Soil Conservation News

An interesting story showing some of the possibilities with grasses was obtained on a seeding of weeping lovegrass in the Amherst work unit recently. Mr. F. N. Smith, who is a coach in the Sudan schools has a 100 acre field of weeping lovegrass near Sudan. He has no livestock so he leased the grazing last season for which he received \$2100.
