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

Elementary school construction continues to run 'smoothly'

New elementary school onstruction continues to run moothly.

During the Nov. 18 regular Crockett County CCSD board Superintendent Thris duBois said the school construction is running "well

on schedule.' "We are making some great progress out there. I'm very pleased with the progess," duBois said.

In the report presented to the board, concrete work is continuing with pouring of ramp at corridor, column block outs, kitchen driveway and exterior spot footings. Stone installation has started in the kindergarten area, steel erection completed in the first grade area and they are installing decking in the kindergarten area.

The drywall work continues with interior and exterior framing in the kindergarten area, along with fire sprinkler work in the pre-k, library and administration. Plumbing,

electrical, air conditioning ductwork and kitchen equipment work is also ongoing.

In the upcoming month, the report stated masonry work, steel erection and drywall work will also continue, and roofing in low areas will

"I have nothing but positive things to say about Waldrop Construction," said Douglas Kohene, architect. "It's a very impressive the job that they are doing. They are to be commended a great


Kohene said in the next two to three months discussions will begin on the type of furnishings and furniture to put in the building.

some, be as sensitive as possible.


The Check IS In The Mail

Attorney general defends Texas' malpractice law

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN - Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott has filed a brief with the Texas Supreme Court defending the state's Abbott filed his brief in a case involving the Methodist Healthcare System of San Antonio. Plaintiff Emmalene Rankin sued two physicians and the Methodist Healthcare System, alleging that a surgical sponge was left in her body after an operation more than 11 years ago.

In 2003, the Texas Legislature passed a bill prohibiting medical malpractice suits filed more than 10 years after the alleged act of malpractice. Lawmakers passed the bill in response to a shortage of doctors and the increasing costs of medical malpractice insurance.

The brief explains that Texas sets limits on the time for lawsuits to be filed "because our legal system does not remedy injuries in perpetuity." The time limit is fair to plaintiffs and to health care providers, the brief

Rankin, the plaintiff, argues that the statute violates Texas' Open Courts provision in the

state Constitution. That provimedical malpractice reform law. sion puts no limits on a person's right to sue for redress. A trial court upheld the state's limiting law, but the Fourth Court of Appeals reversed that decision and

> struck down the statute. **INSURER SLAPPED** FOR \$310 MILLION

Texas Insurance Commissioner Mike Geeslin ordered State Farm Insurance to refund \$310 million to its Texas home insurance customers for overcharges. Geeslin said State Farm overcharged its customers for several years dating back to 2003. State Farm has fought state regulators for years, arguing that it owes nothing to its customers.

"The commissioner found State Farm Lloyds' rates were excessive and is ordering State Farm Lloyds to pay refunds," Geeslin said. State Farm can appeal the order, which would delay any repayments.

TEXANS MAY GET POWERBALL GAME The Texas Lottery Commis-

sion has taken steps to bring the Powerball lottery game to the state. Meeting in Houston, the commission voted to publish its intent in the Texas Register and solicit comments on the plan.

Powerball is available in many states, and its highest payout was \$365 million. Commissioners said that adding Powerball to the Texas lottery's offerings could add \$35 million a year to the state's school fund.

FEW LATINOS

IN SCHOOL STANDARDS At a meeting of the State Board of Education, state Rep. Norma Chavez, D-El Paso, objected to the lack of Hispanic historical figures required to be taught under a proposed social studies curriculum. Representing the Mexican American Legislative Caucus, Chavez told the board that the standards do not reflect Hispanic heritage in Texas.

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Pecos River Basin meeting Dec. 2

Pecos River Basin Assessment Program has announced the watershed protection plan for the Pecos River in Texas is now complete, printed and ready to be implemented.

A series of public meetings for landowners is scheduled Dec. 1-3.

The meetings are meant to familiarize the public with the plan and help eligible landowners learn where to apply for the cost-share funding the program provides, said Gary Bryant, Texas AgriLife Extension Service program specialist and the project's coordinator headquartered at Fort Stockton.

"The watershed protection plan is the culmination of the Pecos River Basin Assessment Program, which began in 2004," Bryant said. "The objective of the program is to create a long-term, landowner-driven management plan that will restore water quality within the river.

"The watershed protection plan we will be discussing at the upcoming meetings includes a variety of management practices that landowners can voluntarily implement on their property," he said. "The plan also includes the continued delivery of educational programming, informational meetings and ways for landowners to interact with each other and with agency personnel."

ic Center, Iraan. The entire watershed protection plan will be available online at http://pecosbasin. tamu.edu once all the meetings are complete. Local soil and water conservation district offices will also have a limited number of printed copies available.

Bryant said funds have been secured to treat additional saltcedar along the river using aerially applied herbicide and to burn debris left behind from earlier treatment efforts. These two tasks will be carried out at no cost to the landowner.

The funding also pays for the establishment of 10 saltcedar leaf beetle colonies along the river, educational materials and programs and the development of at least 20 water quality management plans for properties contiguous to the river.

The funding will also allow us to install a second real-time water quality monitoring station upstream of the U.S. Hwy 67 river crossing near Girvin," Bryant said.


