Citizens voice opinions to Congressman

Rodriguez addresses health care, economy

Packed inside Pepe's Café, Ozona citizens, many of them standing, listened as Congressman Ciro Rodriguez began his talk about the state of the nation's economy and energy.

However, those were not the issues many people came to hear. The issue of health care reform quickly dominated the Aug. 13 public meeting.

An issue that is hitting a sore spot with Americans, Rodriguez said something needs to be done to start bringing down health care costs, especially with pharmaceutical companies.

The San Antonio Democrat said that the government "needs to take them on" meaning the major companies and retailers that produce and sell popular medications.

Rodriguez also said that people in rural communities, like Ozona, usually only have health insurance through local, state or through corporations.

In 1997, 67 percent of small businesses provided health care but that number

It's a mystery: Congressman Rodriguez should be more publicly available, better representative

Dear Editor:

Call lists, unscheduled, last minute meetings, unpublished schedules...sounds like something from a mystery novel? No, it appears to be the current operating procedure of our Congressman, Ciro Rodriguez, according to Roy Attwood, a staff person in San Antonio who answers the Congressman's Constituent (Congress on YOUR Corner) 866 number.

Seeking information regarding the Congressman's town hall meeting schedule for the August recess period, I placed two calls

to the constituent number and that the Congressman's schedwas told initially the last week of July that the schedule was not yet available. Odd isn't it, since the lawmakers of our country were going to be on recess in another week? Nevertheless, I left my email address online for notification as requested.

On Aug. 7, I checked the Congressman's town hall meeting schedule again and was dismayed to find no update for current meetings; only past meetings in July were listed. I called the constituent number again and spoke with Mr. Attwood who told me

ule was not being made public for "safety reasons." I inquired further and was told that he had received a death threat and that "considering everything that has been happening" at the town hall meetings, that names and telephone numbers of people inquiring about the meetings were being taken and that calls would be made accordingly regarding the Congressman's schedule. What, pray tell, happens to those constituents who don't call?

When asked about attending a non-Rocksprings town hall meeting or attending several other non-Rocksprings town hall meetings, I was told, again, that my name and telephone number would be taken and passed along to Caesar Blanco, the Congressman's Chief of Staff, and that he would determine who would be called and when. Sounds pretty restrictive and selective to me; doesn't it to you?

Again, Mr. Attwood repeated that this process was being done to "maintain civility," a seemingly much rehearsed phrasing (my personal observation) and explained that this process was also being

followed so that "some people don't show up at the meetings." I inquired whether those "some people" were people who might oppose the proposed health care plan and was told that the Congressman only wanted constituents at these meetings and that the Congressman was "only accountable to those constituents and not to the rest of the people in the United States." (I certainly hope that he is not as selective when considering legislation and how it conforms to the founding documents of our Country.) I was quickly thanked, and Mr. Attwood

terminated the conversation. I then placed a call to Mr. Blan-

co's personal cell phone number and left a message regarding my concern with the above described process. At this writing, I have not received a return call.

My questions to the Congressman are plain: Is the above process his idea of representation of all of the people in his district, even those who don't call and inquire about current topics of interest? Is taking names and telephone numbers the way to create

To keep ahead of them, and to supply an increasingly fussy consumer, ranchers will have to develop new niche markets in

Like these:

· Cowboy Free: Sad to say, some sophisticated "foodies" don't like cowboys, the west or cattle. But they still like to eat beef. These people don't like the fact that some people are allowed to own vast tracts of private property either, so this beef will be produced by a collective of liberal lesbians in La Jolla in petri dishes, or by Monks in Massachusetts. It will cost \$600 per pound and taste like mud.

Rain Forest Free Beef: In response to the conversion of the Amazon rainforest to pasture, some consumers will want to purchase beef that is rain forest free. Cruelty Free Beef: This does not refer to the cattle but to the people who raise it. The demand for such beef will be in response to the poor working conditions in third world countries and on our farms and ranches. Such beef will come from ranchers and cowboys who were never subjected to any abuse or harsh working conditions. To produce beef for this niche ranchers must earn a livable income above minimum wage, have health insurance and a pension comparable to that received by postal service employees. Needless to say, this beef will be harder to find than Certified Free Beef.

Agriculture chief says meal program won't stop if flu gains foothold

AUSTIN - During the H1N1 "swine" flu outbreaks last spring, many Texas schools closed, leaving about half a million students without access to meals normally provided under the National School Breakfast and Lunch Programs.

"There are thousands of children who depend on the meals served at school every day, and we want to make sure schools have the option of continuing this crucial service, while still protecting those students from any public health threat," Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples said.

In response to a letter from Staples to the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, a change in federal policy now lets schools health emergency.




Caperton receives \$8,000 scholarship



Grasshoppers got you hoppin' mad?

FORT STOCKTON - Grasshoppers got you hoppin' mad? If they don't yet, there's a good chance they soon will, according to a Texas AgriLife Extension Service ento-

'A few grasshoppers aren't much of a problem, but when abundant as they are starting to be here in far West Texas, they are some of the most difficult insect pests to control in the urban landscape," said Dr. Mark Muegge, AgriLife Extension entomologist at Fort Stockton.

"That's because they are so mobile and, depending on the species, the eggs will hatch from early spring through midsummer. This seemingly endless supply of hoppers will head to town when pastures (their natural habitat) dry up.'

Muegge said there are many grasshopper species in Texas, but only a few cause problems. Two of the more common troublemakers in far West Texas are the red legged and Lakins grasshoppers. The duo are similar in size and shape, but their colors differ control.

slightly. During outbreak years, they can wreak havoc on alfalfa, wheat, vegetables and ornamental flowers.

Can homeowners get rid of grasshoppers? During outbreak years like this one is shaping up to be in some parts of the state, I'd have to say no," Muegge said. "But homeowners can minimize their damage by implementing Integrated Pest Management practices. These often include physical barriers, insecticides and landscape plants grasshoppers don't particularly care for.'

Muegge said it's obvious ho-meowners have little control of what goes on outside their landscape, but they can take a big step in protecting their yards by eliminating weedy margins around the home which offer

prime egg-laying sites. Insecticides are another option that can provide some immediate control. Muegge said recent tests have shown that products with bifenthrin provide the fastest kill and longest residual

Products containing permethrin and esfenvalerate should also work well.

Baits are another option homeowners might consider, said Muegge. Baits consist of wheat bran combined with the insecticide carbaryl or the natural grasshopper pathogen Nosema locustae.

"Baits are designed to selectively kill only grasshoppers and other foraging insects and therefore will be less harmful to off-target organisms," Muegge said.

Some common grasshopperresistant plants include American beautyberry, artemesia, Coralberry, crape myrtle, Dwarf yaupon, Afghan pine, Lantana, Moss rose, Nandina, Purslane, Salvia greggii and Turks cap.

Part 1: new traffic, criminal laws set to go into effect Sept. 1

Editor's note: This is part 1 of the new traffic, criminal laws. Part 2 will run in the Aug. 26 edition.

HB 2730 is the DPS's Sunset Legislation, and many of the DPS-related bills this session were included in HB 2730. Notable traffic and criminal laws that go into effect on Sept. 1 (unless otherwise indicated) include*: **DRIVING:**

· HB 55 makes it illegal to use a wireless communication device in a school zone unless the vehicle is stopped or a hands-free device is used. Cities or counties wanting to enforce this law must post a sign at the beginning of each school zone to inform drivers that using a wireless communications device is prohibited and the operator is subject to a fine. It is a defense to prosecution if the operator was making an emergency call.

HB 2730 increases the penalties for driving while intoxicated with a child passenger by adding an automatic driver license suspension period for first-time offenders and an increased suspension period for repeat offenders. The driver license re-instatement fee for completing an education program will rise from \$50 to \$100. Closes a loophole so a person who commits an offense as a minor cannot circumvent the driver license penalty if the person turns 21 before their court

· HB 2730 allows a new Texas resident to operate a vehicle without a Texas license for 90 days instead of the current 30. (This provision went into effect

on June 19, 2009.) HB 2012 creates two new punishment enhancements: a Class B misdemeanor if a person drives with a suspended license and without insurance; and a class A misdemeanor if the person driving without in- June 1, 2010. Police officers are

has an accident and someone is seriously injured or dies as a result of that accident.

SB 129 authorizes neighborhood electric vehicles (NEVs) to be operated on roads with a posted speed limit of 45 miles per hour or less. The bill authorizes driver license holders to operate NEVs without having a motorcycle endorsement, clarifies that drivers and passengers in such vehicles are not required to wear helmets and specifies that enclosed threewheeled vehicles as described in the bill are authorized to operate in preferential lanes.

SEATBELTS:

· HB 537 requires all occupants of a vehicle, no matter their age, to be secured by a safety belt, no matter where they are seated in the vehicle; changes the definition of a passenger vehicle to include a passenger van designed to transport 15 or fewer passengers including the driver; removes the current exemption for thirdparty Medicaid transportation provisions regarding the use of child passenger safety seats; and prohibits a motorcycle operator from carrying a passenger under the age of 5 unless the child is seated in a sidecar attached to the motorcycle.

· SB 61 amends the exist-

ing statute regarding child passenger safety seats. The bill requires that any child younger than 8 years of age be restrained in an approved child passenger safety seat unless the child is at least 4 feet, 9 inches in height. The fine is no more than \$25 for a first offense and \$250 for a second offense. The law also creates a new court cost for conviction of an offense under this section to be collected and used by TxDOT to buy safety seats for low income families. The law becomes effective on Sept. 1, 2009, but tickets for this offense cannot be issued until

> **CONCEALED HANDGUN:** ous provisions regarding concealed handgun licenses (CHLs), including eliminating student loan defaults as a disqualifier, to clarify that DPS must suspend or revoke a license when and mandating that a magistrate suspend a CHL held by the subject of an emergency pro-

> tective order. HB 2664 provides a defense to prosecution if a concealed handgun license holder carries a concealed handgun into an establishment that gets 51 percent or more of its income from the sale of alcoholic beverages, but has failed to post the statutorily required notice that it derives 51 percent or more of its income from the sale of alcoholic beverages. (Under current law, a concealed handgun licensee can be charged with a Class A misdemeanor for doing this.)

> · HB 2730 removes DPS authority to suspend a concealed handgun license (CHL) for the holder's failure to display the CHL to a peace officer on depenalties and suspensions for the failure to display.

DRIVER LICENSE:

HB 2730 requires that all applicants under the age of 18 take the driving skills exam to receive a driver license. The law also requires that a provisional driver license (under 18) or instruction permit expire on an individual's 18th birthday, removes the requirement that a provisional driver license or instruction permit be renewed annually and increases the fee for those licenses from \$5 to \$15. It also extends the current phasetwo restrictions for holders of a graduated driver license from 6 months to 1 year. These restrictions include limited night driving, prohibited use of wireless

SB 1317 creates a six-hour the licensee becomes ineligible driver education course required for driver license applicants 18 years of age or older. It also mandates that applicants 25 or under must submit to an approved driver education course. (Goes into effect March

SB 328 gives DPS the power to suspend a minor's driver license if they fail a breath or blood alcohol test while operating a watercraft. Chapter 524 of the Transportation Code also clearly defines the suspension period for an individual who was under the age of 21 at the time when the offense of boating under the influence or driving under the influence of alcohol occurred. The law also increases the reinstatement fee for a license suspended under sections 49.04-49.08, Code from \$50 to \$100.

· HB 2730 increases the mand. It removes associated driver license sanction from a one-year CDL license disqualification to a lifetime disqualification if a person uses a motor vehicle to transport, conceal or harbor an alien. If a child is engaged in conduct involving a severe form of trafficking persons, a judge at a juvenile hearing is required to order the juvenile's driver license or permit

to be suspended. HB 2730 prohibits DPS from issuing a driver license or identification card to a person who has not established a domicile in Texas. The law specifies that an applicant may receive a driver license at a post office box only if the applicant's residence address has also been provided, with some

Sales tax holiday this weekend

> AUSTIN - Shoppers will save more than ever before during the annual sales tax holiday-which now includes more than two dozen school supply items in addition to clothing and backpacks.

Families will save an estimated \$65.7 million in state and local sales taxes, Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said today.

The annual sales tax holiday is this weekend Aug. 21-23. State law designates the weekend of the third Friday in August for the sales tax holiday.

"Most families are on tight budgets and it can be a real challenge to buy kids the clothes and supplies they need for a new school year," Combs said. "To help out, the Legislature has added many school supplies to the list of tax-free items during the sales tax holiday. The tax break on school supplies alone will save families nearly \$9 million in state and local sales taxes this year."

The sales tax holiday covers school supplies, school backpacks and most children's and adults' clothing and shoes priced less than \$100.

The annual August taxfree shopping spree has saved shoppers around \$442 million since it began in 1999.



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\$14 million plane crash verdict overturned by El Paso court

The El Paso Court of Appeals has overturned a \$14 million verdict that stemmed from a Crockett County tri-

Last week, the court issued an opinion that reversed the judgment against Sheila Arthur and David Magiera and rendered judgment that plaintiff Janet Lyn Grimmett takes nothing.

This judgment comes out of a 2006 Crockett County trial where Grimmett was awarded \$14.2 million by a local jury for physical and mental injuries, as well as medical expenses, Grimmett said she suffered in a 2001 plane crash in Ozona. The 2006 trial lasted two-weeks.

Arthur and Magiera were owners of the plane that crashed in the parking lot between the new Dollar General location and the Miller Firestone building.

According to the El Paso court opinion, evidence was legally insufficient to support Grimmett's theories of recoveries.

Grimmett pursued several theories of recovery against Arthur, Magiera and pilot John Willison, which included negligence, fault among the defendants, that Arthur, Magiera and Willison were in a joint enterprise and ments state.

that the three were also in a joint venture. Arthur and Magiera filed the appeal.

In the opinion, the appeals court stated that evidence was insufficient to establish a joint enterprise and a joint venture, thereby overruling the verdict.

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The case will likely be appealed to the Texas Supreme Court, which takes a low percentage of appeals, saic John J. Reenan, attorney for Arthur and Magiera. Reenan also said that there is a 98 percent chance that the Texas Supreme Court will not consider the case.

According to court documents, the plane, a Piper PA-30 multi-engine, left Laijitas Airport and was en route to Fort Worth. While the plane approached the Ozona Municipal Airport to refuel, the left engine lost power followed by the right engine.

The plane then struck power lines and crashed.

The original petition filed in 2002 had Grimmett and her boyfriend Dennis Otts vs. Crockett County as well as Charles McCleary and Mc-Cleary Aircraft.

Otts entered into a settlement and Grimmett dismissed her claims against Crockett County and Mc-Cleary upon deciding that neither entity bore any fault in the accident, court docu-
