

"I was surprised when I heard it was not further along. I'm glad now that we are able to help it get moving along," Hilderbran said.

Tony Eeds, president of the Texas Motorized Trails Coalition that is overseeing the work at the park, said they plan on opening the park soon.

Hilderbran also said many state parks are located in rural areas and that hunting and fishing, along with historical sites are done in rural Texas.

For the past four years, Okeke has lived in the United States serving at Sacred Heart Parish in Abilene and most recently St. Joseph's Parish in Fort Stockton.


"Ozona is a nice town. It's a pretty, little town. You have more trees here. I really like the environment," he said. "I believe the people are very approachable."


Okeke began his road to becoming a priest as a small child, when he would play the part with his friends.

Are no more wiser;


Hoping someday,

Complete Count Committees are volunteer teams consisting of community leaders, faith-based groups, schools, businesses, media outlets and others who are appointed by elected officials and work together to make sure entire communities are counted.

Crockett County is currently in the process of adding members to their Complete County Committee. Currently, the committee has six members. The committee is headed by Frank Tambunga.

The committee is important to help create awareness of the upcoming 2010 Census.

Committee members can donate space for testing and training temporary census workers, publicize recruiting efforts and obtain endorsements from local leaders. They can conduct census rallies or parades, media luncheons, and interfaith breakfasts and weekend events as we get closer to Census Day.

The 2010 Census will have one of the shortest census questionnaires in the history of the United States, dating back to the first census in 1790. The 2010 Census will ask just name, gender, age, race, ethnicity, relationship and whether the householder owns or rents their home.

As a result, these committees helped inform local residents - including those historically hard to reach in census counts — of the importance of responding to the census.

In part because of these efforts, the response rate for Census 2000 increased for the first time in 30 years and the undercount of those historically missed during a decennial census was reduced.

However, in 2000 only 47 percent of Crockett County responded.

The U.S. Census Bureau will be mailing out forms the second week of March 2010.

It is important that everyone in Crockett County fill out this form.

By becoming a part of the Complete County Committee, we can assure that every citizen in Crockett County is counted in order that we may receive federal money to help our county.

Governor signs emergency bill enacting reforms for state living centers

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — It's bill signing and vetoing time for Gov. Rick Perry.

He suffered a broken collar bone in a June 9 bicycling accident near his residence, but exercised his pen with a pile of legislation awaiting his signature.

On June 11, he signed one of those bills, SB 643, enacting emergency reforms for Texas' state-supported living centers, formerly referred to as "state schools." The legislation increases oversight and protection for residents of centers and for those enrolled in community-based services.

The projected cost of the package of reforms is \$32.7 million through Aug. 31, 2011, and another \$40 million from Sept. 1, 2011 through the end of fiscal year 2014.

Among its many reforms, SB 643 increases penalties for employees who abuse or neglect residents, or fail to report abuse or neglect, Perry's office said. And, it requires the Department of Aging and Disability Services to contract with an independent patient safety organization to conduct mortality assessments

to determine if deaths could have been prevented.

Among the many people present for the signing ceremony were primary author Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Grapevine, and House sponsor Rep. Patrick Rose, D-**Dripping Springs.**

LOOKING AHEAD **TO NOVEMBER BALLOT** During the 81st regular session of the Texas Legislature, which ended June 1, the House and Senate passed eight joint resolutions that will appear on the Nov. 3 general election ballot as 11 proposed amendments to the state constitution.

In the coming months, the Secretary of State's office will publish analyses of the proposed amendments, including what supporters and opponents say about each.

Here are somewhat shortened captions of proposals on the ballot:

• To authorize the state to contribute money, property, and other resources for the establishment, maintenance and

operation of veterans hospitals in this state.

· To prohibit the taking, damaging, or destroying of private property for public use unless the action is for the ownership, use, and enjoyment of the property by the State, a political subdivision of the State, the public at large or entities granted the power of eminent domain.

· To establish the national research university fund to enable emerging research universities in this state to achieve national prominence as major research universities and transferring the balance of the higher education fund to the national research university fund.

· To authorize the Legislature to provide for the ad valorem taxation of a residence homestead solely on the basis of the property's value as a residence homestead.

 To set uniform standards and procedures for the appraisal of property for ad valorem tax purposes.

· To authorize the Legisla-

ture to authorize a single board of equalization for two or more adjoining appraisal entities that elect to provide for consolidated equalizations.

• To provide that elected members of governing boards of emergency services districts may serve terms not to exceed four years.

• To protect the right of the public, individually and collectively, to access and use the public beaches bordering the seaward shore of the



Farm Service Agency reminds producers that ACRE Program enrollment is underway

Jed Hruska, Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service reduction of the direct pay-Agency in Reagan-Upton-Irion-Crockett County reminds producers that as of April 27, enrollment in the Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) program is underway. ACRE is a provision of the 2008 Farm Bill.

"The Average Crop Revenue Election program is an innovative alternative to the traditional farm safety," Hruska said. "This new option presents an opportunity for producers to review both programs and decide which one will work best for their operation."

Producers have until Aug.14, 2009, to make their decision for the 2009 crop. USDA will not accept any latefiled applications.

Producers who elect the ACRE program for a farm agree to:

· forgo counter-cyclical payments;

New license plate set to hit Texas roadways AUSTIN - The Texas Depart-

ment of Transportation has begun shipping the new general-issue plates to the 254 county tax offices statewide.

Texans chose the Lone Star Texas plate from five different designs. The plate design received 455,878 of the more than 1.1 million Texans votes. The Texas Transportation Commission, which by law must approve the state's general-issue plate, unanimously agreed with online voters and approved the plate on Feb. 28, 2008.

The opportunity for a new general-issue license presented itself when the agency realized it was going to run out of the sixcharacter plate patterns. The new general-issue plate features sevencharacter license plate numbers.

Texans eligible for the new license plate will be those that purchase a new vehicle, and those whose license plates are seven years old, the mandatory time when plates are replaced because they begin to lose their safety reflectivity.

Since 1917, the Texas Department of Transportation has been

· accept a 20-percent ments; and

· accept a 30-percent reduction in loan rates for all commodities produced on the farm.

Commodities eligible for ACRE payments are wheat, corn, grain sorghum, barley, oats, upland cotton, long grain rice, medium and short grain rice, peanuts, soybeans, sunflower seed, canola, flaxseed, safflower, mustard seed, rapeseed, sesame seed, crambe, dry peas, lentils, small chickpeas and large chickpeas.

The ACRE program was created in the 2008 Farm Bill to give producers an option in lieu of traditional countercyclical payments. Producers may elect and enroll in ACRE for the 2009 crop year even if they have already accepted advance direct payments under the Direct and Countercyclical Program.

To elect ACRE for a farm, producers must complete Form CCC-509 ACRE, which irrevocably elects ACRE for the farm through crop year 2012. Form CCC-509, the contract to participate in ACRE, must then be completed each year the producer intends to participate and receive benefits.

According to Hruska, the ACRE decision tool developed by the Agricultural and Food Policy Center (AFPC) at Texas A&M University is now available to producers online at www.afpc.tamu.edu/models/ acre/index.php

"This ACRE Decision Aid will assist producers in analyzing the impact of ACRE participation on their individual operation," said Hruska.





During the three-day campaign, 7,316 commercial vehicles were inspected, and 1,636 of the vehicles (22.3 percent) and 202 of the drivers (2.7 percent) were found to have serious enough safety violations to be removed from service. Last year, 1,435 vehicles and 178 drivers were placed out of service.

Inspectors placed 125 drivers out of service for hours-ofservice violations. Other violations ranged from false log violations to suspended, expired and cancelled licenses and having the improper endorsement. Seven drivers were placed out of service for drug or alcohol violations. Troopers issued 12 tickets for seat belt violations.

Vehicle out-of-service violations included 953 trucks that needed a brake adjustment, 655 that had brake system problems, 245 that had

· To authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue general obligation bonds in amounts equal to or less than amounts previously authorized.

DPS Commercial Vehicle Enforcement troopers, along with Highway Patrol troopers and other inspectors who have received specialized training in commercial vehicle inspection, stopped commercial vehicles to inspect safety equipment and check driver licenses, endorsements and log books. Troopers also looked for possible drug or alcohol use.

The annual Roadcheck program, which stretches from Mexico to Canada, is designed to reduce commercial vehicle highway fatalities through increased vehicle safety. The Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance, which sponsors Roadcheck, reports a significant decrease in the commercial vehicle crash rate in North America since the program's start in 1988. Vehicles passing inspec-

tion received a CVSA decal exempting the vehicle from inspection for a 90-day period, unless they have an obvious safety defect. Troopers issued 3,037 decals during Roadcheck 2009.


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
