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



Commissioners, school board approved sale of county property

After lengthy discussions, the Crockett County Commissioners Court and the CCCCSD Board of Trustees came to an agreement on the sale of county property during a joint meeting Monday night.

Both boards unanimously approved a motion for the school district to enter into an inter-local agreement for the school to purchase the south pool property from the county for \$30,000 plus donating the primary school's used playground equipment for paramount public use of the land, pending a legal opinion.

The motion means the county will not have to advertise for bids for the sale of the property, since both entities agree this is the best use of the property. The property is 31,237.50 square-feet.

The motion also included splitting the cost of an environmental impact study, which is around \$2,000 total.

Currently, the county has a skateboard park on the property.

School Board President Dr. Marcus Sims said the school did not want to "kill" the skateboard park, but that the property could better be used as part of the future new elementary school.

The district is not sure what exactly the property will be used for, but possibilities are as part of the playground or parking.

Both commissioners and the school board each met in separate executive sessions before the negotiated price was made.

The skateboard park will be moved to the area by the county swimming pool across the street.

"In my opinion, I don't know how long skateboarding is going to be the fad. To me, it's better used by 400 school kids for the next 50 years," Sims said.

County Judge Fred Deaton said the community approached the commissioners with the need of the skateboard park, which is why the county pursued constructing one.

"The county is not in the business of selling real estate. We know (the property) is worth some money, but we're not out to make money that way. We are in the parks business and recreation business. Our intention is that we are going to have a skateboard park for the kids. We realize the need for it," said Commissioner Pleas Childress.

At one point during the meeting, Deaton said it could possibly cost the county around \$70,000 to build a nice skateboard park with public basketball courts and lighting.

"That's too much money. With that kind of money, it would be the school paying for the new skate park," said School Board Secretary Veronica Fierro.

Discussion also mentioned moving the skateboard park to the north pool area.

Commissioner Alfredo Tobar said he felt the skateboard park should remain in the area it currently is due to be more visible and near the Texas Department of Public Safety office.

Tobar also asked the school board if they would be looking at the north pool property in the future for parking at Lion Stadium.

"I don't see our community growing, so I don't see where we are going to need more than what we have right now (at the stadium)," Sims said.

The school board recently approved the purchase of two lots of land owned by Arturo Lara and Esquivel Rios. The lots are located southwest of the primary school building and will be used as part of the new pick-up and drop-off routes at the new school.

Tired of waiting for help

Pandale residents discuss

lack of maintenance on rough, rocky roads

PANDALE - The rough, dirt road is filled with potholes, stretches of rocks and rigged areas.

Driving along the road, tracks move in all directions as previous drivers searched for smoother spots, or tried to avoid extremely rough ones.

For the residents of the small community of Pandale, the conditions of the dirt roads around their houses and lands have hit the breaking point.

At a meeting in the Pandale Schoolhouse Monday, around 35 residents and area citizens discussed how they might get Val Verde County officials to listen to the problems they are having with the road conditions.

"I'm just fed up with this nonsense," said resident Terry McManus. "The conditions of the road are costing me money to maintain my pick-up. I can only drive 10 mph."

THE ROUGH, ROCKY DIRT ROADS AT PANDALE made residents come together Monday to discuss how to get regular maintenance from Val Verde County officials. Most maintenance on the road is done when the roads suffer wash outs or floods after large rains, or when the Pecos River floods like it did two weeks ago, residents stated.

Pandale is a community located 50 miles southwest of Ozona and about 53 miles northwest of Comstock right inside the Val Verde County line.

For years, the residents have lived with Val Verde County officials

ignoring their requests to maintain the roads.

At the end of the paved, state road, travelers coming to Pandale from Ozona face a cattle guard that separates the pavement in Crockett County from the dirt road in Val

Verde County.

The cattle guard is also in poor condition, and while several warning signs are posted before the cattle guard, vehicle accidents often occur at this site or on part of the dirt roads.



HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN - Hurricane Ike augered through the state Sept. 13-14, battering Galveston and other communities along its path.

Gov. Rick Perry pledged to residents of stricken areas that the state would see them through the restoration process.

Perry's office reported that as of Sept. 18, 211 shelters were open throughout Texas housing more than 21,941 evacuees; more than 1,360 truckloads of water and 1,201 truckloads of ice have been distributed throughout storm-affected areas.

Nearly 10,000 utility workers, many from out of state, set about the task of restoring power. As of Sept. 20, about one third of the estimated 3 million people were still without power.

Reopened businesses and many more signs of recovery from the hurricane are popping up, but there is much unresolved for thousands of people. The governor urged displaced Texans "to remain patient and stay where they are until local offi-

cialists deem their neighborhoods as safe enough for their return."

For those displaced by the hurricane, Perry ordered that hotel and motel taxes be waived through Oct. 14 and FEMA set up transitional housing help.

Evacuees may phone 2-1-1 from any Texas landline or Texas cell phone to get information on how and where to apply for food stamps and other assistance.

Insurance companies have been extra busy. For example, Farmers Insurance said that as of Sept. 16, the company had received more than 50,000 Ike-related claims.

Farmers sent claims buses to sites in Houston, Beaumont, Humble Pasadena, Pearland and Sugar Land to help customers file on-the-spot claims.

And what about beloved pets and livestock left behind in the storm?

The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals reported it was working with the Texas State Animal Resource Team and other credentialed animal care agencies to assist and provide resources.

AG PROVIDES INFO-AID TO EVACUEES

Attorney General Greg Abbott and his office have had a big role in the return to normalcy after Hurri-

cane Ike.

On Sept. 15, Abbott launched a hotline to help custodial parents get child support payments.

Also on Sept. 15, he announced that more than 3,300 evacuees had been screened in an effort to identify registered sex offenders staying in shelters.

On Sept. 16, Abbott reminded Texans to report price gougers. Also on Sept. 16, he detailed the rights of evacuees when they stay in hotels.

On Sept. 17, he offered tips on ways to avoid disaster-related scams and that same day he also said emergency shelters had called in 5,555 evacuee names for his office staff to compare with the Department of Public Safety's sex offender registry.

As of Sept. 18, Abbott's office identified 18 people residing in emergency shelters as sex offenders and 36 more people as possible matches with the sex offender database.

And on Sept. 19, Abbott said, "When disaster strikes, many Texans want to make generous donations to charitable organizations. Before reaching for their wallets, Texans should ask questions and check the facts to make sure they are not about to hand their money over to a scam artist posing as a charitable cause."

COMBS PARTS WITH LEHMAN BROS.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs on Sept. 17 severed the state's contract with Lehman Brothers Inc. to provide marketing and client services to TexPool and TexPool Prime, investment pools used by local governmental bodies.

Lehman Brothers Inc. is owned by Lehman Brothers Holdings Inc., which filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection on Sept. 15.

Combs assured investors that the bankruptcy filing poses no threat to local governments invested in TexPool and TexPool Prime. Those kinds of investments are managed by a separate company, Federated Investors Inc., she said.

EYES OF TEXAS ON BAILOUT PLAN

Attention will be on Congress over the next few days, to see how lawmakers react to the Bush administration's proposed \$700 billion bailout of Wall Street financial institutions that are suffering the cascading effect of failed home mortgages. Texans will have a big stake in the outcome.

BIG DATES IN UPCOMING ELECTION

Monday, Oct. 6, is the last day for Texas residents to register to vote in the Nov. 4 general election. Early voting begins Oct. 20 and ends Oct. 31.







Many of the accidents have ended in fatalities.

"The roads are dangerous and are health hazards," said Diana McManus.

The hazardous road conditions date back 11 years ago for Sharon Cash, who took her mother by private vehicle to Del Rio when she suffered a stroke.

"Anybody here can tell you this is not fair," she said.

Emergency services often come from Crockett County, residents stated.

"Del Rio refuses to come out here," said Betty Klepper.

Crockett County EMT Coordinator Eddie Martin said the rough roads do affect response and transport times in emergencies.

"It is very uncomfortable on the patients in the back of the ambulance," he said. "We do support going down to that area. I believe we are the closest service available and in an emergency situation we need to have the closest service respond."

Residents said they have made several attempts to contact Val Verde Commissioners Jesus Ortiz and Robert Nettleton and County Judge Manuel Fernandez.

Terry McManus invited the officials, as well as a reporter from the Del Rio News-Herald to attend the meeting, but none of them showed.

The only county official in attendance was David Kelley, a deputy from the Val Verde County Sheriff's Office who lives in Comstock and patrols the Pandale area.

"We gripe about the roads, but the only time we can get anything done is when there is a lot of rain and a road is washed out," Kelley said. "I can't get (the county) up here."

"We've gotten down to a point now, where the county is unable, unaware or has an uncaring attitude about us out here," added Terry McManus.

Terry McManus said he worked on sending a written request to be placed on the agenda of the next Val Verde County Commissioners meeting on Oct. 14, as well as circulating a petition to present to the commissioners.

Terry McManus said he also contacted State Rep. Pete Gallego, D-Alpine, who represents Val Verde County. McManus said Gallego's office told him they are sending letters to the Val Verde County Judge and to the commissioners about the roads.

"I am asking each and every one of you to call the county judge and give him your name and number," Terry McManus said.

"I've been calling him for three years and he never returns a call," Cash added.

The Ozona Stockman left a message for Judge Fernandez, but he did not return the call by press time.

Residents also stated that the landowners are willing to donate cliché to help smooth out the roads, but that hasn't made a difference.

"We have to at least be able to get out and get livestock to market," said Bill Lockridge.

McManus said while he doesn't expect the problem to be solved overnight, he plans on pursuing as far as he can to get something done about the roads.

He said he plans on obtaining records from the Val Verde County Tax Assessor's office to show who pays taxes in Pandale area.

Gary Buck Mitchell also suggested to get the oilfield companies involved and to look at the Homeland Security Act.

"We pay taxes out here for these roads. We need to find out where our money is going," said Laura Sue Baggett. "I think we need to be patient not think this will be fixed overnight. We need to keep pushing."



The JV Lions will face Mc-Camey at 6:30 p.m. Thursday at Lion Stadium.







Ozona third-grader, mom attend national conference on Prader-Willi Syndrome

Ciera Lee, who has Prader-Willi Syndrome, and her mother Becky Lee attended the Foundation for Pader-Willi Research Conference Sept. 7-9 in Washington, D.C.

During their visit, they "hiked the hill" to the U.S. Capitol to speak to representatives and senators.

Becky had meetings with U.S. Rep. Ciro Rodriguez, D-San Antonio, and U.S. Senators John Cornyn, R-Texas and Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas.

Becky ask the senators and representatives to co-sponsor House Resolution 1386, which expresses support for the designation of a National "Prader-Willi Awareness Month" and increased funding for research into the causes, treatment and cure for Prader-Willi Syndrome.

Ciera, a third grader at Ozona Elementary School, has an older brother Dakota and her father is Donnie.

Founded in 2003 by parents and children born with Prader-Willi Syndrome, the Foundation for Prader-Willi Research's mission is to eliminate the challenges of Prader-Willi Syndrome (PWS) through the advancement of research.

PWS is a genetic disorder that occurs in approximately one out of every 15,000 births. PWS effects males and females with equal frequency and affects all races and ethnicities.

PWS is recognized as a common genetic cause of childhood obesity.

SYMPTOMS OF PRADER-WILLI SYNDROME



CIERA LEE traveled to Washington, D.C. with her mom Becky to attend the Foundation for Pader-Willi Research Conference. During their visit, they spoke at the U.S. Capitol to senators and representatives.

Many of the features of PWS are thought to be the result of faulty functioning of the hypothalamus, a small region at the base of the brain, that plays a crucial role in regarding a variety of the bodily functions, including hunger and satiety, body temperature, pain regulation, fluid balance, emotions and fertility.

PWS recognizes two stages. Stage 1 occurs in infants and is characterized by very low muscle tone. Feeding difficulties are common, and babies may suffer from "failure to thrive" if not carefully monitored and treated. As they grow older, strength and muscle tone generally improve. Motor milestones are achieved, although usually delayed.

An unregulated appetite char-

acterizes the second stage of PWS, which commonly begins between the ages of 2 and 6. Individuals with PWS lack normal hunger and satiety cues and will overeat if not closely monitored.

In addition, the metabolic rate of persons with persons with PWS is lower than normal. Left untreated, the combination of these problems will lead to morbid obesity and its many complications.

In addition to the eating issues, those with PWS usually have speech abnormalities, short stature, scoliosis, sleep disturbances with excessive daytime sleepiness and an abnormally high pain threshold.

Behavioral difficulties may include obsessive-compulsive disorder and difficulty controlling emo-

tions. PWS is a spectrum disorder and symptoms vary in severity and occurrence among individuals.

CURE AND TREATMENT OF PWS

Currently there is no cure for PWS. For many individuals affected by the disorder, elimination of some of the most difficult aspects of the syndrome, such as the insatiable appetite, would greatly increase the opportunities for fuller, more independent lives.

The Foundation for Prader-Willi Research is interested in advancing research toward treating specific aspects of the syndrome as well as development of a cure for PWS.

Growth hormone is the only FDA-approved treatment for children with PWS. It has dramatic positive impact on height, weight, body mass, strength and agility, among other areas.

BENEFITS OF PWS RESEARCH

PWS is the most frequently diagnosed and best-characterized genetic cause of obesity, thus making PWS a valuable tool in the scientific study of obesity for the general population.

Understanding why those with PWS can't control their appetite may lead to a better understanding of how appetite is controlled in normal individuals.

In addition, understanding the underlying basis of problems in PWS patients will lead to insights into other common conditions including sleep disorders, scoliosis, obsessive compulsive disorder and other behavioral difficulties.
