A smooth start to the school year

Another "smooth" first day is in the record books for Ozona schools.

Monday morning, students of all ages poured onto the various campuses eager to start a new year.


"The first day went really smooth," said Superintendent Chris duBois. "We had a few annoyances in maintenance, mostly air conditioning issues, but we have them under control."

Enrollment for the first day was 749 students, right where the district left off in May. Elementary had 394 students, middle school 155 and high school 197. There was 17 no-shows in the high school, but three the district has excuses for, duBois said. The biggest class was the kindergarten with 71 students.

For Ozona Elementary students, it was another start in portable buildings and in the intermediate building. However, plans are still a go to start attending in the new elementary school building after Labor Day, Sept. 6, duBois said. An open house and dedication date will be announced soon.

"The contractor is wrapping up site clean-up and touch ups. Most systems are tested, and we are going to start moving teacher materials and waxing floors later this week," duBois said.

With a new move ahead, students were greeted in classrooms with new materials and boxes packed and ready for the new school.

The last day to registo vote in the November election is Oct. 4.



Commissioners discuss housing prisoners, **Care Center Administrator's raise**

A different place to house Crockett County prisoners was discussed at a special called meeting last week.

Crockett Count Commissioners held a budget workshop on Aug. 20 to talk about housing prisoners in other counties. Currently, prisoners are transported and housed at the Reagan County facility in

Reagan County sent a letter to Crockett County indicating that the cost to house prisoners next year would be nearly \$300,000. Crockett County budgeted \$160,000 this year. Local sheriff's office offi-

cials started looking for other places to transport inmates. Two places were found, Upton and Sutton counties.

Chief Deputy Bo Semmler said Reagan County has been charging Crockett County a lot more, and that Upton and Sutton counties amount is based on figures are interested in working for the last six months. In

with Crockett County to order to make this amount house prisoners.

"We are prioritizing our cases a lot more," Semmler said. "As we go working with those two jails (Upton and

Sutton) we are going to look

at keeping costs down." County Judge Fred Deaton said Reagan County's increase charges were based on Crockett County bringing more prisoners over than was originally contracted. Deaton said he asked Reagan Coun-

ty officials if the two counties could split the increase, but some internal problems have occurred at Regan County.

Crockett County will now let it's contract with Reagan County expire and then enter into general agreements with Sutton and Upton counties.

For the 2011 budget, this means an increase of \$60,000 for inmate housing and transportation, which totals around \$220,000.

Semmler said this

work, money was taken out of other areas of the sheriff's budget and jail budget, including \$10,000 prisoner meals and \$12,000 for supplies and utilities.

At the Crockett County Jail, prisoners are held for only 72 hours before being moved or released.

"We've crunched the numbers," Semmler said.

Deaton said the county will still continue to work and house prisoners at Reagan County, as well as the other two counties.

"I don't have any intensions to burn our bridges with Big Lake. We will still have to use them," Deaton said.

Also discussed at the budget workshop was a \$2,500 raise recommended to Care Center Administrator Benny Gibbs by the Crockett County Health and Emergency Services Board.

Raises for other county employees, including elected officials, have not been recommended for the 2011 year.

Decide on a business vision, have a plan of action and measure success



Election day inches closer with no public encounter between Perry, White

AUSTIN — Gov. Rick Perry on Aug. 19 called for lawmakers to enact tougher penalties for the crime of human trafficking in Texas.

Lawmakers will meet next when the 82nd Texas Legislature convenes at noon on Jan. 11, but more pressing is Election Day, Nov. 2, only two months away.

Former Mayor Bill White of Houston, a Democrat and incumbent Gov. Perry's main challenger, also says he wants tougher penalties for human trafficking.

Even if Perry and White agree on human trafficking, other topics of interest to Texans the state budget, health care reform, highway construction, education, public safety prisons, border security and more topics of interest — remain undebated by the two.

Well, they do manage to point out differences in their approaches to those subjects in press releases, but Perry is still standing back from White's call for a live debate until White makes public more of his personal income tax returns.

White released his mayor-era tax returns in June, but the Perry campaign demanded White's tax returns from the span of time in 1993-1995 when White served as deputy U.S. Energy secretary in the Clinton Administration.

TEST SCORES SHOW IMPROVEMENT

Class of 2010 Texas high school seniors posted a higher average score on ACT mathematics and science tests than any other class of seniors in the last decade, the Texas Education Agency reported on Aug. 18.

The class of 2010 scored 21.4 on math and 20.9 on science.


The average overall composite score for the class of 2010 matched the class of 2009 at 20.8.

The Texas Education Agency said 92,615 high school seniors took the ACT this year, while 82,640 from the class of 2009 took the test last year. That's a 12 percent increase in the rate of participation.

The ACT is a standardized test for high school achievement and college admissions.

School budget, tax rate on tonight's agenda for approval

are on the agenda for approval at tonight's (Aug. 25) regular meeting of the Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees.

After two budget workshops, the board will look at approving a tax rate of 1.26 per \$100 value for the 2010-2011 school year. The district has two tax rates. One is 1.04 per \$100 value for maintenance and operation, and the other is .22 per \$100 value for interest and sinking. The I&S tax is for the \$10 million bond that was approved in 2008 for construction of the new Ozona Elementary School.

With this rate, the district can pay off the remaining \$6 million on the \$10 million bond in February 2011 and save around \$425,000 in interest. Next year, with the bond paid off, the I&S tax will go away. Bond money is not subject to state recapture, meaning the district has been able to keep all \$10 million for building the school.

The board toured the school on Aug. 18. Students and teachers are scheduled to move into the new building after Labor Day.

Also on the agenda is to approve the 2010-2011 official budget. The board has met twice this month in budget workshops.

At the last workshop on Aug. 18, the board met in executive/closed session

for nearly three hours on personnel matters. No action was taken by the board A budget and a tax rate when they resumed in open

session. The board did approve to include short-term disability insurance in the new budget for district employ-

A public meeting will be held at tonight's meeting to discuss adoption of the budget and proposed tax rate. The board has until Aug. 31 to adopt a budget for the 2010-2011 school year.

"We are not giving anybody else a raise, so we can't approve giving one person a raise. I don't care who they are. I wish I could give everyone a raise. He does a good job, but we've asked people to do a lot more. I'm not going to vote for this,' said Commissioner Frank Tambunga.

Deaton said the health and emergency services board was very adamant in giving Gibbs the raise for his work in helping to save the Care Center in insurance money this year.

Commissioner dy Branch said the board should have done a bonus or some other type of perk, instead of a raise.

Branch also questioned other items in the care center budget including raises budgeted for other employees. Deaton said those were for additional staff due to the care center having more residents.

Commissioner Childress III said the commissioners' court needed to meet with the health and emergency services board to discuss this further.

"It does make it hard to explain when we are not giving raises anywhere else," Childress said.

"We can meet with the board, but I'm not going to vote for it. I'm voicing my opinion right now. Everybody gets a raise or nobody gets it," Tambunga added.

The commissioners verbally agreed to meet with the health and emergency services board at the board's next meeting on Sept. 9.

The county budget will be on the agenda for approval at the next regular commissioners' court meeting on Sept. 13.


