Cotton production seems headed for a tie with the 1953 figure. And grain sorghum and wheat production have increased. In Bailey County, cotton acreage was down one-third in 1954, but total yields were only onefifth lower than in 1953, About 20,000 more acres went into grain sorghums in 1954, but total yields were off almost 1 million bushels. Wheat yields averaged 20 bushels on 12,000 acres, compared with a 15 bushel yield on 20.-000 acres in 1953. Agent J. K Adams looks for some increase in vegetables in 1955, and perhaps a slight increase in sheep production. But he expects an over-all decrease in hogs and cattle.

County Okays Crop Supports Tuesday

Bailey County farmers voted 211 to 11 in favor of retaining curbs on cotton produced in 1955, according to ASC manager Lonnie Bass. The county vote Tuesday represented about 95 per cent majority in favor, as compared to a national average of 91.5 per cent favoring the con-

The voting insures that 1955 cotton will be supported between 891/2 and 90 per cent of parity. Had the vote gone the other way, the parity price would have dropped to 50 per cent.

The referendum held Tuesday in no way affects the regulations concerning eligibility for price supports, whch remain the same.

The secretary said the reduction in price supports for small grains was designed to prevent over-production of these grains next year as well as to bring prices of such grains down to point where more of them will move into use rather than into storage under a government sponsored price support program.

The only controls in 1955 will be the ones the farmers vote on themselves in the form of quotas for marketing cotton wheat, and some acreage allotments on corn. Also still in effect is a directive that farmers must comply with all acreage allotments assigned

The frequent repetition of this expression is a very encouraging sign. It shows that people are developing a better sense of values . . . that they realze the pleasure they get from a few drinks isn't worth the risk involved.

Of course, there are still a lot of people around who insist that drinking doesn't affect their driving ability. Some even go so far as to state they can drive better after a couple of cocktails or a beer or two.

But most people take a more intelligent attitude. They know the evidence is against the fellows who claim they can drive as well after drinking.

A great deal of research has been done on this subject in recent years, and it all tends to establish the fact that consumption of alcohol slows down reactions and impairs judgement. Accident records show the tragic relationship between drinking and traffic accidents. Accident Facts, the official statistical publication of the National Safety Council, states that in 24 out of 100 fatal traffic accidents that occurred in 1953, a driver or pedestran had been drinking.

Informed people, aware of the danger involved, are unwilling to take a chance. They value their own safety and the security of ther families.

The day of the daredevil who climbs unsteadily behind the wheel and roars away with great bravado is gone. Even the slightly tipsy fellow is likely to meet with disapproving stares if he attempts to drive. And his friends are not likely to be grateful for his offer of a lift.
