Ozona citizens file federal lawsuit against sheriff's office, county

THE OZONA STOCKMAN

A federal lawsuit accusing the Crockett County Sheriff's Office of "using excessive and unreasonable" force and Hill. on a local man, has been filed by two Ozona citizens.

The class action civil suit was filed Jan. 28 in the San Angelo Federal Courthouse by Charla Wooten Marley and Michael Wayne Hill.

Marley and Hill are suing the Crockett County Sheriff's Office and Crockett County for the wrongful death of Marley's late husband Jess Marley, as well as the false arrest and retaliation against Hill. The Estate of Jess Marley is also listed as a plaintiff in the suit. The plaintiffs demand a jury trial, the suit states.

The suit names Sheriff Roy Glenn Sutton and Deputies Joseph G. Bertolino, Danas the individuals involved.

Neighbor Monte Garrett spoke to Jess Marley after the incident. The suit states that Garrett objected to Jess Marley shooting the rifle.

Next, Arrieta and Bertolino pulled into the alley from the other end and talked to people at the Garrett household, the suit states.

The two deputies then drove to the Marley house, pulled up in the driveway, bailed out of the vehicle in a hurry, pointed their weapons and began yelling at Charla Marley and Hill to get on the ground, the suit states.


Charla Marley and Hill were then placed into handcuffs. The suit states that neither Charla Marley nor Hill had a gun.

Hearing the yelling, Jess Marley stepped out the front door and onto the front porch, with a cigar in his mouth and his hand clearly visible, the suit states.

Jess Marley asked the deputies "What's going on? Why are you pointing guns at my wife and friend?'



Black wins Reserve Champion at Fort Worth



A voice of reason

waste of time and money. That's what four cities are doing in federal court in a lawsuit challenging the Texas Open Meetings Law. However, a voice of reason and common sense has risen in this matter in the form of Towas Attorney Congred Crea

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott. Abbott's office filed a motion on Feb. 2 stating that the four cities don't belong in the lawsuit challenging the open meetings law. The plaintiffs argue that the Texas Open Meetings Act

the Texas Open Meetings Act shouldn't prevent some communication from being considered a quorum outside a posted meeting. Their claim includes e-mails and messages from social networking sites.

Abbott argued in the 10-page

Abbott argued in the 10-page brief filed in federal court in Pecos that Alpine, Pfluger-ville, Rockport and Wichita Falls lack standing in the suit because they don't have First Amendment rights. The city of Big Lake had been a part of the suit but withdrew on Jan. 19.

Abbott states that the First Amendment guarantees freedom of speech to citizens, not cities. Plus, if a citizen is an elected official, their rights to speak out never supersede those of other voters.

Cities are "creatures of the state" and they "may not assert constitutional claims against the state," Abbott stated in the motion.

Now, Ozona is not considered a city because the town is unincorporated. However, we do have a county commissioners' court that acts as a city council as it deals with county and in-town issues.

"These cities claim that the criminal penalty provisions of the Texas Open Meetings Act violate their First Amendment rights," the state's filing said. "But only citizens have constitutional rights. Cities do not especially against the very state from which they derive their powers - and especially not against criminal penalties that do not apply to them in the first place."

What are the 15 public officials, who are also plaintiffs, trying to prove with this?

According to the Texas Attorney General, the law "...requires meetings of governmental bodies to be open to the public, except for express-

closed sessions, and to be preceded by public notice of the time, place and subject matter of the meeting."

To simplify it even more, the public's busi-

ness needs to

be discussed, debated and acted on in public view - after the governmental entity has posted adequate notice to the public. Any binding decisions must also be made by a quorum or majority vote of the governing body in the official record.

Sounds pretty simple, public officials doing business in a public setting. On the second Monday of the month, the Crockett County Commissioners' Court meet for a regular, public meeting. Once a month the Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees also meet for a regular, public meeting.

The statute also provides a penalty, a Class B misdemeanor offense, if those entrusted by the public violate this law and get caught conducting business in secret, of a \$500 fine and up to six-months in jail.

This means, if you don't follow the rules you might have to pay a penalty, just like when you were a child.

How many times, you may ask, have people served jail time for violating the act? Only once in the last 43 years, which means public officials know they are suppose to follow the rules.

So, what's so scary about this law that has a few elected officials, and cities, running to the federal courthouse claiming the law is unfair and restricts their ability to conduct business? It makes us all wonder what business they are wanting to keep secret from their taxpayers.

If the 15 public officials and the cities have any respect for their constituents, they will stop wasting money and withdraw it.

Homeland security chief briefs lawmakers on various threats

AUSTIN — Transnational gangs fueled by Mexican drug cartels are the biggest threat to security in Texas, said the state's homeland security chief at a Feb. 1 hearing at the Capitol.

Steve McCraw, director of the Governor's Office of Homeland Security, told members of the House Transportation Committee and the Senate Transportation and Homeland Security Committee that his office and partner agencies are battling the gangs' multi-billion dollar criminal enterprise through multi-jurisdictional "fusion centers."

These fusion centers are tasked with "connecting the dots" to prevent acts of terrorism, drug and human trafficking, and serial crimes by pooling the intelligence efforts of local, state and federal law enforcement agencies. Texas is home to several of the 70 fusion centers that report to the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

McCraw said roving wiretaps would help law enforcement track gangs that use throwaway

cell phones.

McCraw also addressed security in the Capitol complex. He said the Department of Public Safety has a plan that includes X-ray machines and metal detectors to increase protections and does not turn the Capitol into an armed fortress.

And, McCraw addressed the estimated 3,000 Texas highway traffic deaths in 2009. About 15 percent of those deaths involved commercial trucks and tractor trailers.

Regarding the new federal law banning commercial truck operators from typing and sending text messages while driving, Sen. Florence Shapiro, R-Dallas, pointed out the difficulty in enforcing the ban. She brought up the line-of-sight issue: drivers in truck cabs are hard for troopers in sedans to catch in the act of texting. Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, said enforcement would be after the fact, by comparing the time of the accident with cell phone records.

The House and Senate committees also had questions about "Real ID" — the authentication system that ties together a Texas driver's license, voter registration and citizenship. McCraw said the state is getting better at detecting fake licenses and other forms of false identification.

AG CHIEF CALLS FOR HAITI HELP

State Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples on Feb. 1 asked farmers and ranchers to help Haiti, with more than 2 million people in need of food and water after the Jan. 12 earthquake.

"Texas is a state large in geography and even larger in heart and compassion," Staples said. "Texans have always responded to those in crisis, and right now, the Haitian people desperately need our assistance.

"Whether it's a surplus food commodity, a volunteer service or a monetary donation, I know the Texas agriculture community and citizens of Texas can find ways to mobilize resources and offer assistance."

The Texas Peanut Producers Board already has responded and is working to deliver peanut butter.

Shelly Nutt, executive director of the Texas **Peanut Producers** Board, said Texas peanut farmers have combined efforts with the entire U.S. peanut industry to raise more than \$75,000 to purchase peanut butter for Haiti. PLEASE SEE STATE, PAGE 8

The deputies then trained their weapons on Jess Marley and began ordering him on the ground.

The suit states that due to Jess Marley's age of 70 and infirm condition, he just stood motionless on the porch and kept both of his hands visible and continued to ask for an explanation from the dep-

Bertolino then deployed his Taser, which then hit Jess Marley's pocket of his shirt and bounced off, and also hit a car in the driveway, the suit states. Bertolino then rushed to Jess Marley, grabbed him around the neck in a headlock and began using Pepper Spray in Jess Marley's face, the suit states.

The deputy used the entire can of Pepper Spray. Jess Marley was slumped on the ground and incapacitated.

Jess Marley was then arrested for deadly conduct with a firearm and resisting arrest/ search, where he later posted bond and was released from the Crockett County Jail.

In the following days, the suit states, Jess Marley began having several medical problems.

According to public information officials at TCLOSE, Sutton has taken the peace officer license test once on Nov. 30, 2009, which he failed. Sutton has two more opportunities to take the test this year.

The Texas Local Government Code states that TCLOSE may require each county sheriff, who is not a commissioned peace officer, to attend not more than 40 hours of instruction in law enforcement. The commission shall allow a sheriff at least two but not more than four years after the date on which the sheriff assumes office to complete the hours of instruction.

If a sheriff fails to complete these requirements, then he may be removed from office under "incompetency."



WORK PROGRAM FEATURES **INCENTIVES**

"Texas Back to Work," a two-year, \$15 million employment program promoted

by Lt. Gov. Dewhurst and funded by the state Legislature last session, will offer employers incentives such as subsidized-wage reimbursements or retention bonuses for hiring qualified out-ofwork Texans.

Grants under the program are available to employers through the 28 Texas local workforce development boards, which also provide employers with workforce recruitment assistance, prescreening of qualified applicants and training programs.

More than 1.8 million customers were served in more than 240 workforce centers across Texas last year, according to the Texas Workforce Commission.

COMPUTER RECYCLING FIGURES IN

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality in late January announced first-year results in its computer recycling program.

The agency reported manufacturers collected for reuse or recycling 12.4 million pounds of computer equipment in Texas from Jan. 1 through Dec. 31, 2009.

The program, which helps conserve reusable materials including copper, lead and steel, requires computer manufacturers that sell in Texas to offer consumers convenient, free recycling for their brands of computer equipment.

Currently, 81 manufacturers representing 116 brands are participating in the pro-

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
