Texas drought update: not out of the woods yet

Drought conditions have significantly improved since last year at this time, and the La Niña pattern ended in April 2012, but according to experts, Texas is not out of the woods yet—the state is still in drought.

"Precipitation during the first six months of 2012 averaged close to normal across most of Texas," said Dr. John Nielsen-Gammon, Texas State Climatologist and professor of atmospheric sciences at Texas A&M University, during a July 9 interview. "However, the past month and a half or so, since the middle of May, has been fairly dry. This means the drought is ongoing.'

For some places in the state, such as most of West Texas, the drought never stopped.

Nielsen-Gammon said a few months of normal rainfall during the wintertime aren't enough to pull West Texas out of the drought. In addition, in the eastern part of the state, especially between Austin and Corpus Christi, drought has reappeared because of the lack of rainfall during late spring.



The good news is that, according the July 17 U.S. Drought Monitor, there is no place in the state designated as being in exceptional drought.

Crockett County Voters can cast their ballots from 8 a.m.-5 p.m., including the noon hour, at the courthouse

Runoff Election Day is July 31. Polls will be open from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. on that day. Voting locations are Precinct 1 - Crockett County Courthouse; Precinct 2 -Senior Center; Precinct 3 -Civic Center and Precinct 4 - Ozona Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center.

Registered voters who voted in the May 29 Primary Election can vote in the same Party Runoff Election.

If a registered voter did not vote in the May 29 Primary Election they may vote in either party's Runoff Election.

On the Democratic Primary ballot, Ron Hawthorne and Robert "Bob" Rodriguez are vying for the office of Crockett County Sheriff, which is the only local race in the runoff.

School board not using resources effectively

Dear Editor,

At last week's school board meeting, I made the point that our school district, as a lA school district, was topheavy with administrators. Further, the point was also made that we had too many coaches. This against the backdrop, as I pointed out, that our student academic scores, in comparison to other schools, have yet to improve. Neither point was refuted.

I also pointed out the virtues of a "poor school district" like Mason, Texas, which has had statewide academic ratings and academic scores significantly better than our "rich school district."

In comparison to our demographics, a "Children at Risk" study from last year

pointed out that Mason's students were 40 Hispanic (compared to our 76). Secondly, that their percentage of "economically disadvantaged" students was 58 (compared to Ozona's 39).

I would also point out that at the end of the 2010-2011 fiscal year, the district's financial audit indicating that our school had a fund balance of over \$6.3 million

(see the January 25, 2012 Ozona Stockman edition). From my review of the available information, the fund balance of the 2011-2012 fiscal year will be approximately \$2 million. Then consider that over \$3 million is still owed on the QSCB loan.

Further, the school board is still seriously considering a bond election to basically renovate our old, but functioning, high school. The last cost estimate from the architect was a project costing over \$43 million dollars. Brady, Texas citizens approved, in 2007, a \$14.5 million bond and built a new high school with a library, a student dining area, a separate vocational building, and a gymnasium with dressing areas (see 2007 Internet article). Their new school was

available for use in January of 2010.

So if this approach over the past couple of years is not working, should not the board step back and reevaluate its approach to decisionmaking? You decide if our resources are being effectively and efficiently used.

Mansion restored in multi-year effort

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — The Texas Governor's Mansion is fully restored, Gov. and Mrs. Rick Perry announced last week.

According to a July 18 governor's office news release, the restoration was made possible by a \$21.5 million appropriation by the Texas Legislature and a private fundraising effort led by first lady Anita Perry that raised more than \$3.5 million from thousands of Texans.

Restoration included a new roof, repairs to the exterior masonry, restoration of columns and porches, renovations to the kitchen and installation of a "geoexchange" system to provide energy efficient heating and cooling. Private funds were used to pay for an addition to the west side, restoration of historical features, improved accessibility and the completion of landscaping and historical documentation, the governor's office stated.

On June 8, 2008, the front porch of the 156-year-old structure was fire bombed. Flames spread, causing catastrophic damages. Authorities still are hunting for a suspect who was caught on camera throwing a Molotov cocktail at the man-

sion.


STATE OF DROUGHT CONTINUES

"There are a few areas of extreme drought in West Texas, Central Texas and South Texas," he said. "It wouldn't take more than a couple more weeks of dry weather to slip back into exceptional status.

"In West Texas they need a decent rainy season, which is July and August that comes from the summer thunderstorms. As long as they get plenty of moisture coming from the Gulf of Mexico and the Gulf of California, they'll be able to make it through."

Most of the rest of the state tends to be dry during this time of year anyway, with July being the driest month on average for most of the state, he said.

"A chance of rain comes from occasional tropical disturbances, so we'll be looking for weather from the Gulf of Mexico heading for us, hopefully not in hurricane form," Nielsen-Gammon said.

Predictions call for a close to normal hurricane season, although four named storms have already occurred, which is above average, he said.

What is the outlook for the rest of the year?

"NOAA has officially declared an El Niño watch, which means that it thinks there's a better than 50 percent chance of El Niño forming within the next six months," Nielsen-Gammon said. "This tends to mean a damp and cool winter is in store, which I think most of us have learned to appreciate.'



elections may vote in either party's run-off election, Secretary of State Hope Andrade

A valid voter registration card without additional photo identification as required in Senate Bill 14 will not be required in Early Voting or on Election Day.

Also, Andrade, the state's chief elections officer, announced July 17 that Texas has been named one of 15 states recognized as an all-star "for promoting and protecting the voting rights of America's military service members and their families, especially through legislative efforts to streamline the federal ballot application process."

The recognitions were made by the Military Voter Protection Project, an organization that tracks each state's: (a) use of electronic and web-

based services to send election materials; (b) legislative efforts to eliminate barriers to military voter participation; and (c) record of making sure absentee military ballots are sent out no later than 45 days before the election and efforts to resolve violations. In other news, Lt. Gov. David

Dewhurst and a former state Solicitor General Ted Cruz,

who are vying to become the Republican nominee for the U.S. Senate seat to be open on the retirement of Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison engaged in a televised debate July 17 and are scheduled for a third and final debate on July 23. Also competing in a run-off race for their party's nomination are Democrats Paul Sadler of Henderson Grady Yarbrough of Tyler. Sadler is a former state representative and Yarbrough is a retired educator.

JUNE JOBS REPORT ARRIVES The Texas economy added

12,900 seasonally adjusted nonfarm jobs in June and has added 282,000 private sector jobs since last year, the Texas Workforce Commission announced June 20.

Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 7.0 percent in June, slightly higher than the 6.9 percent reported for May, but down from 8.1 percent a year ago.

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


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

ORDER RESTRICTING **OUTDOOR BURNING**

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

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

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
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
