# Extra practice days

Swine flu postpones regional track meet, state academic meet for Ozona students

BY MELISSA PERNER THE OZONA STOCKMAN

A case of H1N1, or swine flu, near Austin caused regional and state meets to be postponed until after May 11 last week.

University of Interscholastic League officials made the decision on April 29 on the recommendation of Dr. David Lakes, commissioner of the Texas Department of State Health Service, and in consultation with Texas Education Agency Commissioner Robert Scott.

'The health and safety of our student activity participants is of the utmost importance," said

UIL Executive Director Dr. Charles Breithaupt. "Taking every possible precaution to prevent the further spreading of this disease is an important contribution to the welfare of our great state, and altering the schedule of our events is a way to keep our participants safe.'

With these changes, six Ozona students who were originally set to compete at the state academic meet this weekend; will be competing May 25 and 26, the week of

What should I do if I feel ill?


Stay home and avoid contact with others when you are feeling ill to avoid spreading illness to others.

the intelligence of the supposedly smarter people would have worn off on the animals. But scientists say it's the exact opposite: as animals became domesticated their brains actually shrank. A lot! Horses brains used to be 16 percent bigger than they are now, back when they were wild and had no human contact. The brains of domesticated dogs have shrunk 10-30 percent and hog's brains have shriveled 34 percent. Just think how smart hogs would be if people hadn't dumbed them down!

I had the opportunity to prove this theory at an all-breeds bull sale many years ago. It was back in the day when many of the bulls sold at all breed events were haltered, fitted, clipped and I guess you could say... domesticated. The range bulls we could still sell at the usual clip of one every 30 seconds but nearly every time a fitted bull, what you call domesticated, came into turge to point to the big sign on the door the ring he immediately turned around and tried to exit through the in gate which was now closed. This went on all day and usual snappy sale dragged on for hours as we all

tried to shoo the bulls outside. A friend of mine who had just recently

been married to a cute gal was working ring with me and every time one of these show bulls delayed the sale he'd come over to me during the break in the sale and say, "Those stupid bulls. I'm never gonna get home." This went on all day with my buddy's blood boiling every time there was a lengthy delay. "Those fitted bulls have to be dumber than a 15 year old fifth grader," he remarked, as he was itching to leave and growing more frustrated with each hold up.

### Legislators move toward reshaping focus of education

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN - The Texas House and Senate on April 30 passed legislation to revise the accountability system for public schools.

The legislation, SB 3 by Senate Education Committee chair Florence Shapiro, R-Plano, and HB 3 by House Public Education Committee chair Rob Eissler, R-The Woodlands, have long lists of amendments that must be agreed upon or discarded as the process moves forward.

Under both bills, the education system would be changed to focus on students' readiness for post-secondary education that could be college or other forms of training.

Shapiro said Texas' current accountability system has created an illusion of progress. "The passing standards on the assessments lack any link to success after graduation. The world today requires sound preparation. All students must be prepared for post-secondary education."

SB 3 and HB 3 update curriculum requirements for high school students. They'll take four years of math, science, social studies and English, two years in the same foreign language, and

eight electives that could include fine arts, or career-in-technology education that gives students who don't plan on going to college workforce training.

In addition, school districts would have new accountability standards. Accreditation and performance ratings would be based not only on passing standards, but also on how students score on college readiness standards. Schools could receive recognition in more areas, for success in 21st century workforce development, fine arts, secondary languages, PE, and academic excellence.

> SPEAKER NAMES **BUDGET CONFEREES**

The primary task of the Texas Legislature is to produce a budget for fiscal years 2010-2011.

The House and Senate versions of the \$180 billion (give or take) budget don't match, so the two bodies are going to have to compromise.

House Speaker Joe Straus on April 27 announced the following appointees to the Conference Committee on SB 1, the state's

biennial budget for 2010-2011: House Appropriations Committee chair Jim Pitts, R-Waxahachie, and vice chair Richard Raymond, D-Laredo; Ruth Jones McClendon, D-San Antonio; John Otto, R-

Dayton, and John Zerwas, R-Katy. The five House members will work with five Senate members named earlier by Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst. They are: Senate Finance Committee chair Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, and vice chair Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, Shapiro, Senate Intergovernmental Relations chair Royce West, D-Dallas, and Senate Administration Committee chair Tommy Williams, R-The Woodlands.

June 1 is the last day of the 81st regular session of the Texas Legislature, so the pressure is on to wrap up the budget and get it to the governor. **BILL MAY CHANGE** 

**AGENCY'S NAME** SB 341 by Sen. Jeff Wentworth, R-San Antonio, proposes to rename the Texas Railroad Commission as the Texas Energy

The bill was passed by the Senate and now moves to the House for consideration. If the bill becomes law, the name change will be phased in before Jan. 1, 2010. The Texas Railroad Commis-

sion regulates the oil and natural gas industry, pipeline transporters, natural gas and hazardous liquid pipeline industry, natural gas utilities, the LP-gas industry, and coal and uranium surface mining operations. The Texas Department of Transportation regulates rail roads.

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



The UIL's decision came one day after health officials ordered a shutdown of every school campus in New Braunfels and Comal school districts until May 11 due to two cases of swine flu being confirmed in

Comal County. On Monday, the Austin American-Statesman reported that a case has been confirmed widespread across the United in Travis County.

The case was one of two previously classified as "probable" and involved a 5-year-old student at Lucy Read Pre-kindergarten, which has been closed by school district officials until May 11, the Statesman article stated. Tests are still pending on the second case.

As of Tuesday morning, the Center for Disease Control was reporting 279 cases in the U.S. with 41 in Texas.

The United States is reporting one swine flu death: a 22-month old boy from Mexico who was visiting relatives in Brownsville. He died April 27 night after being taken to a hospital in Houston, the health department reported.

Gov. Rick Perry issued a disaster declaration for all of Texas last week.

The disaster declaration enables the state to enact emergency measures and to seek federal money for protective measures.

tions and treatments if a case of swine flu is confirmed in Crock ett County.

David Lakey, Texas Health commissioner, on April 29 delivered a public statement stating the Department of State Health Services is taking measures to prevent the spread of this disease.

"In communities where we have identified swine flu, we're asking the communities to do specific steps. We're asking them, at certain times when they have the disease in their schools, to close their schools. We're asking them to implement their Pandemic Influenza Plan so we are ready, and the community is ready, for whatever comes their way. We're working with health care providers throughout the state so they know what they need to do in order to protect your health."

A leading official at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta said Sunday that swine flu is in virtually every state, causing her to expect more severe cases and deaths nationwide in the weeks

"We do think this virus is States." said Dr. Anne Schuchat. interim deputy director for the CDC's Science and Public Health Program. "More people are getting flu. More people are being tested for it, and most of those people are recovering. ... I don't think we're out of the woods

What's the big deal with swine flu? It's a novel virus that hasn't been seen before, and no one has immunity to it. However, it can be treated with Tamiflu and Relenza, and Perry said at the news conference the CDC has approved 850,000 courses of antiviral medication from the Strategic National Stockpile. Another 840,000 courses of medication are on hand that Perry and the Legislature authorized in 2007.

The Texas Education Commissioner Robert Scott said school districts that decide to close because of the swine flu will not be penalized academically or financially. The state will offer waiver days for the missed school so districts won't have to hold makeup days during the summer.

### Commissioners approve resolution in support of oil and gas appraisal bill

During a special called meeting Monday, the Crockett County Commissioners approved a resolution in support of a state bill that would change how oil and gas mineral values are appraised.

If passed, senate bill 2557, filed by State Senator Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio, would repeal Sec. 23.175 of the Texas Tax Code, which calculates oil or gas interest for appraisal property values.

If the statewide natural gas price for 2008 of \$8.03 per mcf is reduced by the Texas Comptroller's market condition factor of .604, then Crockett County's mineral reduce the value of the county's oil and gas properties, based on the current code, according to a letter from County Auditor John Stokes and Crockett County Chief Appraiser Rhonda Shaw.

You want heroes?

Doris Dillon dreamed all her life of being a teacher. She not only made it, she was one of those wondrous teachers who could bring the best out of every single child. One of her fellow teachers in San Jose, Calif., said, 'She could teach a rock to read.' Suddenly she was stricken with Lou Gehrig's Disease which is always fatal, usually within five years. She asked to stay on job . And did. When her voice was

You want heroes? Bob House, a teacher in Georgia, tried out for "Who Wants to be a Millionaire?" After he won the million dollars, a network film crew wanted to follow up to see how it had impacted his life. New cars? Big new house? Instead, they found both Bob House and his wife still teaching. They explained that it was what they had always wanted to do with their lives and that would not change. The community was both stunned and grateful.

You want heroes? Last year the average school teacher spent \$468 of their own money for student necessities... workbooks, pencils...supplies kids had to have but could not afford. That's a lot of money from the pockets of the most poorly paid teachers in the industrial world.

Schools don't teach values? The critics are dead wrong. Public education provides more Sunday School teachers than any other profession.

The average teacher works more hours in nine months than the average 40-hour employee does in a year.

You want heroes? For millions of kids, the hug they get from a teacher is the only hug they will get that day because the nation is living through the worst parenting in

An Argyle, Texas kindergarten teacher hugs her little 5 and 6 year-olds so much that both the boys and the girls run up and hug her when they see her in the hall, at the football games, or in the malls years later.

A Michigan principal moved me to tears with the story of her attempt to rescue a badly abused little boy who doted on a stuffed animal on her desk...one that said "I love you!" He said he'd never been told that at home. This is a constant in today's society. Two million unwanted, unloved, abused children in the public schools, the only institution that takes them all in.

You want heroes? Visit any special education class and watch the miracle of personal interaction, a job so difficult that fellow teachers are awed by the dedication they witness. There is a sentence from an unnamed source which says: "We have been so eager to give our children what we didn't have that we have neglected to give them what we did have.

What is it that our kids really need? What do they really want? Math, science, history, and social studies are important, but children need love, confidence, encouragement, someone to talk to, someone to listen, standards to live by. Teachers provide upright examples, the faith and assurance of responsible people.

You want heroes? Then go down to your local school and see our real live heroes - the ones changing lives for the better each and every day!

Now, pass this on to someone you know who's a teacher, or to someone who should thank a teacher today.

I'd like to see this sent to all those who cut down the importance of teachers. They have no idea who a public school teacher is or what they do.

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

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
