The ins and outs of franchise businesses

Potential small business owners who have always dreamed of being selfemployed are sometimes unsure where to begin. The franchisor typically assists the business owner with training on how to run the business properly. Since franchises have

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a tested business model, they can be more likely than other startups to survive. However, no business venture comes with a 100 percent guarantee of success.

The franchisee gets name recognition which proves to be very valuable. There are likely to be a number of potential customers who are familiar with the products and services, therefore saving mon-

ey on marketing. As a franchisee you will be giving the parent company control over several aspects of your business. Some of these may be the appearance of the building and the inside floor plan, the

products and services offered. the location of your business and hours of operation.

Starting a small business requires capital. With a franchise you can expect to pay an initial fee, which may be non-refundable, and also monthly royalty fees based on a percentage of sales.

Before you purchase a franchise, determine goals for the business. How much time and money are you willing to commit? Will you be managing the business or will you hire someone else to do it? Will you continue with your current employment or will this be your main

stream of income? Do you want to expand in the future?

Work out a reasonable budget as to how much you are willing to spend to purchase the franchise. How will you come up with the capital? Do you have savings, additional income or personal assets you can liquidate?

As with any small business venture it is suggested to do sufficient research to find the right opportunity. Will the franchise offer products and or services that are in demand in the area? How long will that demand last? Who will be your competitors? Is the market oversaturated?

Explore your possibilities by speaking with other franchise owners. Ask them if their franchisor delivered as promised, how the business is doing, how much support was provided by the franchisor and if training was adequate.

Keeping digital playgrounds safe for young Texans

uring summer, young Texans are more likely to have unsupervised time at home - and in an increasingly digital world, that means more opportunities to visit potentially dangerous online playgrounds. Families must stay engaged in their child's activities online, set boundaries and know the capabilities of minors' mobile phones and handheld gaming devices.

Police officers across the state who specialize in cyber crimes investigations know all too well that dangerous criminals lurk online. Parents should warn their children not to share personal information with strangers online - and to never agree to a face-to-face meeting with someone they meet on the Internet.

By surfing the Internet with their children and fostering open conversations about the websites they visit, parents can both teach and learn from their children. Parents should give children and teenagers ground rules for their Internet usage – including the hours they can access the Web and the types of websites children can visit.

Cyber Crimes Unit investigators with the Attorney General's Office have arrested several sexual predators who used wireless devices in an attempt to call or text children. These communications often include sexually explicit language or images and are intended to lure children into a sexual encounter. Wireless devices that allow users to surf the Internet may also give children an opportunity to go online and access sexually explicit content, chat rooms and social networking sites without a parent's knowledge.

Parents should monitor their children's mobile phone Web usage and teach them to avoid calling or texting anyone they do not actually know. Young Texans should also avoid giving out personal information through their wireless devices. Any child who receives a communication - including a photo or video - that is inappropriate, hurtful or otherwise makes them feel uncomfortable should immediately notify their parents. If parents suspect criminal activity or believe that their child is in danger, they should save the image or message and contact law enforcement authorities.

Fortunately, many wireless

messages and phone calls. Depending on the provider, parents can also filter or completely block websites from being accessed by their child's wireless device. Increasingly, wireless devices are also equipped with global positioning system (GPS) features that give parents the ability to track their child's whereabouts.

Finally, Texas parents should be aware that video game systems now have many of the same capabilities as home computers. In particular, these gaming devices allow users to interact with other players through typed messages, voice communication or even online video chats.

Although children may enjoy playing video games with their friends online, parents should carefully consider whether to enable a gaming system's online chat feature. During online conversations, predators may look for clues that reveal a child's physical location. Parents who choose to allow online chatting should strongly caution their children not to discuss anything personal while playing online games with players they do not know.

Video game systems typically have parental control features that can be used to restrict game features that pose increased risks.

Parental control features on a wireless phone or game system are designed to give parents peace of mind. While these tools are important, actual parental supervision and communication offers the best level of control. To keep young Texans safe while they enjoy their summer break, parents should communicate openly with their kids and set clear limits on Internet, wireless device and gaming system usage.

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Wait for ruling on voter ID law begins

AUSTIN — What happens next to Texas' enacted but as-yetunenforceable voter identification law is up to a three-judge panel of the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals, following a week of court action, July 9 to 13.

If allowed to stand as written, the law, with certain exceptions, would require each voter to present official photo identification along with a valid voter registration card at the poll in order to cast a ballot.

After final arguments were completed on July 13, Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott stated his opinion that evidence presented at trial by the State of Texas shows that U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder's list of voters who lack governmentissued photo identification is "fatally flawed" because the U.S. Department of Justice's list "includes dead voters, failed to exclude non-Texas residents, and did not attempt to match voters with photo ID databases maintained by the federal government, such as the State Department's passport database or the Department of Defense's military identification database."

While the state did present evidence that voter rolls may include the names of deceased or otherwise ineligible voters, it did not present evidence that voter impersonation at the polls is commonplace or has changed the outcome of an election.

Among those testifying against the voter ID law at the request of the Department of Justice were state Reps. Rafael Anchia, D-Dallas, and Trey Martinez-Fischer, D-San Antonio, who chairs the Mexican American Legislative Caucus.

The D.C. Circuit Court is expected to rule in late August or early September.

BACKGROUND ON VOTER LAW

Near the end of the 2011 regular session of the Texas Legislature, Gov. Rick Perry ceremonially signed the voter ID law, Senate Bill 14, amending the state election law with language "relating to requirements to vote, including presenting

proof of identification; providing criminal penalties."

When Perry signed the bill, he said, "... we take a major step forward in securing the integrity of the ballot box and protecting the most cherished right we enjoy as citizens." But Texas House and Senate Democrats in committee and floor debates of SB 14 claimed the legislation would result in voter suppression and would be harming to the state's black and Hispanic populations.

Throughout the legislative process state House and Senate debates were contentious and votes were party-line. The enactment of the bill kindled protracted civil rights litigation. The Department of Justice declined to grant the necessary pre-clearance under Section 5 of the U.S. Voting Rights Act for the law to take effect and the State of Texas filed suit.

PERRY REACTS TO RULING

On June 28, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the constitutionality of part of the U.S. Patient

Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 on the basis that it is a fair exercise of federal authority to impose a "tax" on citizens who fail to obtain health care insurance.

Range, wildlife management workshop July 31 in Ozona

A Texas AgriLife Extension Service range and wildlife management workshop will be held from 8:30 a.m.-3:30 p.m. July 31 in the Crockett County Convention Center.

Five Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units, one laws and regulations, one integrated pest management and three general, will be available for those with a valid private pesticide applicator's license.

"This program will center on the drought we are still very much in here in Crockett County," said Chase McPhaul, Crockett County AgriLife Extension Agent. "We've had more moisture this year than last, but times are still hard out here in West Texas.

During this workshop, discussions will be on drought management strategies, how the dry weather has affected livestock, supplemental feeding and range and pasture issues.

"We'll also hear how the dry weather hasn't slowed the influx of feral hogs to our area and what's being done about it," McPhaul

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

Landowners, agencies partner to protect Pecos River

The Pecos River is an iconic symbol in West Texas. Many consider it an oasis in the water stricken, semi-arid desert country of the state.

It has served as a source of major historical, biological and hydrological importance to the entire Pecos River Basin and the Rio Grande.

The Pecos River provides approximately 9.5 percent of the annual inflows to the International Amistad Reservoir, a major source of drinking and irrigation water for the lower Rio Grande Valley and its millions of residents.

However, the river also contributes an estimated 26 percent of salt loading to the reservoir annually, periodically causing salinity levels to approach the maximum drinking water standard.

With time and the worst drought in 50 years still holding a death grip on the area, the once ample historic source of water is dwindling down to a trickle in some areas.

Its salinity is so high that its use for irrigation and livestock watering has become limited in many instances.

Knowing a change was needed, conservation-oriented agencies stepped up to the plate. Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB), USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Crockett and Upper Pecos Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD), U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Texas Water Resources Institute, Texas Clean Rivers Program, Texas Forest Service (TFS) and local landowners set forth to improve and conserve the present natural resources.

Through the Watershed Protection Plan Development for the Pecos River project, a watershed protec- dar trees have been reportoped that addresses water- ter per tree each day. shed concerns, impairments issues.

The WPP was developed using scientific data gathered throughout the course of the project along with information and guidance from watershed landowners.

The WPP was completed and distributed to watershed landowners in December 2009. Two separate projects were initiated concurrently to implement portions of the Pecos WPP.

Utilizing partnership efforts, SWCD field technicians have been working directly with watershed landowners to promote, develop and implement Water Quality Management Plans (WQMP) through the TSSWCB.

Starting on properties adjoining or near the Pecos River and now including properties along major tributaries, producers are being offered financial incentives and technical guidance to implement conservation practices and management plans that can improve the overall condition of the Pecos River.

Chemical application, biological control and prescribed burning are all conservation practices being utilized to rid the basin of its number one problem causing, invasive speciessaltcedar.

Saltcedar was introduced as an ornamental from Asia, and it has invaded riparian areas throughout the American West.

It accumulates salt in its tissues, which is later released into the soil or water nearby.

In addition, large saltcetion plan (WPP) was devel- ed to use 200 gallons of wa-

Through WPP landownand resource management ers can choose to chemically or biologically treat the species in areas near and adjacent to the river channel and remove debris from previous treatments through the use of controlled burns.

In terms of biological control, one tiny beetle, Diorhabda sublineata, commonly known as the Tunisian beetle, seems to play the part as a major advocate to landowners.

The jaunty beetle, im-

ported from China, Kazakhstan, other parts of Asia, and the Mediterranean region all areas where the troublesome tree is native—has taken an impressive bite out of saltcedar in several study sites in the West.

To this insect, vast stands of saltcedar are just one enormous, seemingly endless banquet.

The plant's scale-like leaves offer a nutritious treat for the insects, whether they're in their caterpillar-like larval stage or have matured into quarter-inchlong adult beetles.

Besides thriving on emerging leaves and shoots, the beetles also nibble on the bark of small twigs, all the while posing no hazard to people, pets or crops. Since the establishment of this program, Texas AgriLife Extension Service has been compiling data from the water quality monitoring activities and incorporated into a database.

In trying to expand the territories covered under WQMPs and inform producers and partners of the efforts made thus far, the Texas AgriLife Extension Service hosted two workshops in April 2012 covering the Pecos River Watershed Protection Plan.

During recent Pecos River Watershed Spring Field Days, producers gained insight into the ways NRCS, Farm Service Agency, and SWCD programs can be combined to help them combat the water quality along the

Working with the varied programs allows producers to obtain both technical and financial assistance.

Producers also learned about the options available to them through the Pecos







Carty and Tammy Mc-Williams said Clayton's duties as assistant principal would be just that. He would help with attendance issues, discipline, visit with parents with the parent liaison, training teachers and other duties. Clayton will no longer be teaching or coaching.

"We are trying to take care of the people we have and keep them here to utilize their talents. There seems to have been a miscommunication that has provided a road block," Car-

With Clayton becoming assistant principal, duBois had recommended to the board that his

contract would change. Clayton has his master's degree in administration and is a certified assistant principal, duBois said.

"If we did a contract change we're not changing anybody's title. They are all called professional employees, but we want to compensate them fairly. I felt that this is the right thing to do to make sure he's available through the summer," duBois said. "Coach Clayton has demonstrated loyalty to our district. We are talking about conditions of work and talking about having the right support for our teachers and staff."

Carty said OHS had attendance problems continually throughout the year. When students are not in school then the district does not receive funding for that student.

Also, if a student is not in school then that student cannot learn, Carty said.

"We currently have one foot in the unacceptable rating bucket. We need to strengthen academic rigor," Carty said.

Also, Carty named several teachers that had asked him to visit their classrooms during instruction periods. He said he can't do this if students are in his office.

Board Vice President Grizz Medina said she could assure Carty that one of the teachers he named did not want him in her classroom.

"That's what they have told me to my face," Carty said. "It's a double-edge sword. I can't visit classrooms if I have kids in the office.'

Clayton would also help Parent Liaison Misty Jurado in visiting with families about students' attendance.

duBois said the district was wanting to do more with parent outreach. "The guy with the hol-

ster is the guv with the principal's certification. He can speak to them about the consequences," duBois said.

Board member Roland DeHoyos questioned Clayton about being able to speak to parents who only speak Spanish or speak very little English.

Carty said that is one of the reasons why Clayton and Jurado will be a team in visiting with parents.

"We understand the population we serve. We've thrown every effort. We're not asking for more staff. We're asking to utilize the people we've got to the best of our ability," duBois said.

Board member David Mc-Williams said the board has discussed the staffing changes for several months and didn't understand why the contract changes didn't pass.

At the July 9 meeting, David McWilliams and Tom Anderson voted in favor of the changes, while Medina, Harvey Sanchez, DeHoyos and Ray Don Myers voted against.

"Obviously there was a miscommunication. As I understood all this was taken care of in the spring. We had all those meetings and talked about interviewing Ronny (Clayton) and other candidates, and nobody said no. That's why I'm confused,' David McWilliams said.

Board member Harvey Sanchez said he was against the dean of students position from the very beginning.

"We could be here and argue all night. You have to respect each other's vote. I don't approve of it. That's my decision. I'm sitting on Sanchez said.

Medina said she has never seen the need for an assistant principal or counselor at Ozona Middle School.

Tammy McWilliams said Leanna Childress would be a counselor at OMS but still maintain teaching duties. Her change was that her contract be extended two weeks due to work she will be doing in the summer.

Tammy McWilliams

said that Leanna Childress would not be a full-time counselor, but that she would be teaching, counseling and helping with test coordinating.

"We are not adding a position. We have the same amount of staff," Tammy McWilliams said.

After meeting in executive/closed session for an hour, the board approved changes to Leanna Childress' contract by a vote of 3-1-1. Medina voted against the motion and Dwight Childress abstained. Myers and Anderson were not in attendance.

No action was taken on any other contract changes during the meeting.

Resignations from Leandra Perez and Christina Rodriguez were approved.

The board also approved to authorize the superintendent to hire an assistant band director and two elementary teachers.

HOUSING

Since the June board meeting, duBois said he has met with Tommy Klein Construction out of Lubbock about converting the portable buildings by Ozona Middle School into apartments for school housing.

duBois said Klein said he could covert the buildings into four two-bedroom apartments and four onebedroom apartments for around \$453,000 with appliances and around \$430,000 without appliances.

The district has around \$425,000 left in the Qualified School Construction Bond funds.

duBois said the district is subsidizing 10 out of district private rentals.

'You are continuing to spend money on subsidizing rents and not generating any revenue," he said.

The board asked duBois to invite Klein to a future meeting for further discussion.

FOOD SERVICES

During a budget workshop, board members heard from Alfred Walker of Walker Food Services about how this first year using his services.

district made The around \$53,000 more in revenue with anticipation of another \$10,000 coming in August. Expenses were about the same for both

Walker said the district

changed some services, including free breakfast for all students at Ozona Elementary School.

He also said meal prices have to increase in order to keep up with the cost of food. The board tabled a decision on cafeteria prices last month due to questions they had for Walker.

Average cost of a lunch meal is \$1.15 and average cost to serve the meal ranges from \$2.95-\$3.10. The average cost to serve breakfast was \$.75 with government reimbursement for every paid student was \$.26.

Walker said he recommends increasing prices to get price equity closer to \$2.51.

"You need to look at what students will be able to afford," Walker said.

Also in his recommendations, Walker said the district may consider thinking about phasing in closing the high school campus.

"High school kids are ones with the disposable income," he said.

duBois said around onethird of the students at Ozona High School participate in lunch on campus.

"I think you would stir up a lot of ruckus with the community. They are use to their open campus," Medina said.

duBois said Walker's presentation was just options and items for the board to think about as they get deeper into more budget discussions.

CROCKETT COUNT

ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081 and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.


More firefighters, Crockett County EMS, Crockett County personnel, deputies from the Crockett County Sheriff's Office and volunteers quickly arrived.

Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius his intention to opt Texas out of full participation in President Obama's marquee national health care plan. In a statement issued by the Office of the Governor, Perry said, "If anyone was in doubt, we in Texas have no intention to implement so-called state exchanges or to expand Medicaid under 'Obamacare.' I will not be party to socializing healthcare and bankrupting my state in direct contradiction to our Constitution and our



founding principles of limited government."

However, it is the job of the Texas Legislature to decide whether to opt in or out of full acceptance of the federal Medicaid package and participate in health insurance exchanges. The Legislature convenes in January with more than 6 million Texans who do not have health insurance.

REVENUE COLLECTIONS INCREASE

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced July 13 that state sales tax revenue in June was \$1.98 billion, up 15.2 percent compared to June 2011.

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
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
