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Fireworks will fly this Fourth of July

Commissioners approve restricted sales, public displays

Fireworks will be allowed this Fourth of July.

Unlike many of the counties in Texas, Crockett County Commissioners' Court voted to allow the sale of fireworks at fireworks stands. Commissioner Eligio Martinez voted against the motion.

Not all fireworks will be sold. The commissioners unanimously approved restricting aerial fireworks, such as bottle rockets, "skyrockets with sticks" and "missile's with fins.'

The State of Texas order states that no person may sell, detonate, ignite or in any way use these types of fireworks. It does not prohibit common fireworks, small in size.

Violation of the order is a Class C Misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

Firework sales have been banned throughout the state, including El Paso, Lubbock, Bexar, Tom Green, Midland, Ector, Winkler, Brewster, Howard and Upton because of the hot, dry and windy on July 3. An account has been escounties. Taylor and Harris County commissioners have given similar bans to Crockett County restrict-

ing the sales of aerial fireworks. According to the Austin American-Statesman, Austin's annual downtown July 4 fireworks display has been canceled because of drought, along with fireworks displays everywhere else in the county — including Pflugerville, Oak Hil and the Lake Travis area.

Bans on fireworks are due to the extreme drought conditions across the state.

"I feel we still live in a free country and this is the Fourth of July. I want the people to go out and have the freedom to set fireworks. I know it's dry and I know it's hard," said County Judge Fred Deaton.

All fireworks sales should be banned

ireworks on the Fourth of July are as American as apple pie. However, when

you live in a county that hasn't seen rain in months it would make sense to take additional precautions against anything that gives off a spark.

At Monday's regular meeting, the Crockett County Commissioners' Court approved by a 5-1 vote allowing the sale of fireworks in our county with restrictions on no sales of aerial fireworks, such as missiles with fins and skyrockets. Commissioner Eligio Marti-

nez voted against this issue. While this restriction has been applied before in our county, we were disappointed that Commissioners Randy Branch, Pleas Childress III and Frank Tambunga and County Judge Fred Deaton approved allowing sales of any type of fireworks this year.

In case it hasn't been obvious enough with the brown grass and constant blowing dust, our county is in a drought. In fact, nearly 50 percent of the state remains in what is termed an "exceptional" drought, which means a once-in-50-years occurrence, said Dr. John Nielsen-Gammon of College Station, Texas state climatologist, and the drought is severe elsewhere. Only parts of North Central and Northeast Texas are not at least abnormally dry as of May 31.

Setting off fireworks during this holiday is an American event. We all enjoy seeing the rockets' red glare. but wouldn't it be better to not have bombs bursting in air this year?

Our county has suffered through three major grass and brush fires this year. Temperatures seem to climb every day into triple-digit degrees with low humidity levels and gusting winds.

Common sense, though, should dictate that we take extraordinary care to protect ourselves - as well as our friends and neighbors - against the deadly consequences of a spark being carried away by the hot, dry

sale of objects where one festive spark and one gust of wind can call our local firefighters into action, again.

Now, we are not saying that we are against all fireworks. The Knights of Columbus hold a beautiful public display each year. Once again they are asking for donations for their show and we encourage everyone to contribute to their account at Ozona National Bank.

The Knights show is a different situation. They host their show in a controlled environment with the fire department on standby.

We can also emphasize fireworks safety and encourage those that plan on having fireworks to keep water nearby, but as fire officials will tell you common sense sometimes is hard to find among people who get caught up in the boisterous celebrations of the Fourth of July.

Area counties have banned the sale of fireworks due to our extremely dry conditions. We were hoping Crockett County would follow suit.

We do live in a free country and we should be allowed to demonstrate this love for our freedom, but we can do that without possibly causing harm that is not needed.

The commissioners still have time to meet again and change their decision.

If this partial ban remains, we want to encourage the citizens of Crockett County remember this Fourth of July, when celebrating it only takes one spark to ruin the fun.

Education, health care funding bills head toward passage

AUSTIN — Republican majorities in committees and in the full House and Senate pushed toward the governor's desk an assortment of high-stakes legislation in the first 10 days of the special session.

To smooth the way, House leaders used Senate bills as vehicles to carry the budgetrelated, Medicaid, congressional redistricting and public education finance issues Gov. Rick Perry ordered the 82nd Texas Legislature to address.

Senate Bill 1, the fiscal matters bill that controls the ebb and flow of funding in the 2012-2013 state budget, now moves back to the Senate with 96 House amendments.

One of those amendments, by Rep. Diane Patrick, R-Arlington, would put a two-year shelf life on the funding formula that resulted in \$4 billion in cuts to public schools across Texas under the new state budget.

Rep. Donna Howard, D-Austin, successfully attached an important "amendment to an amendment" to SB 2, the supplementary appropriations bill for education in the 2012**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS** By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

13 state budget.

Howard's amendment would take any revenue above the \$6.5 billion projected for the state's Rainy Day Fund in 2012-2013 and use it to fund enrollment growth in pre-kindergarten through grade 12. SB 2 now moves back to the Senate with 18 House amendments.

Another education-related bill, SB 8 by Sen. Florence Shapiro, R-Dallas, offers teacher furloughs and salary cuts as means to help school districts cope with losses of funding losses.

Passed by the Senate last week and now headed to the House for consideration, the bill would allow districts to give teachers unpaid leave on noninstructional days.

Shapiro said her bill also removes the current salary floor for teachers and does away with the "last-in-firstout" policy when terminating teachers. The bill, if passed in its current form, also will void the contract of any teacher who does not keep up to date with state certification requirements.

Medicaid, the second-biggest piece of the state budget pie behind public education, was addressed and tentatively approved last week by the House in the form of the omnibus health care bill, SB 7 by Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, and Rep. John Zerwas, R-Simonton.

SB 7 would amend current laws regulating administration, quality and efficiency of health care, health and human services and health benefits programs in Texas.

Among its objectives is the creation of health care compacts to function as a substitute for federally managed health care. The bill also removes a provision of law prohibiting the state Health and **Human Services Commission** from providing Medicaid using a health maintenance organization in Cameron County, Hidalgo County, or Maverick County.

REDISTRICTING BILL MOVES **AHEAD**

SB 4, legislation redrawing U.S

congressional districts, tentatively was passed by the Senate on June 6 and by the House on June 10.

The bill by Sen. Kel Seliger, R-Amarillo, and Rep. Burt Solomons, R-Carrollton, plots lines for Texas' 36 congressional districts, including the four added because of the state's 20 percent population growth as recorded in the 2010 U.S. Census. During this ceremony, as one of the 1,006 graduates, he was presented with a bachelor of science degree in mechanical engineering.



to problems with teenagers and young people coming down the road along their property drinking alcohol, setting campfires and vandalism that has been occurring, mainly at Live Oak Crossing.

"It's a dangerous situation," said John Meadows.

The property owned by the Meadows does not have any structures, but John Meadows said he is concerned about the woods on the property.

"These people are starting fires. These woods have been written about in history. They are a real treasure," Meadows said. "There's nothing we can do to stop them except catch them on sight."

Meadows said the family would build turn around areas at each end of the closed road and provide gates locked with combination locks. Oilfield companies and any other people with legitimate leases would not be denied access, he said.

Those in opposition of closing the road said it would not solve the problem of young people coming down to the area and partying.

Kenny Gage owns and lives on property near the area that was proposed for closing. He said the half mile stretch between his property and a closed road would lead to "chaos."

"That's a half a mile for these people to do the same thing on me. I don't want a half a mile of trouble," he

Gage, along with Sandy Brooks who lives on County Road 305 which is adjacent to 304, said that they already have trouble along their roads and the closing of this part of 304 would make it worse.

"People get mad when they get to a locked gate. There is a lot of oilfield in there and deer hunters. This is something you have to think about," Gage said. "If you don't live on a place and don't have somebody living on it, then forget about it. Rules are no good if there is nobody to enforce them. This is a law enforcement issue."

John L. Henderson questioned the importance of public access for emergency use, especially if there was an accident on nearby Lancaster Hill.

"It's called public access and sometimes we need public access," Henderson said.

Chris Elliott, with Fort Lancaster, said the fort's safety and security and the safety and security of his family living at the fort were his concerns.

"We know this goes on. We have found our stuff at the (Live Oak) Crossing. It's a destination," Elliott said.

Historically in commissioners' court, if anyone has opposed closing a road, the commissioners haven't closed it because it serves a public purpose, Deaton said.

While the commissioners took no action on the road, they did suggest having new fences and lane the whole road, as well as putting proper water gaps, braces and pipes at the Live Oak Crossing location. Deaton said the county typically has provided fencing materials and supplies if the landowners were willing to

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do the labor.

"This is more a problem of a law enforcement situation. If you fence the area and they cross the fence line then it is trespassing," said Commissioner Pleas Childress III. "If we close this road, this is setting a very dangerous precedence for our county road system. The county roads are for a purpose. Let's do some other things.

Commissioners Frank Tambunga and Randy Branch also agreed with Childress in keeping the road open.

"I would like to see an alternative method instead of shutting it down. It's a lot harder to reopen the road if it is shutdown. We've already relocated two roads in my precinct and it cost a lot of money. I understand your problems, but let's go with an alternative plan, try it out and see what happens," Tambunga said.

Martinez said he was concerned about having a big fire out there and if somebody gets hurt.

"I see their side of it. I'm in their (the Meadows) favor," Martinez said.

Deaton also said the sheriff's office and the commissioners' court would be put on notice. The item will also be placed on the July 11 commissioners' court agenda for more discussion and further action.



FSA County Committee nominations start today

Reagan, Upton, Irion and Crockett County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Jed Hruska, announced that county committee election nominations begin today, June 15.

Farmers, ranchers and landowners are encouraged to nominate farmer and rancher candidates to serve on their local FSA county committee by the Aug. 1 deadline.

Elected county committee members serve a threeyear term and are responsible for making decisions on FSA disaster, conservation, commodity, and price support programs, as well as other important federal farm program issues.

"County committee members are a valuable asset because they are local producers who participate in FSA programs themselves and have a direct connection to farmers and ranchers in the community," Hruska said. "I would like to see a high level of participation in this year's nomination and election process.

Producers may nominate themselves or others candidates. Organizations that represent minority and women farmers and ranchers may also nominate candidates. Nominees must

participate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area (LAA) in which the person is a candidate.

To become a nominee, eligible individuals must sign form FSA-669A. The form and more information about county committee elections are available online at: www. fsa.usda.gov/elections.

"It is important that the county committee reflects the demographics and agricultural interests of the community these individuals represent," Hruska said. "I strongly encourage all producers, including women, minority and beginning farmers and ranchers to participate in the nomination and election process."

County committees are comprised of three to five members elected by local producers.

All newly elected county committee members and alternates will take office Jan. 2. 2012.

Nomination forms must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Aug. 1.



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CROCKETT COUNTY

ORDER RESTRICTING **OUTDOOR BURNING**

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand.

This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine

not to exceed \$500.


