are in a crosswalk crossing streets/highways. Any students causing traffic hazard outside the crosswalks should be reported to the school office.

• Do not park vehicles facing opposite of traffic - especially in school zones.

• All vehicle drivers operating in school zone areas are required to obey all traffic laws and parking requirements.

NEW SIGN OUT PROCEDURES FOR PRE-K - SECOND GRADE

Parents must sign students out in the office at the intermediate school. The office will give the parents a note that indicates that they have signed their child out. The intermediate school will then call the contact point (a cell phone at each portable site). The employee in charge of the cell phone will then escort the child to either the OMS office or the Administration Building. Once the parent presents the appropriate sign out slip, the child will be released.



ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand.

This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500





As Texas school children prepare to head back to school, the Texas Department of Public Safety reminds all drivers to watch out for children walking to school or waiting for school buses--and to obey all traffic laws related to school buses.

"DPS has zero tolerance for vehicles that pass stopped school buses," said Col. Thomas A. Davis, Jr., a stop sign). STATE LAW REQUIREMENTS

State law requires approaching drivers to stop when a school bus is stopped and operating a visual signal (red flashing lights or a stop sign).
