Voters will choose new school board member

A new school board member will be elected in November.

After discussing the issue during the May 18 regular meeting, the Crockett County CCSD School Board voted 4-2 to hold an election to fill the vacant At Large board member position.

Board Vice President Grizz Medina and Board Member Roland De Hoyos voted against the motion.

Medina said she wanted to appoint to save the district the cost of an election.

Dr. Marcus Sims resigned in April. The board could either appoint a person to fill the position or hold an election. The person elected will fill the remainder of Sims' term, which is one year.

At their April regular meeting, board members were interested in knowing how much an election would cost.

Superintendent Chris duBois said election costs would run around \$2,500, and that the

Riding Lessons

People who have seen me ride aren't going to believe this but I've never had an equitation lesson in my life. I just climbed aboard one day and let my feet dangle over

One of the greatest pleasures of my life has been polishing my pants on a saddle attached to a horse. It was those horses who taught me to ride, not some riding academy teacher or professor at an exclusive private school for rich city kids back east. I'll admit, I've always felt inferior around the horsey set who ride flat saddles and jump fences.

They look impressive posting up and down like an oil well, but I've never managed to get on the right beat without bruising my backside. Besides, I look stupid in jodhpurs, crash helmet and tall boots. I mean, even more stupid than usual.

I started riding before I was one year old and I have a photo of me as a baby sitting astride my Grandpa's horse at a rodeo he produced that I'd share with you if not for the fact that it looks like I'm wearing what appears to be a dress.

My first teacher was a saddle sitting on a sawhorse in a room my Grandpa called his "bunkhouse." It was that bunkhouse saddle that taught me to keep my heels down and my back erect and I'm proud to say that I was never bucked off by that saw horse, even though there were some close calls when someone would open the door and a wind gust would test my mettle.

By burying my spurs in the cinch I man-

In high school I worked part-time on a ranch and the first day the manager

assigned me a horse and said that even though I didn't own him, he was mine and no one else could ride him. At the time I didn't know that he meant that literally. Since I'd never ridden before I guess he thought he should give me a horse that had never been ridden before either. I should have quit when he said the horse's name was Buck.

Buck was a horse who didn't like the sensation of anything on his back and the first thing he taught me was to never, ever, climb aboard a horse named Buck, Maneater or Grave Digger. It was Buck who taught me tricks folks back home are still talking about, such as riding under the horse, hanging on to his tail and riding backwards with both knees in the saddle. All at full

speed. Although I've never been able to recreate these tricks on other horses I have

The other thing Buck taught me was how to "grab the horn, hunt for leather, reach for the apple, sound the horn, squeeze the biscuit and shake hands with grandma." All euphemisms for using the saddle horn for what it was intended for. No, not roping, but for hanging on for dear life.

The last thing Buck taught me was that the secret to not being thrown off was to not get on in the first place.

Another teacher of mine was my horse Gentleman. Now, old timers will tell you to never buy a horse that is smarter than you, but I disagree for it was important for at least one of us to know what we were doing. Usually it was Gentleman who decided where we went. Although Gentleman was generally well behaved, he kept me honest and I never did forget how to get bucked off properly. After a day spent riding Gentleman my back ached from carrying him around on my spurs all day.

Although he was only slightly more effective than being afoot, and it took him two weeks to "spin" 360 degrees, I did teach some nieces, nephews and neighbors how to ride on Gentleman. Which reminds me of the story of the five year old little darling who, when asked why she was holding on so tightly to her father in front of her on the saddle she said, "So he won't fall off." Sometimes I need someone like that.

Budget close to passage in final week

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Actions taken by the state House and Senate point toward the possibility of completing a state budget on or before May 30, the final day of the session.

House Speaker Joe Straus and Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, who presides over the Senate, sent out press releases late in the week indicating negotiations were going well enough to pass a balanced budget that relies on historically deep cuts.

The House did pass a Senate "fiscal matters" bill — one just for public education but House members attached amendments to the bill. The Senate, in turn, refused to concur on those amendments. A conference committee of five House members and five Senate members has a shrinking window of time to come to an agreement on the final language. Another Senate fiscal matters bill, one that deals with budget areas other than public education, was scheduled for consideration in the House on May 23.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs on May 17 generated optimism about the state's financial health a few days before the Legislature entered the final week of the 140-day session without a finalized state

budget for 2012-2013. "I am raising the general revenue estimate for the next biennium by \$1.2 billion," Combs said, estimating that sales tax, oil and gas production tax and motor vehicle sales tax should bring in more revenue than trends indicated earlier.

Of the projected \$1.2 billion, the largest component is \$400 million in oil and gas production tax. Whatever the real number turns out to be for oil and gas production taxes, 75 percent of those are constitutionally reserved for deposit into the state's so-called "rainy day" fund.

Even though the budget is expected to total more than \$160 billion, the rainy day fund remains a bone of contention. Some Texans say it is "raining" now, so it is time to use most, if not all of the fund to shore up cut-back public education

and health care programs. And some Texans stand with Gov. Rick Perry, who said he would reject any plan that employs the fund in 2012-2013. House Bill 1 in its present form does

not use rainy day funds. Perry, now in his eleventh year as governor, recently has been mentioned as a possible presidential candidate in 2012. And although he's been shrugging off the idea while making speeches that seem national in scope, Perry's pressing task is to scrutinize the growing pile of passed legislation on his desk. He has until June 19 to sign, veto or let bills become law without his signature. Here are a few of the 180 bills the governor had signed as of May 20:


Knox awarded Hilderbran Scholar







Jim (Jimmie) was born

in McKinney, Texas on Aug. 25, 1930 to Jesse Thomas (Dough) Rollins and Katie Parralee (Patty) Hendrix Rollins. He graduated from Boyd High School, McKinney, Texas in 1948. He was active in Boy Scouts of America and Future Farmers of America. Following in the footsteps of and ten first cousins he attended the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas. Jim graduated with a B.A. in mathematics in 1952, was commissioned into the United States Army, and served in Korea. In 1954, he married Elaine Connally in Dallas, Texas. Jim served on the faculties of North Texas State College/University, Department of Mathematics, 1959-1961, and 1963-1966, and Florida State University, Department of Mathematics Education, 1966-1970. In 1970, Jim returned to his alma mater, Texas A&M University, as a founding faculty member of the Department of Education and Curriculum and Instruction. He held a dual appointment in the Department of Mathematics. Jim enjoyed supervising student teachers and guiding graduate students through their Masters and Doctoral programs. He served on the Library Council at Texas A&M. In 1992, he received an Outstanding Teacher Award from the College of Education, Texas A&M University. He was active in the National Council for Teachers of Mathematics



and Phi Delta Kappa. Jim retired to Estes Park, Colorado

in 1993. Jim had a lifelong love his father, six of his uncles, of music. He was a Singing Cadet at Texas A&M, acting as student director his senior year. While a student at A&M, he was the organist for A&M Methodist Church. He was the director of the choral club for Ozona High School, Ozona, Texas and the organist and choir director for Ozona Methodist Church, 1954-1957. He was the choir director for St. Thomas Episcopal Church, College Station, Texas, 1970-1983. Jim also served on the Music Commission for the Episcopal Diocese of Texas. He served as Dean for the American Guild of Organists. He sang in the Community Singers and the Brazos Valley Chorale, Bryan-College Station, Texas. Jim performed in community theatre in Estes Park and sang in the Estes Park Chorale.

Jim enjoyed many hobbies with his family, such as swimming, gardening, cooking, and traveling. 

vided both days.



Those bills may get the governor's signature, but there already are indications from certain Democratic lawmakers that redrawn maps that cut up communities of interest and disenable minority opportunity districts will be challenged in federal district court under the U.S. Voting Rights Act.

Of the redistricting bills, only the one that redraws State Board of Education districts was on the governor's desk as of May 22. That bill will take effect, without the governor's signature, on Aug. 29.

TAX HOLIDAY THIS WEEKEND

State sales tax holidays put a damper on the intake of state and local taxes, but strangely enough, they survived the Legislature's revenue hunting and budget writing process.

In fact, Texas' fourth annual "Energy Star" Sales Tax Holiday is May 28-30. "You can save water and energy by purchasing efficient, ENERGY STAR appliances," said Comptroller Combs. "And during the ENERGY STAR Sales Tax Holiday, you won't pay state or local sales taxes on your new appliances."

UNEMPLOYMENT **RATE DROPS**

The Texas Workforce Commission on May 20 reported Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased to 8.0 percent for April, down from 8.1 percent in March, and from 8.2 percent a year ago and Texas' total nonfarm employment was up by 32,900 jobs in April for a total gain of 254,400 jobs from a year ago.





CROCKETT COUNTY

ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/ or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand.

This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.
