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# Lions roar to overtime victory

HARPER - With a new head coach and a new attitude, the Ozona Lions marched into their first game with pride and ended it with a thrilling overtime victory.

The Lions came out on top last week defeating the Harper Longhorns 20-14.

"The kids played their hearts out. They played with a lot of heart and determination. I was really happy for them," said Coach Robert Hernandez. "It was a great win and a great win for the program. However, it was just one win, we still have a lot of season left.'

Quarterback Zane Hernandez, with help from his teammates, would score the winning touchdown for the Lions on third and one in overtime, sealing the victory.


In his first game as a Lion, Zane Hernandez would carry the ball 20 times for 94 yards. He would also nail four of eight in passing for 113

The junior quarterback would also lead the Lions in a crucial comeback drive in the fourth quarter.

The drive would start with a soaring pass from Zane Hernandez to Senior Wide Receiver Kyle Sewell. Sewell was the top receiver for the Lions with three catches for 53 yards.

Zane Hernandez would then roar through the Harper defense on the next two plays ending in the end zone and putting the Lions on top 14-7.

## Businesses need policy to restrict cell use in vehicle

I've done it and you've done it millions of people do it every day.

They get in their vehicle, hit the road and start making phone calls. How does this affect your business? It only affects it if it causes an accident. Are you willing to take that risk?

Braun Consulting News said cell phone litigation is springing up around the country, making it increasingly important for employers to establish a firm policy on cell phone usage.

The National Safety Council said cell phone use behind the wheel is a growing problem. According to conservative estimates, drivers using cell phones cause more than 636,000 crashes; 330,000 injuries; 12,000 serious injuries and 2,600 deaths each year in the U.S.

The National Safety Council became the first national organization to call for a total ban on cell phones.

The NSC Motor Vehicle Safety Policy is designed to serve as a model for any company. The free kit is available as a download on the NSC Web site, nsc. org. Included in the kit is a section on distracted driving, a sample cell phone policy, PowerPoint presentation, policy pocket card, pull over and park poster, and a one-hour training program on distracted driving. There is also a statement of acknowledgement of receipt of the policy that employees must sign and return to their supervisors.

If you asked most auctioneers I think they'd agree that momentum is what makes auctions the best way to sell darn

There are a lot of things that can break the momentum and freeze an auction as if

someone had fired off a stink bomb. A longwinded color commentator, rookie ring man or mechanical difficulty can all stop the flow of commerce faster than an expired credit card. I once saw the in-gate at a bull sale get so stuck that by the time they cut it loose with a cutting torch a once successful sale had been reduced to a begging affair. Bad weather will stop any auction before it gets started, as will auctioneers who forgot the sale date, and cold-hearted bankers. You'd be surprised how bank lien notices encourage prospective buyers to keep their hands in their pockets.

"We can all admire and should respect a life lived with such consistent adherence to a deeply-held set of beliefs. Anita and I extend our sincere condolences and prayers to his family and friends."

U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, who is competing with Perry to be the Texas Republican Party's nominee for governor in 2010, said, "While Ted Kennedy and I disagreed on many issues, we were strong allies in the fight against cancer. The Kennedy-Hutchison cancer research bill is a tribute to his determination that the battle against this dreaded disease continue. Cancer may have claimed his life; it did not dampen his spirit or his will."

Tom Schieffer, Democratic

candidate for governor, said of Kennedy, "Throughout his long and illustrious career, he was the strong voice for education, fairness and compassion in our society. That voice is quiet now but his legacy will continue to


Lakey said the current pandemic has been much milder than anticipated and that this has given the state time to learn more about the disease and be prepared for additional outbreaks in the fall.

## Ag Commissioner's talk targets rural Texas

Preserving rural life and rural heritage is something Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples believes is "worth fighting for."

Staples spoke to Crockett County citizens during a packed Aug. 25 luncheon at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center.

During his talk, Staples spoke on the many programs offered within his office, including the Go Texan program which offers different divisions for rural community marketing, restaurants, hunting and fishing and international marketing.

"Too many times we don't look outside of where we are today," Staples said. "Things change, regardless if we change or not."

By 2060 Texas is expected to have 40 million people, with 70 percent of that growth in urban areas, Staples said.

Rural Texans are going to have to work "longer, harder and smarter" to keep up, he

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
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
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

## Texas A&M Climatologist: Drought hits historic levels in parts of Texas

New information shows that at least nine Texas counties are experiencing their worst drought in history, and in the United States, according to information compiled by Texas A&M University researchers.

Contributing to the problem is the heat - Texas is having one of its hottest summers ever.

John Nielsen-Gammon, professor of atmospheric sciences who also serves as the Texas State Climatologist, notes that areas in South Central Texas are experiencing their driest period ever. These include the counties of Bastrop, Caldwell and Lee in

Central Texas and Victoria, Central Texas.

"These core drought armuch of the state is facing eas are experiencing their the worst drought conditions most severe drought on record, at least since 1895 when modern record-keeping began," Nielsen-Gammon says. "About 26 percent of the state is in 'extreme' or 'exceptional' drought, according to the U.S. Drought Monitor.

"Smithville in Bastrop County has received only 35 percent of its normal rainfall for the past 15 months and Victoria only 34 percent. It's the second most intense drought ever for San Antonio and the third most intense for Corpus Christi."

He notes that the previ-Bee, San Patricio, Live Oak, ous major drought years in Jim Wells and Duval in South Central and Southern Texas were in 1917, 1918, 1925, 1953, 1955, 1956 and 1971.

"All droughts are different, and it's difficult to compare them," he notes. "The year 1956 marked the last of several years of drought, so it brought severe water shortages. The current drought is only two years old, but it has already broken many records."

While Central and South Central Texas are baking, parts of the state have enjoyed unusually high amounts of rain, he adds.

"Despite the drought, about 50 percent of Texas is not suffering from a drought at all," he explains.

## Program offers help with utility bills

The C.E.A.P. Program and the W.A.P. Program are the programs intended to make funds available to respond to the energy needs affecting low-income households.

To qualify for the programs the households must meet 125 percent of the Federal poverty income guidelines.

Priority is given to households that are elderly (60 years and above); disabled (individuals who are unable to engage in substantial employment by reason of a medically determined physical or mental condition which is determined to last); households with children under 6 years; households with the lowest income that pay the highest portion of their income for home energy and households that have been on the weatherization waiting list for two or more years.

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
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# Firefighters contain Taylor Box blaze

Local and area firefighters provided food. spent the weekend battling a massive grass fire located 20 miles south on Taylor Box Road.

The fire, which started on Saturday, has covered 2,445 acres and destroyed 10 RVs, three ATVs and one vehicle. Texas Forest Service of-

ficials said Tuesday morning that the fire is now contained. Cause of the fire is due to a possible lightning strike, according to Ozona Fire Chief

Bob Falkner. Firefighters have been able to save two ranch headquarters. No injuries or fatalities

have occurred in the fire. The fire has covered the Clayton Friend, the Moore family and the Seahorn ranches, Falkner said.

Ozona has had nine units with 14 fire fighters responding to the blaze. Area fire departments responding include Barnhart with two units and four firefighters, Big Lake with two units and four firefighters, Sonora and the Texas Forest Service with three dozers and nine firefighters.

The Texas Department of Transportation has provided fuel and water transports, as well as Crockett County and Tee Pee Trucking.

revenue anticipation notes achieved an interest rate of 0.48 percent, the lowest rate the state has ever received on its annual sale of short-term notes. "We had an impressive sale

and an excellent interest rate the best Texas has ever had," Combs said.

Texas will use the proceeds of the sale to distribute state funding to public schools early in the upcoming fiscal year and manage its cash flow between the start of the fiscal year and the arrival of tax revenues later in the year. The notes will be repaid Aug. 31, 2010.

**MORE ROAD PROJECTS** ARE POSSIBLE

The Texas Transportation Commission on Aug. 27 gave preliminary approval to the state department of transportation for more mobility projects that may be covered under the federally funded American Reinvestment and Recovery Act.

It all depends on whether

funding becomes available as a result of "under-runs" on the previously approved mobility projects. Funds would be spent on projects in the region of the state in which the under-runs were generated.

**PARKS AGENCY APPROVES GRANTS** 

More than \$9 million in competitive parks and recreation grants for city and county parks and other sites across the state was approved by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission on Aug. 27. The grants support the acquisition, development and beautification of city and county parks.

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Of the total, the Dallas, Austin, San Antonio and El Paso areas were awarded a combined \$3.8 million from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Urban Outdoor Recreation Grants program. San Antonio also was awarded \$1 million from the agency's Indoor Recreation Grants program.
