The Lions keep up with the Golden Cranes in first half, with Abey Lara getting the ball rolling for the Lions with a 72-yard interception return for the touchdown and the two-point conversion to put Ozona up 8-7 in the second quarter.


However, Crane would get a field goal and a touchdown before the end of the first half to put the Golden Cranes

Board approves new Read Right program

A new reading program has been implemented that promises to not only help students read better, but also perform better on the TAKS test.

At the Oct. 21 meeting of the Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees, the board approved a contract with Read Right Systems Inc. to use their program in the elementary and middle schools.

The program has started being implemented in grades third through eighth. The \$142,300 is being paid for through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act grants, said Superintendent Chris duBois.

"This is not part of the general fund or tax collection. In the course of a year, we will put this program in and train our teachers," duBois said. "This isn't something I take lightly. We're committed. This is a big ticket item, but it's going to have some big pay out with our kids."

duBois said he decided to implement the program after meeting with campus administrators and counselors about what was needed to im-

prove the district's math and science TAKS scores.

Out of that meeting, the group decided that students need to improve their reading skills in order to better understand the math and science tests, especially the science vocabulary.

duBois said he spoke to other districts that use the program and heard nothing but success stories.

"This is intensive. We're going to really go after it hard. I've never used Read Right anywhere else. I've always wanted to use and see its potential," duBois said. "We're not looking to replace any programs. We are looking to do additional support and follow through with this to high school. Reading is the barrier."

According to the Read Right website, Read Right was developed by Dr. Dee Tadlock after her son, who was in first grade, began having trouble reading in school. Along with school teachers, Tadlock, who has a Ph.D. in reading, began working hard to try and solve her son's problem.

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
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Retirees and vets allowed to salute flag

Law enforcement agencies arrest 81 suspects in drug cartel sweep

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — More than 200 Texas Department of Public Safety agents, troopers, pilots and Texas Rangers took part in an Oct. 21 sweep targeting the La Familia Michoacana criminal cartel resulting in 81 arrests in the Dallas-Fort Worth, Houston and Austin areas.

The law enforcement work was done in coordination with the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, the Federal Bureau of Investigation and U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

Reported as seized in the sweep: 220 pounds of methamphetamine, 23.1 pounds of cocaine, 1 gallon of liquid methamphetamine, \$960,000 in cash, 54 guns, 53 vehicles, 1 jet ski, 1 recreational vehicle and two all terrain vehicles, the DPS reported.

Earlier this year, Mexican authorities arrested 27 public officials in the state of Michoacan with suspected ties to La Familia, the DPS reported.

RRC CREATES **NEW DIVISION**

The Texas Railroad Commission, the state agency that regulates the energy industry, last

week approved the creation of a new Alternative Energy Division. Commissioner Elizabeth Ames Jones provided the impetus.

Jones said the new division will focus on existing alternative energy currently under the commission's jurisdiction and will provide a platform for development of alternative energy forms such as compressed and liquefied natural gas.

SCRATCH-OFF TO BENEFIT VETS FUND

A new \$2 lottery ticket, The Veterans Cash Scratch-Off, will go on sale Nov. 9.

Proceeds from ticket sales, expected to about \$8 million in its first year, will benefit the state's Permanent Fund for Veterans' Assistance.

The lottery ticket will provide "a secure revenue stream to fund critical services and programs for veterans and their families. Our veterans have already paid the price, now it is time for Texas to honor their sacrifice," said State Sen. Leticia Van de Putte, D-San Antonio.

SUNSET REVIEW LIST IS RELEASED

State Sen. Glenn Hegar, R-Katy, the newly appointed chair of the Sunset Advisory Commission, last week released the names of 28 state agencies to be reviewed in 2010-2011.

A few of the agencies on the list are: the Texas Youth Commission, the Texas Department of Transportation, the Electric Reliability Council of Texas, the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs, the Texas Department of Information Resources and the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

The 12-member commission reviews policies and programs of more than 150 state agencies. **COMMUNITY COLLEGE**

ENROLLMENT IS UP

Enrollment increased by 65,000 at Texas community colleges this fall - an 11 percent increase - the Texas Association of Community Colleges reported last week.

Dr. Richard Rhodes, TACC chair and president of El Paso Community College, and Dr. Rey Garcia, TACC president and CEO, said in a letter to the governor, lieutenant governor and House speaker that community colleges in Texas have grown by more than 40 percent since 2000, like "adding the equivalent of seven Texas Tech universities or four Universities of Texas at Austin to the state's higher education system capacity." 



The methodology of the program she came up with centers around three key components which include excellent reading, coached reading and independent reading.

Read Right Systems Inc. was organized in 1991 after Read Right was successfully implemented at the Simpson Timber Company sawmill and plywood complex in Shelton, Wash.

According to the website, currently 91 elementary schools, middle schools and high schools have Read Right programs, and three correctional institutions have implemented Read Right for juvenile offenders. Eightyseven Read Right Learning Centers have been set up at industrial locations in the US, Canada, and China. Read Right is also tutoring individuals across the United States and Canada by

According to the programs proposal, the system not only helps to improve reading ability, but also critical thinking skills, helps to eliminate reading problems and motivates self-esteem.

Read Right Consultant Maretha Baltimore said she has watched students use the program, and was so convenience that she purchased it for her grandson.

"This is not an intervention. Once a student graduates and is deemed an excellent reader, they stay an excellent reader," Baltimore said.

Baltimore is spending seven weeks throughout the school year in Ozona Elementary and Middle Schools training teachers on how to use the program with the students.

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Once teachers are certified in their training, they can then train other teachers as well.

duBois said he fully expects to implement the program in the high school next year. Once the program gets going, there is also potential for adult education opportunities.

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



Notice is hereby given that on October 5, 2009 AEP Texas Central Company (TCC), formerly known as Central Power and Light Company, AEP Texas North Company (TNC), formerly known as West Texas Utilities Company, and Electric Transmission Texas, LLC (ETT) filed a joint application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission or PUC). The docket number and style of this application is PUC Docket No. 37522, Joint Application of AEP Texas Central Company, AEP Texas North Company, and Electric Transmission Texas, LLC to Transfer Certificate Rights and for Approval of Transfer of Facilities in Callahan, Childress, Coke, Cottle, Crockett, Eastland, Edwards, Frio, Hidalgo, Medina, Menard, Motley, Nolan, Nueces, Pecos, Reagan, Runnels, San Patricio, Taylor, Terrell, Tom Green, Upton, Val Verde, Victoria, Webb, Wilbarger, and Zavala Counties, Texas. TCC, TNC, and ETT are engaged in the transmission of electricity under certificates of convenience and necessity (CCN).

In their application, TCC, TNC, and ETT request that the Commission approve their proposal in which TCC and TNC will transfer to ETT TCC's and TNC's existing CCN rights concerning the transmission facilities described below; and find that the transfer of the facilities from TCC and TNC to ETT is consistent with the public interest. No new facilities are being sought in this filing; nor are the boundaries of TCC's or TNC's service area affected by this filing. Descriptions of the TCC transmission facilities that are the subject of this request are as follows:

CREZ Default 69 kV Line and Substation Facilities:

Hamilton Road to Fort Lancaster - TCC proposes to transfer its portion of the existing 114 mile Hamilton Road to Fort Lancaster 69 kV line to ETT. TCC will transfer certain 69 kV and 138 kV transmission facilities at Hamilton Road substation, except for the 138 / 69 kV autotransformer and associated facilities. TCC will transfer all transmission facilities at Comstock substation to ETT. TCC will transfer to ETT real property interests for TCC's portion of the Fort Lancaster to Hamilton Road line. TNC also owns facilities related to this project that will be transferred to ETT, as discussed below. From Fort Lancaster substation in southeast Pecos County in the proximity of the I-10 and State Highway 349 interchange the TNC portion of the line runs southeasterly ultimately entering Val Verde County where it crosses County Road 1024 (approximately the beginning of the TCC-owned portion) and State Highway 163 in the vicinity of Comstock substation. From Comstock the line continues southeasterly crossing the Amistad National Recreation Area to Rough Canyon substation where the line turns southerly generally along U.S. Highway 277 / 377 to Hamilton Road station near the intersection of U.S. Highway 277 / 377 and U.S.

Port Aransas Transmission Substation Facilities: TCC proposes to transfer transmission facilities in the Port Aransas substation to ETT. The Port Aransas transmission substation is located on North Padre Island in Nueces County. The Port Aransas substation property will remain under the ownership of TCC.

Rocksprings Substation: TCC proposes to transfer transmission facilities in the Rocksprings substation to ETT and the segment of line including any related real property interests between the Rocksprings and PEC Rocksprings substations. The Rocksprings substation property located at the junction of U.S. Highway 377 and State Road 55 in Edwards County will remain with TCC.

Victoria 69 kV Substation Facilities: TCC proposes to transfer to ETT the transmission facilities in the Magruder substation and the 138/69 kV autotransformer that is to be installed at the Magruder substation, which was removed from service at the Highway 9 substation. The Magruder substation facilities are located immediately east of U.S. Highway 77 north of the City of Victoria in Victoria County. Magruder substation will remain the property of TCC.

Azteca Substation Facilities: TCC proposes to transfer the 138 kV facilities in the Azteca substation to ETT. The Azteca substation site is located southeast of the intersection of Caliche and Russell Roads in the proximity of the City of Edinburg in Hidalgo County.

Papalote Creek Substation Facilities: TCC proposes to transfer to ETT the initial tapped interconnection for the Papalote Creek 180 MW wind farm. The TCC facilities at the Papalote Creek generator-owned substation such as the RTU are also proposed to be transferred to ETT. The Papalote Creek Substation is located near the Papalote Creek 180 MW wind farm in San Patricio County.

West Batesville Substation Facilities: TCC proposes to transfer to ETT the transmission facilities in the West Batesville substation. The West Batesville substation is located on the north side of U.S. Highway 57 between the cities of La Pryor and Batesville in Zavala County. The West Batesville substation property will be transferred to ETT.

Lytle 138/69 kV Substation and Lines: TCC proposes to transfer the transmission facilities in the Lytle and Devine substations, the Big Foot to Devine to Lytle and the Devine to STEC Devine 69 kV transmission lines, and associated real property interests to ETT. The Big Foot to Devine to Lytle 69 kV line is 13.1 miles in length and Devine to STEC Devine 69 kV line is approximately 2.1 miles in length. The Big Foot to Devine to Lytle line travels northeasterly from Big Foot substation in Frio County and crosses I-35 near the State Highway 132 interchange. The line continues northeasterly to Devine substation situated between I-35 and State Highway 132. From Devine substation, the line continues northeasterly on the west side of I-35 and in the vicinity of Natalia turns directly north to Lytle substation. The Devine to STEC Devine 69 kV line runs east-west from the Big Foot to Lytle line beginning just south of Devine substation and crosses State Highway 132.

<u>Laredo Topaz Generation Interconnection:</u> TCC proposes to transfer to ETT three new 138 kV terminals added at the Laredo VFT substation. The Laredo VFT substation is located in the vicinity of I-35 and Del Mar Blvd. in the City of Laredo in Webb County.

Descriptions of the TNC transmission facilities that are the subject of this request are as follows:

CREZ Default 69 kV Lines and Substation Facilities:

Leon to Putnam - TNC proposes to transfer the existing 17 mile 69 kV Leon to Putnam line (up to the point of interconnection with Oncor) to ETT. Transmission facilities at the Cisco substation will be transferred to ETT. TNC will transfer to ETT real property interests for the Leon to Putnam line. The Leon to Putnam line follows I-20 on the north side of the highway in Callahan and Eastland Counties.

Hamilton Road to Fort Lancaster - TNC also proposes to transfer its portion of the existing 114 mile Hamilton Road to Fort Lancaster line to ETT. TNC will transfer all transmission facilities at the Illinois substation to ETT. TNC will transfer to ETT real property interests for TNC's portion of the Fort Lancaster to Hamilton Road line. TCC also owns facilities related to this project that will be transferred to ETT, as discussed above. From Fort Lancaster substation in southeast Pecos County in the proximity of the I-10 and State Highway 349 interchange the TNC portion of the line runs southeasterly through Terrell and Crockett Counties, crosses the Howard Draw River, and enters Val Verde County where it crosses County Road 1024 (the approximate end of the TNC-owned portion). The TCC portion of the line continues southeasterly to Hamilton Road substation.

Oklaunion Substation - TNC proposes to transfer its existing 138 kV and 345 kV transmission assets operated within ERCOT in the Oklaunion substation to ETT. Excluded from the transfer will be the HVDC tie and certain 138 kV equipment used to provide backup power to the HVDC tie. The Oklaunion substation is located in Wilbarger County east of the City of Vernon. The ownership of the substation property will remain with TNC.

<u>Paducah Clare Street Substation Facilities:</u> TNC proposes to transfer the transmission assets, except for the 138 / 69 kV autotransformer and associated facilities, in the Paducah Clare Street substation to ETT. The substation property will be transferred to ETT. The Paducah Clare Street substation is on the south side of Paducah in Cottle County.

Abilene – San Angelo Area Transmission Facilities: TNC proposes to transfer to ETT the property and transmission facilities for the Steamboat substation. The Steamboat substation site is just south of the City of Bradshaw in Taylor County.

Also, TNC proposes to transfer the existing 48 mile Ballinger to South Abilene 69 kV line to ETT, including the Hatchell switches. TNC will transfer real property interests to ETT. The 69 kV Ballinger to South Abilene line in Runnels and Taylor Counties generally follows U.S. Highway 83 and over the 48 miles crosses several times to the opposite side of the highway.

Further, TNC proposes to transfer to ETT the property and transmission facilities for the Yellow Jacket substation. The Yellow Jacket substation is in the proximity of the City of Menard in Menard County.

Childress 69 kV Transmission Line: TNC proposes to transfer to ETT a new 69 kV line being built consistent with CCNs in Docket Nos. 36463 and 37248 from the West Childress substation to the Childress 20th Street substation. The Childress 69 kV line is located in the City of Childress County.

Rio Pecos / Big Lake Substation Facilities: TNC proposes to transfer to ETT property interests and facilities under construction for the installation of a static var compensator (SVC) and associated 69 kV facility upgrades at the Rio Pecos substation in the McCamey area and installation of a phase shifting transformer (PST) and associated 138 kV facility upgrades at Big Lake substation west of San Angelo. The Rio Pecos substation is in Upton County. Big Lake substation is located in Reagan County.

Langford Power Generation Interconnection: TNC proposes to assign to ETT facilities for interconnection of the Langford Power, LLC, wind farm. Access rights to the land and facilities are governed by the interconnection agreement being transferred to ETT. The TNC facilities at the Langford Power generator-owned substation such as the RTU are also proposed to be transferred to ETT. The facilities are located along and east of U.S. Highway 277 approximately 20 miles south of San Angelo in Tom Green County.


Vernon Area Substation and Line Facilities: TNC proposes to transfer to ETT approximately 5.5 miles of 138 kV line from Vernon Main Street to Vernon Southwest and transmission facilities at the Vernon West Sand Road substation. Applicable real property interests will be transferred from TNC to ETT. The facilities are located in Wilbarger County and the line runs generally north – south through the City of Vernon between Vernon Main Street and Vernon Southwest substations.

Also, TNC proposes to transfer approximately one mile, from Vernon Main Street substation to structure 24/4, of the existing 138 kV Lake Pauline to Vernon Main Street line to ETT. Real property interests will be transferred from TNC to ETT. The one mile segment of the existing 138 kV Lake Pauline to Vernon Main Street line in Wilbarger County lies to the north of U.S. Highway 287 and generally follows the highway from the northwest into the Vernon Main Street substation on the north side of Vernon.

Matador to Paducah 69 kV Lines and Associated Transmission Facilities: TNC proposes to transfer the Matador to Paducah Clare Street 69 kV transmission line, the Paducah Gate City Electric Co-op tap, and the Paducah Clare Street line to ETT. The Matador to Paducah Clare Street line consists of approximately 30.5 miles of 69 kV single conductor. The Paducah Gate City Electric Co-op tap is approximately 1.5 miles in length. Real property interests will be transferred to ETT. The subject facilities are located in Motley and Cottle Counties. Matador substation is situated in Matador immediately southwest of the intersection of State Highway 70 and U.S. Highway 62 / 70. The Matador to Paducah Clare Street line generally follows U.S. Highway 62 / 70 and crosses the highway east of Matador at Bullard Creek. Two additional U.S. Highway 62 / 70 crossings occur within Motley County. The line continues north of the highway crossing the Tongue River and into Cottle County. The line makes a final crossing to the south of U.S. Highway 62 / 70 at County Road 211. At County Road 207 the Paducah Gate City Electric Co-op tap follows the county road to the south approximately 1.5 miles crossing Salt Creek to the Gate City Electric Co-op substation. The Matador to Paducah Clare Street line is approximately 0.7 mile in length connecting the Paducah Clare Street substation and the Paducah City substation to the north.

Bluff Creek to Oak Creek 138 kV Line: TNC proposes to transfer to ETT the Bluff Creek to Oak Creek 138 kV line. The line is comprised of the 14.3 mile Bluff Creek to Oak Creek 138 kV line and the 6.8 mile Abilene NW to Oak Creek 138 kV line. In addition, the transfer includes a 3,000 foot cut over from Oak Creek to the Nicole substation. Real property interests will be transferred to ETT. From Bluff Creek substation southwest of Abilene in Taylor County, the 21 mile 138 kV line generally follows U.S. Highway 277 to the southwest into Nolan, Runnels, and Coke Counties. The line crosses U.S. Highway 277 in Taylor County at approximately the County Road 1086 intersection. The line crosses State Highway 153 in Nolan County, and crosses State Highway 70 in Coke County just before entering Oak Creek substation.

For all of the TCC and TNC facilities described above, the transfer will include as applicable certain telecommunications facilities related to the transferred transmission assets.





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
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Early voting in constitutional amendment runs through Friday, Election Day Tuesday

Early voting for the 2009 dated equalizations." Texas Constitutional Amendment Election continues through Friday at the courthouse annex.

Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 3, at designated precinct sites. Below is are explanatory statements for each proposition provided by the Texas Secretary

of State's Office. PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 132)

HJR 132 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow a municipality or a county to issue bonds and notes to finance the purchase of buffer areas or open spaces adjacent to military installations. The buffer areas would be used to prevent encroachment or to construct roadways utilities, or other infrastructure to protect or promote the mission of the military installation. The municipality or county may pledge increases in ad valorem tax revenues for repayment of the bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the financing, including through tax increment financing, of the acquisition by municipalities and counties of buffer areas or open spaces adjacent to a military installation for the prevention of encroachment or for the construction of roadways, utilities, or other infrastructure to protect or promote the mission of the military installation.

PROPOSITION 2 (HJR 36 - #1) HJR 36 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide for the taxation of a residence homestead solely on the basis of the property's value as a residence homestead, regardless of whether the property may have a higher value if it were used for other purposes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the ad valorem taxation of a residence homestead solely on the basis of the property's value as a residence homestead.

PROPOSITION 3 (HJR 36 - #3) HJR 36 would amend the constitution to require the legislature to provide for the administration and enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for ad valorem tax purposes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as "The constitutional follows: amendment providing for uniform standards and procedures for the appraisal of property for ad valorem tax purposes

PROPOSITION 4 (HJR 14 - #2) HJR 14 would amend the constitution to establish the national research university fund to provide a source of funding that will enable emerging research universities in this state to develop into major research universities. The amendment would require the legislature to dedicate state revenue to the fund and to transfer the balance of the existing higher education fund to the national research university fund. This amendment would further require the legislature to establish the criteria by which a state university may become eligible to receive and use distributions from the fund.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing the national research university fund to enable emerging research universities in this state to achieve national prominence as major research universities and transferring the balance of the higher education fund to the national research university fund. PROPOSITION 5 (HJR 36 - #2)

HJR 36 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow for a single appraisal review board for two or more adjoining appraisal entities that elect to provide for consolidated reviews of tax appraisals.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to authorize a single board of equalization for two or more adjoining appraisal entities that elect to provide for consoliPROPOSITION 6 (HJR 116)

HJR 116 would amend the constitution to authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue general obligation bonds, subject to certain constitutional limits, for the purpose of selling land and providing home or land mortgage loans to veterans of the state.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Veterans 'Land Board to issue general obligation bonds in amounts equal to or less than amounts previously authorized."

PROPOSITION 7 (HJR 127) HIR 127 would amend the constitution to allow an officer or enlisted member of the Texas State. Guard or other state militia or military force to hold other civil offices.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow an officer or enlisted member of the Texas State Guard or other state militia or military force to hold other civil offices."

PROPOSITION 8 (HJR 7) HJR 7 would amend the constitution to authorize the state to contribute money, property, and other resources for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of veterans' hospitals in this state.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional follows: amendment authorizing the state to contribute money, property, and other resources for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of veterans hospitals in this state.

PROPOSITION 9 (HJR 102) HJR 102 would define what is a state-owned public beach, The public, individually and collectively, would have an unrestricted right to use and a right of ingress to and egress from a public beach. The amendment would authorize the legislature to enact, laws to protect these rights.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to protect the right of the public, individually and collectively, to access and use the public beaches bordering the seaward shore of the Gulf of Mexico.'

PROPOSITION 10 (HJR 85) 12 HJR 85 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide that members of the governing board of an emergency services district may serve terms not to exceed four years.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as "The constitutional follows: amendment to provide that elected members of the governing boards of emergency services. districts may serve terms not to exceed four years.'

PROPOSITION 11 (HJR 14 - #1) HIR 14 would amend the constitution to provide that the taking of private property for public use ("eminent domain"); is authorized only if it is for the ownership, use, and enjoyment of the property by the State, its political subdivisions, the public at large, or by entities granted the power of eminent domain, or for the removal of urban blight. The amendment would prohibit the taking of private property for transfer to a private entity for the purpose of economic development or to increase tax revenues. The amendment would also limit the legislature's authority to grant the power of eminent domain in the future unless it is approved by a two-thirds vote of all the members elected to each house.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to prohibit the taking, damaging, or destroying of private property for public use unless the action is for the ownership, use, and enjoyment of the property by the State, a political subdivision of the State, the public at large, or entities granted the power of eminent domain under law or for the elimination of urban blight on a particular parcel of property, but not for certain economic development or enhancement of tax revenue purposes, and to limit the legislature 's authority to grant the power of eminent domain to an entity."

END OF TOLL FINE PROGRAM IN SIGHT Motorists who have not paid

delinquent tolls may still take advantage of the Texas Department of Transportation's offer to reduce violation fees.

They have until Nov. 30 to pay up. In return for payment of all outstanding tolls, TxDOT says it will waive 90 percent of the administrative and collection fees accrued. To receive the fee reduction, customers must also

open a TxTag account and keep it in good standing.

GIANT SCHOOL AID FUND **RECOVERS** The Permanent School Fund

overseen by the State Board of Education apparently is mirroring the recovery generally seen in the financial markets. The fund was down to about

\$16 billion last spring, but it is now around \$22 billion, the Texas Education Agency announced Oct. 23.

The fund, established in 1854, helps pay for textbooks and other educational expenses.

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
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
