New Lion Stadium scoreboard approved

Along with new turf, Lion Stadium is also going to have a new scoreboard this fall.

During the May 16 regular meeting, the CCCCSD School Board approved a bid of \$43,895 from Spectrum for a new all digital scoreboard complete with full-color message board. Board members Harvey Sanchez and Tom Anderson voted against the motion.

Board member Roland DeHoyos said the Athletic Booster Club was interested in helping to pay for the scoreboard. Also, possible sponsorship reimbursements and advertising on the message board was discussed.

Board President Ray Don Myers said the current scoreboard is at least 20 years.

Replacement parts are hard or nearly impossible to find, said Maintenance and Transportation Director John Kain

"It needs a new facelift," said Superintendent Chris duBois.

Commissioners, school board start wind energy negotiations

Negotiations have started between Crockett County, CCCSD and Spinning Star Energy

Spinning Star Energy.

Last week, the Crockett County Commissioners' Court and the school board both held meetings where decisions were made to start discussing tax abatement agreements with Spinning Star Energy on a start discussion of tax and t

wind turbine project.

The commissioners, who first met with Spinning Star at their regular meeting on May 14, met again on May 16 where they approved a resolution declaring Crockett County, Texas eligible to participate in a tax abatement.

ment.
Commissioners Frank
Tambunga and Eligio Martinez, along with County
Judge Fred Deaton, voted in favor of the motion. Commissioner Randy Branch voted against the motion, and Commissioner Pleas Childress abstained due to his family owning property in the project area.

"This is moving a little bit too fast for my comfort zone," Branch said.

Spinning Star Energy is proposing a 45 wind turbine project for the northwest area

of Crockett County. The project must be completed by the end of the year in order for the company to qualify for a federal tax credit.

Project partners listed on the company's website are the United States Renewable Energy Group, LLC, SPG (Shenyang Power Group), of China, United Steelworkers Union, A-Power Energy Generation Systems Ltd. and Cielo Wind Power, LP.

The commissioners hired attorney Allen Carmichael, of Sweetwater, at the May 14 regular meeting. He presented tax abatement criteria and guidelines at the May 16 meeting.

One of the areas Branch was concerned about was Spinning Star using local resources. On the past wind turbine project, approved in 2000 as the Southwest Mesa Wind Project, Branch said local businesses that were used complained about not getting paid or the company taking a long time

to pay bills.
"It sent up a red flag,"
he said.

The agreement proposed is for a 10-year county tax abatement.

All local candidates running for county offices, including the contested sheriff's race and the contested 112th District Attorney's race are running in the Democratic Primary.

In Texas, voters cannot vote in both primaries, only one.

County officials said this is the first time in almost 10 years the county has had a Republican Party Primary.

Extra attention focused on unbuckled seat belts

AUSTIN — State troopers, police officers and sheriff's deputies across Texas will be looking for drivers and passengers who are not buckled up or whose children are not properly restrained, the Texas Department of Transportation warned last week.

During a two-week period from May 21 through June 3 (which includes Memorial Day weekend) the "Click It or Ticket" campaign will be enforced. Drivers pulled over will be subject to fines up to \$250, not including court costs.

Texas law requires that both drivers and passengers wear seat belts. Children younger than 8 years old must ride in a child safety seat or booster seat unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches, according to TxDOT.

"It only takes a minute to strap on your seat belt and to make sure that everyone else in your vehicle is properly restrained," said Carol Rawson, TxDOT's Traffic Operations division director. "That one minute can save a life. We shouldn't have to remind people to wear

seat belts. But just in case, police officers around the state will be pulling over folks who still have not gotten the message."

Traffic crashes remain a leading cause of death in Texas. In 2011, nearly 3,000 people died in fatal collisions on Texas streets and highways. Almost half of those drivers and passengers were not buckled up, according to TxDOT. Visit www. texasclickitorticket.com for more information.

SALES TAX HOLIDAY ON CALENDAR

Shoppers don't have to pay sales tax on certain appliances under the state's annual "Energy Star Sales Tax Holiday," May 26 through May 28, which is also Memorial Day weekend.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs on May 14 published a statement saying the sales tax break "applies to ENERGY STAR® qualified air conditioners priced at \$6,000 or less; refrigerators priced at \$2,000 or less; ceiling fans; fluorescent light bulbs; clothes washers; dishwashers; dehumidifiers; and programmable thermostats."

UNEMPLOYMENT RATE **DROPS LOWER**

Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased in April to 6.9 percent, down from 7.0 percent in March and from 8.0 percent a year ago, the Texas Workforce Commission reported last week.

According to statistics gathered and analyzed by the U.S. Department of Labor, the national unemployment rate of was 8.1 percent in April.

"The Texas economy continues to add jobs, with 10 of 11 major industries growing over the past year," said Texas Workforce Commission Chairman Andres Alcantar. "The continued growth across industries is positive and we encourage employers and job seekers to take advantage of the services offered through our 28 local workforce boards across the state."

Texas' unemployment rate has decreased for eight consecutive months.

CROCKETT COUNTY HISTORICAL COMMISSION

Meeting held May 5

CROCKETT COUNTY HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The Crockett County Historical Commission had a great meeting May 5 at the Crockett County Civic Center. Thirteen West Texas counties were represented and reported on preservation activities in their counties.

Historical Commission President, Bob Childress, was the Mater of Ceremonies of the event, and had a group of mostly local people tell about the old days.

Ginger Perner did an excellent job discussing the Hoovers and how they lived when they came to the Ozona area in 1882.

County Judge Fred Deaton talked about stage stops, freight wagons and how the first stage coach from Comstock to Ozona was started by his grandfather.

District Judge Brock Jones described the 58 camels that came by Fort Lancaster in 1850, and what happened to these camels.

Bob Childress told about Fort Lancaster's 58 soldiers being raided by 900 Kickapoo and other Indians on Dec. 26, 1867.

Harold Tanner shared the story about his wife's grandfather, Mr. Brown, who had a big bear that lived under Livestock Creek Bridge. Mr. Brown was killed by the bear after being a pet for many years. He also told wild, wild, stories of Gruby, Texas located in the northwest part of Crockett County in the 1920s.

Claude Hudspeth had a very good story about Howard's Well. This waterhole became one of the most important waters for the 3,000 wagons per year that came west on the Chihuahua Trail over a period of 25 years.

Randall Ross told of the terror that Indians caused the pioneers. One incident was of a rancher's son taken by Indians in Camp Wood in 1864. The boy was brought through Crockett County by the Indians and was later recovered in Mexico two years

The chuck wagon lunch prepared by Graham Childress and the barbecue dinner served by Claude Hudspeth were very unique and tasty.

Next year, this meeting will be held in Presidio.





Paul Howard Shacklette

Paul Howard Shacklette, age 86, died on May 15, 2012, at Angelo Community Hospital. His death was due to complications from diabetes and heart disease.

Born in Richmond, Virginia, on February 3, 1926, to Hayward and Madelyn Shacklette, Paul grew up in Pennsylvania, where he graduated from State College High School. He immediately enlisted in the United States Army Air Corps and entered the Pilot Cadet Training Program.

After being honorably discharged in 1945 as a Private, he traveled to Panama to visit his father who was working for the Panama Canal Company. Paul liked Panama so much that he decided to stay. He attended Canal Zone College and later worked as a police officer for the Canal Zone Government for a short while before transferring to the Surveys Branch of the Panama Canal Company.

During a brief break from the Panama Canal Company, Paul worked for the United Fruit Company from 1951-52, where he helped survey and maintain the company's railroad in Panama, Honduras and Guatemala. He later worked in Arizona for the state highway department in 1958-59 as a route surveyor preparing construction for Interstate 10. Paul's additional work experience during this period also included working on the Panama portion of the Inter-American Geodetic Survey (IAGS) which was making a definitive map of all of Central and South America during the 1950s and early 60s.

After the completion of that IAGS project, Paul returned to the Panama Canal Company's Section of Surveys in 1961 for good to complete his government career as a cartographer and eventual chief of the Hydrographic Branch. During his tenure, he was integral in the 1960s Canal Widening Project as well as participating as lead project manager representing the United States Government's assistance to Great Britain in searching for Sir Francis Drake coffin off Portabelo, Pana-

While on a sabbatical to attend the University of Texas in Austin, Paul met and married Jacquelyn Williams of Ozona, Texas. They returned to the Canal Zone to live until Paul's retirement in 1980. Upon retirement, he

Upon returning to Texas,



Paul established Ozona Flight Service to pursue his lifelong passion of maintaining and rebuilding vintage aircraft, specializing in the restoration of Stinson aircraft.

Paul became a nationally recognized authority on Stinson military and civilian aircraft, often generously assisting other rebuilders with his knowledge and expertise by phone and mail.

During the years, Ozona Flight Service matured into a thriving business, restoring a number of rare World War II aircraft and some even older. He restored a PT-17, seven AT-19s, two Piper L3s, a Stinson SR-7 and a SR-10. In 1990, Ozona Flight Service relocated from Ozona to Ducote Air Park at San Angelo, but retained its original name.

He was a Colonel and member of the Commemorative Air Force since the 1980s. He was also a member of the Experimental Aircraft Association.

Paul is survived by his wife of 49 years, Jacquelyn, and their two children, Peter Paul and his wife, Patricia, and two grandchildren, Ellis and Kaitlin of Roanoke Rapids, NC, and daughter, Summer Shacklette and son-in-law, Michael Hutchinson, of Dallas, Texas.

He was an outstanding and loving husband, father, grandfather, uncle and friend who will be missed by all. May you have your wind in your face and sun on your back.

Always active in his church and missions, he was the first physician to staff the free clinic that Eleanor Poe founded in South El Paso in 1972.

Texas Forest Service urges caution over holiday weekend

COLLEGE STATION, Texas - Texans are urged to use caution while celebrating the upcoming Memorial Day holiday weekend - and when doing any outdoor activity that can cause a spark.

Although many areas have received significant rainfall, much of the state is experiencing some level of drought, according to the U.S. Drought Monitor.

On Memorial Day weekend last year, local fire departments and Texas Forest Service responded to 363 fires that burned almost 18,000 acres. Almost half of those fires were determined to have started by preventable causes such as campfires or debris burning. Eighteen homes and 35 other structures were destroyed over the holiday weekend.

It doesn't take much to ignite a potentially devastating wildfire. Always check with local government or fire department officials to make sure outdoor cooking and campfires are allowed in your county — and be sure to comply with all restrictions.

Memorial Day Safety Tips:

· When barbecuing, never leave a grill unattended. Locate the grill away from your home and any combustible materials.

· Clear away grass, leaves and other debris within a 10-foot perimeter of any campfire or barbecue grill.

• Ensure all campfires and barbecue coals are completely extinguished before leaving.

· Never use gasoline to start a barbecue.

· Have water on hand just in case. If a fire does start, call 911 immediately.

· Remember you are responsible for any fire you start and any associated cost or damage that fire may cause.

The Texas Forest Service also has new web applications that will help homeowners and communities determine wildfire risk at texaswildfirerisk. com.

Wildfires scorched almost 4 million acres across the state last year, destroying nearly 3,000 homes.

Texas Forest Service officials say the new web applications will arm Texans with the tools they need to reduce threats from future blazes.




Throughout enforcement period of the Texas Department of Transportation's

duBois said the board will be paid for with the remaining funds in the Qualified School Construction Board.

In an earlier motion, the board unanimously approved to authorize the administration to proceed with pursuit of eligible QSCB projects as prioritized, reserving effort toward larger projects for alternate re-

Around \$800,000 is left in QSCB funds. duBois said other projects, like the scoreboard, can be completed with the

"We got everything that we wanted to get done. This can

go a long way," he said.

Another QSCB funded proposal that was unanimously approved by the board was upgrading and adding security cameras and fire alarms.

A \$62,038 bid from Ener-Tel was approved.

The board received proposals from KayGee Security and Ener-Tel, both of San Angelo. Representatives from Ener-Tel spoke to the board about their system, which includes security and fire alarms.

Ener-Tel's bid was the highest bid but board members felt that Ener-Tel had better knowledge on current codes and needs, along with better service.

"We want to have our chil-

dren safe and keep our schools safe. We don't want a system cutting corners," said board member Dwight Childress.

Board Vice President Grizz Medina said she felt more comfortable with the knowledge Ener-Tel provided.

During that time, Spinning Star Energy will pay the county \$750 per megawatt for the first 20 turbines and \$550 per megawatt for the rest with three percent interest per year.

In the agreement, it states that the wind energy company must make efforts to use local resources for contract work, goods and services.

"The loudest complaint I hear is they didn't use any of workforce and didn't buy a dang thing here. There's very little you have that they'll need. At least spend some of it here," Carmichael said. "We require the company to bring proof of how much is spent with county residents.'

Spinning Star officials said they were willing to use local resources, if those resources were competitive in price and

"If we find competitive, individuals that are qualified, we will make every effort to hire or buy locally," said Shweta Sharma, chief executive officer with Spinning Star Energy.

The proposed agreement stated that comparable price shall be defined as less than or equal to 105 percent of the nonresident price for equivalent quality, conditions and terms. Sharma asked if this could be changed to 100 per-

"I am a huge fan of wind

energy. I've seen first hand the benefits the projects can bring to a county. It will be a great opportunity for Crockett County but at what price," Carmichael said. "You need assurances the company is going to use good efforts to employ and use Crockett County goods, services and people. If they can get it done in Crockett County they need to try. We need some sort of assurance to receive the benefit of our tax abatement."

The commissioners appointed Deaton to work with Carmichael as negotiations with Spinning Star Energy are being handled. Deaton said he expects the commissioners to have several called meetings in the future.

"We are judged through this abatement by our taxpayers. This is a very fast deal for us," Deaton said.

The commissioners also approved a motion to authorize the county to call a meeting to consider creating the Spinning Star Energy reinvestment zone. An advance notice will be published in The Ozona Stockman newspaper.

This does not obligate the county to enter into a tax abatement, but it does put them one step further, Deaton

The motion passed with Deaton, Branch, Martinez and Tambunga voting in favor and Childress abstaining.

For the school district, a tax abatement agreement offers property tax incentives.

During the school board's May 16 meeting, the same Spinning Star Officials gave the same proposal. The difference is with a school district. benefits for a tax abatement agreement include an increase tax base if Crockett County voters pass a school bond.

When a district has a bond, there are two taxes. The bond tax is called interest and sinking. With a wind energy tax abatement, the amount of the I&S tax rate can be lower for Crockett County taxpayers.

There are also advantages for the district's regular maintenance and operation tax rate. With the wind energy tax abatement, the company will pay full tax until 2015.

Starting in 2015, property value above a \$20 million cap is abated for eight years. Spinning Star Energy will then make in-lieu payments of \$100 per student to the district each year. These payments will not be subject to recapture.

"Frankly, we don't see a down side for the school district," said Dale Cummings, consultant for Spinning Star Energy. "We're not here to cost the district any money."

Superintendent Chris du-Bois said the district's attorneys will be consulted about the project before a final decision is made.

"I don't see a bad side," duBois said. "At the end of the project, you still have a taxpayer that is still pretty healthy."

The board approved to authorize the school district administration to proceed with negotiations and consultation with counsel as appropriate relative to an Appraisal Value Limitation agreement with Spinning Star Energy LLC. Board member Dwight Childress abstained from voting due to having property within the project.



steadfast advocate for transparency in state and local government, announced in 2011 that she would not seek reelection.

Democrat Robert "Bobby" Guerra of Mission is running to succeed Gonzales for the District 41 seat, the boundaries of which in Hidalgo County. Also, two Republican candidates have filed: Miriam Martinez of Edinburg and Armando Vera of McAllen.

ESTIMATES INCLUDE TEXAS DATA

A couple of years ago, the office of the state demographer described Texas as a "majority-minority" state, meaning in effect that the aggregate count of people who self-identify as Hispanic, Black, Asian, Native American, Pacific Islander was greater than the count of people who self-identify as singlerace white.

On May 17, the U.S. Census Bureau released a set of estimates that show Texas is one of four majority-minority states, the others being Hawaii, California and New Mexico, and of the four, Texas has the lowest percentage of minority residents, with 55.2 percent.

Also from set of census estimates is this information: More than 11 percent (348) of the nation's 3,143 counties were majority-minority as of July 1, 2011, with nine of these counties achieving this status since April 1, 2010. Of those 348 counties, Maverick County, Texas, had the largest share - 96.8 percent - of its population in minority groups, followed by Webb County, Texas with 96.4 percent.

Also noted was that of all counties in the U.S., Starr County, Texas, had the highest percentage of Hispanics: 95.6 percent. And, of all states, Texas showed the greatest numerical gain in Black or African-American population, with an increase of 84,000 individuals between 2010 and 2011.
