Lions beat Harper 28-20

HARPER - Austin Suddreth didn't hesitate when he saw the football fall from the Harper Longhorn player's hands and onto the field.

Suddreth grabbed the pigskin and sprinted 61 yards to seal the Ozona Lions 28-20 victory over Harper Friday night. The win puts the Lions in the playoffs for the first time since 2006.

Ozona finished second in district behind Sonora, but ahead of San Saba.

"We came out and played well early, just plagued by too many penalties to put Harper away in the first half," said Coach Ray Brown.

Ozona will face the Three Rivers Bulldogs Friday for the Bi-District Championship in Boerne. Game time is 7:30 p.m. Ozona will be visiting team. Admission is \$6 for adults, \$4 for students.

Commissioners approve burn band

Crockett County is once again under a burn ban.

During their regular meeting Monday, the Crockett County Commissioners' Court approved a 30-day burn ban.

Over the past two weeks, the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department has responded to several grass fires.

The most recent fires were Nov. 6 off of U.S. Highway 190.

"I wish I knew the cause of them all. They are beginning to get a little suspicious," said Fire Chief Bob Falkner. "All of them have been started off the side of the road. It was a little bit suspicious on Saturday (Nov. 6) to have fires out on that highway."

A burn ban does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission, such as firefighter training, public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations, planting or harvesting or agricultural crops or burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment

Canseco ready to represent district

Throughout the heated campaign, Francisco "Quico" Canseco ran an efficient, focused campaign with a simple message: The federal government is too big.

The now Republican Congressman-elect knocked off U.S. District 23 Rep. Ciro Rodriguez, D-San Antonio, last week in the Nov. 3 General Election.

Canseco, 61, said in a telephone interview last week that he is ready to represent a district that stretches from El Paso to San Antonio, including Crockett County.

"You've got to be able to not just disseminate a clear and conscience message, but you have to be able to know who your voters are and who's with you," he said. "I had a very good organization in every county and most of the precincts in order to help us with that effort."

Man Perfume


As a cattleman I hate to admit this but I like pigs. There, I've said it. So sue me. In fact, I like almost everything about

Republicans enjoy swath of victories on Election Day

AUSTIN - Republican candidates in the Nov. 2 election picked up 21 seats in the Texas House of Representatives and voters "rehired" incumbent Gov. Rick Perry for a third consecutive four-year term.

Perry outpaced former Houston Mayor Bill White, a Democrat, with a 13-point margin of victory, claiming 55 percent of the nearly 5 million ballots cast to White's 42 percent.

Now, the GOP claims 99 seats in the 150-seat Texas House to the Democrats' 51. No incumbent Republican House member lost their seat. Here is the list of incumbent Democrats who lost theirs to Republican challengers, as follows: Stephen Frost of New Bos-

ton, to George Lavender; Mark Homer of Paris, to Erwin Cain; Jim McReynolds of Lufkin, to James White; Solomon Ortiz Jr. of Corpus Christi, to Raul Torres; Abel Herrero of Robstown, to Connie Scott; Yvonne Gonzalez-Toureilles of Alice, to Jose Aliseda; Patrick Rose of Dripping Springs, to Jason Isaac; Valinda Bolton of Austin, to Paul Workman; Donna

Howard of Austin, to Dan Neil: Diana Maldonado of Round Rock, to Larry Gonzales; Jim Dunnam of Waco, to Marva Beck: Joe Moody of El Paso, to Dee Margo: Joe Heflin of Hale Center, to Jim Landtroop; Paula Pierson of Arlington, to Barbara Nash; Chris Turner of Arlington, to Bill Zedler; Robert Miklos of Mesquite, to Cindy Burkett; Carol Kent of Dallas, to Stephani Carter; Kirk England of Grand Prairie, to Rodney E. Anderson; Allen Vaught of Dallas, to Kenneth Sheets; David McQuade Leibowitz of San Antonio, to John V. Garza; Kristi Thibaut of Galveston, to Jim Murphy; and Ellen Cohen of Houston, to Sarah Davis.

In the 31-seat Texas Senate, the GOP's edge over Democrats in the Senate remains at 19-12. No incumbent lost to a challenger, and Democrat Jose R. Rodriguez of El Paso won the Senate District 29 race to succeed a retiring Democrat, Sen. Eliot Shapleigh.

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst,

Attorney General Greg Abbott, Comptroller of Public Accounts Susan Combs and Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson, Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples - all Republicans - were reelected. Each outdistanced their Democratic rivals by comfortable margins.

In State Board of Education races, Dist. 1 incumbent Democrat Rene Nunez lost to Republican Carlos "Charlie" Garza. Elected to other SBOE seats were Dist. 3 Democrat Michael Soto; Dist. 9 Republican Thomas Ratliff; Dist. 10 Republican Marsha Farney; and Dist. 11 Republican George M. Clayton.

In the U.S. Congressional District contests, Republican challengers unseated three Democratic incumbents: U.S. Rep. Chet Edwards, D-Waco, lost to Republican Bill Flores; U.S. Rep. Ciro Rodriguez, D-San Antonio, lost to Republican Francisco "Quico" Canseco; Solomon Ortiz, D-Corpus Christi, lost to Republican Blake Farenthold. Republican candidates also

enjoyed a sweep of the Texas Supreme Court and Courts of Criminal Appeals races.





roll it back. We need to make sure we keep more of our hard-earned dollars."

Born in Laredo, Canseco and his family moved to San Antonio in 2006. This race was the banker-attorney's third attempt at a congressional seat. In his previous two bids, he failed to win the Republican nomination both times.

In 2008, he spent nearly a million dollars of his own money but lost the Republican primary to then-County Commissioner Lyle Larson.

"I had never run in a General Election. The first time I ran (in 2004) I was a political novice," he said. "Even though I didn't win, I stayed very politically active. I jumped into the same race in 2008 and didn't make through the primary, but I did such a good job during that race, it raised some good attention."

Canseco built a solid early-voting lead in Bexar County, which makes up two-thirds of the district's electorate, with Rodriguez, 63, making a small dent in that margin as Election Day results rolled in. In Crockett County, Canseco won with 570 votes to Rodriguez's 300

Five months ago, Canseco campaign manager Scott Yeldell told campaign volunteers at the Texas Republican Convention that the District 23 race was "about taking the gavel out of (U.S. House Speaker) Nancy Pelosi's hand."

Republicans succeeded in that national effort on Nov. 3. The district, which has a 65 percent Latino population, is nearly evenly split between Democrats and Republicans.

"Anyone that does their job right, or does it correctly, there is a certain degree of nervousness that goes with that. This is not a gamble, if done systemically and correctly. If you've done all of that, you hope your methods pay off," Canseco said. "We are elated our efforts paid off and that things worked out well.'

Making reference on picking up three new state congressional seats, Canseco said "it's a new day for Texans and a great day for the U.S.A."

'Texas has the strongest Republican delegation going to Washington. We are going to fight for the state that is the example of how we should run the rest of our country," he said.

Rodriguez was seeking his seventh term on Capitol Hill, and his third representing District 23.

Many political experts believe Rodriguez lost the race in July when a video of the Congressman losing his temper at a San Antonio restaurant made its way across the Internet.

According to a San Antonio Express-News article, in early July, Rodriguez, dropped by a North Side restaurant for an informal get-together with his constituents. By his own admission, the San Antonio Democrat broke one of his cardinal rules for such gatherings by delivering a speech before allowing the audience to ask questions.

Rodriguez was attempting to defend his controversial vote in favor of healthcare-reform legislation when a woman urged him to "tell the truth." An angry Rodriguez confronted her, swatted his newspaper against a table and told her, "Don't accuse me of not saying the truth."

Within days, the video of the exchange went viral, and Rodriguez found himself ridiculed by Rush Limbaugh and

"That video was the death blow," said Colin Strother, an Austin-based Democratic consultant, in the Express-News article. "Losing his temper, acting out like that, you just can't do it. It cost him a lot of votes."

Rodriguez lost his temper in front of a Crockett County audience in November 2009 when he was asked about his voting record, specifically following Pelosi.

"I grew up on the south side of San Antonio and fought the political machine. I'm not anybody's little puppet. I don't care about the Washington Post. That has nothing to do with my character. I respond to the needs of the community. I do not agree on everything," Rodriguez said during that November meeting. "On the stimulus - that I feel strongly about. That money helped us out. You're not going to get out of this. If we collapse as a country, the whole world collaps-

"When people tell us 'no," we're not going to tell them that we know better than them and we're going to shove this down their throat," Canseco said to the Express-News. "We need to make sure that we're in contact with our constituents and listen to them.

> Rodriguez's 35-year political career has been marked by heartbreaking defeats and tenacious

comebacks. He failed in his first bids at school board and state legislative seats, and was bounced from Congress in 2004 when he lost the District 28 Democratic primary by 58 votes to challenger Henry Cuellar, after a recount overturned an apparent Rodriguez victory.

Rodriguez lost again to Cuellar in the 2006 primary, but months later he successfully challenged District 23 incumbent Henry Bonilla after a U.S. Supreme Court decision resulted in the redrawing of that district's map.

Rodriguez, who conceded the election on Nov. 4 in a phone call that Canseco described as "gracious," insists that he was simply a casualty of an unstoppable Republican tsunami.

The voters have spoken and chosen to elect a new leader to represent them in Congress. I respect their decision and wish Congressman-elect Canseco the best. I want to thank all my supporters, staff and volunteers who gave tirelessly to this campaign. We let our principles guide us and I have no regrets. I believe I worked hard with our constituents to leave this District better than we found it," Rodriguez said in a press release. "I delivered for the District, maintained an independent voting record and made myself available to all the constituents. Most of all, we helped men, women and families be heard and helped in very real ways. That is what government is about. And I am so proud to have been a part of that."

For his part, Rodriguez indicated that he's open to a future political run, if the state's redistricting effort next year creates a favorable district map for him.

"I'm either going to be supporting candidates or being a candidate myself," he said. "No one is going to retire me. I'll do that on my own."


The second half would start with a bang as the Li-

Station or certified prescribed burn manager.

All burns need to be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office and the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department prior to commencing.

The band also does not prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

Violation of the burn ban is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

"The grass is getting real quick to the point where it's high enough that it is hard to put out," Falkner said.

"The only thing I don't like about a burn ban is the liability and the attention, but it is dry and dangerous," added Commissioner Pleas Childress III.

The county hasn't been under a burn ban since June.

SHERIFF'S REPORT

Crockett County Sheriff Roy Glenn Sutton said the sheriff's office has received reports and has questioned individuals who claim to be selling electrical or energy packages door-to-door. These persons are asking for social security numbers.

Sutton asked the commissioners if anything can be done or put into place to help law enforcement be able to stop individuals like this.

"We've got to get some teeth in the system. They walk out of here they have a whole list of social security numbers. The sheriff's office was chastised for not taking these people into custody. We can't arrest anybody if we can't get a warrant for their arrest," Sutton said.

County Judge Fred Deaton said the commissioners would work with County Attorney Jody Upham to find out more information.

Sutton also suggested that the Animal Control Officer be placed under the sheriff's office when Road Superintendent Eddie Moore retires at the end of the year.

Sutton said the sheriff's office receives numerous calls for the Animal Control Officer, and then have to refer callers to the county road department.

"What we would like to see,

is to put the dog catcher under the sheriff's office so that only one phone call has to be made," Sutton said.

Nov. 8 marked the first day legislators could file bills in advance of the 82nd session of the Texas Legislature, which opens Jan. 11.


State Sen. Carlos, Uresti, D-San Antonio, filed bills Monday to ban texting while driving and another bill designed to help a West Texas space flight company protect itself from unjust lawsuits.

Senate Bill 115 would strengthen the legal waivers of liability signed by passengers who were made aware of the risks involved with sub-orbital space flight.

While the measure would apply to any commercial space flight company in Texas, Uresti hopes it will further the development of Blue Origin, which is developing a vertical take-off and landing vehicle at its space port in Van Horn.

Created by Amazon.com founder Jeff Bezos, Blue Origin is already one of the largest taxpayers in Culberson County.

The company hopes to begin sub-orbital journeys into space by 2012.



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

ORDER RESTRICTING **OUTDOOR BURNING**

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand.

This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code

352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

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
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
