# **Commissioners stay** with effective tax rate

The Crockett County Commissioners have decided to stay with the effective tax rate.

At Monday's regular meeting, the commissioners unanimously approved that they will use the effective tax rate for 2011 property taxes. Last year's tax rate was .45852 cents per \$100 evaluation.

The new tax rate will be .52983 per \$100 evaluation. The effective tax rate is a calculated rate that would provide the same amount of revenue from the previous year.

The effective tax rate is higher this year due to a 12.4 decrease in property values.

If property values rise, the effective tax rate will go down, said Rhonda Shaw, county tax-assessor collector.

However, the overall tax rate may be lower due to Crockett County CCSD having paid off their bond with Ozona Elementary School. The overall rate presented is people work for our county \$1.58090, which is \$0.14917 less than last year. CCCCSD held their first budget workshop Tuesday, Aug. 9. They are proposing a tax rate of \$1.04 per \$100 evaluation. "The budget we've created that we have before us is to stay with the effective tax rate. With this approval

we can't go above that rate," said County Judge Fred Deaton.

The commissioners held another budget workshop during Monday's meeting.

During that workshop, 112th District Attorney Laurie English explained, per a request from the commissioners, how her overall budget is spread among five counties in her district and that no increases in salaries have been made to her staff.

She did ask the commissioners to consider her staff if they give a raise to county employees, since they do work in Crockett County. English said each county makes its own decision as to salary increases for the district employees.

"The bottom line in my budget did not change for any county," she said. "The redistribution is different among the counties."

English said her entire budget from all five counties is available to the public, just like the county's budget.





# It's official: Texas drought the worst ever



As Texas continues to bake in record heat, the drought news for the state continues to be bleak - Texas is now in the midst of its most severe one-year drought on record, according to John Nielsen-Gammon, the Texas State Climatologist and professor of atmospheric sciences at Texas A&M University.

Preliminary reports from the National Climatic Data Center indicate that July 2011 was the warmest month ever recorded statewide for Texas, with data going back to 1895, Nielsen-Gammon reports.

The average temperature of 87.2 degrees broke the previous record of 86.5 degrees set in 1998. The June average temperature of 85.2 was a record for that month and now ranks fifth warmest overall.

Rainfall totals were also unusually light across the state. The July monthly total of 0.72 inches ranks third

driest, surpassed by the driest consecutive 8, 9 and 0.69 inches recorded in both 1980 and 2000. This is the fifth consecutive month in which precipitation totals were among the 10 driest for that month, says the Texas A&M professor.

Among the other rainfall records set this month: least year-to-date precipitation (6.53 inches; historical average 16.03 inches; previous record 9.36 inches in 1917);

10 months on record (7.25 inches 8.35 inches, and 9.17 inches respectively); and driest 12 months ending in July (15.16 inches, previous record 16.46 inches in 1925).

"These statistics rank the current drought as the most severe one-year drought ever for Texas," Nielsen-Gammon explains. "Never before has

That added line in this simple child's prayer is not meant to be funny. Each day is doesn't rain, each day the temperatures climb above 100-degrees and each day we all continue to pray.

Last week, Texas State Climatologist John Nielsen-Gammon made it official: "Texas is now in the midst of its most severe one-year drought on record."

Preliminary reports from the National Climatic Data Center indicate that July 2011 was the warmest month ever recorded statewide for Texas, with data going back to 1895. This is the fifth consecutive month in which precipitation totals were among the 10 driest for that month.

I am not a fan of Western books or movies, forgive me if you are, but my mind has been drifting to Elmer Kelton's book "The Time It Never Rained."

"Just another dry spell men said at first. Ranchers watched waterholes recede to brown puddles of mud

The Census Bureau reported 7.7 million Texans in 1950. According to the 2010 population count, 25.8 million people now call Texas home.

Obviously, there is much more demand for the Texas water supply today than there was then so the competition for that crucial resource is intense even though the reservoirs built in the 1950s expanded the supply. Expanded the supply that is, assuming it rains.

The U.S. Climate Prediction Center said last week that the La Nina weather phenomenon blamed for the crippling lack of rain might be back soon, just two months after the last La Nina ended. If that happens,



Meals are never catered and the only prepared foods you're allowed to bring from home are marshmallows, Graham Crackers, chocolate and wieners. You hunt and fish for your food and if you fail in your quest, you tighten your belt a notch or two. And there's no cheating: no scopes for your guns or fish finders on your boat. You'll fish from the shore like the rest of us. If you don't have to hide your food from bears you are not camping. You big sissy

Recently I saw in the Cabelas catalog (the Bible for campers), an entire section of "camp furniture." I love Cabelas but shame on them! Chaise lounges, rockers, zero gravity chairs, fold-up kitchens, and showers are not allowed on a real camping trip. that their livestock would not touch. They watched the rank weeds shrivel as the west wind relentlessly sought them out and smothered them with its hot breath. ...

"Men grumbled, but you learned to live with the dry spells if you stayed in West Texas; there were more dry spells than wet ones. No one expected another drouth like that of '33. And the really big dries like 1918 came once in a lifetime.

"Why worry? they said. It would rain this fall. It always had.

"But it didn't. And many a boy would become a man before the land was green again."

The prologue of Kelton's book is becoming all too real. I look out my living room window at the ranch and I see dirt where grass is suppose to me. I see a group of goats crowding under a skinny tree with sparse leaves the same color as the dirt on the ground.

In the town of Robert Lee, near San Angelo, about 1,000 people are worried that Lake E.V. Spence could dry up by winter and leave the town without any water. The Llano River is trickling at a rate about 95 percent slower than normal. The city of Llano already has contacted bottled water distributors about supplying residents with bottles for cooking and drinking if the river flow stops entirely,

the drought would almost certainly extend into 2012. Statewide demand for pow-

er was expected to approach the maximum last week for a fourth straight day. Some large industrial plants were forced off the overburdened electric grid, requiring them to shut down or rely on their own power reserves.

Life in Ozona and Crockett County continues, but ask ranchers and they have less livestock. Talk to the people with water wells and they are nervous.

Survivors of the 1950s drought will tell you stories of elementary schoolage children crying at the sound of thunder and sight of rain because they had never heard or seen either one. They tell of families using the same tub of water for the Saturday night bath. The cleanest one went first. We haven't reached that point yet, but this drought poses some serious concerns.

Watch when you water the yard, fill that washing machine with clothes and hit the cold cycle and fix those leaks.

Whether this drought is worse than the one that devastated Texas in the 1950s is really beside the point.

This is the one we're living with, and like a freeloading relative, it isn't in any hurry to leave.

## **Record-setting heat, lack of rain prompt actions**

AUSTIN — Texas is suffering through the most severe one-year drought on record and experienced the hottest July in state history, Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples announced on Aug. 4.

Drought-caused damage to the Texas economy "is already measured in billions of dollars and continues to mount," Staples said.

"I cannot stress enough the critical need for forage to sustain the largest cattle herd in the nation. The suffering and desperate need for relief grows with the rising temperatures and record-breaking heat that continue to scorch Texas with each passing day.'

The commissioner's words came after Texas A&M-based State Climatologist Dr. John Nielsen-Gammon confirmed Texas was in a worst-on-record drought situation. The state began to collect weather information in the 1890s. To those who remember the drought of 1950-57, this one is "shorter and sharper" Nielsen-Gammon said.

To help with cattle feeding, Gov. Rick Perry extended a

hay transportation waiver at Staples' request to Sept. 1 with the possibility of further extensions every 30 days as long as the drought continues.

With weeks of daily high temperatures topping 100 degrees, Texans have been using unusually elevated levels of electricity to cool their homes and businesses. Extreme temperatures resulting in extraordinary power usage prompted the Public Utility Commission, power gridmanaging entity ERCOT and the governor, who said himself there is no relief in sight, to ask citizens to switch off unnecessary appliances and turn up air conditioning settings in order to avoid rolling blackouts.

Furthermore, the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality has in the works new rules that may allow the agency's executive director to suspend or adjust water rights during times of drought or emergency water shortages.

An Aug. 11 hearing at TCEQ headquarters in Austin was scheduled to include public

input in advance of rulemaking on drought procedures and to define "drought" and "emergency shortage of water."

### PERRY TAKES PART **IN 'RESPONSE'**

More than 30,000 people attended The Response, a Christian prayer meeting initiated, promoted and led by Gov. Perry and evangelical groups in Houston on Aug. 6.

Also, more than 80,000 web viewers watched the daylong event from their homes, organizers said.

Billed as an opportunity to pray publicly "for a historic breakthrough for our country and a renewed sense of moral purpose," the event was held at 75,000-seat Reliant Stadium.

In Houston and Austin, small groups of protesters criticized the governor's official connection and personal participation in The Response.


The Response was monitored by political commentators, some of whom expressed the notion that the event might be

seen as an indicator or serve as a trigger for the governor's pending decision over whether to run for the presidency in 2012.

# Texas fireflies doing a disappearing act

They're called fireflies, lightning bugs, glowworms and other names, but one thing they are not called in recent years is plentiful.

You can still find the flashy bugs in many areas of the country, but in Texas you might have to do some serious searching, say two Texas A&M University researchers.

Entomologists Ed Riley and Bart Drees say the past few years have dimmed the lights of the flashy insects, once seen almost nightly throughout the state during spring and summer months.

"There's no doubt the severe drought the past few years has affected them," confirms Drees, who is a Texas AgriLife Extension Service entomologist. "The lack of water has to be one big reason why you don't see as many as in years past, but there are probably other reasons, too.'

"Most insects need a certain level of moisture in their environment, so the drought can play a big role in their numbers," adds Riley, a curator for the entomology department with a joint appointment with Texas AgriLife Research. "But another likely reason is urbanization - most insects need natural settings in which to live such as woods, meadows and creeks. In places where you have a lot of homes and concrete, you will find fewer insects, and lightning bugs certainly fall into that category."

Both experts say there has been very little research over the past decade to determine why there appears to be fewer fireflies, which are technically members of a family of beetles and not abilities. But too many children today are stuck with an empty jar.

"Some theories are that fire ants are partly to blame because they can destroy them (lightning bugs) in the early development stages," says Drees. "As to whether pesticides are to blame, it may be possible but there is no definite proof. There are just not that many scientific studies to look at to come to one definitive answer."

Residents of East Texas probably have a better chance of seeing them, as do persons who live in the Midwest, South and Northeast United States, where fireflies remain in abundant numbers.

There's no doubt they are interesting bugs.

Fireflies produce a chemical reaction inside their bodies that allows them to light up. This type of light production is called bioluminescence.

The flashing — both males and females light up — is a huge neon sign to other fireflies that it is time to mate.

But some species use the flash for a more sinister reason — dinner time.

"There are some species of the flashing beetle that flash to attract others so they can eat them," Riley notes.

So some fireflies aren't sure if it is time for romance or time to be lunch, and the bugs don't have much time for either, since they live as adults 7-14 days at the most, the experts explain.

"I have lived in this area for almost 25 years, and I have never seen very many of them in town," Riley adds. "It's a question that seems to come up very frequently, but there seems to be no real answer."







#### LIVESTOCK FACILITIES BOARD

Establishing a Livestock Facilities Board was put on hold after discussion with employees of the Crockett County Extension Office.

The commissioners discussed overseeing the livestock and horse barns with Chase McPhaul, agriculture extension agent, Andie Richardson, extension office assistant, and Susie Bishop, family-consumer sciences agent.

Discussion about establishing a board has been made during the last two regular meetings. The main issue is enforcement of the rules, especially in the horse barn.

"Chase (McPhaul) is going to be there and oversee all of that stuff. I think he could keep us informed with a monthly report," said Commissioner Pleas Childress III. "Let's just postpone this for a little while."

At the extension office, the livestock barns for sheep, goats and swine are primarily for 4-H students and their projects. However, the horse barn facility is open to the public.

Bishop said horses being up to date on their coggins requirements have been a problem. The Texas Animal Health Commission requires horse owners to be up to date on their coggins testing.

# Sales Tax Holiday Aug. 19-21

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs says Texas families have a big opportunity to save money when they shop. The state's annual Sales Tax Holiday is scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 19-21.

"On that weekend, shoppers will pay no state or local sales tax on many school supplies, school backpacks and most children's and adults' clothing and shoes priced at less than \$100," Combs said. "The tax break helps out when the kids' back-to-school lists are long and money is short."


This year, Combs predicts shoppers will save \$62.1 million in state and local sales taxes during the Sales Tax Holiday.

The tax holiday weekend has been an annual event since 1999. Currently, the Tax Code sets the holiday for the third Friday, Saturday and Sunday in August.



#### Dear Parent Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. Crockett County Consolidated Common School District offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs: \$.90, lunch costs \$1.85. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced-price meals. Reduced price is \$.30 for breakfast and \$.40 for lunch.

1. Do I need to fill out an application for each child? No. Complete one application to apply for free or reduced-price meals. <u>Use one Free and Reduced-Price School Meals Application for all students in your household.</u> We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. **RETURN THE COMPLETED APPLICATION TO: Crockett County CCSD, Ludy Vargas, PO Box 400, Ozona Texas 76943; 325-392-5501 ext. 5708.** 

2. **Who can get free meals?** Children in households receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits (formerly the Food Stamp Program) or TANF can get free meals regardless of your income. Your benefit letter from the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) is your documentation for free meals. If you have not already received a letter from your school stating that your household is eligible for free meals, you may take your HHSC benefit letter to your child nutrition office to be certified for free meals. Call the school at **325-392-5708** if you have questions.

3. Should I fill out an application if I got a letter this school year saying my children are approved for free or reduced-price meals? In most cases no, however read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at **325-392-5708** if you have questions. If your household does not receive SNAP or TANF, your children may still be eligible to receive free meals if your household income is less than the amounts listed on the federal Income Eligibility Guidelines. Please complete the application and submit it to your child nutrition office. Head Start students and most foster children may also qualify for free meals.

4. Can homeless, runaway and migrant children get free meals? Yes. If you have not been notified of free status under these categories, please call **Crockett County CCSD**, Maria Perez to see if your

child(ren) qualify.

5. Who can get reduced price meals? Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reduced-price limits on the Federal Income Chart, included in the application packet.
6. I get WIC. Can my child(ren) get free meals? Children in households participating in WIC may be

eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Please fill out the application.

7. Will the information I give be checked? Yes, we may ask you to send written proof.
 8. If I don't qualify now, may I apply later? Yes. You may apply at any time during the school year if your household size goes up, income goes down, or if you start getting SNAP, TANF or other benefits.

9. What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application? You should talk to school officials. You may also ask for a hearing by call or writing to: Chris duBois, PO Box 400, Ozona, Texas 76943; 325-392-5501.

10. **May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen?** Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be a U.S. citizen to qualify for free or reduced-price meals.

11. Who should I include as members of my household? You must include yourself and all people living in your household, related or not (such as children, grandparents, other relatives or friends).

12. What if my income is not always the same? List the amount you normally receive. For example, if you normally get \$1,000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only got \$900, put down that you get \$1,000 per month. so little rain been recorded prior to and during the primary growing season for crops, plants and warm-season grasses."


Texas would need more than 4.5 inches of rain in the next two months to avoid breaking the 1956 record for driest 12 consecutive months, he adds.

"Dr. Nielsen-Gammon's work confirms the harsh realities," Texas Agriculture **Commissioner Todd Staples** said. "The extreme heat and unprecedented dry weather are crippling agricultural operations in Texas upon which all Americans rely for food, fuel, clothing and other daily necessities. This historic drought has depleted water resources, leaving our state's farmers and ranchers in a state of dire need. The damage to our economy is already measured in billions of dollars and continues to mount."

Recent rains have brought some relief from drought conditions in extreme west Texas, extreme south Texas and extreme southeast Texas. However, in the interior of the state, conditions remain dire, Nielsen-Gammon said.

"The climate division that covers west-central Texas has received only 3.32 inches of rainfall since Nov.1," said Nielsen-Gammon. "That's less than 21 percent of the historical average and less than half of the previous record, set in 1956. Add in the record heat, and it's just devastating."

Nielsen-Gammon notes that the most severe Texas drought overall is still the



1950-1957 drought. During the most intense year of that drought – 1956– Texas set its all-time record for lowest 12-month precipitation, 13.69 inches ending in September.

"But in 1956, much of the rain fell in the spring when crops were being established," he says. "The current 12-month total (from 2010 to 2011) is dominated by rain that fell early last fall, and the ground had already dried out in many parts of the state by planting time."

Because the 1950-1957 drought lasted longer, it had a substantial impact on water supplies across the state, and most water supplies are now designed to withstand a similar drought, the Texas A&M professor explains.

"The present drought is shorter but sharper," Nielsen-Gammon adds. "So far, its impacts have been disproportionately felt in agriculture, but many water suppliers throughout the state have now imposed water restrictions.

"The outlook is not entirely grim," he reports. "Late August and September bring increased chances of widespread rain from tropical disturbances, as well as the occasional cold front. Some computer models predict a return to La Niña conditions this winter, which would imply continued dry weather, but most predict neutral conditions in the tropical Pacific and the possible return of normal weather patterns.'

# Perry urges Texans to conserve energy as high temperatures persist

AUSTIN – Gov. Rick Perry last week made the following statement regarding the need to conserve energy as the state continues to experience record high temperatures:

"Because of the extreme heat that has created an unprecedented demand on the state's energy grid, and with no relief in sight, all Texas residents and businesses are being asked to conserve electricity," Gov. Perry said. "We are thankful to all state agencies, businesses and residents who have taken steps to reduce the demand on our energy grid during these extreme weather conditions. Our supply is strong, but not unlimited, and I urge everyone to continue conserving energy over the weekend and next week, especially during the peak hours of 3 to 7 p.m., to help minimize the risk of outages."

The Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT) and the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) have issued the following conservation tips for customers:

•Turn off all unnecessary lights, appliances and electronic equipment.

•When at home, close blinds and drapes on windows that get direct sun, set thermostats to 78 degrees or higher, and use fans in occupied rooms to feel cooler. •When away from home, set thermostats to 85 degrees, turn off all fans, and close blinds or drapes on windows that will get direct sun.

•Do not use your dishwasher, laundry equipment, hair dryers, coffee makers or other home appliances during the peak hours of 3-7 p.m.

•Avoid opening refrigerators or freezers more than necessary.

•Use microwaves for

cooking instead of an electric range or oven.

 $\cdot$  Set your pool pump to run in the early morning or evening instead of the afternoon.



including nursing, education and information technology are offered, the governor's office announced.

Self-sustaining WGU-Texas does not collect money from the state. Tuition reportedly costs about \$5,780 per 12-month vear. Visit http://texas.wgu. edu/ for more information.

The first paragraph of Gov. Perry's Aug. 3 executive order establishing WGU-Texas says, "although enrollment in all Texas institutions of higher education has increased 47 percent since 2000, there is still a significant need to provide adult learners with greater access to opportunities to obtain higher education degrees."

## **AYP REPORT IS RELEASED**

Some 5,597 Texas schools met the Adequate Yearly Progress standards for the federal school rating system this year, the Texas Education Agency announced. This represents 66 percent of all Texas campuses.

Schools and districts must have 80 percent or more of their students in grades 3-8 and 10 pass the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills reading or English language arts test and 75 percent must pass the TAKS mathematics test to meet AYP standards.

They also must achieve a 90 percent attendance rate or a 75 percent graduation rate, depending on the grade levels they serve.

Under the federal No Child Left Behind law, the standards must reach 100 percent passing on both reading and mathematics assessments by 2014 which requires a substantial increase in ratings standards each year in order to meet this requirement, the state education agency noted.
