Early voting begins Monday in school board, **Texas Constitutional Amendment Election**

THE OZONA STOCKMAN

Crockett County voters will go to the polls staring Monday to cast their ballots on 10 Texas Constitutional Amendments and for the At Large position of the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District School Board Race.

Early voting starts Monday, Oct. 24, and runs through Nov. 4 from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. at the courthouse annex. Voters will be given two ballots, one for the constitutional amendments and one for the school board race.

The last day to apply for a ballot is Nov. 1.

Election Day is Nov. 8. Voting on the amendments and the school board race will take place at the designated precinct polling places that day. The polls will be open from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. on Nov. 8.

Once again, voters will have two ballots. One will be for the amendments and the other will be for the school board race.

In the school board, two men are vying for the At Large seat. They are local attorney Orlando De Hoyos and rancher and former school employee David McWilliams.

The following is are explanatory statements on the 10 constitutional amendments from Vote-Texas.org.

VOTING DATES:

Early Voting - Oct. 24 to Nov. 4 at the courthouse annex for constitutional amendments and school board.

Last Day to Apply for Ballot by Mail - Nov. 1, contact the Crockett County Clerk's Office at (325) 392-2022.

Election Day - Nov. 8, Precinct 1 voting at the Crockett County Courthouse; Precinct 2 voting at the Senior Center; Precinct 3 voting at the Civic Center and Precinct 4 voting at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce. Voters will vote on constitutional amendments and school board.

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1 (SJR 14)

SJR 14 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran with an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the surviving spouse's residence homestead as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried, the property was the residence homestead of the surviving spouse when the qualifying veteran died, and the property remains the residence homestead of the surviving spouse.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence

homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2 (SJR 4)

SJR 4 would amend the constitution to authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue additional general obligation bonds on a continuing basis for one or more accounts of the Texas Water Development Fund II, with the restriction that the total amount of bonds outstanding at any time does not exceed \$6 billion.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$6 billion at any time outstanding."

NUMBER 3 (SJR 50)

SJR 50 would amend the constitution to authorize the Texas Higher **Education Coordinating** Board or its successors to issue and sell general obligation bonds on a continuing basis for the purpose of financing educational loans for students, subject to certain constitutional restrictions, including a restriction as to the maximum principal amount of bonds outstanding at any one time.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas to finance educational loans to students."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 4 (HJR 63)

HJR 63 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to permit a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area within the county, and to pledge increases in ad valorem tax revenues imposed on property in the area by the county for

"We had several opportunities to put the game away in the last three minutes, both offensively and defensively, and we just didn't make the plays. I thought we might have gained the momentum in overtime when we scored on the first play, but we just couldn't find a way to stop their running game," said Coach Ray Brown.

The Eagles came into the game with a powerful running game led by Robert Young who carried the ball 40 times for 228 yards and two touchdowns, including

Con Job baby of the family, and

I've always been impressed by diversified ag operations, where one brother is the farmer in the family, another is the rancher and the third sibling, usually the youngest, is in charge of the shop. (If there is a fourth sibling that person either runs the trucks, or is a lawyer in town.) More and more I'm finding families where one of the siblings involved is a daughter, and invariably she is the one in charge of the cows. Such family farm and ranch operations fascinate me and are the backbone of the most productive agricultural machine the world has ever known.

I've written about countless such operations in my career and you are probably familiar with, or are in involved with one yourself. I've always wondered though, how did it work out that each sibling gravitated to one specialty such as the crops or the cows? Did they vote or fight on if they got to wrangle cattle or socket wrenches, or could it possibly be that all the siblings were happy and doing what they most

As a middle child, my preconception was that these decisions were made for the siblings based on the centuries old concept of "primogeniture." This is the right, by law or custom, of the firstborn son to inherit the entire estate, to the exclusion of his siblings. Again, being a middle child, I figured the first born son got to pick first on whether he wanted to manage the farm, the cows or the shop. I also figured that the

always the most spoiled, got to pick second. As usual, the middle child got what was left over, or handed down. What a terrible thing

it would be in life if you loved cattle but hated to drive tractor, but because your brother was born first, you had to plant spuds while he got to play cowboy. Or, if you loved the feel of a wrench in your hands but

couldn't find the handle on a rope, but were forced to be a rancher instead of a wrencher.

I decided to get to the bottom of this phenomenon one time in Texas when I was interviewing just such a family. Imagine my surprise when all three brothers said they were doing exactly what they wanted, made the decision for themselves and wouldn't think of trading jobs! I wondered, how could this be? Surely it couldn't have been a coincidence. I decided to probe the dynamics of this impressive clan.

The oldest brother said, "Daddy always took me to farm shows with him and he was teaching me how to drive a tractor before I could walk. For Christmas I got pedal tractors, lace-up boots, a CAT hat and a set of bib overalls. I remember daddy say-

ing, "I'm counting on you to run the farm because your brothers couldn't grow a radish, and wouldn't know an International Harvester from a hackamore."

The middle child laughed and said, "Daddy always took me with him to bull sales and he put a rope in my hands instead of a rattle. I got a pony for Christmas when I was five and always got a piece of tack or cowboy boots for Christmas. Daddy always told me, "I'm counting on you to run the cattle because your other brothers don't know a cow from a cultivator, and couldn't stay on a horse in a stiff breeze."

The third son chuckled and said, "Daddy was always giving me stuff to fix, from a toaster to a transmission. I got an Erector set when I was four and a tool from Sears every Christmas. He told me, "Your brothers wouldn't know a grease gun from a shotgun and so I'm counting on you to run the shop when I retire."

Rather than a coincidence, it was clear that each son had been programmed since birth to assume the role each would eventually play. But I wondered, what role had the mother played? Was she just an innocent bystander, or was she in on the con job? To a brother they all said that their mother told each one of them the exact same thing: "You know I'm counting on you to run the (farm, cattle or shop as the case may be) because your father doesn't know anything about it.'

Ag chief testifies before Homeland Security panel

AUSTIN --- Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples testified on border security issues before the U.S. House Homeland Security Oversight and Investigations Subcommittee in Washington, D.C., on Oct. 14.

"Texas farmers and ranchers along the U.S.-Mexico border are regularly becoming victims of intimidation, aggression and outright violence by armed trespassers who often have direct ties to Mexico's drug cartels,"

Staples testified, and cited these examples:

- On Feb. 18, two energy company employees assaulted and robbed in rural Webb County;

- On March 11, ranch foreman injured from shots fired by suspected drug cartel members in rural Webb County;

- On June 9, Texas Department of Public Safety officers and game wardens shot at by drug traffickers in rural Hidalgo County;

- On June 19, U.S. Border Patrol officers shot at by drug traffickers in an area that has seen repeated shootings aimed at U.S. law enforcement in Hidalgo County;

- On July 14, shots fired at water district workers in rural Hidalgo County; and

- On Sept. 27, shots fired killing at least one individual on Hidalgo County highway.

Staples also presented "Texas Border Security: A Strategic Military Assessment," chronicling the impacts of Mexican drug cartels and transnational criminal organizations on Texas and its citizens. The 59-page report (not including attachments) dated Sept. 26 offers solutions to addressing cartels' increasingly violent tactics.

Staples, in his cover letter, states, "This report is the culmination of many efforts that started with rural farmers and ranchers bringing pleas for a secure border to me."

The publication suggests the need for more cooperation between federal and state agencies, increased federal funding and the adoption of militarystyle tactics.

> **DPS WEIGHS IN** ON CARTEL ISSUE

Also on Oct. 14, the Texas Department of Public Safety disseminated a release stating that cartels have been recruiting Texas school children to be used in criminal activities such as drug, human, currency and weapon smuggling.

Parents should talk to their children and explain how these cartels seek to exploit Texas teenagers and the risks in dealing with these organizations, especially those parents who live along the Texas/Mexico border, the DPS suggests.

"The Mexican cartels value Texas teenagers for their ability to serve as expendable labor in many different roles and they have unlimited resources to recruit our children," said DPS Director Steve McCraw.


MOST BURN BANS STILL ACTIVE

Long overdue rains resulted in the recent lifting of burn bans in some of Texas' 254 counties.

However, a Texas Forest Service map dated Oct. 16 shows

230 counties where burn bans are still in effect.

More than 600 wildfires charring 39,602 acres were caused by debris burning, which is the number one cause of wildfires in the state according to the Texas Forest Service.


Donald Lowell McCaleb

Most Texas Farm Service Agency loans require current livestock brand registration

James B. Douglass Acting Texas State Executive Director for the USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds ranchers that the 10-year livestock brand reregistration deadline In Texas is approaching.

Livestock brand re-registration started on Aug. 30, 2011 and ends Feb. 29, 2012.

All livestock producers who have a brand recorded in the county clerk's office must re-register their brand in the county in which the livestock are located.

In order for the brand

to remain valid.

After the re-registration period is over, any previously recorded brands that were not re-registered will expire and become available to the public.

Producers who obtain FSA direct or guaranteed loans and pledge their cattle as collateral are typically required to have a registered brand that is recorded with the county

This condition must be met as long as the loan is outstanding.

"It is the producer's re-

sponsibility and a condition of most livestock operation loans to have your livestock brand recorded," said Douglass. "Questions regarding a livestock producer's specific FSA loan conditions should be directed to their local FSA farm loan manager," he said.



repayment of such bonds or notes. The amendment does not provide independent authority for increasing ad valorem tax rates.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area and to pledge for repayment of the bonds or notes increases in ad valorem taxes imposed by the county on property in the area. The amendment does not provide authority for increasing ad valorem tax rates."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 5 (SJR 26)

SJR 26 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow cities and counties to enter into interlocal contracts with other cities and counties without having to assess an ad valorem tax and set aside a specified amount of funds for the payment of costs under the interlocal contract.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to allow cities or counties to enter into interlocal contracts with other cities or counties without the imposition of a tax or the provision of a sinking fund."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 6 (HJR 109)

HJR 109 would amend the constitution to increase the amount of principal that is available for withdrawal from the permanent school fund each year and would also clarify certain references to that fund in the constitution. Increased access to the principal of the state public education trust fund would be based upon HJR 109 granting the authority to consider alternative market calculations when determining the amount of principal that is available for distribution to the available school fund. HJR 109 would also provide authority to distribute to the available school fund annual revenue from school fund land or other properties up to \$300 million per year.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment clarifying references to the permanent school fund, allowing the General Land Office to distribute revenue from permanent school fund land or other properties to the available school fund to provide additional funding for public education, and providing for an increase in the market value of the permanent school fund for the purpose of allowing increased distributions from the available school fund."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 7 (SJR 28)

SJR 28 would amend the constitution by adding El Paso County to the list of counties authorized to create conservation and reclamation districts to develop parks and recreational facilities financed by taxes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit conservation and reclamation districts in El Paso County to issue bonds supported by ad valorem taxes to fund the development and maintenance of parks and recreational facilities."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 8 (SJR 16)

SJR 16 would amend the constitution by requiring the legislature to provide for taxation of open space land devoted to water stewardship purposes on the basis of its productive capacity.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the appraisal for ad valorem tax purposes of open-space land devoted to water-stewardship purposes on the basis of its productive capacity."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 9 (SJR 9)

SJR 9 would amend the constitution to authorize the governor, on the written recommendation and advice of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, to grant a pardon, reprieve, or commutation of punishment to a person who successfully completes a term of deferred adjudication community supervision.

The proposed amend-

ment would appear on the ballot as follows: constitutional amendment authorizing the governor to grant a pardon to a person who successfully completes a term of deferred adjudication community supervision."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 10 (SJR 37)

SJR 37 would amend the constitution by extending the length of the unexpired term that causes the automatic resignation of certain local elected officeholders if they announce candidacy or become candidates for another office from one year to one year and 30 days.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the length of the unexpired term that causes the automatic resignation of certain elected county or district officeholders if they become candidates for another office.

Texas Forest Service, all three of them were of the same opinion that the burn ban needed to remain in effect.

The commissioners had voted at their Oct. 10 regular meeting to keep the burn ban intact, but several citizens had contacted the county officials wanting to know if the ban would be lifted in order to burn trash and debris.

Several counties Texas lifted their bans last week after the rains, but the Texas Forest Service warned that those counties should be cautious since debris burning is the number one cause of wildfires in Texas.

Forest service officials have determined that so far this year, more than 600 wildfires charring 39,602 acres were caused by debris burning.

"I wanted to lift it for a short period of time," said Commissioner Pleas Childress. "I understand the need for it. My only concern is when will it be lifted? How big a rain will we have to have?"

Falkner said if the county receives another really good rain then the ban might be lifted for three or four days.

"We got a good rain, but I can already see on my bus run cracks in the ground already forming. It's already drying out," Falkner said.

Childress said the commissioners should keep in mind Falkner's recommendations for the future.

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

Eyster says hydraulic fracturing is a safe proven technology that involves injecting water, sand and various chemicals at high pressure into rock formations thousands of feet below the base of usable groundwater to open fractures in the rock and allow gas to flow into the well.

"Hydraulic Fracturing is currently used in 90 percent of the nation's natural gas and oil wells. The practice makes drilling possible in areas that 10-20 years ago would not have been profitable for the oil company or the landowner", said Eyster.


ORDER RESTRICTING **OUTDOOR BURNING**

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

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
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
