King named interim superintendent

Trustees unanimously approved King during a special meeting Monday night.

King will serve as interim superintendent until June 9 when the board will meet again in a special meeting to hire Chris duBois as superintendent. That meeting will be at 6:30 p.m. at the Administration Building.

Currently the assistant superintendent of finance at Grape Creek ISD, duBois was named the Lone Finalist for superintendent on May 18. State law requires a 21-day waiting period for finalists before the board can officially offer a contract.

Superintendent Abe Gott resigned in April and will leave at the end of week to become the new superintendent at Blackwell ISD.

Also on the agenda for onday's meeting was the Athletic Director position.

The board met in executive/closed session for 3.5 hours and called Athletic Director Matt Gutierrez into the executive session for about 20

No decision was made by John King has been named the board when they reconvened in open session.

Board President Dr. Mar-The CCCCSD Board of cus Sims said the district still has an Athletic Director at this time, and at this time the district is not looking for a new

Sims also said that the board does not make decisions in executive/closed session that all board decisions are made in open session.

CHANGE ORDERS APPROVED FOR NEW SCHOOL

The board approved a \$53,541 change order for gas heating in the cafetorium, kitchen, gymnasium, library, music classroom and the existing four classrooms in the new elementary school.

This was done during the board's regular meeting held on May 20.

Architect Douglas Koehne presented results of researching the cost to change to gas heating. Koehne said that gas prices over the last 10 years have been more volatile than electric, which means a saving may not been seen until 20 to 30 years out.

Remembering fallen heroes

Remembering those who gave their lives for freedom through song, prayers and words was part of the annual Memorial Day ceremony held Monday at the Veterans Wall between Lima and Cedar Hill Cemeteries.

More than 400 Crockett County Veterans are buried at the two cemeteries, said Frank Tambunga, event coordinator.

"Across the country, people are pausing today to remember them. America needs heroes today, just as we needed them throughout history," Tambunga said. "American heroes can be sure that their sacrifices are not forgotten, that they did not die in vain."

Tambunga's son Roman, a 2007 graduate of Ozona High School, sang "The National Anthem" and led the crowd in "The Pledge of Allegiance."

Two current OHS seniors were recognized as being the American Legion and Crockett County Veterans Outstanding Students.

The first is Ethan English for his dedicated service to always assisting with the ceremony and for "leading his peers by example," Tambunga said.

Comptroller: 'We have a healthy economy'

The economy in Texas is better off than the rest of the country, but the legislature is not neglecting the fact that using the state's "rainy day fund" will have to be used in the future.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs gave this report to Crockett County officials, officials from Irion County and community members during her visit on May 22 at the Ozona Chamber of Com-

Combs gave a report on the Texas economy and the state's budget. Unlike the rest of the country, Combs said Texas has a diversified economy that has helped the state to stay afloat.

Texas runs the 12th largest economy in the world, one that's more diverse than Canada's or Mexico's, Combs said.

"We have dodged the recession bullet. Yes, we have had job losses but I believe that is coming down and we should level out in the summer," she said.

Texas' home foreclosure rate is one of the best in the country, Combs said. In Texas only one out of 850 hous-

es are being foreclosed on, compared to California and Florida at one out of 175 and Nevada which is one out of every 70.

"We have a healthy economy," she said. "It is not an accident that Texas was responsible for over 70 percent of all new job creation across the entire country in 2008. A lot of people believe that this part of the country will be the next migration population boom."

Combs also said when the oil boom went bust in the mid-1980s, the legislature created a "rainy day fund" which is up to \$6.7 billion.

Despite, the "healthy economy" Combs said the legislature will have to use the "rainy day fund" in their next session. The fund is expected to be up to \$9.1 billion.

"You can't get something for nothing, and everything costs money," she said.

In the next session, the legislature is going to look at revising the franchise tax that was passed in 2006 to help with school funding.

Combs said legislators were counting on the franchise tax raising up to \$5.9

Senate bill would put brakes on TxDOT's toll road promoting

AUSTIN — The Texas House tentatively approved HB 2142, legislation to prevent the Texas Department of Transportation from promoting toll roads.

Now the bill, by Rep. Ruth Jones McClendon, D-San Antonio, moves to the Senate for consideration. An identical bill, SB 384 by Sen. John Carona, R-Dallas, gained Senate approval and has moved to the House for consideration.

Either bill, if passed, would put a clamp on TxDOT's practice of using various means to influence public opinion in favor of toll road construction.

Under the legislation, TxDOT no longer would be authorized to engage in marketing, advertising, or other activities for the purpose of influencing public opinion about the use of toll roads or the use of tolls as a financial mechanism.

"TxDOT needs to be committed to the goals of the public, not just promoting its own goals," McClendon said.

regard to the status of pending and ongoing toll projects. **SENATE PASSES CAMPUS GUNS BILL**

The Texas Senate on May 19 approved a bill that would allow students who possess a concealed handgun permit to carry a firearm on college and university classrooms, dormitories and oth-

er public buildings on campus. Sen. Jeff Wentworth, R-San Antonio, author of SB 1164, said shootings at colleges in other states inspired his bill.

"They were picked off like sitting ducks in the classroom in Virginia," he said. "I just think we ought to be able to defend ourselves from that kind of situation. It happens very rarely, but when it does happen, it's catastrophic."

SHOW HELPS IN APPRAISAL PROTEST

The Texas Comptroller's Office Internet site, www.cpa.state.tx.us, features a new slide show to help homeowners who are protesting their property tax appraisals.

"How to Present Your Case at an Appraisal Review Board Hearing: A Guide for Homeowners" makes the property tax process more transparent by providing easy-to-understand information about what to expect at a property appraisal protest hearing.

"Homeowners are empowered by understanding the protest process, knowing what information to present to the local Appraisal Review Board and how to present it," Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said. "It helps homeowners make convincing appeals and helps the review boards make better decisions."

Appraisal review boards generally hear property appraisal protests between May 15 and July 25, except in major urban areas with extended protest periods.

AG JOINS IN 'FALSE CHARITY' SWEEP Texas Attorney General Greg

Abbott on May 20 joined 33 state attorneys general and the U.S. Federal Trade Commission in an effort to stamp out fraudulent charitable solicitations nationwide.

Abbott launched an online

portal that gives Texans greater access to information about law enforcement organizations that rely upon telemarketing to raise funds from the general public: http://www.oag.state.tx.us/consumer/charitysearch_info.shtml.

period, Koehne recommended larger areas and currently existing areas.

After hearing details from Koehne and Greg W. Cox, president of Tex-Oma Builders Supply Co., about an interior card access system for classroom doors, the board decided to keep the exterior card access system previously approved but to not include a card access system on the inside doors of the school.

State's major crime rate drops

BY TELA MANGE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY

The major crime rate in Texas decreased nearly 3 percent in 2008, according to data compiled by the Texas Department of Public Safety's Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

Compared with 2007, the crime rate the number of crimes per 100,000 population in Texas--decreased 2.9 percent in 2008. The violent crime rate decreased .6 percent in 2008 from 2007. The property crime rate decreased 3.2 percent in 2008.

The total number of major crimes committed was down 1.2 percent in 2008 compared with 2007. Of the seven index crimes, murder was down 3 percent; rape was down 5.1 percent. The total number of arrests in Texas increased 1.6 percent in 2008. The number of juvenile arrests decreased 1.2 percent, while adult arrests increased 2.0 percent.


The Texas Uniform Crime Reporting Program also collects statistics on hate crimes and family violence incidents. In 2008, Texas law enforcement agencies reported 246 incidents of hate crimes involving 276 victims and 233 offenders.

Law enforcement agencies reported 193,505 family violence incidents involving 208,073 victims and 203,682 offenders in 2008.

IF YOU OR YOUR COMPANY DOES EXCAVATION WORK, WE NEED YOUR HELP TO AVOID DAMAGE TO OUR PIPELINE

To determine if there are pipelines in the area where excavation is planned, look for pipeline markers at nearby roads, railroads and fences. Don't try to guess the route or location of the pipeline. Call the pipeline company toll free at the number shown on the marker at least 48 hours before you dig. They will send a representative to mark the exact location, route and depth of the pipeline at no charge.


WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE DIGGING AND DISTURB A PIPELINE

Even if you cause what seems to be only minor damage to the pipeline, notify the pipeline company immediately. A gouge, scrape, dent or crease to the pipe or coating may cause a future break or leak. It is imperative that the pipeline owner inspect and repair any damage to the line.

HOW TO RECOGNIZE A PIPELINE LEAK

LOOK - A pool of liquid on the ground, a white cloud or fog, persistent bubbling in standing water, or discolored vegetation are signs of a possible leak. Fire or explosion occurring near a pipeline facility should be reported.

LISTEN - Listen for any unusual noise like a hissing or roaring sound. SMELL - Notice any unusual odor.
