

'Smooth' school construction

Elementary building is 'definitely on schedule'

Construction on the new elementary school is going smoothly.

During the Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees Sept. 16 regular meeting, architect Douglas Koehne said "everything seems to be moving incredibly smooth out on the site."

Koehne said they have been meeting with Superintendent Chris duBois twice a month on the site to go over various construction and architecture issues.

Ed Stewart, with Waldrop Construction, said the school construction is "definitely on schedule."

The gymnasium is currently going up and the pouring of the second floor is expected to start this week and other smaller items, as well as steel erection continuing

to go up, Ed said. The board did discuss some of the fencing for the new school. Kohene said it is best to wait until the building is closer to being finished to better get a visual idea of

where to place the fencing. "In the morning, I will have parents ask me about the new school. They are very curious," said Elementary Principal Amanda Jackson.

Lions give it all against Brady

The scoreboard may have said Brady 36, Ozona 27, but anyone who attended the game knew the Lions were still winners.

Ozona accomplished two goals Friday night in their battle with the Bulldogs: they never quit and they scored the most points on Brady so far this season.

Led by Freshman Quarterback Zeth Hernandez, the Lions began aiming for a comeback late in the fourth quarter.

On the first scoring drive, Zeth Hernandez would connect with Senior Wide Receiver Kyle Sewell for a four-yard touchdown pass. Junior Abey Lara would get the two-point conversion.

On the Bulldogs' next possession, Bailey Badillo would recover a Brady fumble and the Lions would drive down field.

Under pressure, Zeth Hernandez would find an open Sewell in the end zone for the 14-yard touchdown.

Wellness Center will benefit West Texas Rehab and community

I have been asked if the proposed wellness center for Ozona would be duplicating -or competing with-services already available to the general public at West Texas Rehabilitation Center. In a word: No.

While it is true that we have many pieces of equipment typically found in wellness centers, our sole focus by necessity of mission, space, and staffing is patient care-not general public accommodation. We do offer a gym maintenance program at a mini-Ozona, Texas | mal cost to individuals who, hav-

ing completed their physicianprescribed therapeutic program at WTRC, would benefit from continued participation in an exercise program developed especially for them. But, again, this is patient-specific, not a service to the general public.

The concept of a community wellness center typically allows for such things as individual and/or group exercise programs. aerobics, muscle toning-all of which fill a particular niche toward achieving fitness, which is always beneficial and is currently unavailable in Ozona.

One other point: An indoor

swimming pool has been mentioned for possible inclusion in the proposed center. If that comes about, West Texas Rehabilitation Center would certainly consider it a resource to consider if our patient profile in the future indicated a need to implement an aquatics therapy program.

I hope this information adds clarity to current community discussions, and I thank all who have asked about the Rehab Center's area of focus.

He was a unique and special individual who touched the very essence of life, forever leaving a strong positive mark imprinted deep in your heart and soul.

Mr. Smith was a driven leader; a sincere and dedicated

He was an immaculate dresser. Always the suit and forever the tie. Never a wavy blond hair out of place. He could brighten the band hall with his smile or send a message with his frown.

The football team and the cheerleading squad consumed most of the high school population; leaving only a few students to form the band.

They were only a few but none the less, a very talented few. They were the pride of the school -- the Band.

The Lion would not roar if the Band did not march. It was not surprising that the Band doubled in size from one day to the next.

Mr. Smith had recruited and signed many of the students who had transferred from the other school across town. I don't think any of us had ever played anything but the radio, much less a musical instrument. It was a little scary but the thought of the free lunch on the out of town trips won us over.

White uniforms with purple and gold trim were issued. Horns were assigned. A french horn for Manual, Tomas and Carlos.

A bass horn for Chuy. A baritone for Felipe. In time, we learned to play the assigned instrument. We always kept them clean and polished, always ready for the march. The marching formations were precise, never a shoe out of line.

The music was good because many talented people filled the ranks. Some hit and misses certainly but only on the stumbles.

Our mornings in the band hall. We had fifteen minutes of warm-up music everyday. Stuff that Enya (yes, that Enya) is made off today. Hymns for sure and along the way, beautiful pieces like Adagio for

With a guiding hand, Mr. Smith inspired our souls; calmed our spirits; touched our young hearts.

Play the music. Shut your eyes. Listen

You can see Mr. Smith leading the Band. You can see the youth representing a small community. All minds deeply in thought. Each music note connected to the next music

The soft and sweet breath of life flowing into each instru-

Throughout the hall, the spirit of youth carried in the form of music on the wings of the Music Angels. The mind, heart, and soul are filled with the sweetness and sounds of precious life.

All from a horn or a string. The cool morning breeze rushes in. The sunshine punches brightly through the small windows of the band hall front doors, spotlighting the young Music Angels dancing to each piece of music being played.

Unemployment rate increases despite state's strong economic foundation

AUSTIN - Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate inched one tenth of a point higher to 8.0 percent in August, which translates to 62,200 more people out of

work. Chairman Tom Pauken of the **Texas Workforce Commission** on Sept. 18 said, "Despite our strong Texas economic foundation, the national recession continues to have an adverse

impact on our state." The national rate of unemployment stood at 9.7 percent for the month of August, according to U.S. Department of Labor statistics released Sept. 4.

Meanwhile, in the context of high unemployment nationwide as compared with conditions in Texas, Gov. Rick Perry made this comment while addressing a business group in Houston on Sept. 17:

"Why is Texas kind of recession-proof, if you will? As a matter of fact ... someone had put a report out that the first state that's coming out of the recession is going to be the state of Texas ... I said, 'We're in one?'

COURT HEARS OPEN RECORDS CASE

The Texas Supreme Court on Sept. 17 heard arguments in a case pitting The Dallas Morning News and the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts.

The case stems from the newspaper's public information request for an updated state payroll database in November 2005.

In December 2005, then-Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn released the requested information, except for state employees' birth dates, arguing that releasing birth dates would expose them to identity theft. The newspaper said birth

dates make it possible to distinguish workers who have the same name, and there is no specific statutory exception that closes off the information. The Texas Attorney General's Office sided with the newspaper. A ruling is pending.

MORE STIMULUS FUNDING COMES IN Texas Comptroller Susan

Combs announced Sept. 18 that local and state governmental bodies are welcome to apply for about \$17 million in federal stimulus funds for transportation efficiency projects.

Grants are administered through the comptroller's State **Energy Conservation Office.** Of the \$17 million, \$11 mil-

lion can be used to help purchase alternative fuel vehicles, pay for alternative fuel conversions and buy equipment for alternative fuel stations. Alternative fuels include natural gas, propane, hydrogen, ethanol, electricity and bio-diesel. And \$6 million is available for

synchronizing traffic lights on major routes to smooth traffic flow and for replacing LED (light-emitting diode) bulbs in traffic signals. REDISTRICTING
