Courthouse expected to be finished by end of December

Renovations on the Crockett County Courthouse are expected to be finished by the end of the year.

At Monday's regular commissioners' court meeting, County Judge Fred Deaton said the roofing is finished on the outside of the courthouse, and that carpentry work, sanding the floors and painting is continuing in the inside courtroom on the second floor.

Deaton said no leaks have been found in the new roof.

"They are making a lot of headway over there," Deaton

TRAFFIC PAYMENTS **ONLINE**

Commissioners listened to a presentation by Leigh Sides, sales director of Trafficpayment.com. This website will allow people to pay for traffic and non-traffic citations online.

Sides said Trafficpayment. com serves more than 200 courts in Texas and Oklahoma and provides a way to pay citations online and over the phone with English and Spanish operators.

When a payment is made, emails are sent to the defendant, court clerk and Trafficpayment.com. There will also be a fee to the defendant for using the website. The average fee is \$13.95, Sides said.

"I don't do online payments, but I know a lot of people do. We do get a few inquires. It's just another way to

do business," said Justice of the Peace Jim Hearne. "It's just another tool in the payment."

If a person does not want to pay online, information about the court or Justice of the Peace office will be available as well.

Trafficpayment.com has been in business for six years. The company is bonded and insured, Sides said.

Crockett County will also have its own website, along with an administrative site for the court clerk and Justice of the Peace office. Both warrants and citations will be listed on the site.

"I think it would be a convenience for people out of town and out of state," said Commissioner Alfredo Tobar.

Hearne said he wanted to look at the contract arrangement more. Deaton also said that the county attorney needs to read the contract before any approval can be made.

The commissioners tabled the item to the December meeting.

HEALTH AND WELLNESS CENTER RESOLUTION APPROVED

The commissioners approved a resolution to establish a Crockett County Health and Wellness Center in setting aside the land where the original north swimming pool located.

The land will be reserved for five years to give members of the Health and Wellness Center Board time to raise money for the center.

Although I'm no artist I could "draw" upon my experiences to come up with punch lines. So, I've come up with what I call do-it-yourself cartoons for publications on austerity budgets. I supply the words and you do the art. For example, draw a picture of a feedlot steer with a packinghouse in the background. Here's the caption: "Hmm, they bring us all the delicious food we can eat and we don't have to do any work. I wonder, what's the catch?"

13 killed, 30 wounded in mass shooting at Fort Hood

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — A Nov. 5 mass shooting at Fort Hood, about 60 miles north of the capital city, resulted in the deaths of one civilian, 12 soldiers and the wounding of 30 others.

Maj. Nidal Malik Hasan, 39, a U.S. Army psychiatrist, was identified as the shooter. Civilian police officers Kimberly Munley and Mark Todd returned fire, stopping Hasan. Hasan received first aid on the spot and was transported to a hospital for treatment. Hasan was on the staff of Darnall Army Medical Center at Fort Hood. He was preparing for deployment to Afghanistan.

Gov. Rick Perry issued this statement on Nov. 5: "The Texas family suffered a significant loss today with the tragedy at Fort Hood. Along with all Texans, Anita and I are keeping those affected by today's incidents in our thoughts and prayers. ...

"To honor those who lost their lives today, I have ordered that all Texas flags be lowered to halfstaff until Sunday, and ask all Texans to pray for the victims, their families and the extended

Fort Hood community." Perry directed the deployment of a variety of state resources

to Fort Hood, including Texas Department of Public Safety troopers, Texas Rangers and helicopters, to assist. The governor's flag order

applied to all United States and Texas flags under the control of the state. Flags were ordered to be lowered to half-staff on the Capitol building, flag displays in the Capitol Complex, and upon all public buildings, grounds and facilities beginning immediately until sunset on Sunday, Nov. 8.

Individuals, businesses, municipalities, counties and other political subdivisions were encouraged to fly the flag at half-staff for the same length of time as a sign of respect.

VOTERS APPROVE ALL AMENDMENTS

All 11 proposed amendments to the state constitution passed in the Nov. 3 statewide election. About 8 percent of Texas' 14 million registered voters voted,

reflecting a low level of general interest.

In contrast, nearly 60 percent of registered voters cast a ballot in the general election a year ago. However, over the past two turnout is not unusual for a constitutional amendment election.

Crockett County had 253 of its 2,587 Registered Voters turnout.

Below is a list of each amendment and how Crockett County voted.

· Proposition 1 - Authorizes financing methods for municipalities and counties to acquire buffer zones or open spaces next to military bases. The proposal could prevent encroachment next to the base and allow construction of roads, utilities and other infrastructure to promote the mission of a military base. In favor - 109;

Against - 138

Proposition 2- Allows the Legislature to provide for ad valorem taxation of a residence homestead solely on the basis of the property's value as a residence, not at the potentially higher commercial use value. In favor - 135;

Against - 111

Proposition 3- Provides for uniform standards and prodecades, an 8 to 12 percent voter cedures for the appraisal of property for taxation. Texas lacks uniform standards, and proponents say this amendment will ensure that property in diverse parts of the state is valued using the same generally accepted practices.



· Proposition 4- Establishes a national research university fund to help emerging research universities achieve national prominence as major research universities. Those pushing the proposal say it will provide funding similar to what elevated Texas A&M University and the University of Texas to first-tier status, providing jobs and stature for the state. Others questioned whether now is the time to spend such money.

In favor - 100; Against - 142 · Proposition 5- Permits the Texas Legislature to allow a single board of equalization for two or more adjoining appraisal entities. That means area appraisal boards can be consolidated if they choose.

In favor - 102; Against - 133 · Proposition 6- Authorizes the Veterans Land Board to issue general obligation bonds in amounts equal to or less than amounts previously authorized. It will keep the land board from continually having to seek legislative authorization.

In favor - 135; Against - 106 · Proposition 7- Allows an officer or enlisted member of the Texas State Guard or other state militia or military force to hold other civil offices. This will correct what some say is an oversight in the state constitution.

In favor - 152; Against - 90 · Proposition 8- Authorizes the state to contribute money, property and other resources to establish a veterans hospital. It's designed to speed up efforts to open a federal Veterans Affairs hospital in the Rio Grande Valley,

whose residents currently must travel to San Antonio to receive some VA hospital services.

In favor - 163; Against - 82 · Proposition 9- Protects the right of the public to access and use the public beaches bordering the seaward shore of the Gulf of Mexico. This will block private developers from restricting beach access to the public. Some say it could infringe on private property rights.

In favor - 136; Against - 104 · Proposition 10-Limits elected members of the governing boards of emergency services districts to terms no longer than four years. Currently, terms are two years.

In favor - 187; Against - 57 **JURY CONVICTS** YFZ RANCH MEMBER

A Schleicher County jury on Nov. 5 convicted Raymond M. Jessop of the Yearning For Zion ranch near Eldorado on charges of sexual assault of a child. He faces a 20-year prison sentence.

A state and federal raid on the ranch last spring resulted in the removal and temporary protective placement of more than 400 women and children who resided there.

The ranch is owned by a religious sect, the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, which broke away from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints beginning in the 1890s.


