
The dinner is free to all veterans and their spouse. For all our guests, cost is a \$5 donation.

Pandale residents address Val Verde commissioners

Residents of Pandale spoke during the Oct. 14 Val Verde County Commissioners' Court meeting about the conditions of their roads.

During the meeting, Carl Esser, of Uvalde, presented the court with a grant request to the Office of Rural Community Affairs and the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service to repair roads and low water crossings due to damage from Tropical Storm Erin in August 2007.

The application has identified repair to roads in the Langtry, Pandale and Blue Hills area, as well as Miers Ranch Road. Grant funds that are requested are \$210,000.

ted Oct. 1 and Oct. 2 and the county is still waiting on an answer. Once the county receives a re-

ply, construction shall begin, Esser said.

During the meeting, the commissioners told residents that Val Verde County doesn't have the money to spend buying materials to repair the roads, and that some of the ranchers in the Pandale area do not want to give the county cliché for the road.

In the grant request, the commissioners have asked for a waiver to allow them to purchase materials from various landowners in the Pandale area.

Resident Terry McManus said Also, the site on the Pecos that landowners have volunteered to provide materials, but that often Verde County personnel and request equipment is at the roads with no one

"I feel like we have been rather patient. This is a problem we face every day of the week. It's a burden," McManus said.

McManus also presented a petition signed by Pandale residents to the commissioners' court.

The commissioners told the residents in attendance that they plan on taking care of the roads as soon as funding becomes available.

Pandale residents held a meeting in September to discuss road repairs in their area.

During that meeting, McManus said while he doesn't expect the problem to be solved overnight, he plans on pursuing as far as he can to get something done about the roads.

Pandale is a community located 50 miles southwest of Ozona and about 53 miles northwest of Comstock right inside the Val Verde County line.
