The search is on: Hernandez leaves **Ozona after one season**

After only one year, Ozona Athletic Director Robert Hernandez has verbally resigned from Crockett County CCSD.

Hernandez's position was posted under employment on the district's website on June 2 at www.ozonaschools.net.

Superintendent Chris duBois said Hernandez verbally notified the district that he intends to take another position.

"Robert (Hernandez) has had several opportunities presented to him in the last several weeks, and he has taken care to thoughtfully weigh both the needs of his family as well our student athletes," duBois said. "Ultimately he decided that this particular opportunity was best. I have enjoyed working with Coach Hernandez and wish him all the best."

duBois said Hernandez has agreed to allow the district to start the process in finding a replacement, even though Hernandez won't officially resign until he has a new contract in another district.

"He recognized that considering how late we are in the hiring season that I needed every advantage in moving on the process for filling this key position, so we agreed to go ahead and post the opening," duBois said.

Texas state law requires Coach," duBois said. that professional positions be posted at least internally for a minimum of 10 days before an offer can be made.

The soonest an offer could be made would be at the close of business on Friday, June 11, duBois said.

duBois said Hernandez understood the criticality of getting it posted as soon as possible.

duBois said he briefed the school board on the situation during a special meeting on June 1, and explained his intended approach for conducting a search.

"I am making some preliminary contacts to get the ball rolling on naming a new Athletic Director/Football since the 2003-2004 season.

duBois said he believes the position is a good one because

of the quality of students. "We have great kids first off and the quality of student-athletes is underrated," duBois said. "They are a terrific group, and they'll miss Coach Hernandez, but they

will bounce back." The Lions finished 4-6 in Hernandez's only year.

Prior to Ozona, Hernandez had been head coach at Rocksprings for 10 years.

Hernandez returned a phone call to The Stockman, but made no comment on the situation.

Board approves surge protector system, fencing for new school

Approval of more items for the new elementary school was made during a June 1 special meeting of the Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees.

The board approved a surge protection system of \$5,818, which will be deducted from the contractor's contingency allowance. The system will help protect electronic equipment in the new building.

The board decided to not go with the \$34,512 lightning protection system. Superintendent Chris duBois said he spoke with local fire officials, as well as others, and was told very few building fires have been caused by lightning strikes. The system is external and can be added later if the board chooses.

Also approved was \$61,638.02 bid from Ameristar Montage Plus for a Commercial Grade fence.

Along with these approvals, the board discussed landscaping options for the school.

"I do wonder what it's going to be like on the outside on Aug. 15," said Board President Dr. Marcus Sims.

The building is still on schedule for completion by Aug. 15, with the library and gym possibly being completed in late August, said Bill Baker, project manager for Waldrop Construction.


"We're making a lot of progress, but there is still a lot left to do," Baker said.

Board Vice President Laurie Hale said she would like the tree moved from the intermediate location to the new school that was planted in memory of former student Jennifer Gravell.

"Something that is nice in the front and totally out of the way," Hale said about the landscaping in general. "I honestly don't think we need a lot of plants."

More information on the landscaping will be presented at the next regular board meeting.

Motion to dismiss filed in sheriff's office federal lawsuit

Another motion to dismiss has been filed in the federal lawsuit involving the Crockett County Sheriff's Office.

This time, the motion is to partially dismiss without prejudice the claims of plaintiff Michael Wayne Hill for unlawful arrest related to his Aug. 6, 2009 arrest for driving while intoxicated because a criminal case has been filed arising out of the arrest and charge, according to federal court documents.

Dismissed without prejudice is a dismissal that allows for re-filing of the case in the future

Hill claims he was unlawfully arrested and that the sheriff's office conspired to have Hill arrested to intimidate Hill and plaintiff Charla Wooten Marley from filing a federal lawsuit related to the arrest and then eventual death of Charla's husband Jess Marley on June 21, 2009, documents state.

On April 22, 2010, the Crockett County Attorney's Office filed a complaint against Hill for DWI on Aug. 6, 2009. According to the documents, the unlawful arrest claim, along with Hill's conspiracy and failure to prevent conspiracy claims are dependent on the invalidity of the DWI arrest.

The document states if the criminal case against Hill is concluded in Hill's favor, then Hill has the right to re-file his claims

Along with the motion to dismiss, Robert S. Hogan, attorney for Marley and Hill, has file objections and response to a summary judgment filed in April by Hogg, which included depositions from Sheriff Roy Glenn Sutton, deputies and Marley and Hill.

The objections include several to the affidavit of Margo L. Fraiser, a criminal justice consultant with 35 years of law enforcement experience from Austin who stated that the sheriff's office conducted reasonable procedures in the arrest of Marley and Hill. Fraiser also states that the arrests of Jess and Hill were justified and that the deputies acted in conformance with the training commonly provided by law enforcement officers in the State of Texas.

According to the documents, Fraiser's affidavit does not set factual basis for the opinions expressed and states unsupported evidence.

Other objections include two audio-visual recordings statements.

The documents also state that Sutton and deputies Joseph G. Bertolino, Bo Semmler and Daniel H. Arrieta have failed to demonstrate a legal or factual basis defense of qualified immunity, and that the case should continue toward a tri-The motion was filed by Jon al. Qualified immunity shields government officials from liability for the violation of an individual's federal constitutional rights.

In the amended lawsuit, it states that Jess Marley died as a result of the unlawful use of force against him when he was "unnecessarily pepper-sprayed at extremely close range" while his wife looked on, even though he was not resisting the law enforcement officers or attempting to flee.

Jess Marley was arrested at his residence on 1106 Avenue B, and that Jess Marley fired a .22 rifle "ratshot" in the alley behind 1106 Avenue B.

In the response, Hogan states that "there was never any indication that Jess Marley had pointed a rifle at anyone, had threatened an individual with a firearm, or had any intent to place anyone in imminent danger of serious bodily injury."

The response states that there was no evidence that Jess Marley had committed deadly conduct.

Additional, the deputies conduct should be evaluated due to the fact that no shots were fired by anyone, and there were never any physical threats made against any of the deputies nor any attempt made to harm or threaten anyone by either Jess or Charla Marley or Hill, the documents state.

It also states that the only individuals with weapons and threatening individuals with weapons were the deputies.

Specifically, illegally detaining citizens through the use of impermissible coercion, threats and unnecessary deadly force without the proper predicate facts are not proper actions within the scope of a police officer's duties and neither does those actions without justification, demonstrate enforcement of the law," the documents state. "Specifically, Bertolino, Semmler and Sutton took it upon themselves to make sure that Charla Marley would not file a lawsuit and that Mike Hill would not be a witness in that same lawsuit. Hence, the defendants unleashed a campaign of fear, terror and intimidation upon Charla Marley and Mike Hill by performing unlawful surveillance, following their vehicles, making improper arrests, and planting and/or fabricating evidence with regard to Charla Marley and/or Mike Hill."

Crockett County and the sheriff's office are claiming that Jess Marley died due to pre-existing medical and health conditions that were not immediately caused by any of the events made in the lawsuit.

Federal Judge Sam Cummings has yet to rule on the motion or on the summary judgment.



Is separation of church and state fact or fiction?

Editor's note: The following was written by Charles C. Haynes, director of the Religious Freedom Education Project. After this column was written, the Texas State Board of Education adopted new social studies guidelines for the state's schools, including the requirement that students be taught that the words "separation of church and state" aren't in the U.S. Constitution.



apple pie. Despite pe-rennial debates over the degree of separation, public support for the principle itself has been strong for

much of our history But in today's culture-war climate, the very mention of "separation of church and state" is enough to trigger a bitter argument over the relationship of

government and religion in the United States. Consider the current fight over the social studies curriculum in Texas. For months now the Democratic minority on the State Board of Education has been sparring with the Republican majority (mostly social conservatives) over what to teach students about the establishment? clause of the First Amendment.

The board recently voted down a Democratic proposal calling for students to examine the reathe federal government from interfering with state establishments (where, as in Massachusetts and Connecticut, state funds supported favored religious sects).

Others, including James Madi-son, the primary drafter of the Bill of Rights, supported full disestablishment on all levels of government, arguing that entanglement of church and state had been a leading source of persecution and coercion throughout history.

Madison settled for half a loaf in 1789, when Congress passed the First Amendment, although the church-state separation he argued for was accomplished in all states by 1833. His vision for religious freedom under the federal Constitution wasn't ful-ly realized until the 20th century when the Supreme Court applied the establishment clause to all levels of government through the 14th Amendment.

Ironically, many of the evangelical Christian opponents of separation in Texas today belong to religious groups that were once among the

strongest defenders of a high and impregnable wall of separation between church and state.

Protestant dissenters in Virginia, for example, were the ground forces in the successful political battle to 1 pass Thomas Jeffer son's Statute for Religious Freedom in 1786 — the first time in history a legislature voted to separate church from state. In the 19th and early 20th centuries, many Protestants waved the banner of church-state separation in their crusade to contain the influence of the Roman Catholic Church in America. As late as 1960, presidential candidate John F. Kennedy, a Catholic, felt compelled to travel to Houston to convince a roomful of Protestant ministers that he was fully committed to the "separation of church and state." The story of Kennedy's religious test is a reminder that the principle of church-state separation has a checkered history — a history that gives the establishment clause a bad name in some quarters. Attacks on Catholics in the name of "separation of church and state" were unfair and unjust. And contemporary attempts to exclude religion from public life in the name of "separation" are also unfair and unjust. But abuses of the principle, past and present, should not obscure the vital importance of church-state separation for religious freedom. What students in Texas (and everywhere else) need to learn is that by separating church from state, the First Amendment protects the independence and integrity of both religion and government — thereby guaranteeing liberty of conscience for us all.

Many years ago in our area two brothers took a bank for many millions by tricking the loan officer into thinking they owned a lot more cattle than they really did. In the morning they showed the loan officer a set of cattle and then they took him to lunch and force fed him martinis for two hours. In the afternoon their cowboys ran the same cattle around a hill a second time as a supposed new bunch of cattle.

That evening they shipped the same cattle to another ranch where they were shown to the same loan arranger a third and fourth time as even more collateral. The loan officer should have been tipped off by the fact that a couple thousand head were supposedly subsisting on a 500 acre ranch that was so devoid of grass it

looked like a moonscape. I'm not sure but the brothers may have gotten the idea from the Germans who, in World War II, captured a few Americans at El Guettar in Tunisia.

They marched those American prisoners up the main street of Tunis to impress the natives with their military superiority and then they trucked the same prisoners back to the start of the parade where they marched them down the street again. This went on several times until the natives must have thought the Germans had captured our entire Army.

Or the brothers may have gotten the idea by reading about Moreton Frewen. This pioneer businessman was so stupid he failed on three different continents. In the late 1800's Moreton bought a large



time when they too were run around a hill and shown to him again. I don't advise anyone to follow a life of crime

but if you are going to try this trick at home there are a couple potential pitfalls.

First, make sure that there are no "marker cattle" in the bunch. If the rest of your herd is healthy and all black or red, a white one, or an

animal with a runny nose and frozen tail, is going to stick out like a wart on the face of a supermodel.

Even a soft-shoed urban banker might recognize a Longhorn steer with long horns and a distinctly marked hide if he sees the same animal more than five times in a row amongst a set of straight blacks or reds.

I hate to admit this but even I, yourautore humble correspondent, have unknowingly helped cattle buyers see double.

Many years ago, when cows were worth about 60 percent less than they are now, I worked ringside at a commercial cow sale that was held on a ranch out in the country. In many ways it was unlike any other

o'clock in the morning. Most auctioneers and ring men work bankers hours and the sales usually start at one. We cranked up the sale and the cattle were coming through the ring in big bunches to make nice even loads. But the buyers weren't interested in even buying a pickup truck load. Anticipating a wreck, the savvy owner had pre-weighed the cattle and he protected the cows to the price they'd fetch at the sale barn in town.

We weren't getting any cows sold and I'm sure the owner was ready to call off the sale when a big buyer showed up at noon to eat lunch before what he thought would be a one o'clock sale. When he saw we were already selling cows he waded right into them. The ranch owner, who had more sand than the Hawaiian Islands, went out back, had the cattle he'd already caught back resorted into smaller bunches and, because they were all the same color and without ear tags, no one was the wiser when we resold them. I thought the cattle began to look familiar and kept thinking we'd be running out of cattle soon but the ranchers, who'd been sitting on their hands before, now suddenly came alive. They started bidding on the same cows they could have bought \$300 cheaper just hours before. We ended up having a great sale, although it was a long day because we sold twice as many cattle as were ad-

sons the rounding rathers protected religious freedom in America by barring government from promoting or disfavoring any particular religion over all others" — arguably the mildest possible definition of the "no establishment" mandated by the First Amendment.

A conservative member of the board wants instead for students to "contrast the Founders' intent relative to the wording of the First Amendment's Establishment Clause and Free Exercise Clause, with the popular term 'Separation of church and state.'"

The tug-of-war in Texas over what students should learn about the First Amendment is the latest chapter in a decades-long crusade by some Christian conservatives to denigrate "separation of church and state" as an invention of the courts that ignores the intent of the Founders to create a Christian nation. The phrase, they argue, doesn't appear anywhere in the Constitution.

While it's true that the words "separation of church and state" are not in the First Amendment, the principle of separation is at the very heart of the establishment clause. By barring Congress from enacting any law that would have anything to do with an establishment of religion, the Founders clearly intended to keep the federal government, at least, out of the religion business. If that isn't "separation," what is?

That doesn't mean, of course, that the Founders agreed on the application of separation – any more than Americans agree about what separation should look like today. Some voted for the establishment clause to keep

Governor nixes participation in education funding program

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Texas will not apply for the second round of federal Race to the Top education funds that could total around \$700 million, Gov. Rick Perry said June 1.

Race to the Top money comes through a competitive granting program that requires states to adopt national curriculum standards in order to compete for the funding.

"Abandoning state standards and adopting new nationalized standards would cost Texas taxpayers \$3 billion, and would likely weaken the rigorous college- and career-ready standards and assessments already in place in our state," Perry said.

Texas' curriculum standards are set by the elected State Board of Education, as recently demonstrated, but the Legislature has the power to amend those standards.

Perry said if Texas accepted the funding "it would cost Texas taxpayers upwards of \$3 billion to realign our education system to conform to the U.S. Department of Education's uniform vision for public education." MORE BUDGET CUTS

PRESCRIBED

Gov. Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Joe Straus on May 28 told state agencies to whittle down their budget requests by 5 percent for fiscal year 2012 and another 5 percent for fiscal year 2013. Agencies must submit their plans between Aug. 2 and Aug. 30.

The 82nd Texas Legislature, scheduled to convene Jan. 11, must write a balanced budget in the face of a shortfall estimated between \$10 billion and \$18 billion.

"While we face challenges to our budget, Texans can rest assured we will preserve essential services as we identify further savings for taxpayers," Dewhurst said.

TAX INTAKE LOWER THAN EXPECTED

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs on June 2 said business tax collections as of the May 16 reporting deadline were about \$3.6 billion.

The amount is about \$500 million short of Combs' biennial

revenue estimate for fiscal years 2010-2011, which projects \$4.3 billion in business tax revenue by the end of fiscal 2010, Aug. 31. Those billions of dollars in business taxes make up a small portion of state revenue overall: the lion's share (about 60 percent) comes from sales and use taxes paid by all consumers.

Speaking of which, the upcoming state sales tax holiday will give Texas shoppers a break from state and local sales taxes on Aug. 20, 21 and 22. The law exempts most clothing and footwear priced under \$100 from sales and use taxes.

How much revenue does the state forgo as a results of a that kind of sales tax holiday? Usually more than \$50 million.

REDISTRICTING COMMITTEE MEETS

Congressional redistricting, a job for the state Legislature next session, will be based on information gathered in the U.S. census.

On June 2, the House Committee on Redistricting met for invited testimony on recent

legal, technological, and demographic developments relating to the upcoming redistricting process.

Dr. Jeffrey Jordan of the Texas State Data Center testified the state's population increased 3.93 million (18.8 percent) from 2000 to 2008, of which 54 percent was natural increase and 45 percent was net migration.
