## 2011 is Crockett County's driest year

It was a year to remember; a dry year.

Since 1931, 2011 is Crockett County's driest year on record. According to data from the Crockett County Groundwater District, the county only received an average of 5.54 inches of rain.

The last time Crockett County saw a yearly average in single digits was 1956 when the county received 9.11 inches.

In fact, the county received more rain per year during the infamous 1950s drought than 2011. In 1951, the yearly average was 7.23 and 1952 saw 8.27 inches.

Since 1995, Crockett County has seen up and down periods with high totals being 34.75 in 2004 and 28.89 in 2007. Prior to 2011, the lowest since 1995 has been 13.02 in 2006.

The wettest month in 2011 for Crockett County was October, which is typically a wet month, with 1.96 inches. The driest month was March with 0.03.

Along with Crockett County, 2011 was the driest calendar year on record for the state, with an average state rainfall total of 14.88 inches, according to the National Weather Service in San Angelo. Previous driest was 14.99 inches in 1917.

The year was also the second hottest on record for the state with the average temperature being RAINFALL RECORD - CROCKETT COUNTY

67.2 degrees. The hottest is 1921 with an average temperature of 67.5, according to the NWS in San Angelo.

The USDA has declared Crockett County a disaster designation related to the 2011 drought. A disaster designation makes agricultural producers in the county eligible for assistance from USDA.

As for the drought ended soon, the county did receive an inch to two inches of rain last week, but that was just a "drop in the bucket," according to officials from the National Weather Service.

"Much of the county has seen below normal rainfall for the first part of

the year. So unfortunately the rainfall will not provide much long term relief from the drought," Nickolai Reimer, meteorologist intern with the NWS in San

Angelo. According to the U.S. National Drought Monitor, the majority of Crockett County and most of West Texas is still listed under

exceptional drought. The latest U.S. Seasonal Drought Outlook shows all of Texas and parts of New Mexico, Arizona, Oklahoma and the southeast to expect the drought to persist or intensify over the next few months. The outlook is through mid-April.

### Attorney General sues to speed approval of voter ID law

Attorney General Greg Abbott on Jan. 23 filed a lawsuit in the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals to push the U.S. Department of Justice to approve the voter I.D. law enacted by the Texas Legislature last spring.

The law has not been given the required preclearance by the Department of Justice. Abbott said his intent is to spur a ruling that would allow the new law to take effect. The lawsuit dovetails with the state's efforts in the U.S. Supreme Court and the D.C. Court to have the Texas Legislature's contested House, Senate and U.S. congressional redistricting maps precleared under Section 5 of the U.S. Voting Rights Act in time to meet deadlines for the April 3 party primaries.

On Jan. 20, the Supreme Court said the U.S. District Court Western District of Texas in San Antonio erred in its remedial redistricting plans created last year and ordered the three-judge panel of the San Antonio court to revise the plans. The San Antonio court on Jan. 27 asked opponents in the redistricting cases to work

together and present them with agreed-upon solutions in hopes of speeding the process.

Texas is among several states and other jurisdictions subject to Section 5 because of a history of discriminatory election practices.

Texans, if the law takes effect, would have to show a government-issued photo I.D. along with their valid voter registration card in order to cast a ballot, and those who do not have a driver's license, passport, military I.D. card or other approved form of identification can get a state-issued voter I.D. free of charge from the Texas Department of Public Safety. And anyone who is disabled or over 65 can vote by mail, a method that does not require photo identification.

Supporters of the voter I.D. law said during the legislative process that it would help stop election fraud. Opponents said the legislation, if passed, would discriminate against minorities, the disabled and citizens who live in rural areas of the state.

Abbott last week said the law is not discriminatory and to support his position quoted a U.S. Supreme Court ruling: "The inconvenience of making a trip to the (Bureau of Motor Vehicles), gathering the required documents and posing for a photograph surely does not qualify as a substantial burden on the right to vote, or even represent a sig-



It will be very interesting to find out what our neighbors are reading and enjoy.





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

Joe Louis Martinez, age 57, went home to be with our Heavenly Father. He died in the comfort of his home on the estimated date of Jan. 22, 2012.


Services were held Friday, Jan. 27, at Templo Siloe Assembly of God with burial at Lima Cemetery, directed by Preddy Funeral Home.

### THE MAD COW



Regarding the drought continuing through this winter and spring, everyone is watching what appears to be a new La Niña developing, said Dr. John Nielsen-Gammon, state climatologist.

A strong Pacific Ocean

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
La Niña is not the only phenomenon that affects Texas droughts, he said.

Scientists now believe that Atlantic Ocean temperature oscillations also play a role in long-term droughts such as the one that hammered Texas and the Midwest in the middle of the last century.

"Compared to the trend,

the north Atlantic is warm in the 1940s and '50s, cool in the 1970s and '80s, and warm since 1995," he said. "At this point, all I can say is that we're in a period of frequent Texas drought until further notice."

As the parent of a pre-k special needs child, Lupita Victornio said her son benefited from an early start in the district's PPCD program for speech before her son started pre-K.

"My child is learning better in the classroom. I'm glad to know there is a lot more help for him along the way," she said. "It would be good to have more parents involved to give more success to the children."

Parents are always invited to their child's ARD (admission, review and dismissal) meetings. These meetings go over the child's academic needs.

**OMS Teacher Rita Kennedy** said three attempts by phone and letters are made to contact the parents.

OHS Principal Josh Carty said phone conferencing is also available for parents. Meetings are also conducted in Spanish if needed.

"We work hard to establish a relationship with parents in the ARD meetings to make them feel comfortable and part of the team planning for their children," Kennedy said.

Data and information is kept on all students at CCCC-SD on how the child performs in each grade level.

"The special education staff is responsible to show curriculum and instruction, just the same as the rest of the teachers," said Amanda Jackson, elementary principal.

Programs such as Read Right in all three campuses, Grand Central Station at Ozona Middle School, AVID at Ozona High School, after and before school help sessions, along with "power hours" during the school are available to all students, including special education students.

"I personally pull kids out into small groups for reading and math," said Valerie Moos, elementary special education teacher.

duBois said with the recent hiring of Kim Wilson, the district's new director of special and federal programs, special ing to improve the area of involving parents in their child's school curriculum.

Kennedy also said the district provides teachers and staff with several opportunities for training in special education. Special education workshops are also free to parents at the Region XV Education Service Center in San Angelo.

"We are learning more and becoming more efficient in providing better instruction to students who are struggling,' Kennedy said.

Starting in middle school and on through high school, efforts are made to help the students' transition into life after graduation.

The Region XV Education Service Center hosts a transition fair, which provides an opportunity for parents and students to see opportunities for after graduation, said Carol Stevens, OHS Counselor.

"At every ARD meeting,

transition is discussed. It's a question for the child. What do they want to do? What are their strengths, weaknesses and what do they want to do after high school," Carty said.

Agencies such as Texas Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services and the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation are available to parents to students to get more information about transitioning after high school. In fact, DARS has a representative in Ozona once a month at the Senior Center.

Wilson, who started with CCCCSD on Jan. 18, said she is hitting the ground running in learning and working on the district's special education needs.

"I thought this meeting was great. We had great response from our community and our staff. We wanted feedback from everybody," she said. "We want the parent's feedback and what is best for their child."



the Texas Department of Agriculture, said that the word "failures" in this context means bankruptcies caused by grain market volatility. The board is looking at ways to set up a grain indemnity fund that would help cover

a warehouse bankruptcy, he said. A grain warehouse operator who is unable to cover the open contracts he or she has purchased can get caught in margin calls. "With the amount of grain some of these warehouses trade, one or two big margin calls can sink them pretty fast," Black said.



proposed plan; and of course, and most commonly - I am asked how soon we could start, and how long a facilities program aimed at modernizing OHS would take. I would like to address some of these issues in this week's installment. Going forward, installments in this series will be offered as consideration to such matters has been deliberated by your School Board, or by the school administration team at their direction. In even the last week, I have

received official opinions from both CCCCSD legal counsel and state elections officials to verify that although the board of trustees had discussed the feasibility of perhaps conducting a bond election even as soon as this May (CCCCSD's last bond election was in May 2008) to take advantage of positive financial conditions that due to changes in election laws enacted by the legislature recently, since we must rely on the services of county election officials, CCCCSD is limited to November elections in even-numbered years. Accordingly, we now know that the soonest any bond election that might support a building program could occur would be the general election date this November. However, your board could determine that to ensure due attention to this concern without complications of other ballot issues in November, that we should postpone such a referendum until a later date. May 2013 is an option for them to consider as well. In either case - we recognize that we do not have to be in any rush, and can manage processes carefully enough to gain voter confidence that enough time has been afforded to inform the public and plan carefully. Economic conditions for possible bond sales may certainly be different than current circumstances after a later-date election, but that territory has been defined for us now.

Next - given your board's instruction to me, architects and advisors to continue discussions and planning consistent with the conceptualizations shared last month - we expect to move forward with real square footage and cost estimates for further deliberation and financial planning. We will also soon assemble a community advisory panel and hold information-sharing ses-



sions to gather impressions and begin the process of narrowing the scope and impact of desired improvements. As explained in previous installments in this series, there are other capital concerns for the district to plan for in addition to modernizing OHS. A thorough examination of such concerns is warranted to define the scope of financing efforts required. If the board authorizes an election for November or May, we will be more than ready. These activities will be accompanied by exploration of district financial projections, market indicators and every possible financial structure that can benefit our community and district. Careful attention to economic factors is the we will engage in such briefings and discussions soon.

role of Financial Advisors, and Lastly for this installment, I would like to report regarding possible time frames for all of this. Detailed floor plans and construction documents cost money to produce. Incurring these costs makes no sense until we are sure we have a viable project to offer for proposals after an authorizing election. It is at this point focus groups across all district and campus concerns will be involved in development of a detailed working plan. These processes take several months, and we expect that required engineering studies, clearances, design, drafting, and bidding processes would take many months. It is reasonable to assume that ground would not break for perhaps as many as 12 or 15 months after a successful election. In the meantime, bond sales would be planned and scheduled according to sound advice to get some cash flowing to pay planning and design costs and perhaps start earning some interest on deposits. Realistically, if there were an election authorized for November this year - we would not see material movement on any real construction process until at least the late summer of 2013 or even early spring of 2014. Further, considering the scope of desired revisions and restorations at OHS - a full rehabilitation of the high school site would extend through at least five years. Certainly OHS students would begin benefitting from improved classroom spaces and infrastructure in perhaps 18 months to two years after the start of construction, but that landmark would still be projected conservatively to fall perhaps sometime just before the 2015-2016 school year. Other possible bond-supported improvements would be made more quickly, but if the principal goal of our planning is to modernize the entire OHS site, community members should plan on waiting through perhaps 2018-2019 to see the final product.

Please continue to monitor deliberations about capital improvements in CCCCSD closely. And as always, please feel free to contact me at any time with questions or concerns.

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
