Graduates look to the future

Diplomas were conferred on 41 students as the Class of 2012 graduated Friday night at Lion Stadium.

In her welcome speech, Salutatorian Isabel Trevino Ybarra spoke of the pride each graduate should feel from living in Ozona. "I'm proud to say I come

from this town. Our community has supported each and every one of us," she said.

As the graduates get ready to set out into the world, Ybarra said no matter where they go or what road they take they can show the pride in being from Ozona.

"We will laugh, cry, be afraid, get lost, but at some point all roads take us back home," she said. "Today, we remember and we will never forget. This is the end of this life and the start of a new one.'

Natalie Marie Hernandez, the third-highest graduate, spoke on the future.

"Dream big, don't settle for less than what you deserve," Hernandez said.

She spoke on how responsibilities for all of them will soon change, but whatever path they chose to go with faith.

'I ask you all not to dwell on the past and look forward to the future. Let's go out into this world and show them what we have to pursue our dreams," Hernandez said.

Gabriella Allie Gutierrez, the fourth-highest graduate, spoke on how the past has shaped this year's class.

From the first day of school to sleepover parties and glory days at Ozona Middle School to the high school years where they beat Sonora in football, the band bus got stuck in the sand on the band trip and won this year's Class Olympics, all of these event shaped the Class of 2012, she said.

"I wondered how it was possible that someone so full of life could be gone so fast," Gutierrez said. "She will be a role model to us all. We must live life to its fullest because tomorrow is not a guarantee."

In his Valedictory address Lane Daniel Hale thanked teachers, parents, his family and community for guiding the Class of 2012.

"I've never driven to a town where all the businesses along Main Street decorated for every sports season. We were fortunate to grow up in a community like Ozona," Hale said.

During their school career, Hale said being in CCCCSD was a challenge having four different superintendents, six athletic directors, eight principals and four campuses.

"In the long run it helped us as students. We have learned how to function in an adverse environment. Things that will benefit us

Hawthorne, Rodriguez headed for runoff

Crockett County voters will go to the polls again to elect a new sheriff.

Bob Rodriguez and Ron Hawthorne will face each other in a runoff for Crockett County Sheriff in the Democratic Primary.

The runoff election date is July 31. Early voting will be July 23-

Rodriguez led the race with 492 votes, which was 44 percent of the voting total.

Hawthorne had 307 votes, which was 27 percent of the voting

Incumbent Sheriff Roy Glenn Sutton received 163 votes, 15 percent, and Paul Stroope received 155 votes, 14 percent.

Rodriguez carried early voting with 241 votes. Hawthorne had 172, Stroope 144 and Sutton 91 in early vot-

In Primary Election Day voting, Rodriguez won three out of the four precincts. In precinct 1 he had 78 votes, precinct 2 65, precinct 3 37 and precinct 4 71.

Hawthorne was second in all but one of the precincts. In precinct 1, he had 27, precinct 2 47, precinct 3 47 and precinct 4

Sutton had 13 votes in precinct 1, 22 in precinct 2, 24 in precinct 3 and 13 precinct 4.

Stroope had 0 votes in precinct 1, 4 in precinct 2, 4 precinct 3 and 3 in pre-

In the 112th District Attorney's race, incumbent Laurie English won her third term as 112th District Attorney.

counties in the Democratic Primary winning overall with 1,810 votes to opponent James Jepson's 1,294.

English will not be fully elected until the November General Election, but does not face a Republican opponent.

In Crockett County, English squeaked by with 498 votes to Jepson's 427. In Pecos County, English had 657 to Jepson's

In Upton County, English had 321 and Jepson

For Sutton County, English had 329 and Jepson 112.

At Reagan County, English won 5 votes to 3

over Jepson.

County wide, 1,186 votes were cast in the Democratic Primary and 13 in the Republican Primary. Crockett County has an estimated 2,500 registered voters.

As of press time, former congressman Ciro D. Rodriguez had 51.3 percent of the vote over State Rep. Pete Gallego, 34.6 percent, and John Bustamente, 14.1 percent, for the U.S. House of Representatives District 23 race in the Democratic Primary.

The winner of that English carried all five race will face Republican incumbent Francisco "Quico" Canseco on the November ballot.

Local State Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville, won his Republican Primary race over Cary Wise with 72 percent of the vote.

Also, as of press time the Associated Press said the Republican Primary U.S. Senate race will go to a runoff between David Dewhurst and Ted Cruz.

President Barack Obama and Republican Challenger Mitt Romney easily won the statewide primaries.

With the win, Romeny clinches the Republican presidential nomination.

Remember Me?

We all like to think we are important enough to have our names remembered. But for most of us that part of the brain responsible for recalling names is usually preoccupied. This became obvious when I attended a trade show wearing the name badge of a friend so I could get in free. Although I knew most people there well enough to share the same toothpick, half the people I met called me by the name on the badge instead of MY name.

When it comes to the name game I see a lot of UFO's (unidentified friendly objects). That's why I was surprised when someone made the comment, "I don't know how you remember everybody's name." Which was funny because I had no idea who they were.

In recalling names I do have a few tricks I use to avoid being embarrassed or appearing aloof. Such as navigating my way to the rear of a rancher so I can read the name on the back of his belt. But this has become much less effective as fashion trends have changed and not as many people have their name stamped in leather on their backside. So lately upon greeting people I have found it useful to slap the UFO on the back and say something like, "Hi, good buddy," or, "Good to see you old friend." Usually they think I'm real friendly and do not suspect for a second that I have no idea who they are.

One of the best tricks I've observed was used by an auctioneer. He sold a set of bred cows to a good customer and when the ring man asked for the buyer's name the buyer said, "The auctioneer knows me." Well, the auctioneer didn't know him well enough to

recall his name, so, as he turned to adjust the sound system behind him he whispered to the clerk, "What's that guy's name?" She told him and the auctioneer whirled around and said, 'Sure, that's my good friend John Jacobs.

I have seen variations on this theme worked to perfection, such as, coming down with a quick case of laryngitis or a coughing attack. Instead of saying, "Do I know you?" a much better response was one employed years ago in Hollywood: "I didn't bother to learn your name because I knew that with your beauty you'd soon become famous and change your name anyway.

Remembering names is one reason I don't do book signings. All these people that I met once 30 years ago, like my mother-in-law, come up to me to have their books personally autographed and I have no idea who they are. So I have to think fast to come up with excuses why I don't remember their name. Such as, "I didn't recognize you without your mustache." Although, I don't recommend this line for your mother-in-law, or any woman, for that matter. If I am at a complete loss I'll say something like, "Your difficult name is on the tip of my tongue. Tell me again how you pronounce your unusual and very unique name?'

Panama Canal expansion: What will Texas do?

AUSTIN — Plans are in the works for a Texas role related to the Panama Canal expansion project slated for completion in 2014.

Last week, the Texas Department of Transportation announced the formation of a "Panama Canal Stakeholder Working Group" whose members will give input on road, bridge and port construction here in Texas because of a projected increase in land and sea traffic enabled by the canal project.

"Preparing the state's infrastructure for such an expansion, in terms of sea and land-based infrastructure, is crucial to accommodating this increased freight traffic," said state Rep. Larry Phillips, R-Sherman, chairman of the House Transportation Committee.

TxDOT said port, agriculture, trucking, manufacturing, government, oil and gas, and rail industries have been invited join the working group, and recommendations from it are due by year's end. Harris County Judge Ed Emmett, a former state representative and former

member of the Interstate Commerce Commission, will serve as chair, and plans are for the working group to meet monthly for the next six months.

Work is under way in the Panama Canal to open a new access lanes, build a third set of locks and deepen navigational channels, with more than \$5 billion in funding coming from the U.S., Canada, United Kingdom, Japan, China, South Korea, most European countries and Israel.

Having reached its maximum sustainable capacity of ship traffic several years ago, the canal, which opened 100 years ago, was in need of the upgrades.

TEXAS PRIMARIES MAY 29

Secretary of State Hope Andrade, Texas' chief elections officer, on May 21 put in a reminder to voters that May 25 was the last day to cast a ballot early in the May 29, 2012, Primary Elections.

Preliminary results of the primaries should be available on May 30.

Voter turnout for presidential primaries in Texas, like this one, has long trended higher than for gubernatorial primaries and runoffs, but still is quite low.

Recent history shows that in the March 2008 Primary Elections, 10.68 percent of all registered voters voted in the Republican primary and 22.54 percent voted in the Democratic primary. In March 2004, 5.60 percent of registered voters voted in the Republican primary and 6.84 voted in the Democratic primary. And in March 2000, 9.70 percent voted in the Republican primary and 6.78 voted in the Democratic primary.

FOOD, FEEDING **ARE BIG ISSUES**

The House committees on Public Health and Human Services, whose responsibilities often intersect, met in a joint interim hearing on May 22.

Invited testimony was given by state agencies, charitable organizations and farmers in

effort to identify policies to alleviate food insecurity, increase access to healthy foods, and encourage better nutrition within existing food assistance programs.

Topics ranged from how to eliminate "food deserts" and grocery gaps, encourage urban agriculture and farmers' markets, increase participation in the Summer Food Program, to incorporating standards in the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. PLEASE SEE STATE, PAGE 10

Texas Pecos Trail board visits Ozona

The Ozona Chamber of Commerce and Visitor Center hosted the bi-monthly Texas Pecos Trail meeting at the Chamber last Thursday.

There were a total of 35 local and out of town people from McCamey, Pecos, Fort Stockton, Sonora, Junction and San Angelo that attended the meeting.

"The bi-monthly board meeting brings tourism and preservation partners within the region together. It gives the representative of each community the chance to see what projects other communities are working on to foster Heritage tourism. Of course we also conduct our board meetings at this time as well," said Scott Jordan, Executive Director for the Texas Pecos Trail region.

"The Texas Pecos Trail is a regional tourism initiative to promote the heritage, culture, attractions, and events within the 22 county area included in the trail region. The program, overseen by the Texas Historical Commission, was originally formed to help to generate revenue the for trail regions," said Shanon Biggerstaff, Ozona Chamber Executive Director during the opening of the meeting to local attendees.

The program also emphasizes the preservation and restoration of our history, and the education of that history.

"We are delighted today to share two projects in Crockett County that we feel will have a long term positive economic impact on Ozona."

At each bi-monthly board meeting the host community has an opportunity to showcase and educate attendees on their local attractions.

The program began with Terry Tate, owner of Spring Creek Nursery in Mertzon and Crockett County Interpretive Trail Designer. Tate shared with the group the vision of the trail.

"The purpose of the project is to educate local and regional residents, visitors, and children across the country about the importance of water conservation, and daily use of native plants in our lives. Plants are part of our heritage and the trail system

Visitors to the site will learn about the ecological balance between plants, insects, and animals, and how they each depend upon one another. They will also learn the importance of our most precious resource, water," said Tate.

Gary Bryant, Extension Program Specialist with AgriLife Extension office out of Fort Stockton, addressed the group about the need for water preservation in the state of Texas, and sited a number of examples of the current critical need for better water resource planning.

The group toured and had a first hand look at the Crockett County Interpretive Trail, located across the parking lot of the Visitor Center, that includes the Rain Harvest exhibit.

Following lunch, Tony Eeds and Kate Singleton of the Community Revitalization Strategies, (CRS) Group out of Dallas spoke to par-

Development, Community Building, Historic Preservation, Planning and Design, Marketing and Public Relations and Tourism solutions. Tony and Kate spoke with attendees about Texas Tourism Opportunities.

They shared with the group positive Texas trends, the top tourism activities, defined Destination Tourism, spoke to the benefits of Heritage Tourism, Experiential Tourism, the importance of taking an inventory of your community, and the basics of selling your town or attractions.

Tony Eeds, who is also the Project Manager for the Escondido Draw Recreation Area, spoke briefly about the ATV park just 20 miles west of Ozona.

"This is a 3,400 acre recreational park offering off-roading for ATV's motorcycles, and jeeps. Longterm there it also the Nature/Eco tourism potential for bird watchers, hikers, campers, star gazers and more," Eeds said.





percent tax abatement for the first five years and 40 percent tax abatement for the second five years on a 10-year abatement agreement. Commissioner Frank Tambunga voted against the motion and Commissioner Pleas Childress abstained from voting.

Officials from Spinning Star Energy said the 60/40 tax abatement was not what they were wanting.

"Our situation is unique. Our objective is, if it's possible, is to negotiate something that works," said Shweta Sharma, chief executive officer with Spinning Star Energy.

Spinning Star Energy is proposing a 45 wind turbine project for the northwest area of Crockett County. The project must be completed by the end of the year in order for the company to qualify for a federal tax credit.

Spinning Star Energy approached the commissioners three weeks ago about the project.

Project partners listed on the company's website are the United States Renewable Energy Group, LLC, SPG (Shenyang Power Group), of China, United Steelworkers Union, A-Power Energy Generation Systems Ltd. and Cielo Wind Power, LP.

The 60/40 offer was a recommendation by attorney Allen Carmichael, of Sweetwater, who is representing the county.

Carmichael said a recent wind energy project in Kent County used the 60/40 abatement, and Young County, home to another recent wind energy project, used a fixed payment per year that came to roughly 50 percent abatement over a 10-year period or similar to a 60/40.

Crockett County's offer would have Spinning Star paying an estimated 46 percent in taxes over the 10year period.

"I'm basing my decision on what I think we should do with wind energy in Crockett County. All we're trying to do is figure out the best way to develop our wind resources," Deaton said.

Sharma said Upton County has already approved their tax abatements with Spinning Star Energy and that the percentage was higher than 60/40. Upton County is proposed to receive 55 wind turbines in the project.

She asked the commissioners if they would be willing to negotiate for 70-80 percent abatement.

"We have an option to install everything in Upton County because we have an abatement there," Sharma said. "I think we are running in circles here. All we are asking for is some flexibility on your side."

Spinning Star Energy has also approached CCCC-SD with proposal of a tax abatement. With the school district, Spinning Star Energy has offered to make inlieu payments of \$100 per

student, along with helping to decrease the tax rate if the school district proposes a bond.

"There is another impact here. There is a community benefit here that goes over and above commissioners' court," Cummings said.

Commissioner Frank Tambunga asked if Spinning Star Energy would be willing to donate or make a contribution for a new animal shelter.

"I would like to see us work out a deal. Our county has to face coming up with the funds to build an animal shelter. You are here to get an abatement. There's got to be something we can work out," Tambunga said. "We can certainly put that in to sweeten the deal," Sharma added. "I really want to reach where our break even point is."

However, the rest of the commissioners were firm on making the 60/40 offer. "Do you realize what

100 percent abatement looks like in the newspapers to us? All people see is 100 percent abatement. We are seeking a standard that is reasonable and prudent," Deaton said. "We need to find a value and negotiate the best value for our taxpayers. That's who we work for, our taxpayers. I have based my idea on what I think is a reasonable price for a product. Most companies stand on their own without a having a tax abatement."

"I think we are wasting your valuable time right now arguing this," Branch added.

Sharma said she would take the offer to her board. She also said Spinning Star Energy is considering the total value of the county's and the school district's offers.

Spinning Star Energy is scheduled to meet with the CCCCSD School Board at 3:30 p.m. Thursday, May 31, in the Administration Building. The meeting is open to the public.

Also, a public hearing to create the Spinning Star Energy Reinvestment Zone is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. June 7 in the district courtroom of the Crockett County Courthouse.

The commissioners also unanimously approved wind energy tax abatement guidelines and criteria for Crockett County.

These guidelines are overall rules and requirements for any company seeking wind energy tax abatement with Crockett County.

Carmichael said this was a pre-requisite the commissioners' had to adopt before entering into any tax abatement agreement.

The criteria and guidelines include provisions for using local businesses for site work, goods and services and has a provision that the company must consider local applicants when hiring.







Celia Cole, director of the Texas Food Bank Network, discussed progress in feeding more Texans, mentioning that not being able to afford a healthy diet remains a problem for many and economic impacts of inadequate nutrition affect all of us," she said, citing dietrelated illness and cognitive problems in children.

Cole testified to the beneficial work of public and private partnerships, such as Texans Feeding Texans, a program linking the Texas Department of Agriculture with growers and food banks.

CAMPAIGN: ABDUCTION AWARENESS

The Texas Department of Public Safety on May 24 an-



nounced its participation in "Take 25," a public awareness campaign developed by the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children to encourage parents, guardians, educators and other caretakers to take 25 minutes to talk to their children about safety and ways to prevent abduction. Events were staged around the state and nation to make child safety a priority surrounding National Missing Children's Day on May 25.

In its announcement, the DPS said Texas records show more than 4,900 cases active cases of missing children up to 17 years of age.

DROUGHT EMERGENCY CONTINUES

Gov. Rick Perry on May 21 renewed his emergency disaster proclamation that exceptional drought conditions pose a threat to some 170 of Texas' 254 counties. 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

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


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
