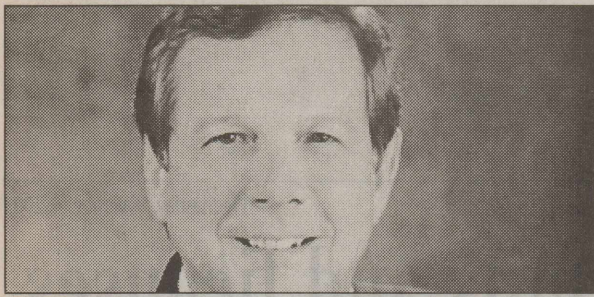

Lions cruise past Owls for district win

BIG LAKE - The Ozona Lions ran all over the Reagan County Owls for their first district victory Friday night.

The Lions dominated the field and won 44-27.

While Reagan County would get on the board first, the Lions were quick to answer with three touchdowns in the first quarter.

The first one came on a 25-yard run by Abye Lara.

Quickly after that, Zeth Hernandez would catch a 35-yard pass from Zane Hernandez for the Lions second touchdown. Nathan De Hoyos would nail the extra-point kick.

At the end of the first quarter, Kyle Sewell would grab a 40-yard pass from Zane Hernandez for the third touchdown. De Hoyos would nail the extra-point kick again to make it 21-7 at the end of the first quarter.

The Owls would score twice in the second quarter, but the Lions would not be stopped.

After a long-drive down the field, Zane Hernandez would squeeze across the goal line for the touchdown. De Hoyos's kick would be good again.

With nine seconds left in the first half, Lara would catch a 55-yard pass from Zane Hernandez for the score.

- Honorable Mention

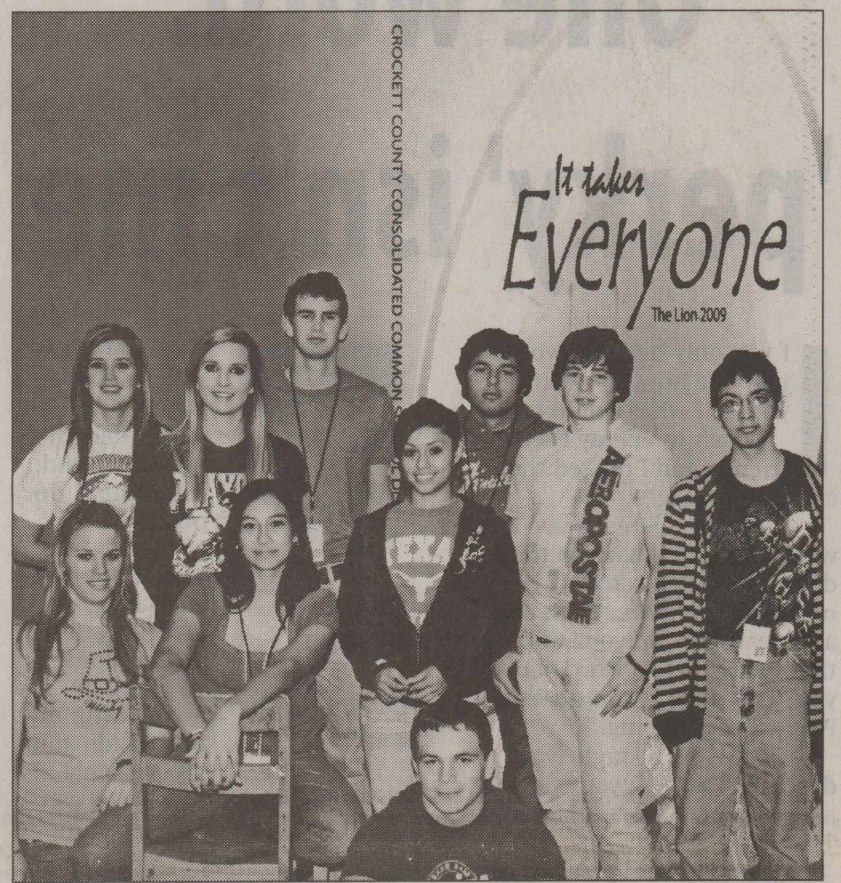

"I know the quality of the publications our book is held against - and it is very exciting that our students and Mrs. Thompson have been recog-

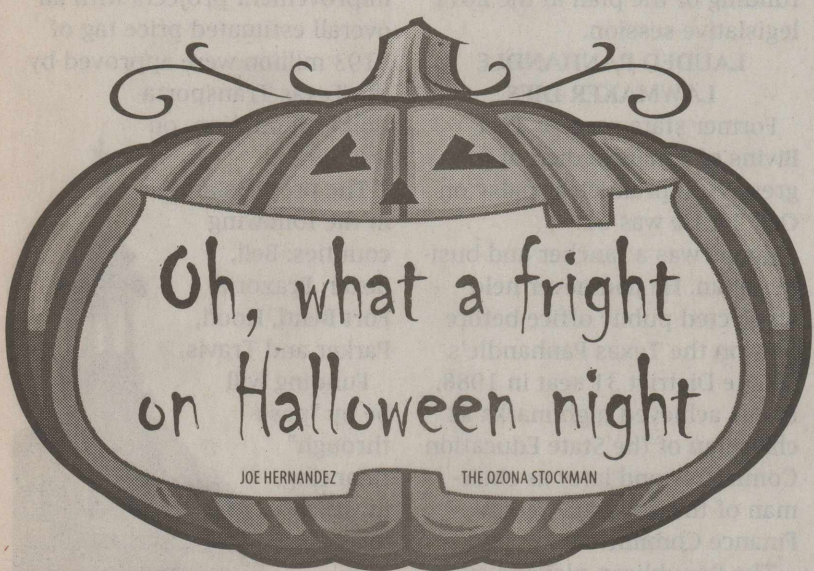

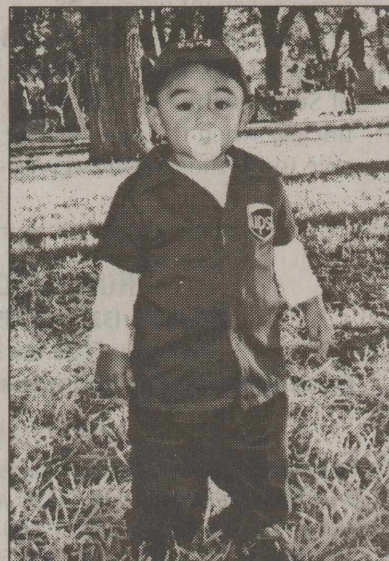

Starting your own business: permits and licenses

This is the fourth part to the series guiding you through the general process of starting your own business. In the first part we discussed the idea formation process, how to determine your strengths and analyze the holes within your plan.

This article will cover the agencies to contact to obtain your permits and licenses.

One of the most asked questions at the Small Business Development Center is, "Where do I go to get a license or a permit?" The answer to this question is, "It depends on what you are doing." One of the most common permits needed is the sales

tax permit, and this permit can be obtained at the Comptroller of Public Accounts office. The permit will allow you to collect sales taxes on behalf of the State of Texas, which you then have to send in on a periodic basis. The process is relatively quick and inexpensive. Another important agency to

visit is the County Clerk's Office. In order to open a commercial checking or savings account, the bank may require a "Doing Business As" form (DBA) or Assumed Name form. This form can be filled out at the County Clerk's Office and basically lets the county know that you will be operating under a different name.

If you are trying to start a restaurant, a very important agency to contact is the Department of Health. This department oversees all the health code requirements that a building should have prior to handling food service. Meanwhile, a day care provider will need to visit with the

Texas Department of Human Services, and a person engaging in alcohol or firearms sales will have to visit the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission.

Besides the above listed agencies, you may have a question regarding whether a particular building is zoned for commercial use. The agency to contact in this instance is the City's Planning and Development Department in City Hall. Human resource questions on the other hand can be direct either to the Texas Workforce or the Internal Revenue Service, dependant

Prisons not included in top-priority bracket for H1N1 vaccinations

AUSTIN — According to the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, at the top of the list to receive H1N1 "swine flu" vaccinations are:

- Pregnant women;
- Those who care for infants under 6 months of age;
- Health care and EMS workers;
- Those ranging from 6 months through 24 years of age; and
- 25- to 64-year-olds with underlying medical conditions.

Texas has not allocated any H1N1 vaccine to prisons, but a limited supply will be going to the prison system to vaccinate those most at risk.

Furthermore, prisoners are not a priority group to receive the vaccine and will not be vaccinated ahead of the general public, the state Department of Health Services announced in an Oct. 28 news release.

Health care providers who serve pregnant women in prisons have requested vaccine from the Texas Department of State Health Services. It is unclear when the state will be able to fill those orders given

the limited national supply of the vaccine.

In other news, Texas had expected to receive 3.4 million doses of the vaccine by mid-October, but the state has been allocated less than 1.7 million doses so far.

TUITION PROGRAM CHANGE POSSIBLE

On Nov. 5, the Texas Prepaid Higher Education Tuition Board will consider a recommendation by Texas Comptroller Susan Combs that it adopt the former refund rule for the Texas Guaranteed Tuition Plan.

If the board adopts Combs' recommendation, families will no longer need to decide by Nov. 30 whether to cancel their contract in order to receive tuition-based earnings.

Combs also plans to recommend that families who cancelled contracts during an ongoing opt-out period be allowed to resume their contracts if they choose to do so.

However, Combs said, the plan faces a projected funding

shortfall in the neighborhood of \$2 billion that may appear as early as 2015. She said she wants lawmakers to address funding of the plan in the 2011 legislative session.

LAUDED PANHANDLE LAWMAKER DIES

Former state senator Teel Bivins of Amarillo died of progressive supranuclear palsy on Oct. 26. He was 61.

Bivins was a rancher and businessman. He had never held an elected public office before he won the Texas Panhandle's Senate District 31 seat in 1988. Bivins achieved high marks as chairman of the State Education Committee and later as chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee.

The Republican played key roles in the passage of tort reform and school finance legislation. He held the Senate seat until 2004 and resigned when then-President George W. Bush appointed him U.S. ambassador to Sweden. Bivins served in that capacity until 2006 and

returned to Amarillo.

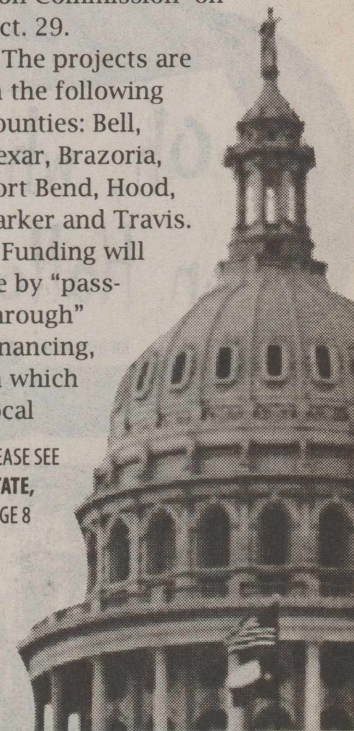
PROJECTS MUST BE PAID FOR UP-FRONT

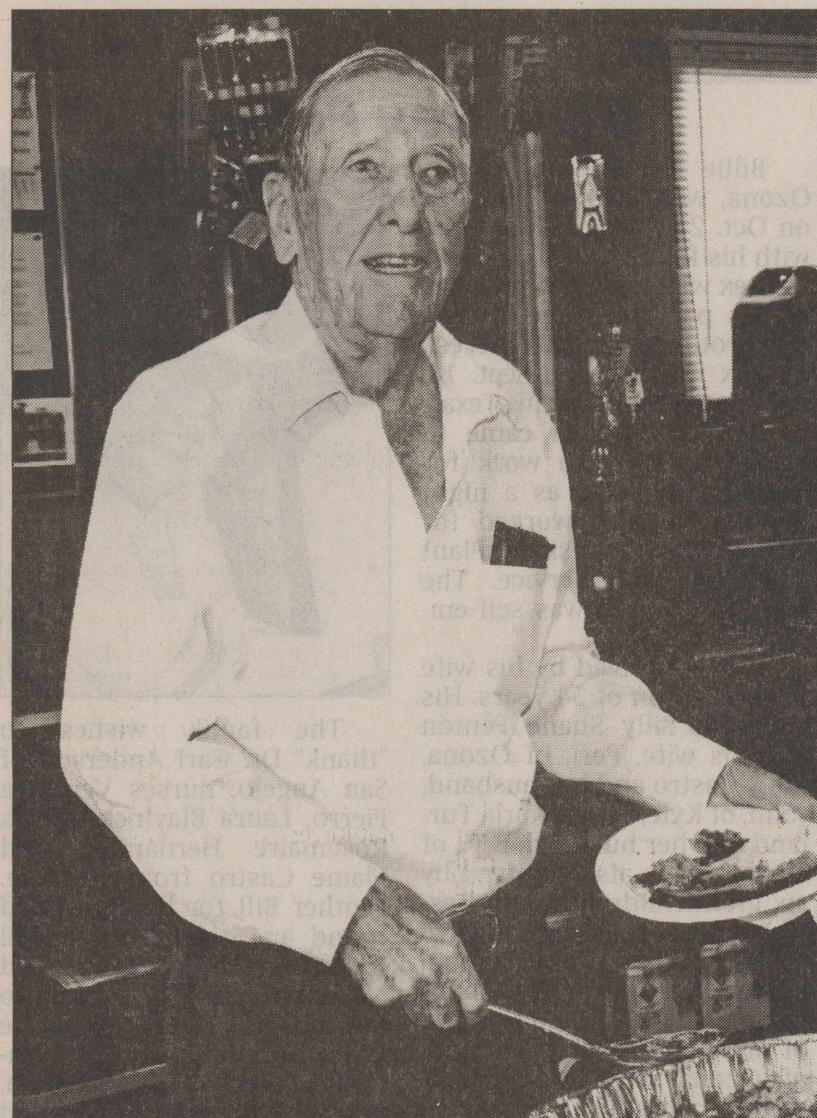

The 30-hour training will occur Monday-Thursday evenings from 5-9 p.m. Nov. 9-16 at 317 Koberlin in San Angelo.

Anyone unable to attend the group training, an independent, self-paced study is also available. Court Appointed Special Ad-

vocates work to ensure that children removed from abusive homes do not suffer further abuse due to the overburdened court system. There is great concern about the availability of CASA volunteers for court caseloads in the Concho Valley, specifically in Concho and Crockett counties. We currently have around 100 children in need of a CASA.

Anyone interested in becoming a CASA, must be at least 21 years of age, complete a screening interview and criminal background check and be willing to make a 12-month commitment. The average CASA dedicates an average of 15-20 volunteer hours per month.

Billie Rex Fenton, 73, of Ozona, went to see our Lord on Oct. 25, 2009 at his home with his family.

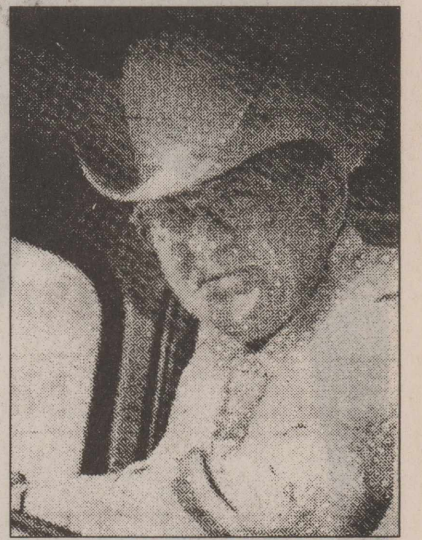
Rex was preceded in death by his parents, three sisters, two brothers and four nieces.

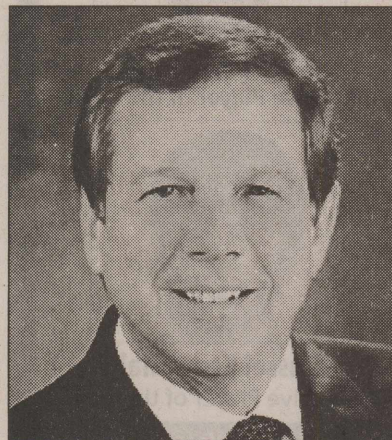

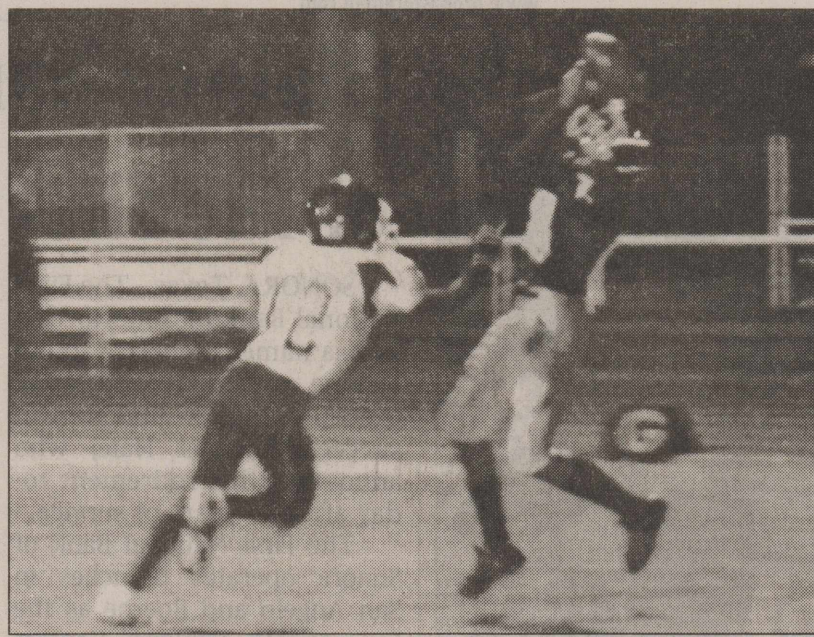

DPS announces plan to expedite computer crime examinations

SUBMITTED BY THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY

DPS has initiated a program to decrease the time it takes to conduct forensic computer examinations in criminal cases, especially those involving child pornography.

"The current backlog of cases is unacceptable, especially if the case involves child pornography," said DPS Director Steven C. McCraw.

As part of the initiative, DPS will:

- Purchase additional workstations with specialized forensic examination software;
- Hire and train additional examiners;
- Streamline how computers are searched during the initial examination phase;
- Require additional information from law enforcement agencies, including criticality and specific search parameters to expedite processing; and
- Conduct a process improvement examination to further increase efficiency and reduce processing time.

The DPS Austin Crime Lab is the only DPS Lab in the state that handles this specialized examination. Approximately half the current workload involves suspected child pornography cases. Currently, there are 45 computer forensic cases pending examination. These examinations are complex and time consuming.

The Texas Transportation Commission is a five-member body that oversees the Texas Department of Transportation.

PERRY SAYS STOP TRANSPORT OF ALIENS

Gov. Rick Perry on Oct. 31 sent a letter to the U.S. Department of Homeland Security urging the federal government to stop its plans to transport undocumented people from other states into Texas for the purpose of deportation.

The Alien Transfer and Exit Program, which began Nov. 1, may transport undocumented people through Presidio.

Perry said the program would "increase the likelihood of these individuals will immediately cross back into Texas, which is already bearing an uneven burden in dealing with immigration and border security issues along the Texas-Mexico border."

DEVICE HELPS IN BIRD IDENTIFICATION

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department announced the debut of "eBird Trail Tracker," a device that allows bird watchers to record sightings and use an online, interactive database to see what other birders have reported.

Users also can view photos and listen to audio recordings of bird songs.

Devices are installed in kiosks at World Birding Center sites in three Lower Rio Grande Valley state parks.
