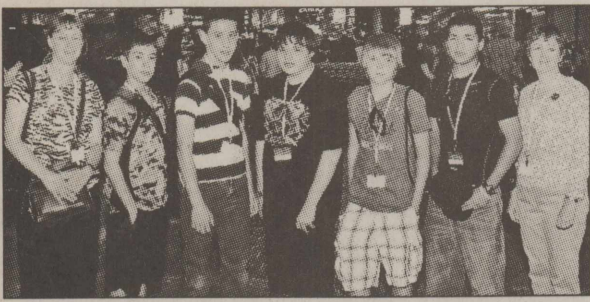

Commissioners approve fireworks, burn ban and signs prohibiting cell phone use in school zones

The only fireworks allowed to fly high this Fourth of July will be the ones at the Knights of Columbus show.

During Monday's regular meeting, the commissioners approved an order restricting aerial fireworks, such as bottle rockets, "skyrockets with sticks" and "missile with fins."

The State of Texas order states that no person may sell, detonate, ignite or in any way use these types of fireworks. It does not prohibit common fireworks, small in size.

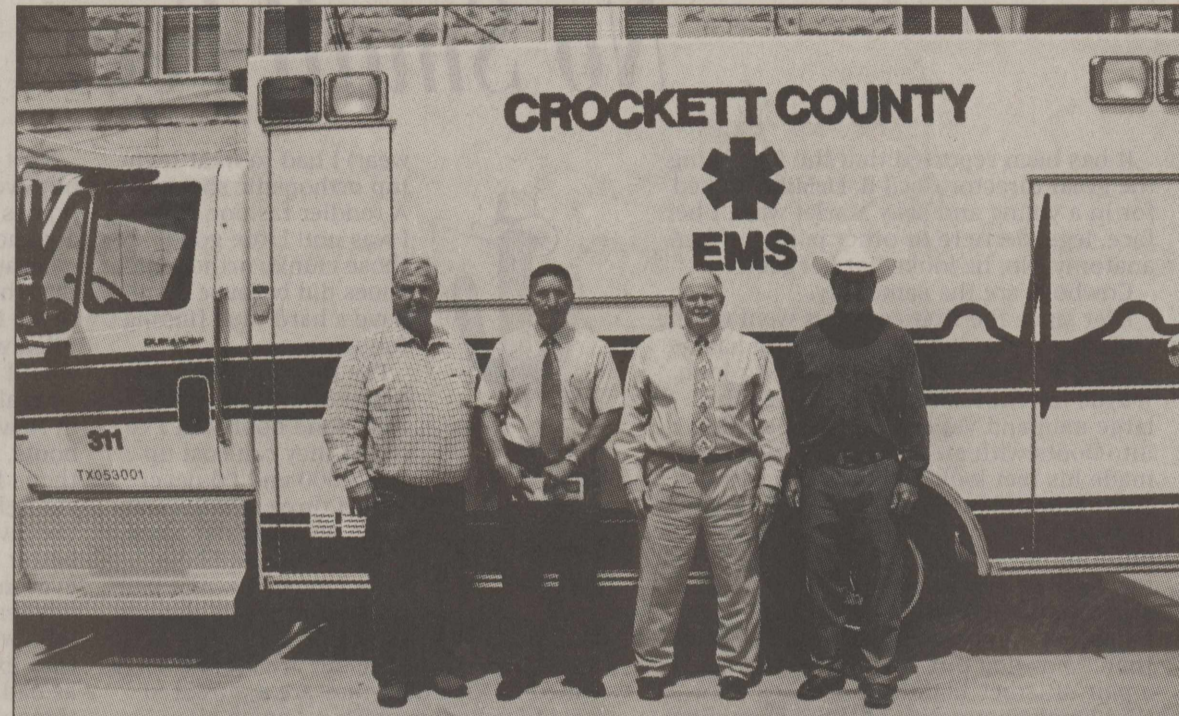
Violation of the order is a Class C Misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

The Fourth of July show presented by the Knights of Columbus was also approved by the commissioners. The annual show at the north baseball park is controlled by the Knights and monitored by the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department, said County Judge Fred Deaton.

The commissioners also approved portable toilets for town square during the Fourth of July weekend.

Along with restricting fireworks, and the possibility of a hot, dry summer ahead, the commissioners also approved a 30-day county burn ban Monday.

Deaton said it has been nearly a year since the county

has been under a burn ban.

This ban does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission, such as firefighter training, public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations, planting or harvesting or agricultural crops or burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station or prescribed burn manager.

NO CELL PHONE USAGE IN SCHOOL ZONES

Driving in a school zone and talking on a cell phone will now be against the law in Crockett County when new signs are posted prohibiting the use.

The commissioners approved a motion to allow signs to be posted in all school zone areas. The request comes from officials at Crockett County CCSD and the Crockett County Sheriff's Department, Deaton said.

The state law went into effect Sept. 1, 2009, but could not be enforced until the county approved to have

the signs posted.

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety it is illegal to use a cell phone in a school zone unless the vehicle is stopped or a hands-free device is used. Violators can be fined. The DPS stated that there is an exception if the call is an emergency.

Calf ropers look really good in these boots and I should be able to pull off the look because my dad was from Tulsa, but whenever I wore them I was always getting high centered due to the low heel. And people gave me loose change because I looked like a tramp.

Next I tried wearing lace-up packer boots but I've never liked tying my shoes and it goes against my rule of never trusting anyone who wears lace-ups.

State agencies play role in Gulf oil spill response

AUSTIN — Birds and other Texas coastal wildlife have not been affected by the Deepwater Horizon oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico, according to the Texas General Land Office.

And, if any tarballs from the spill make it to Texas shores, the Land Office will work with the U.S. Coast Guard and BP to clean them up, Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson said on June 7.

Governor Rick Perry's office, according to its June 10 news release, participates in daily conference calls about the spill with the White House, Coast Guard, Department of Homeland Security, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and gulf state governors.

Texas Workforce Commission on June 8 announced it had sent mobile units to sites on the Louisiana coast. The two 34-foot-long units provide job search and referral services to people whose jobs have been affected by the disaster.

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality activated 12 Mobile Response Spill Assessment Teams to monitor air quality, collect sediment

and water samples, offer advice on waste disposal and provide training in shoreline clean-up techniques.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has its own oil spill response team and is conducting weekly conference calls with the Texas Department of Agriculture, Texas Sea Grant College Program and commercial fisheries. No fisheries have been closed along the Texas coast due to this oil spill, the agency said.

Meanwhile, the governor's office said, Texas beaches remain open for summer recreation and business.

GROUP'S SITE PUTS SPOTLIGHT ON I-35

The Texas Department of Transportation on Oct. 7, 2009, officially announced it would no longer pursue the Trans-Texas Corridor project, a plan to transform Interstate 35 into a conduit for vehicles, rail and utilities.

But, improvements are still on the drawing board for I-35,

which runs from Laredo to the Oklahoma border north of Gainesville.

Citizens who have an interest in the highway's future might take a gander at www.my35.org.

The web site launched June 9 by the I-35 Corridor Advisory Committee focuses on efforts to plan future improvements and on current activities, such as construction on the stretch between the central Texas communities of Salado and Hillsboro.

WHITE RESPONDS TO PERRY

Bill White, Democratic candidate for governor, disclosed in his tax return and financial statement that he invested in a Houston-based company, BTEC Turbines LP, in 2006.

After White released his financial information, incumbent Gov. Perry said White should end his candidacy because while White was mayor of Houston, he personally profited as a result of public money spent with BTEC because of Hurricane Rita.

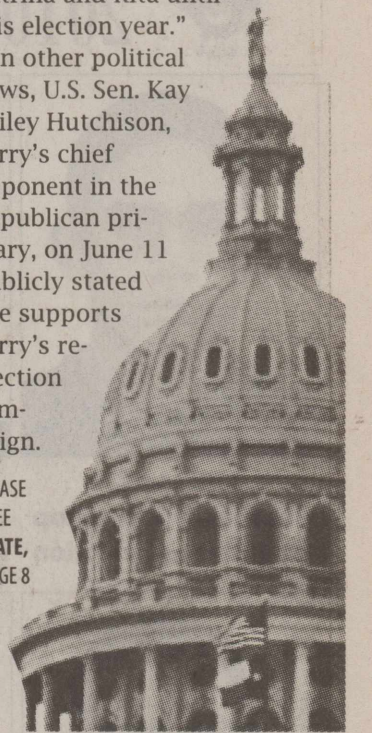
White rejected Perry's sugges-

tion, pointing out the investment was made a year after hurricanes Rita and Katrina hit in fall 2005.

In White's response to Perry's accusation, he said, "Perry took no issue with my leadership in the wake of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita until this election year."

In other political news, U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, Perry's chief opponent in the Republican primary, on June 11 publicly stated she supports Perry's re-election campaign.

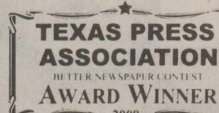
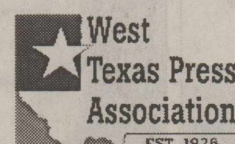

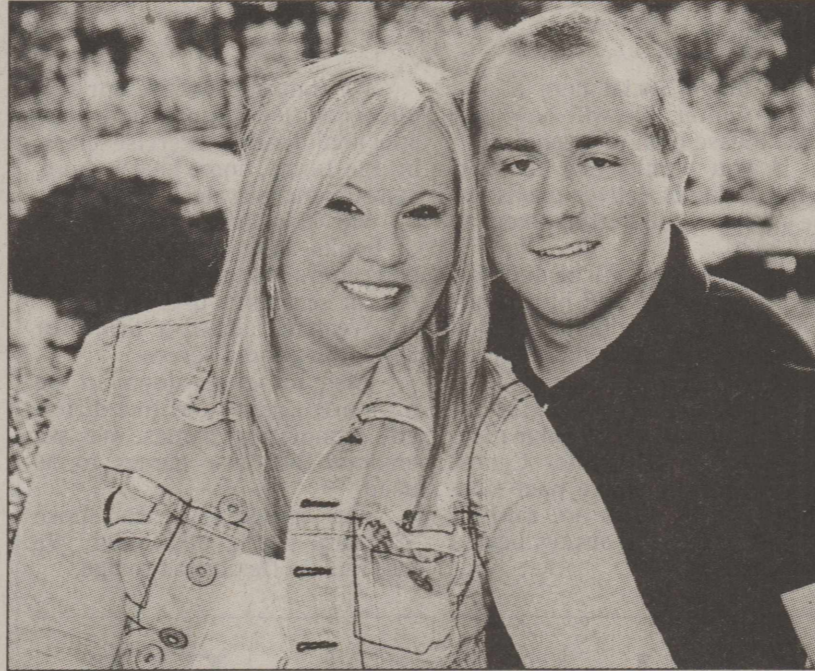
Bridesmaids wore cornflower blue organza dresses with satin under slips.

The couple will marry on July 24, 2010 at Paradise Cove at Lake Grapevine in Southlake, Texas.

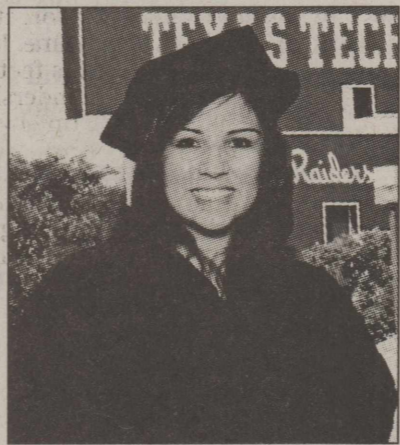
Tambunga graduates from Texas Tech Law School

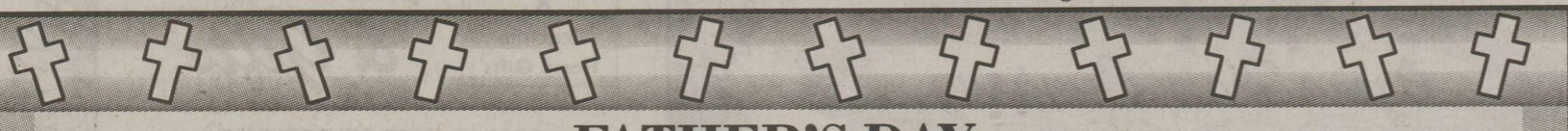

The Crockett County Wool Judging team made up of Erik Carrizales, Lane Hale and Linda Stapper brought home the



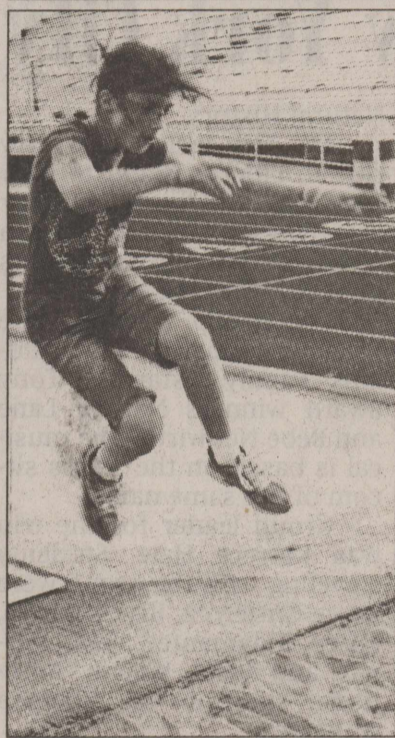

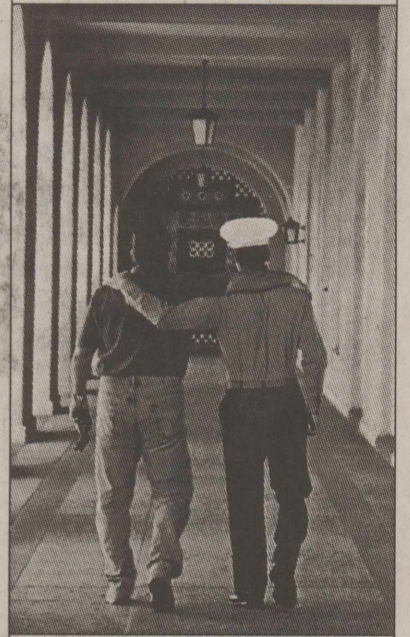

Ozona man arrested on multiple drug charges

An Ozona man has been arrested on multiple drug charges after a six-month investigation by the Crockett County Sheriff's Office. Abel Galindo Villarreal, 38, has been charged with delivery of marijuana and possession of a controlled substance, both felony charges, and possession of marijuana enhanced, a misdemeanor charge. Bail bond for the felo-

ny charges was set at \$10,000 each, while the misdemeanor charge bail was set at \$5,000.

According to Chief Deputy Bo Semmler, the sheriff's office executed a search warrant at 1906 Mulberry St., where they found marijuana and marijuana growing at the house, as well as large amounts of prescription drugs.

Semmler said the arrest and search was based on information the sheriff's office received over a six-month investigation.

The Green Party agreed to wait to submit its list of candidates to the state for ballot certification until a court rules on the lawsuit. At its convention in San Antonio, the Green Party nominated retired teacher Deb Shafto of Houston as its candidate for governor.

The Libertarian Party, at its convention in Austin on June 12 nominated Kathie Glass, a Houston attorney, as its candidate for governor.

TEXAS PARTICIPATES IN WORLD EXPO

A Texas economic development and tourism delegation led by Gov. Perry is overseas attending "Salute to Texas Week" at the world's fair, Expo 2010 Shanghai China.

Texas Week, which runs June 13-19 in the USA Pavilion, is part of a six-month global event expected to draw some 70 million visitors.

ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand.

This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.


