## Portable buildings becoming teacher apartments

A new set of apartments will be added to teacher housing.

The CCCCS School Board approved a proposal from Tommy Klein Construction in Lubbock to convert the portable buildings by Ozona Middle

School into eight apartments. The decision came during the board's Aug. 15 regular meeting.

Cost to renovate the portables will be around \$440,599. Funding for the project will come from the Qualified School Construction Bond, which is a federal loan the district has been using to ren-

ovate and upgrade facilities around the district.

This project will wipe out the \$3.4 million funds, which can only be used for facilities renovations and not used for jobs, salaries or paying utilities, said Superintendent Chris duBois.

The new apartments, which will be four one-bed-

room and four two-bedroom, will also take the district out of subsidizing rents for employees that live in housing outside the district.

By doing this, the district will save around \$17,640 and decrease expenditures in subsidizing rent \$19,200.

Shad Hartman, with Tommy Klein Construction, present-

ed the proposal to the board.

He said the proposal includes ceramic tile floors, hard ceilings, relines the inside with sheet rock and stove, range, microwave and dishwasher. The apartments will be total electric and have security locks.

Hartman said they are planning to use as many local contractors as possible.

"It will look like brand new apartments. We will open up the walkways from both sides," duBois said.

The project will start in late September and is expected to be completed by December.

This proposal was one of the four suggestions the board

## West Nile virus hits West Texas

The Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) is urging people to take precautions to reduce the risk of contracting West Nile virus, a mosquito-borne illness. People should use insect repellent when outdoors and avoid going outside at dusk and dawn.

There has been a higher than usual number of human West Nile cases in Texas this year due to the warm winter and recent rains, particularly in the North Texas region. Statewide there have been 552 state-confirmed cases of West Nile illness and 21 related deaths, according to the DSHS.

In West Texas, four cases have been reported in An-

- Use insect repellent containing DEET, picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus.
- Dress in long sleeves and long pants when you are outside.
- Stay indoors at dusk and dawn, when mosquitoes are most active.
- Drain standing water where mosquitoes breed. Common breeding sites include old tires, flowerpots and clogged rain gutters.

draws County and one in Val Verde County. Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo reported it has treated four cases related to the West Nile virus since July 27, and that included a person from Eden who died because of the virus.

No cases of West Nile

Virus have been reported in Crockett County.

County Road Supervisor Jeffery Stuart said the road department has sprayed for mosquitoes around town several times and is expected to spray again after the weekend rains.

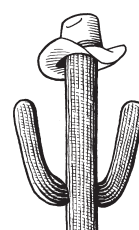
I wish we could still do the things we did in kindergarten. We should have recess in the morning, milk and cookies in the afternoon and we should all take a nap about 2:30 p.m.

## Appeals court sides against EPA in split decision

**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS** By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — The New Orleans-based U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals on Aug. 13 vacated the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's disapproval of the state program governing releases of air pollutants by Texas industries.

Among several findings in the majority opinion released following a 2-1 ruling by a three-judge panel of the court, the EPA's 2009 ruling disapproving Texas' emissions control program came 16 years too late. The program, featuring flexible permitting to meet federal air pollution guidelines, originally was submitted for the EPA's review by then-Gov. Ann Richards in 1994.

"Despite the U.S. Clean Air Act's mandate that the EPA approve or disapprove a 'State Implementation Plan' revision within 18 months of its submission, the EPA delayed formal consideration of the Texas Flexible Permit Program for more than a decade," the majority opinion stated.

In his dissent to the majority opinion, Judge Patrick Higginbotham alluded to the politically charged quality of the case in stating, "Angst over perceived federal intrusion in to state affairs ought to be eased by the reality that laws enacted by Congress are laws of the states."

Named as petitioners in the case were the State of Texas, Texas Oil & Gas Association, Texas Association of Manufacturers, BCCA Appeal Group, American Chemistry Council, American Petroleum Institute, National Association of Manufacturers, National Petrochemical and Refiners Association, Texas Association of Business, Texas Chemical Council, and Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America.

Gov. Rick Perry, Attorney General Greg Abbott, Texas Environmental Quality Commis-

sion Chairman Bryan W. Shaw and other state government officials hailed the ruling.

Shaw, in an Aug. 14 reaction, commented, "As a result of EPA's disapproval, 120 flexible permit holders in Texas were wrongly mandated to 'de-flex' under threat of federal and civil sanctions, and not a single environmental benefit was gained. Not a single pound of emissions reductions resulted from the unjustly targeted facilities. Instead, those companies spent millions of dollars to 'de-flex,' in what amounts to no more than a bureaucratic paper exercise."

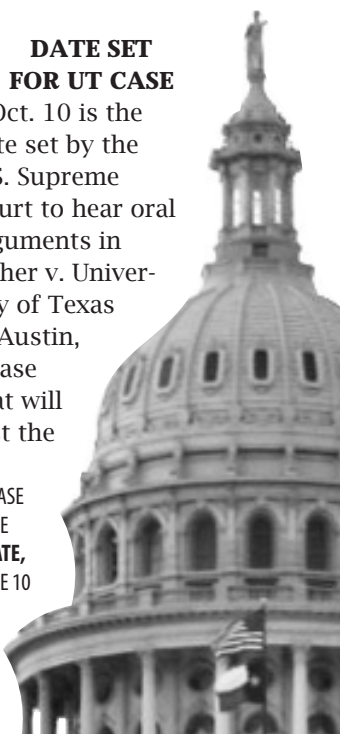
The Lone Star Chapter of the Sierra Club posted a reaction to the ruling from Neil Carman, the chapter's Air Program director. Here's an excerpt: "It is important to realize that until EPA approves the flexible permitting system, the TCEQ must

rely on the existing air pollution permitting program. The court ruling today does nothing to change that fact."

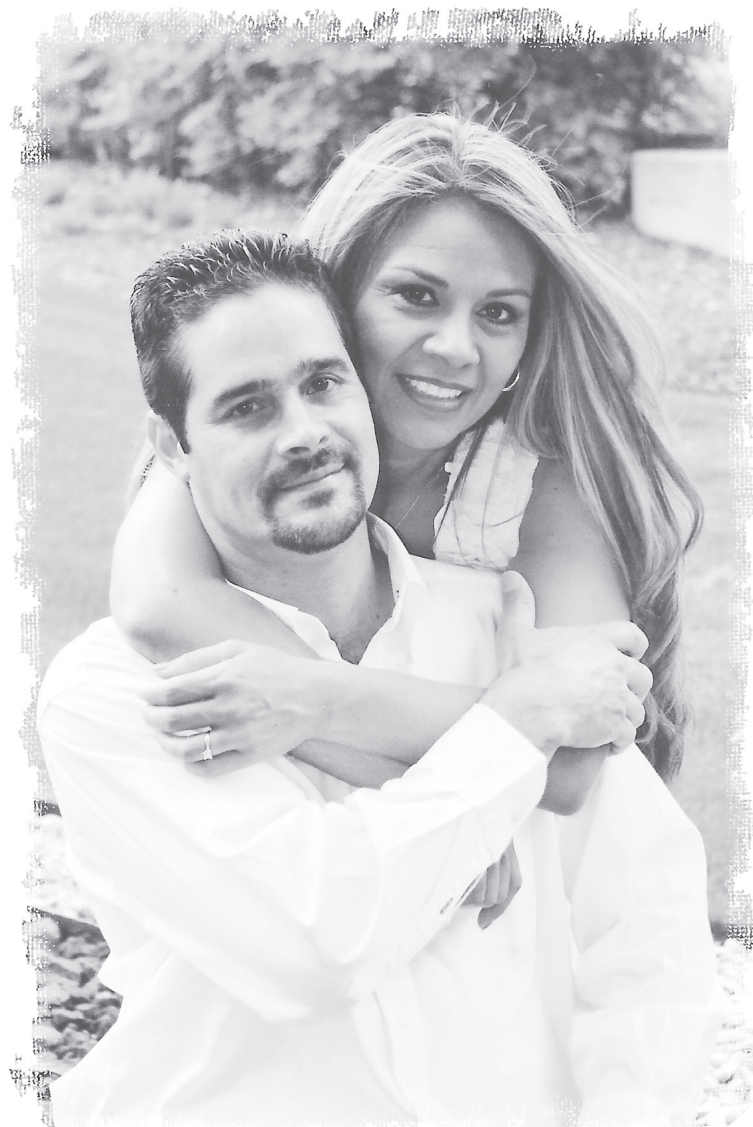

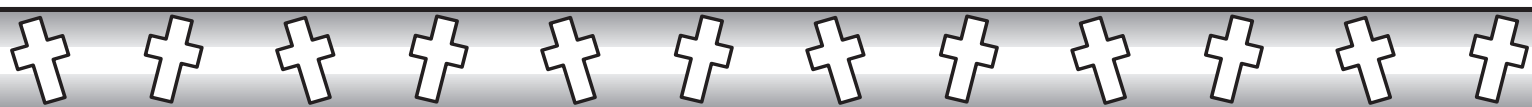

## DEAD SEA SCROLLS

# Chamber hosts ribbon cutting for new vet clinic

County officials, Chamber Board of Directors, staff, Ambassadors and locals all gathered at a Ribbon Cutting ceremony held Thursday, August 16th, to welcome the services of the Eldorado Animal Clinic to Ozona.

"We are here today to celebrate and welcome Dr. Edmiston and his staff to Ozona," said Chamber Executive Director, Shanon Biggerstaff.

Employees of the Eldorado Animal Clinic include local Janet Pullen, who will man the Ozona office, and Leanne Higgins and Gaby Garcia of Eldorado.

"In Ozona we will offer basic and minor veterinary services. For more serious visits, you may bring your pet to our Eldorado office, and we can bring them back to you in Ozona on Thursday," said Dr. Edmiston. "In the future we are looking at making some changes to the Ozona facilities that would enable us to conduct surgeries."

The Eldorado Animal Clinic will be in Ozona each Thursday. Annual wellness exams and vaccinations, including rabies, distemper-parvo, rattlesnake, and bordatella vaccinations are available along with flea and tick control consultation and products.

each week are laboratory and ultrasound equipment, along with a full pharmacy to treat sick or injured animals. Allergy testing and desensitization are available to treat and reduce allergy symptoms. Micro-chipping for permanent identification is easily accomplished.

"Our therapy laser treats many diseases and injuries without the possible side effects of medications," said Dr. Edmiston.

On-site ambulatory equine services will be available, with vaccinations, deworming cogins, and dentistry among the most popular. Other large animal services can be scheduled for onsite visit.

Horse owners are encouraged to have their animals vaccinated for West Nile Vi-

rus, along with encephalitis, rabies and respiratory diseases.

"Anthrax is an ongoing threat to Crockett County livestock and ranchers are encouraged to vaccinate their animals. Humans are rarely affected by anthrax, but care should be exercised when handling potentially diseased animals. Extreme care should be exercised with any dead animals, and any unexplained subsequent fever or sore should be seen by a physician immediately," said Dr. Edmiston.

Heart worms are an emerging problem for Ozona dog owners. Heartworms are transmitted dog to dog by mosquitoes, with a significant source of infection present in dogs moved to Ozona from

East or South Texas or other states by the recent movement of oilfield personnel.

Protection against heartworms is accomplished by monthly administration of an oral medication, following an initial negative blood test. Treatment of a positive animal can prevent the heart and lung disease associated with chronic heartworm infestation.

The Eldorado Animal Clinic is located at 1205 Sheffield Road. The office is open every Thursday from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

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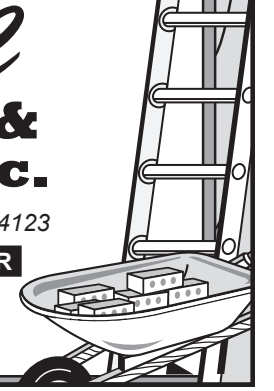

# DPS steps up DWI enforcement for Labor Day

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) will increase DWI patrols from August 19 - September 5, which includes the Labor Day holiday weekend. DPS troopers will focus DWI patrols in high-risk locations at times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent. The enhanced patrols that target impaired drivers are funded through a grant from the Texas Department of Transportation.

"As the result of this grant, our troopers will be able to increase patrols on our roadways, which will make the roads safer for all travelers," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Drinking and driving is always a concern during holidays, and getting intoxicated drivers off our roads saves lives."

During the Labor Day enforcement effort last year, DPS troopers made more than 2,000 DWI arrests, and

approximately 550 of those were the direct result of the increased patrols. Last year during this same time period, DPS enforcement also resulted in more than 25,000 speeding citations, 4,368 seat belt/child safety seat citations and 4,057 no insurance tickets. In addition, troopers made 1,409 fugitive arrests, 958 felony arrests and 882 drug arrests during routine patrol operations.

DPS offers the following tips for safe travel during the Labor Day holiday:

- Don't drink and drive. Designate a driver or take a cab.
- Eliminate distractions, and don't text while driving.
- Buckle up everyone in the vehicle - it's the law.
- Slow down - especially in bad weather, construction areas and heavy traffic.
- Slow down or move over for tow trucks and police, fire and EMS vehicles stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated - it's the law.
- Don't drive fatigued.
- Drive defensively, as

holiday travel may present additional challenges.

-Make sure your vehicle is properly maintained before your trip begins.

Ozona was the only 1A team at the meet. Hondo, LaVernia and Boerne were all in attendance representing class 3A. Comfort (the meet host) is a 2A team and then San Marcos and a Cornerstone Christian School were the final teams.

The Lions and Lady Lions are both aiming to make it to the Regional Meet this year.

Last season, the Lions placed third at the district meet and then 12th at the Region I Meet in Lubbock.

This year, both teams will be competing in District 7-1A with Christoval, Eldorado, Iraan, McCamey, Irion County, Miles, Van Horn, Wink and Winters.

"As long as we come to practice every day and work hard, then I expect we will win district," said Coach Erik Thormaehlen about the Lions. "We are a lot stronger than last year. Our group of freshmen are very talented. We are looking for big contributions from all of them."

Ozona will only be competing in the Varsity divisions at this race and each race will be two miles.

The Ozona boys and girls teams will be competing against former 2A rivals Crane, Wall, Brady, Ballinger and Sonora.

"We got great value in all other concerns, and so this project was possible with what we had left over," duBois said.

This conversion was completed using the same methods as virtually all recent field conversions and installations at major universities.

"In fact, our field is exactly like the newest installs at Texas Tech. Our communi-

ty can have great confidence that this field is absolutely safe," duBois said.

"We are hopeful that the community will be very proud of these improvements and assist the district in superior stewardship as always," duBois said.

Dear Parent Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. Crockett County Consolidated Common School District offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs: \$1.10, lunch costs: \$2.25 for OMS and OHS and \$2.10 for OES. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced-price meals. Reduced price is \$.30 for breakfast and \$.40 for lunch.

1. Do I need to fill out an application for each child? No. Complete one application to apply for free or reduced-price meals. Use one Free and Reduced-Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. RETURN THE COMPLETED APPLICATION TO: Ludy Vargas, PO Box 400, Ozona Texas 76943; 325-392-5501 ext. 5847.

2. Who can get free meals? Children in households receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits (formerly the Food Stamp Program) or TANF can get free meals regardless of your income. Your benefit letter from the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) is your documentation for free meals. If you have not already received a letter from your school stating that your household is eligible for free meals, you may take your HHSC benefit letter to your child nutrition office to be certified for free meals. Call the school at 325-392-5501 if you have questions.

3. Should I fill out an application if I got a letter this school year saying my children are approved for free or reduced-price meals? In most cases no, however read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at 325-392-5501 if you have questions. If your household does not receive SNAP or TANF, your children may still be eligible to receive free meals if your household income is less than the amounts listed on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines. Please complete the application and submit it to your child nutrition office. Head Start students and most foster children may also qualify for free meals.

4. Can foster children get free meals? Yes, foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court, are eligible for free meals. Any foster child in the household is eligible for free meals regardless of income.

5. Can homeless, runaway and migrant children get free meals? Yes. If you have not been notified of free status under these categories, please call or e-mail Kim Niehuets to see if your child(ren) qualify.

6. Who can get reduced price meals? Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reduced-price limits on the Federal Income Chart, included in the application packet.

7. My child's application was approved last year. Do I need to fill out another one? Yes, your child's

application is only good for the school year and for the first 30 operating days of the new school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year.

8. I get WIC. Can my child(ren) get free meals? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Please fill out the application.

9. Will the information I give be checked? Yes, we may ask you to send written proof.

10. If I don't qualify now, may I apply later? Yes. You may apply at any time during the school year if your household size goes up, income goes down, or if you start getting SNAP, TANF or other benefits.

11. What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application? You should talk to school officials. You may also ask for a hearing by call or writing to: Chris duBois, PO Box 400, Ozona, Texas 76943; 325-392-5501.

12. May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen? Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be a U.S. citizen to qualify for free or reduced-price meals.

13. Who should I include as members of my household? You must include all people living in your household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives, or friends) who share income and expenses. You must include yourself and all children living with you. If you live with other people who are economically independent (for example, people who you do not support, who do not share income with you or your children, and who pay a pro-rated share of expenses), do not include them.

14. What if my income is not always the same? List the amount you normally receive. For example, if you normally get \$1,000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only got \$900, put down that you get \$1,000 per month. If you normally get overtime pay, include that amount as income. If you do not normally get overtime pay, do not include it as income.

15. We are in the military; do we include our housing allowance as income? If you get an off-base housing allowance, it must be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military House Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance.

16. My spouse is deployed to a combat zone; is her combat pay counted as income? No, if the combat pay is received in addition to her basic pay because of her deployment, and it wasn't received before she was deployed, combat pay is not counted as income. Contact your school for more information.

17. My family needs more help. Are there other programs we might apply for? To find out how to apply for other assistance benefits, dial 2-1-1. 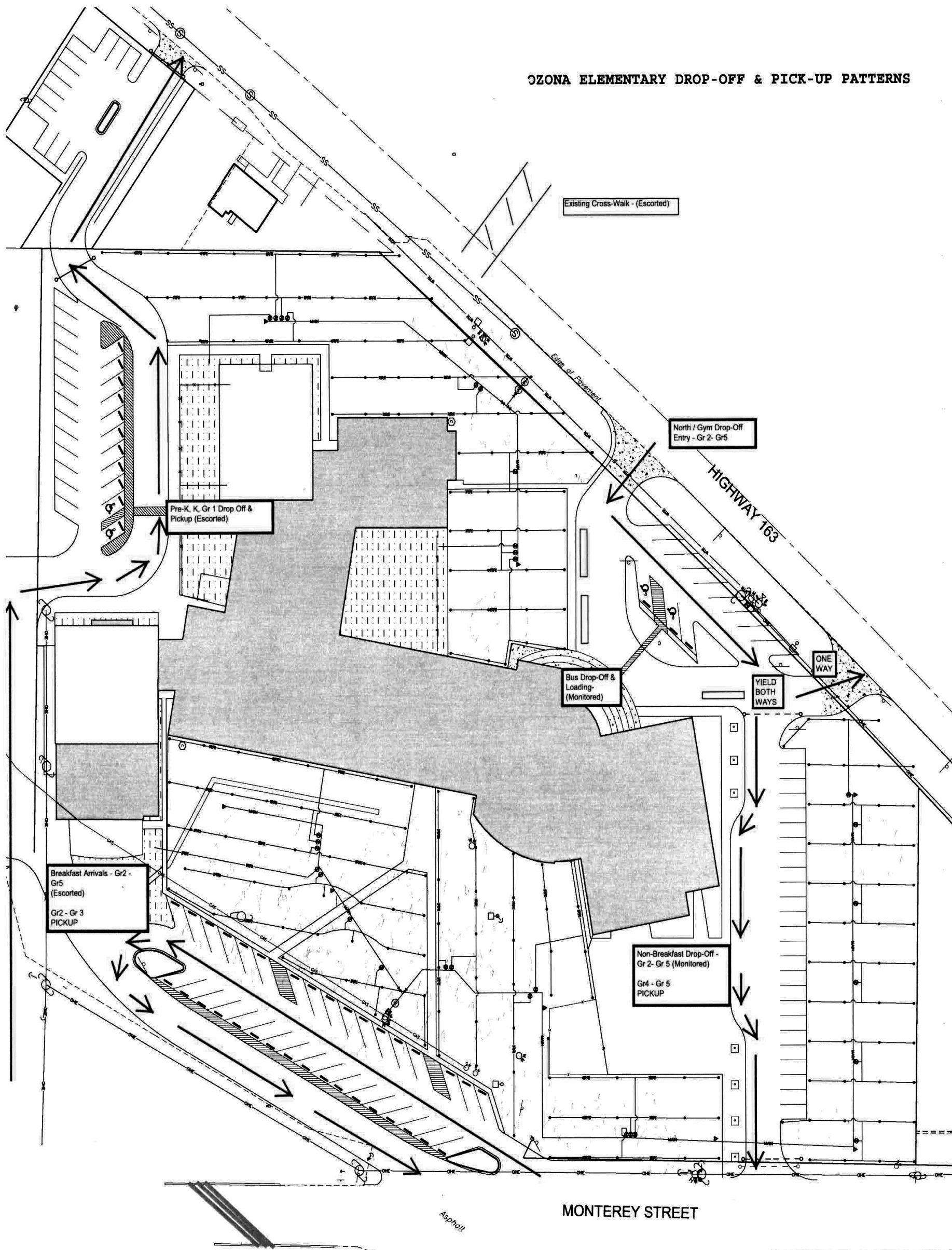

board gave to duBois during an Aug. 13 workshop in order to meet a balanced budget for the 2012-2013 school year.

The other suggestions include all district employees paying \$26 per month for health insurance, changing hours for maintenance and custodial workers from 45 hours per week to 42 hours per week and adding \$40 a month to teaching housing rentals and \$60 a month for principals and superintendent housing rentals.

During the Aug. 15 meeting, the board decided to table any decision on a voluntary resignation program for support staff.

The board had asked duBois to place this on the agenda during an Aug. 8 budget workshop, in case another resolution could not be found to balance the budget.

"You have fought really hard to keep jobs up to this point," duBois said. "We can run the school on the budget that you've got. There's no room for flexibility, and the decisions that we made didn't lower our staffing right now. I'm comfortable suggesting you all back off right now."

The board will look at reviewing and adopting the budget at a special meeting at 6:30 p.m. Monday, Aug. 27, at the Administration Building.

**CCCCSD MISSES MEETING FEDERAL STANDARDS**

The Texas Education Agency announced Aug. 8 that fewer than half of Texas schools met yearly requirements set by the federal government under the No Child Left Behind Act.

CCCCSD was one of the many districts that did not meet Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) targets this year due to a substantial increase in requirements.

A school or district this year met AYP requirements if 87 percent or more of their students passed the state reading/English language

arts test; 83 percent of their students passed the state mathematics test; 95 percent of their students participated in the state testing program and, depending on the grade level, had either a 75 percent graduation rate or a 90 percent attendance rate.

Twenty-eight percent of Texas districts met these high standards.

The district missed AYP in reading and math performance. OHS missed in math, OMS in math and reading and Ozona Elementary in math.

Under the current structure of the No Child Left Behind Act, the passing standards in the federal accountability system must rise to passing rates of 100 percent on the mathematics and reading tests by 2014.

This means steep increases in the requirements each year now through 2014. Last year, a passing rate of 80 percent on the reading/English language arts test and 75 percent on math test were required to meet AYP.

That year 50 percent of the districts and 66 percent of the campuses met AYP requirements.

"This is an unrealistic curve. It's unrealistic to have these numbers," duBois said.

The majority of Title I districts and campuses that missed AYP are in Stage 1, having missed AYP for the same reason for two years in a row, including Crockett County.

Of the 513 Title I districts that missed AYP, 285 or 56 percent of them are in Stage 1 of the School Improvement Program.

Among campuses, 976 or 84 percent of the total 1,159 Title I schools that missed AYP are in Stage 1. These districts or campuses must develop an improvement plan and campuses must offer students the option to transfer to a school that meets AYP requirements.

CCCCSD has distributed letters to all parents about the standards and already has plans in place.

If the district were to miss AYP standards next year, then it would have to

continue the required school improvement plans and provide access at local cost to supplemental education services by a TEA and U.S. Department of Education provider.

"Our first responsibility is to tackle STAAR and TAKS. That's our focus, state accountability," duBois said. "This is a thorn. It's a pain. Everyone is anguishing over it because it looks like a black mark on your school. It's not good news and not anything we can do anything about."

Over the past 10 years, 49 cases on average were reported to DSHS by this time each year, ranging from a low of 3 cases in 2011 to a high of 171 cases in 2006.

Humans can contract West Nile virus from a mosquito bite. Infected mosquitoes get the virus from feeding on infected birds and mammals. The virus can cause serious illness or death. West Nile neuroinvasive disease symptoms include stiff neck, visual problems, body tremors, mental confusion, memory loss and seizures. The milder form of the illness is West Nile fever. Symptoms include fever, headache, muscle and bone aches, nausea and drowsiness.

People with the milder form of illness typically recover on their own, although symptoms may last for several weeks. Up to 80 percent of people infected with West Nile virus will have no symptoms and will recover on their own.

The intensity of West Nile virus activity in Texas fluctuates from year to year and depends on a variety of factors including the weather, the numbers of birds and mosquitoes that maintain and spread the virus and human behavior. The season can last up until the first hard freeze of the year.

There are no medications to treat or vaccines to prevent West Nile virus infection. People over 50 years old and those with compromised immune systems are at a higher risk of becoming seriously ill when they become infected with the virus. If people have symptoms that cause them concern, they should contact their healthcare provider.

To reduce exposure to

West Nile virus:

- Use an approved insect repellent every time you go outside and follow the instructions on the label. Approved repellents are those that contain DEET, picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus.

- Regularly drain standing water, including water collects in empty cans, tires, buckets, clogged rain gutters and saucers under potted plants. Mosquitoes breed in stagnant water.

- Wear long sleeves and

pants at dawn and dusk when mosquitoes are most active.

- Use air conditioning or make sure there are screens on all doors and windows to keep mosquitoes from entering the home.

**CROCKETT COUNTY PUBLIC NOTICE**

**ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING**

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

ADOPTED this the 9th day of July, 2012.

institution's use of race as a factor in its admissions policy.

A white student who qualified for admission under the "top 10 percent" rule but was not admitted brought the case.

Failure to produce the affidavit may result in the withholding of action on the application pending its receipt, and the application may be dismissed if the affidavit is not received within a reasonable time.
