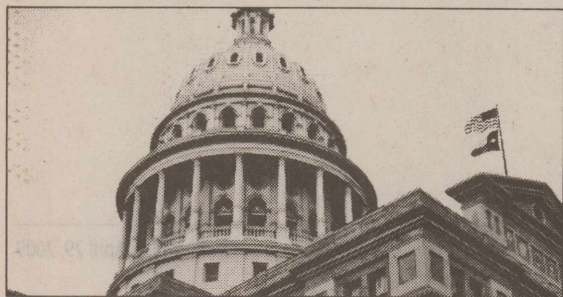

Signs of improvement

Preliminary TAKS scores show positive results in elementary, middle school grades

Last year, Ozona Middle School Principal Benny Granger told the Crockett County CCSD School Board that seventh grade TAKS math scores were "horrible."

The class had scored a 30 percent passing rate.

A year later, things have dramatically changed.

Two weeks ago, CCCSD received preliminary results on the eighth grade math TAKS test. This same class that scored 30 percent last year raised their grades to a 73 percent passing rate for this year.

"We are very proud of the students and teachers," Granger said. "One of our goals is to be above the state average passing rate, which is not available at this time. We always strive to surpass the state average and keep

going. Even if we don't get there, we are still very proud of the ground we made up this year."

Along with the number of students passing, this year's eighth grade class had four students that achieved commended performance and six out of the nine special education students passed, Granger said.

"This is more than double their performance from last year. Lisa James, OMS eighth grade math teacher, has done an exceptional job with these students. Basically, she's worked her tail off," said Superintendent Abe Gott. "These increased scores were also due to the board approving an extra math teacher.

That teacher, Ernie Rivera, along with Ms. James, enabled us to 'double dip' these kids in math and really attack the deficiencies. It obviously paid off."

On the reading test, the eighth-graders also improved scoring an 87 percent with 18 commended performances. Last year, the school had 81 percent pass with 10 commended performances.

"Once again, our goal is to be above the state average and keep getting better. I feel we have a great staff in place at OMS and I believe things will continue to improve as time goes by," Granger said.

In the elementary school, preliminary results for the fifth grade TAKS test were

also exciting.

Eighty percent of fifth-graders passed the test, which is in the recognized performance range.

"I have said since August 2008, what a great group of kids this fifth grade bunch is. They have worked hard and stretched themselves in Math. The Math TAKS results are proof of their work, commitment to excellence, and determination to succeed. Both Autumn (Brown) and I are very pleased with the results," said Debra Fred, fifth grade math teacher.

First year, fifth grade, teacher Autumn Brown had a pass rate of 88 percent in her

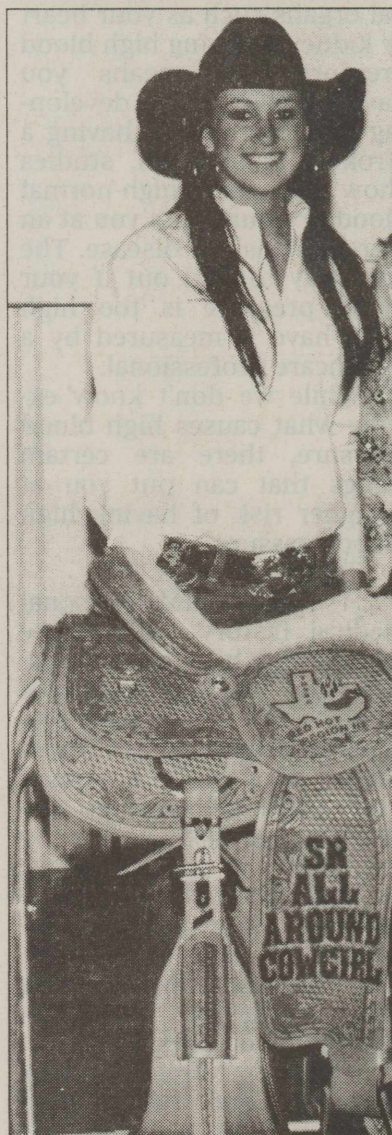

Do you have high home heating and cooling energy bills?

The C.E.A.P. Program and the W.A.P. Program are the programs intended to make funds available to respond to the energy needs affecting low-income households.

To be eligible for the programs the households must meet 125 percent of the Federal poverty income guidelines.

Priority is given to households that are elderly (60 years and above); Disabled (individuals who are unable to engage in substantial employment by reason of a medically deter-

mined physical or mental condition which is determined to last); households with children under 6 years; households with the lowest income that pay the highest portion of their income for home energy; and households that have been on the weatherization waiting list for 2 or more years.

The Concho Valley Community Action Agency administers these programs in the Concho Valley.

Gallego files bill for appointed directors to Red Bluff water district

A bill to have the board of directors appointed instead of elected for the Red Bluff Water Power Control District was filed last week by State Rep. Pete Gallego, D-Alpine.

Gallego filed House Bill 4807 on April 21. If passed, the bill would allow the governing body of each member district to appoint one director to serve on the Red Bluff board.

The member districts are Loving County Water Improvement District No. 1; Pecos County Water Improvement District No. 2; Pecos County Water Improvement District No. 3; Reeves County Water Improvement District No. 2; Ward County Irrigation District No. 1; Ward County Irrigation District No. 3 and Ward County Water Improvement District No. 2.

A person who holds an elected office of a political subdivision in the Red Bluff District may be appointed to serve as a director of the Red Bluff District without incurring a penalty or forfeiting the office unless the Texas Constitution so requires, the bill stated. If a vacancy occurs on the Red Bluff board, the member district that appointed the director to the vacated position shall appoint a person to fill the vacancy.

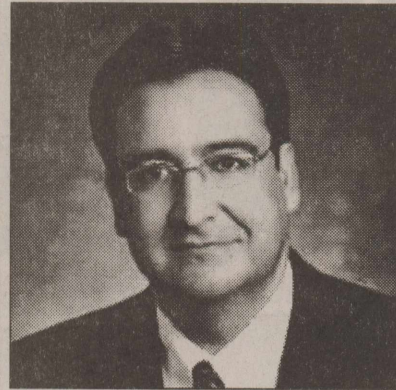
Directors will serve staggered terms of six years. The initially appointed directors shall draw lots to begin the staggering so that one or two directors are appointed every two years. A director may not be appointed to or serve more than one term of office, the bill stated.

"We received a good amount of support from members of the irrigation districts that wanted appointed directors," said Patrick Tarlton, Gallego's chief of staff.

The idea of a Pecos River Water Authority was brought up through Gallego's office earlier this year.

Nowhere in House Bill 4807 does it state that any kind of water authority will be created.

Tarlton said after he met

er Authority bill we would not do so," Tarlton said. "Almost all of the irrigation districts want appointed directors. That's why we filed this bill."

Pecos River water usage is currently controlled by the Red Bluff Water Power Control District board, which was created following the construction of Red Bluff Lake in 1936. The district sells water to the seven sub-districts in Reeves, Loving, Pecos and Ward Counties, which operate from the lake south to Girvin.

class, and more than half of her students received commended performance.

"When we received the results, I was blown away. I am so proud of my students. They have worked very hard for this," Brown said.

Tutorials twice a week with a classroom full of students almost every time, along with reviews, practice tests and with being tough on making

sure students corrected problems and understood all the skills, are some of the things Brown has done in her classroom this year.

"They knew exactly what the test would look like and the kinds of questions that would be asked. We also went to the board daily so the students could practice and had daily multiplication facts tests. If they can multiple they can do

anything," she said.

TAKS testing continues this week with grades fourth, sixth and seventh taking reading and OHS juniors taking exit level math today (April 29).

Grades fifth, eighth, sophomores and juniors will take science and freshmen math on Thursday. The week will finish on Friday with grades eighth, sophomores and juniors taking social studies.

TxDOT earns state's highest environmental award

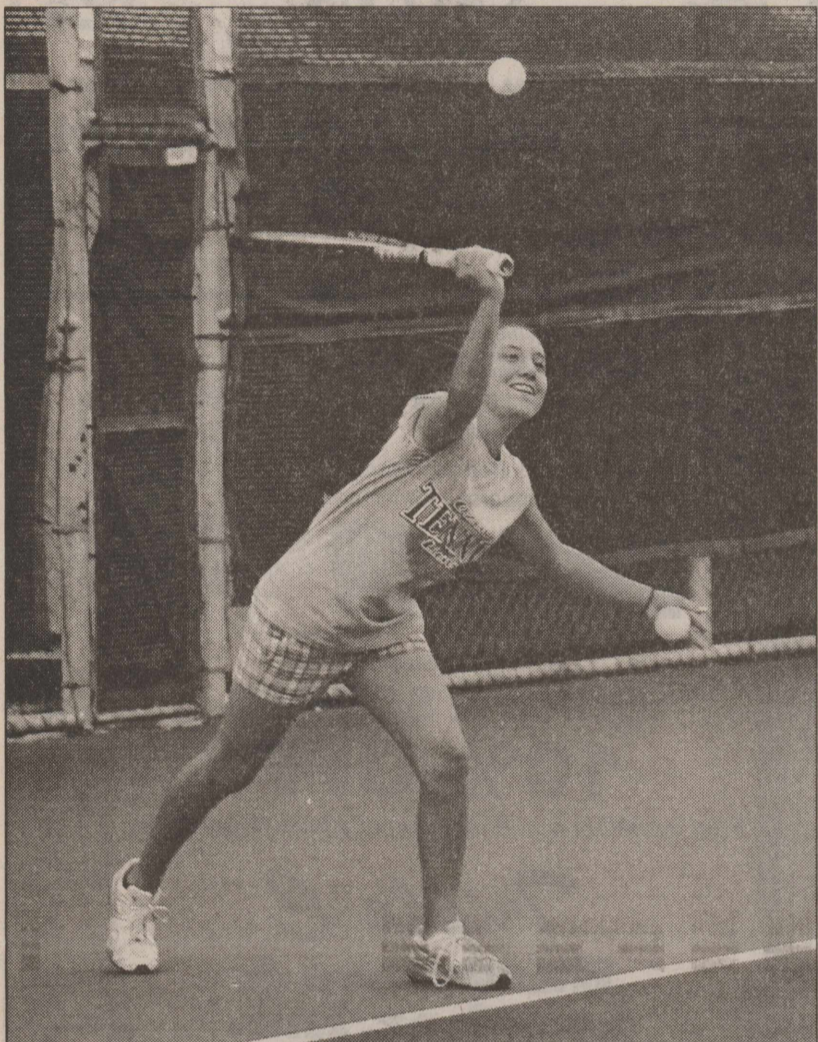

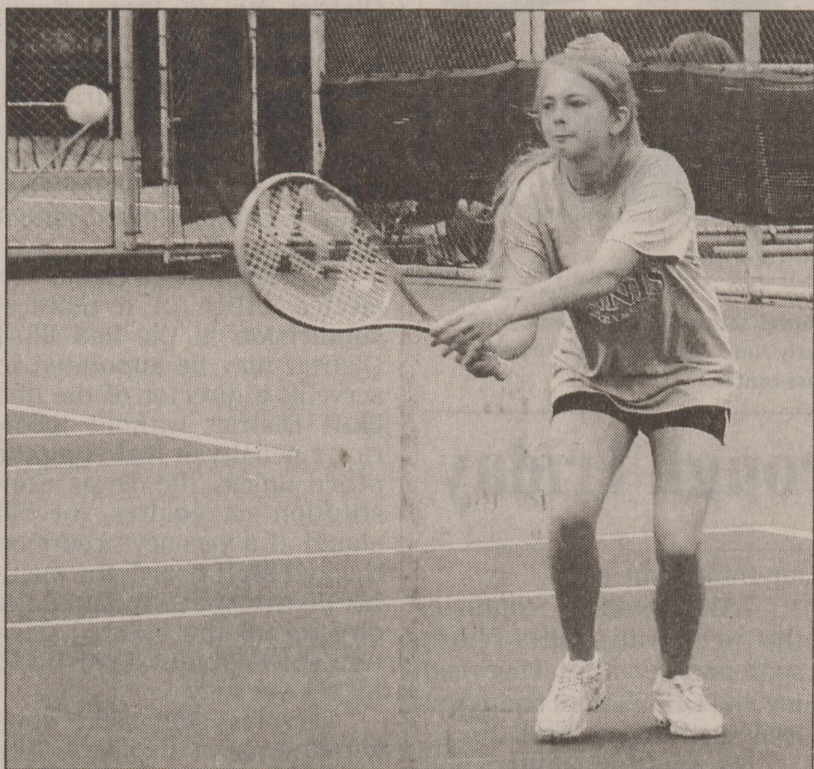
CUATRO JONES goes in for a backhand in the Ozona Middle School Tennis Tournament held April 25 in Ozona.



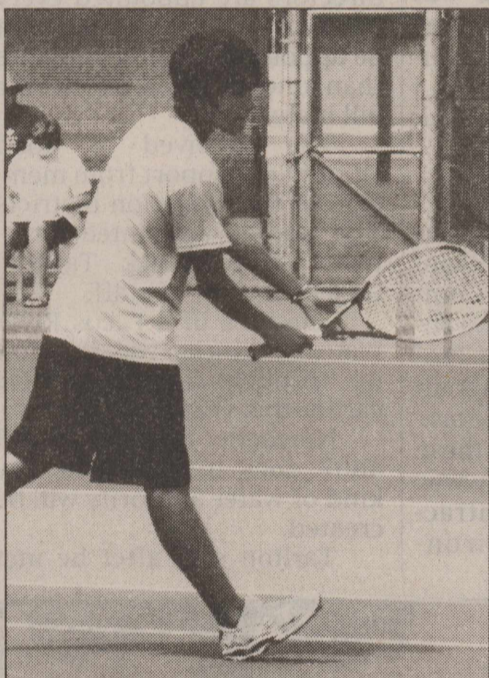
JON DAVID DEHOYOS stretches for the ball in the Ozona Middle School Tennis Tournament held April 25 in Ozona.

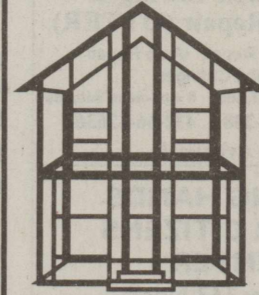

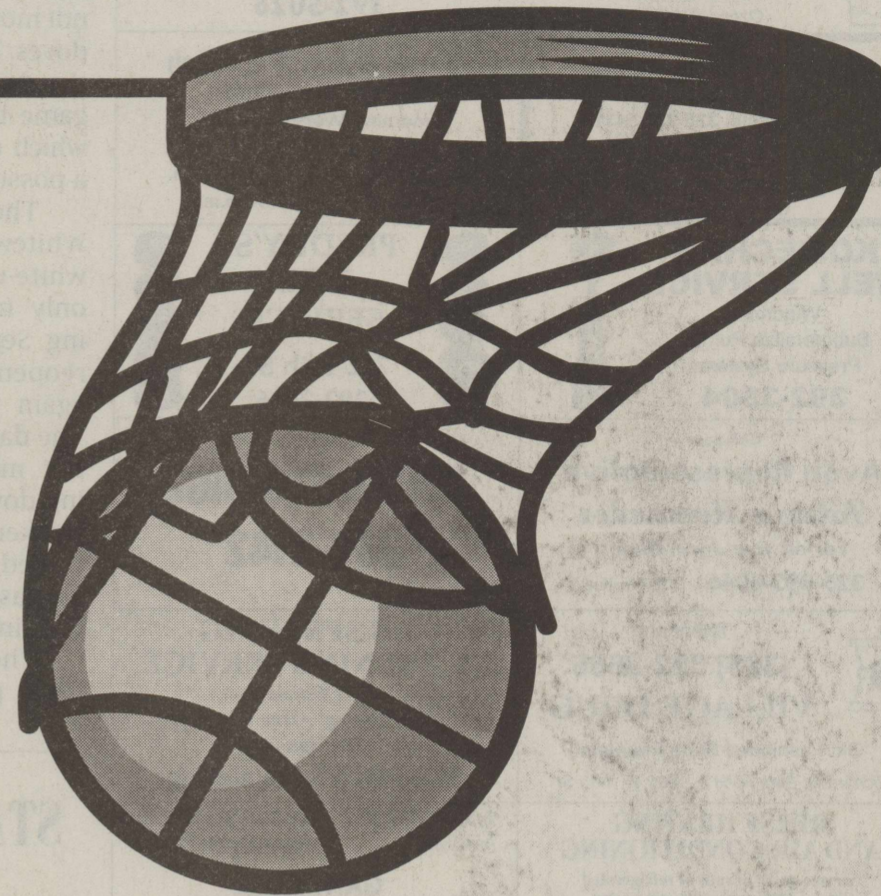

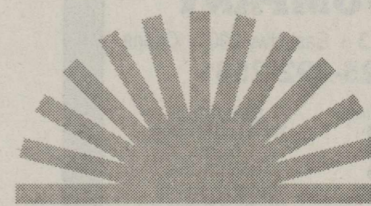
