

Cap and Trade: The Best Way Forward for Texas?

As Texans swelter this summer, we are turning up our air conditioning and hitting the road for vacation. These seasonal routines — as well as many aspects of daily life — would become more expensive because of proposals pending in Washington.

The cap and trade provisions of the American Clean Energy and Security Act of 2009 will have a significant impact on Texas families, businesses and consumers.

The legislation would cap emissions and allow companies to buy and sell their rights to emit carbon dioxide. The concept is that industries would reduce emissions over time as

the government lowered the cap and it became too expensive for companies to continue to buy allowances to emit carbon dioxide.

The proposal to regulate greenhouse gas emissions will weigh far more on Texas than other regions. Costs will increase for energy-intensive industries such as aluminum, chemicals, forest products, glass manufacturing and petroleum refining, among others. I love dogs as much as the next person but things have gotten a little out of hand in the pet department lately. Have you seen the pet clothes section in PETCO recently?



Of course, many people know where Ozona is. Last year our Visitor Center received 5,773 in visitors.

This year, they have received 3,203 so far.

On our chamber's website, there are detailed directions, mileage to other cities and a map, a very detailed page to describe our little town.

Luckily, at our convention, there were a few people who knew where Ozona is located.

A woman from Rockdale, that's near Austin, stops in our town every time she travels to El Paso to visit her parents. Another person had car trouble and had a tire fixed and one just stopped because they were too tired to go any further.

It's hard to explain to people where our town of 3,500 is located but once they find us, many keep coming back. Once you move here, however, it's really hard to leave as well.

So, next time you are asked "where is Ozona?" give some creative answer that maybe will compel that person to look up or drive to our unique, little town.

Governor vetoes 35 bills before June 21 deadline

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN - Gov. Rick Perry signed the 2010-2011 state budget and vetoed 35 bills two days before Sunday, June 21, the deadline for approving or vetoing legislation passed by the 81st Texas Legislature.

The budget leaves the state's \$6.7 billion rainy day fund untouched but includes \$12 billion in federal stimulus money. Perry said the final outcome

of all bills would "move Texas in the right direction."

Now, here are samples of a few bills the governor vetoed:

·  HB 130, creating a pre-kindergarten education grant program. In his veto statement, Perry said a similar grant program already exists, and the new state budget contains \$25 million earmarked for HB 130, so the Texas Education Agency should use those funds to bring 21,000 more students into the existing program.

 HB 821, mandating that television manufacturers collect and recycle a quantity of televisions to be determined annually by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality. ·  HB 1293, creating

disclosure requirements and consumer education standards relating to the sale and marketing of life insurance and annuities.

"Although the bill establishes standards of transparency and improvements that are important, I believe it will do more harm than good" because it would create more opportunities for frivolous lawsuits, Perry said.

·  HB 3481, authorizing the expunction of criminal records, including law enforcement case files, 180 days after an arrest if no formal misdemeanor or felony charges have been filed.

·  HB 3485, relating to certain county, municipal, district, and other governmental functions, procedures, powers, duties, and services, including certain criminal procedures. "The bill's provision regarding physician liability was neither debated nor discussed, but rather amended onto this bill late in the session.

"It risks unraveling the progress we made in curtailing excessive liability and ensuring that patients who need physicians will be able to find them." Perry said.

· SB 1440, clarifying guidelines on how the Department of Family and Protective Services takes children into custody. Perry said he vetoed the legislation because it could infringe on the rights of parents and guardians.

·  SB 2558, allowing beer and malt beverage tastings to be held in a branded vehicle on the premises of a retailer with a permit to sell alcohol, therefore allowing alcohol consumption in a vehicle.

"The Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission would be required to increase its onsite inspections to ensure the proper precautions are taken to prevent serving to minors and over-consumption," Perry said, in explaining his veto.

·  HB 4586, the supplemental appropriations bill that includes \$150 million in funding to help the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston recover from Hurricane Ike. •  HB 4409, reforming

the Texas Windstorm Insurance Association "to ultimately reduce the burden of catastrophic storms on the state and eventually establish TWIA as an insurer of last resort," Perry said.

FSA County Committee

taking nominations

BIG LAKE, Texas - Jed Hruska, Executive Director for USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Reagan-Upton-Irion-Crockett County today announced farmer and rancher candidate nominations begin June 15 for local FSA county committees. The nomination period continues through Aug. 3, 2009. Elections take place this fall.

To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area in which the person is a candidate.

Producers may also nominate themselves, and organizations representing minority and women may also nominate candidates. To become a nominee, eligible individuals must sign form FSA-669A. The form and other valuable information about FSA county committee elections are available online at: http://www. fsa.usda.gov/FSA/webapp?ar ea=newsroom&subject=landi ng&topic=cce.

Nomination forms for the 2009 election must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Aug. 3, 2009.

FSA county committee members make decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs and other important agricultural issues. Members serve three-year Nationwide, there terms. are more than 7,800 farmers and ranchers serving on FSA county committees. Committees consist of three to five members who are elected by eligible local producers.

FSA will mail ballots to producers beginning Nov. 6th.m The voted ballots are due back to the local county office either via mail or in person by Dec. 7, 2009.



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
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

three-stage courthouse restoration project to around \$1.188 million. Over the past three years, the county has budgeted \$1.07 million for the project. This leaves the \$120,000 county around short for the project.

"It looks as if we may have to cut down a bit on the project," Deaton said.

The commissioners discussed possibly cutting refurbishing of the inside stairs that go to the second floor. The work on the stairway is of the project, which include intricate, Deaton said.

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
