"I want to see how this fence holds up. I can guarantee there will be kids climbing on it," said Board President Dr. Marcus Sims.

Superintendent Abe Gott said he would like to see the same stone and wrought-iron fence extend behind the home stands down to the women's restroom, and then look at replacing the fence that splits the stadium and practice field with a chain-link fence.

"I think we should do it right," Gott said the rest of the fence added Board Member Dwight Childress. Also, \$325,000 has been bud-

geted for three new suburbans, two trucks and a new bus.

Gott said the district is budgeting to buy one or two new buses each year, so they are not hit with a 10-year plateau and have to buy five buses at once.

The fuel budget was also increased \$25,000 to \$90,000 for the new year.

In technology, \$80,000 has been budgeted for new software as well as contracts for technology support. Right now, around \$60,000 of the \$80,000 has already been spent.

"Technology really makes me nervous because I don't know what is coming," Gott said. Also, \$15,000 has been budget-

ed to wire the portable buildings for computers.

Throughout the budget, items for unexpected expenses were also added. In technology, \$6,000 was budgeted, \$10,000 in campus administration, \$3,000 for the counselors and \$10,000 in the administration budget.

This money is to allow for things the district doesn't expect to happen, Gott said.

The budget for UIL Literary Supplies was also increased \$1,000 to \$3,800 for drama and computer science programs.

Security cameras for the portable buildings were also budgeted at \$50,000.

NEW ELEMENTARY SCHOOL Officials from Waldrop Con-

struction presented a budget estimate for the new elementary school. The total estimate is around \$11.9 million for the 7,700 to 7,800 square-foot building.

The largest costs for the building include an estimated \$1.12 million for masonry, \$1.047 million for heating, ventilating and air conditioning and \$1.355 million for electrical.

Paul Waldrop Sr. said they believe the budget should be pretty accurate

"We have a contingency allowance of around \$100,000. This is not a lot of money, but this should be a clean, new project and we don't anticipate a lot of problems," Waldrop said.

The budget includes and estimated cost of \$448,444 for demolition, which includes having to haul some of the materials to San Angelo.

Sims said two local landowners have expressed interest in taking some of the materials.

The Lions lost 43-28 to the Harper Longhorns, but had bright moments throughout the rainy game.

"The kids played really, really well. They got after it," said Coach Matt Gutierrez. "They continued to work hard, even when the game seemed to get out of hand."

Senior fullback Steven Silva would get things started for the Lions with a 14-yard touchdown after a nine-play drive in the first quarter.

Harper would answer back as freshmen sensation Reagan Randle found the end zone after a six-play drive.

Senior tight end Jonathan Flores would grab a Harper fumble with seconds left in the first quarter for a touchdown. Flores would also get the two-point conversion to give Ozona the 14-9 lead.

However, the game would slip away from the Lions in the next two quarters as Harper went on a scoring spree.

Sophomore Abey Lara would get his first touchdown as a varsity Lion on a 69-yard pass from quarterback Matthew Garza.

Senior Ben Flores would score the final touchdown of the game on a 41-yard run. Flores also had 16 carries for 124 yards.

Gutierrez said the Lions need to work on tackling before taking on Iraan Friday.

"They (Iraan) are a lot smaller but they are also quick," Gutierrez said.

The naming of hurricanes

the Labor Day weekend, I kept reading on the latest about Hurricane Gustav. As I read about the rain and wind hitting still recovering New Orleans, I wondered to myself "how did they come up with a hurricane named Gustav?"

So, I went to the National Hurricane Center online and read about how they name these powerful

According to the center, when winds from a tropical cyclone reach 39 mph, they are given names.

For several hundred years, hurricanes in the West Indies were often named after the particular saint's day on which the hurricane

For example "Hurricane San Felipe" struck Puerto Rico on 13 September 1876.

Another storm struck Puerto Rico on the same day in 1928, and

While surfing the Internet over this storm was named "Hurricane San Felipe the second."

> Using women's names became the practice during World War II, following the use of a woman's name for a storm in the 1941 novel "Storm" by George R. Stewart.

> In 1951 the United States adopted a confusing plan to name storms by a phonetic alphabet (Able, Baker, Charlie), and in 1953 the nation's weather services returned to using female names.

> The practice of using female names exclusively ended in 1978 when names from both genders were used to designate storms in the eastern Pacific.

A year later, male and female names were included in lists for the Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico.

The name lists, which have been agreed upon at international meetings of the World Meteorological Organization, have a French,

Spanish, Dutch and English flavor Beluah, Flora, Dora, Hilda, David, because hurricanes affect other nations and are tracked by the public and weather services of many countries.

I guess that's how we got Gustav, which has been used four previous times as both hurricanes and tropical storms.

The center says experience shows that the use of short, distinctive given names is easier than older cumbersome methods of latitudelongitude identification.

The letters Q, U, X, Y and Z are not included because of the scarcity of names beginning with those letters

Names associated with storms that have caused significant death and/or damage are usually retired from the list, such as Dennis, Katrina, Rita, Stan and Wilma all from 2005

Other retired names include

Frederic, Michelle, Allen, Alicia, Hugo, Bob and Andrew.

The names assigned for the next several seasons through 2013 have already been assigned. In 2008 so far, there have been Arthur, Bertha, Cristobal, Dolly, Edouard, Fay,* Gustav and coming up is Hanna and, Ike

Next year has Ana, Bill, Ida, Joaquin, Larry and Odette. Bonnie, Danielle, Fiona, Gaston, Igor, Otto, Paula and Walter have been selected for 2010.

Franklin, Gert, Harvey, Irene, Jose, Katia and Philippe are in 2011. Alberto, Chris, Ernesto, Oscar and Rafael are in 2012, while Chantal, Erin, Fernand, Humberto, Lorenzo, Melissa and Pablo are in 2013.

gunned down recently, at least that I know of, their contests are legendary, now part of the fabric of the west.

The protagonist of this true story is dead now, pushing up daisies. Although we are now much too refined to refer to our bone orchards as "boot hill", one hundred years ago that was surely where the outlaw in this story would have been planted.

This is a simple tale of right versus wrong. Of good versus evil. On the side of righteousness was a legend known simply as Ellington, an honest, law-abiding citizen of the west.

On the other side of the trade was our gunslinger, a widely feared man who was tougher than rawhide, more dangerous than a discount divorce and as ethical as a herd of goats. Al-Their duels are recalled in bunk- though most people considered him

and a rumored house of ill repute in the Nevada territory. He made most of his money out-swapping people of their cattle and their ranches and cattlemen and cowboys still speak in hushed, almost reverential tones when they mention his name.

Now, Ellington has always been quick on the draw when it came to doing a deal. So when the gunslinger called him out and said he had a large bunch of cattle for sale Ellington was quick to the draft book.

After all, it was a huge number of cattle, the kind of trade upon which reputations are built and fortunes are made ... and lost.

When the deal and the duel were finally done Ellington was still alive but he was bloodied and wounded. Nothing was as it was supposed to be. The drouthed out cattle were not as they were represented to be by the gunslinger and every sort turned into a vicious argument. Everything that could go wrong did, and the gunslinger used every trick in the book to gain an advantage. The cattle had

Later that night Ellington was licking his wounds as he walked down the hall of a cattlemen's hotel in Winnemucca, gathering up friends, as usual, to take to dinner. "What are you doing?" said Ellington, "Want to come to dinner?"

AUSTIN - The Office of the State Auditor on Aug. 28 released an audit report on the Texas Department of Transportation's Financial Forecasting and Fund Allocation.

The overall conclusion was that "ineffective internal communication, a complex reporting structure and misunderstanding of reported data led TxDOT to overschedule \$1.1 billion in planned contract awards for fiscal year 2008."

And, the audit specified, "although the [TxDOT] has made organizational changes that should help reduce communication obstacles in the future, its reporting process still needs improvement."

Texas law requires TxDOT to contract for an independent audit of its management and business operations in 2007 and every 12 years after 2007.

Independent, external audits of TxDOT processes found weaknesses . related to those the state reported.

NEW TELEMARKETING RULES TO COME

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott publicized the Federal Trade Commission's Aug. 25 announcement of a new rule governing prerecorded telemarketing calls.

Beginning Sept. 1, 2009, telemarketing companies must obtain call recipients' written permission before contacting them with a prerecorded message. More immediately, effective Dec. 1, 2008, prerecorded telephone marketing calls must have an opt-out mechanism so that recipients can elect not to receive those unsolicited calls in the future.

Telemarketers with pre-existing customer relationships will be allowed to continue using prerecorded messages to contact those customers only for one year after the rule is published in the Federal Register. At that time, telemarketing companies will need their customer's written permission before calling anyone with a prerecorded message.

However, under the new regulations, charitable organizations can continue contacting their members or previous donors, but will need to offer an opt-out mechanism once the new rule goes into effect.

prohibit customers from receiving sure revenue from privatizing the certain prerecorded informational calls, such as those that announce flight delay notifications, upcoming appointments, or similarly helpful information. These phone calls are unaffected by the new rule because they are not used to market products or services to the recipient.

Healthcare-related phone calls also are exempt from the new regulations.

LOTTERY PRIVATIZATION **CONSIDERED**

State lawmakers met Aug. 27 at the Capitol to hear ideas on whether to privatize the Texas Lottery.

Scott Dudley of the Legislative Budget Board said the state's share of lottery proceeds is 26 to 28 percent, and 75 percent of the proceeds come from \$50 million in scratchoffs sold each week. But, Dudley said, sales are declining.

Representatives of some of the nation's largest brokerage houses testified at the hearing. All pretty much agreed that the Texas Lottery could become more profitable, and that privatization is worth a look.

DPS CAUTIONED HOLIDAY TRAVELERS

Before Labor Day weekend, the Texas Department of Public Safety sent out a reminder that drinking alcohol and driving shouldn't be mixed and wouldn't be tolerated.

These points were made:

• A Driving While Intoxicated conviction stays on an offender's criminal and driving record forever.

• For the first offense, the law allows a maximum of six months in jail, a \$2,000 fine and a one-year driver license suspension.

• A DWI conviction also carries a \$1,000 surcharge for three years, in addition to any other fines or costs associated with the arrest.

The plan was for more law enforcement officers than usual to patrol roads, highways and interstates across Texas.

What a great night to ride broncs! The rain threatened but held off making the air cool enough to really make the Bad Company string buck.







Ozona Lodge number 747 was chartered in 1893, two years after Crockett County was founded, and for the ensuing 115 years has carried out the Masonic endeavors of providing philanthropic assistance to worthwhile causes.

ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING


The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

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
