

Heroes come in a shapes and sizes. For Ben English, his heroes have always been in a military uniform.

English spoke to a packed Ozona High School Auditorium Friday during the Veterans Day ceremony.

Students from all three school campuses participated in recognizing and honoring veterans and active service military.

English, a retired Texas DPS Trooper and former U.S. Marine, spoke to the audience about how the military and the people in it led to the person he is today.

"One of the greatest of those blessings are the men I have been honored to call 'friend.' The great percentage of them are veterans," English said.

When English entered the Marines at age 17, he was considered a "juvenile delinquent." Most likely, he said he would not have graduated high school if not for a former Army Ranger who was also his high school teacher.

" 'Dad' Baker not only taught about history, but about life and what a man was supposed to be. He learned it first hand, during some of the bloodiest days of World War II," English

English also remembered the drill instructors in boot camp and how they tore him down during his 13 weeks of training.

Burn ban stays intact for one week

The countywide burn ban remains intact, for now. At Monday's regular meeting, the commissioners' court voted to keep the burn ban for a week. The commissioners will reevaluate the situation at a special noon meeting on Monday, Nov. 21, at the courthouse annex.

"Nearly everyone has dropped their bans around us. We are hoping we receive some rain," said County Judge Fred Deaton.

The Texas Forest Service reported Monday that 206 out of 254 counties in Texas still have burn bans. Tom Green, Kimble, Coke, Runnels and Sterling counties have all dropped their bans.

One concerned raised was deer hunters building unwatched fires, said Commissioner Eligio Martinez.

Since fire season began Nov. 15, 2010, almost 4 million acres have burned across the state, according to the Texas Forest Service.

Candidates initially were going to begin filing to run for office starting Saturday, but a court order issued Friday pushed the date back to Nov. 28.

Use SW0T when planning business ideas

We have clients come see us at the Small Business Development Center with a business idea with the excitement and energy to get started. Our goal is to help those clients make that idea a reality. I like to remind clients that the idea is the easy part. Making it a reality is the challenge.

One approach to determine if your business idea is feasible is to develop a SWOT analysis. SWOT stands for strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats. This approach can quickly help develop a business idea into a possible plan.

Strengths. Why would this business work? List those businesses that are successful in your industry. Study them to determine what makes them successful.

Location, cus-

tomer service,

service can all be strengths.

Other strengths may be years worked in the industry and your business network.

Weaknesses. Next, think about the weaknesses of the idea. Focus the strengths and weaknesses on the internal operations of the business. Is there a flaw in the idea? What are the barriers into the market? Is it a product that is expensive to produce or is the service limited to a particular market? Stay objective as you work through these items. It is important to challenge the idea to make it stronger.

Opportunities. Opportu-

nities and threats are external factors affecting the business. Opportunities are those things in the market that can make your business grow or expand. For example, your business idea may be to be a supplier for a business in the area and that business is growing. Or, an area in your community is growing and there is a location available in that area for your business. Those are opportunities.

Threats. Lastly, it is important to understand the threats for the business idea. Threats are those things that are happening in the market that could affect your business, like the economy. Many businesses have been affected by the current economy. It is important to understand how the market, the economy, technology and employment levels can have an impact on your business idea.

The value of this approach allows you, if necessary, to rework your business idea or redirect it in a way that can make the business idea even more of a success. Frequently, we will have clients become discouraged by the planning process of a business. However, from

our perspective at the SBDC, we would rather have a client work out the issues of their business idea on paper than try to figure out the issues with the doors open. No client wants to hear that their idea needs to be reworked or retooled. The process may be delay the opening of the business but it may make the business a long term

Voters amend state constitution in Nov. 8 election

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Voters approved seven propositions and rejected three in the Nov. 8 state constitutional amendment election.

Unofficial figures posted Nov. 9 by the Office of the Secretary of State show that a little over 5 percent of Texas' more than 12 million registered voters cast ballots in the election.

Approved were:

- Prop. 1, authorizing the Legislature to provide the surviving spouse of a 100 percent disabled veteran with an exemption from ad valorem taxation.

- Prop. 2, authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to \$6 billion in general obligation bonds.

- Prop. 3, authorizing the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue and sell general obligation bonds to finance education loans for students.

- Prop. 5, authorizing the Legislature to allow cities or counties to enter into interlocal contracts with other cities or counties without the imposition of a tax or the provision of a sinking fund.

- Prop. 6, allowing the Gen-

eral Land Office to distribute revenue from permanent school

fund land or other properties to the available school fund to provide additional funding for public education. - Prop. 9, authorizing the governor to grant a pardon to a per-

son who successfully completes a term of deferred adjudication community supervision. - Prop. 10, changing the length of the unexpired term that causes the automatic resig-

nation of certain elected county or district officeholders if they become candidates for another office.

Rejected were:

- Prop. 4, authorizing the Legislature to permit a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area within the county.

- Prop. 7, adding El Paso County to the list of counties authorized to create conservation and reclamation districts to develop parks and recreation facilities financed by taxes.

- Prop. 8, requiring the Legislature to provide for taxation of open space land devoted to water stewardship purposes on the basis of its productive capacity.

REDISTRICTING LINES REJECTED


A panel of three Washington, D.C., federal district judges on Nov. 8 threw out U.S. congressional and state House and Senate district lines redrawn by the Texas Legislature earlier this year.

The court order denying the State of Texas' motion for summary judgment to have its new redistricting maps declared legal is worded as follows:

"Having carefully considered the entire record and the parties' arguments, the Court finds and concludes that the State of Texas used an improper standard or methodology to determine which districts afford minority voters the ability to elect their preferred candidates of choice and that there are material issues of fact in dispute

that prevent this Court from entering declaratory judgment that the three redistricting plans meet the requirements of Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act."

New maps must be produced by the Federal District Court, Western District of Texas, San Antonio.

"I will never forget that time, or those drill instructors. You know, I did not attend my own high school graduation because I felt I had not earned that diploma. But when graduation day came around for boot camp, I was very proud to be there. When they told me that I was now a marine, I knew I had earned something that few others would ever achieve, or even fully understand," English said.

During the next seven years, English said he would make friendships that lasted a lifetime. With the inspiration and influence of his commander David M. White, English would further his education and go on to college after his military career.

White was from a poor family Alabama. When he was in Vietnam he was severely wounded several times and was one of two men to survive the fighting in Hue City during the Tet Offensive.

White earned his college degree, put his body back together physically and then reentered the Marines as a commissioned officer. After he retired, he led a Junior ROTC program at a high school. He is now 63 and training for this third Boston Marathon.

"You might say you can order a Marine out of the fight, but you can never order the fight out of a Marine," English said. "And you ask me why veterans are my heroes? These were extraordinary men, and marines through and through. They were American patriots; men who understood words like courage, honor and duty. To them, 'Call of Duty' was not a video game, but a way of life. For some of them, it was how they died. These men were not only my friends, but they were my mentors and my heroes. They still are. There were so many of them who affected my own life for the better. No matter how hard I try, I will never be able to adequately thank tnem for that.

English then spoke of two young boys, both of which had goals to enter the military. Both studied hard, graduated from Ozona High School and are fulfilling their dreams.

The oldest is now a Second Lieutenant in the U.S. Marine Corps and the other is in his third year at the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis.

Many in the audience knew that English was speaking of his two sons, Levi and Ethan, both of whom English now calls heroes.





hair and the creases of age in your face, you should still have your heroes. These days some of my heroes are getting younger while I grow older. I guess that is what they mean by the torch being passed," English said. "Take it from me; all of us need real heroes."

Vivian Medina read the history of Veterans Day and Ryan Kennedy and Erik Carrizales read the history of "Taps."

"What a great day to be alive in America," said OHS Principal Josh Carty. "We wanted to properly recognize all of our veterans today, as well as those who have made the ultimate sacrifice."

At the annual Veterans Day lunch, Frank Tambunga presented banners to families who currently have family serving in the military.


Tambunga also recognized the veterans that at-

JESSOP SENTENCED



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

ORDER RESTRICTING **OUTDOOR BURNING**

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/ or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed

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
