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

Texas' top three elected officeholders co-signed an Aug. 19 letter to Texas Transportation Commission Chair Dierdre Delisi expressing their collective wishes for a plan to fund transportation projects over the next biennium.

Gov. Rick Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Tom Craddick told Delisi to prepare for an Aug. 29 bond review board meeting with certain goals in mind:

• End the practice of funding the Texas Department of Public Safety with gas taxes that are needed for road construction. Use general revenue to fund the DPS.

· Create a finance entity that will allow the state's public investment fund managers to put money directly into

· Pass enabling legislation and appropriations for the Prop. 12 bonds approved by voters.

In November 2007, voters approved Prop. 12, amending the state constitution to authorize \$5 billion in general obligation bonds for transportation projects.

In September 2003, voters approved Prop. 14, allowing short-term borrowing by the Texas Department of Transportation. Perry, Dewhurst and Craddick instructed Delisi to prepare to begin selling \$1.5 billion in Prop. 14 bonds in September.

EXECUTIVE ORDER BEGINS BLUE ALERT

An executive order signed by Gov. Rick Perry on Aug. 18 launched Blue Alert, a communications network to help track down suspects who flee after killing or seriously injuring federal, state or local law enforcement officers in the line of

Blue Alert, based on the AM-BER and Silver Alert programs, combines efforts of the DPS, the Governor's Division of Emergency Management and TxDOT.

When Blue Alert is activated, the suspect's vehicle information will be displayed across the state pri- 50,000 online Texas teacher certi-

IMMIGRATION POLICIES IN QUESTION

Two Republican state lawmakers have asked Attorney General Greg Abbott if the Texas Legislature has the authority to deter local governments from adopting policies, or invalidate existing policies that hinder state enforcement of federal immigration laws.

In the request for an opinion, Rep. Frank Corte of San Antonio and Sen. Dan Patrick of Houston wrote that "sanctuary cities" advocate policies that are favorable to illegal im-

To support their views, the lawmakers cited the Oklahoma Taxpayer and Citizen Protection Act of 2007, which prohibits sanctuary cities and bars local governmental bodies from creating policies to limit or prevent local law enforcement officers from communicating or cooperating with federal officials on the immigration status of a person.

ONLINE CERTIFICATION TESTING GROWS

Applicants took more than

fication tests via the Internet in the past year.

And, Texas is leading the nation in online certification testing, the Texas Education Agency reported Aug. 20.

Online testing has been available in Texas since 2004-2005. Test takers have five hours to complete an exam, but the average completion time is between three and four hours. The results come back in about a week.

Karen Loonam of the State Board for Educator Certification said she expects online testing eventually will be the sole method for certification but she does not expect paper and pencil

tests to disappear anytime soon. INTERIM DPS DIRECTOR IS NAMED

The Texas Public Safety Commission named Texas Highway Patrol Major Stan Clark of Garland interim director of the Texas DPS on Aug. 15.

Clark will take office on Sept. 1 and serve until the Texas Public Safety Commission, which oversees the DPS, has selected a permanent

Clark has been with the DPS since 1973. He has worked at DPS offices in Tyler and McAllen, and has been a member of the DPS Capitol Police force.





COURT: Fire, district court, attorney budgets discussed

"I wanted to keep doing the job, and I wanted to keep the two offices together," she said.

Shaw also said she was the only chief appraiser in Texas not getting paid. Armstrong, Blanco, Burleson and Cottle counties also have the tax assessor-collector and chief appraiser as one office.

"I'm happy the way things worked out. The board now has an idea of what we do here," Shaw said. "I want to thank the board for their decision and I appreciate all the work they've done on this is-

The board had discussed splitting the two offices. If this had been approved, the county would have had to pay 25 percent of the \$486,895 budget. Crockett County CCSD would have had to pay 74 percent of the budget and the other one percent would have come from the Crockett County Water District.

Not only would the county have to budget for the new office, but the county would have lost \$258,000 in collection fees that the school district pays for because the county does the district's appraisals.

Shaw also said that she was worried one of her three staff positions in her office would be lost, and she wanted to keep all three

"Our staff works well together,"

COUNTY BUDGET WORKSHOP

During two meetings, the Crockett County Commissioners' discussed several items about the 2009 budget.

Fire Chief Bob Falkner and the commissioners' negotiated to buy the chassis of new truck with 2008 funds of \$72,583.

For 2009, the group negotiated an amount of \$85,000 for the rest of the new truck and \$9,500 to purchase a new generator for the fire station and radio equipment.

The fire department bought a fire truck earlier this year for around \$150,000. This purchase and the additional new truck will replace two older grass fire trucks that are constantly in need of repair, Falkner

"If we get this done, maybe we can lay off of the court for the next year provided we don't have major catastrophe," Falkner said.

The commissioners also made a verbal agreement to budget for a part-time bailiff for \$12,000, of which \$8,000 will come out of the district court budget and \$4,000 will come out of the county court budget.

District Judge Pedro Gomez said with a new administration in the sheriff's office, he is not sure if the new sheriff will allow deputies to serve as bailiffs.

"I've got to make provisions in While Shaw said she doesn't case the sheriff's office doesn't have the manpower or funding to spare a deputy," Gomez said. "A bailiff's number one duty is to protect the judge and then keep order in the court. He's the enforcer of obedience in the courtroom. Emotions of-

low deputies to serve or on the days when Constable Bear Borrego serves, Gomez said the money could just go back into the general fund.

District Attorney Laurie English has asked the commissioners to approve the hiring of an investigator and an additional secretary for her

The secretary would be housed in Ozona and would assist her current full-time secretary. The investigator would help with tracking down and interviewing witnesses, English said.

The salaries for these two positions would be paid for by all five counties in the 112th Judicial Dis-

"I'm trying to make the most of what we have. I will be more than willing to work with whatever," she said. "Right now, with the oilfield the way it is, our case load is increasing. We are moving things faster. I'm hoping with this staff would be able to last several years."

English also requested a \$3,643 supplement to her salary. This request has also gone out to the other four counties in her district. The money is for contributions to English's county retirement.

"This is the only thing I have ever asked for myself. I have waited four years to ask for it because I wanted to earn the right to ask for it."

The commissioners came to a verbal agreement to leave the district attorney's budget as is with the two new positions and the supple-



Though most people in Houston are friendly, it was crowded, the air always smelled of petrochemicals and car exhaust, the pace was always hurried, and the traffic was always bad.


In fact, I can now walk to anyplace in our town faster than I could make my seven mile commute to work in Houston. We are fortunate that we do not possess any of the aforementioned elements in West Texas. Life is slower here and our air is generally clean, free from the many airborne carcinogens that fill the air in many large cities.

I have come to the conclusion that perhaps my favorite quality about life in a small town is that relationships are more personal. I know most of the people's faces in Ozona and I know many by name. When I talk to, or do business with, someone here, the transaction, whatever the setting, is typically more personal because we know each other, at least at some level.

Sure, everyone makes great friends in a city, but most of the people that one sees on a daily basis in the city are just faces in a crowd and folks just do not reach out to faces in a crowd in their time of need like they do when they know those faces.

I cannot think of even a day in





ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand.

This Order does NOT-prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.


