



State of the district: CCCCSD great schools in challenging times

A district made up of great schools with hard working staff, teachers and administrators was presented Mon-

Superintendent Chris du-Bois gave a State of the District report on CCCCSD at the OES Cafeteria.

The meeting was open to the public with school board members Tom Anderson, Dwight Childress and David McWilliams in attendance, along with school board candidates Shelly Childress, Travis Davidson and Amy Newton, principals and other district administrators and members of the site-base committee that consists of teachers, staff, parents and community members.

During the presentation, duBois went over all that makes up the district from the vision, mission and goals the district has to what the State Legislature may be debating on public education in the upcoming session.

"We're a great school. We want to be able to release students to be successful and that's what we're aiming to do," he said.

duBois went over all services in the district, including the release of a new bullying hotline sponsored by DCP Midstream that will soon be in effect, technology in all areas of the district, college readiness, home liaison services, food service and that the district covers all students under

insurance even for 7on7 football and cheerleading camps.

duBois said the district recently received a \$30,000 grant from Chevron which will be spread through all three campuses for science and technology.

"We are trying to move with the modern world," he said.

Bilingual education is a must that the district has to provide. Pre-K through first grades currently offers it but duBois said Ozona Elementary must work toward adding other grades. Teachers must be bilingual certified in order to teach the classes. Parents are given a choice of whether or not they want their child in a bilingual classroom.

duBois said filling the spots with bilingual certified teachers can cause some staffing issues as the certification test is very hard.

"We are faced with hard choices on staffing and program changes. This is pressure we have to deal with and we must do it," he said.

Another issue that is facing all school districts in Texas is the STAAR test for middle and elementary students and the end-of-course tests in high school that will county 15 percent of a students' grade. High school students will have to achieve an overall average on all the end-of-course tests in order to graduate.

Challenges the district is also facing academically is an unacceptable rating on the

James Wesley Sherrer 27, was arrested Saturday, Oct. 6, and charged with first-degree murder, according to DPS Trooper Shawn Baxter. Sherrer was arraigned and bond set at \$100,000 Monday by Crockett County Justice of the Peace Evelyn Lozano.

A first-degree felony is punishable up to 99 years in prison and a \$10,000.

Sherrer is charged with allegedly murdering John Candelario Sepulveda, 31, of Weatherford, Texas.

cials started discussions Monday for a local neighborhood to receive better roadway access.

our newspaper will be there for A simple statement, but let's break it down a bit.

Your newspaper ... That's right, all yours, assembled just for you, tailored to where you live, emphasizing the things that affect you, keeping track of the people and players in your community. Your newspaper is put together by people in a newsroom that was built for you, where people work to supply information that matters to you, from the details of that crash you passed by on Tuesday to biographies of the candidates for your school board to notices of what's on sale at your local supermarket.

...Will be there for you. Be where? On your porch, in your mail, at your convenience store and, yeah, sometimes in your bushes. But also at your township hall, inside your local police department, attending your city council meeting, watching your elections. It will be where you can't, paying attention, keeping watch, asking questions, making the record public.

And you can take it wherever you're going without worrying about battery life or Wi-Fi connections.

Some say newspapers are dying, that people get their news today from the Internet, TV and radio. But where do the Internet, TV and radio get their news? From the newsrooms of America's newspapers, large and small, which still encompass the nation's largest newsgathering force. Other information providers may add opinion, pictures or sound, but most of the time, the facts begin in the newsrooms of newspapers, where journalists are there for you, cultivating sources, combing through records, ask-

ing tough questions. A few generations back, TV and radio were supposed to be the death of newspapers. Instead, they

For about a generation now, the Internet has supposedly been driving newspapers into extinc-

Nope. It's just given their newsrooms another platform to deliver journalism that now includes videos, interactive graphics and access to informational archives built for years by ... Guess which medium?

Unlike websites and bloggers, newspapers are fixtures in their communities. Most of them were around long before personal computers and smart-phone apps, chronicling life, dissecting trends and exposing things that needed some air. And unlike less-established media, their newsrooms operate with standards and ethics intended to assure the credibility of the information they deliver. They don't just make the record; they protect it, too. It's a responsibility, a trust, a duty.

And while newspapers and their newsrooms have always broken stories, the Internet has now enabled them to cover breaking news, too, with reporting that goes directly up on-line — just as soon as it meets those newsroom standards.

So the evolution continues.

But the mission remains the same: To be there. For you. Because it's your newspaper.

State revises method of purging voter rolls

AUSTIN — The State of Texas last week agreed to drop its recently adopted practice of using "weak matches" of Social Security Administration data in purging names from voter rolls as required by a 2011 state law.

What precipitated the agreement was a lawsuit filed Sept. 20 in a Travis County district court by Austin attorneys Buck Wood and David Richards on behalf of four plaintiffs who were among some 70,000 Texans who were mailed a letter from the state's chief elections officer, Secretary of State Hope Andrade, instructing recipients to fill out a form and send it to their local voter registrar within 30 days — or be presumed dead — and consequently stricken from the list of registered voters.

Pursuant to the agreement, Andrade stopped using weak matches, or part of a name and part of a social security number, to identify deceased or possibly deceased voters.

Names on voter rolls that have

been "strong matched" through Social Security Administration death index data will get a letter

and have 30 days to respond. Meanwhile, Oct. 9 was the last day to register to vote. Looking forward, on Monday, Oct. 22, early voting begins.

And, on the subject of voting, Texans last week saw the campaign season move to the front burner with the first of three scheduled debates between incumbent President Barack Obama and Republican challenger Mitt Romney taking place on Oct. 3 and the first of two debates between U.S. Senate nominees, Democrat Paul Sadler and Republican Ted Cruz on Oct. 2.

Broadcast from Denver, the presidential debate featured segments on the economy, health care, the role of government and the act of governing. Online, nonpartisan fact-

checking organizations such as factcheck.org have posted information to help viewers sort out what they heard.

School fund finishes strong Texas Education Agency on Oct. 2 announced "an outstanding return on the investments" of the Permanent School Fund for fiscal year 2011-2012, closing with a value of \$25.5 billion and a return of 9.44 percent on

its investments. According to the agency, the fund, which helps pay for textbooks and other educational expenses of school districts, provided \$1.2 billion in revenue for public schools over the two years.

School offers \$10,000 degree Gov. Rick Perry on Oct. 2 praised Angelo State University's new \$10,000 degree program and called on more Texas universities to follow suit, the governor's office announced

Oct. 2 in San Angelo.

Joined by Texas Tech University System Chancellor Kent Hance, Angelo State University President Joseph C. Rallo and state Rep. USDA hosting webinars on Hispanic and Women **Farmer and Rancher Claims Process**

COLLEGE STATION -USDA Texas Farm Service Agency (FSA) Acting State Executive Director James B. Douglass today announced that two (internet-based virtual meeting) webinars are scheduled in October to discuss FSA, Rural Development (RD) and Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) program updates as well as the USDA Hispanic and

Women Farmer and Rancher pate in the program. Claims Process.

The claims process opened Sept. 24 and closes on March 25, 2013. The webinars are scheduled for Oct. 2 and Oct. 18 from 6:30 - 7:30 p.m.

As announced in February 2011, the voluntary claims process will make available at least \$1.33 billion for cash awards and tax relief payments, plus up to \$160 million in farm debt relief, to eligible Hispanic and women farmers and ranchers. There are no filing fees to partici-

"I encourage producers who want more information about USDA programs or the claims process to register for one of these webinars," Douglass said. "The webinars are free and open to the first 1,000 participants who regis-

Douglass emphasizes that these webinars are intended as forums to discuss the general plan for the claims process and USDA webinar hosts will not be able to discuss the details of any individual claim during the course of the webinars.

Sheep and goat predator management board mails ballots for directors election

SHEEP AND GOAT PREDATOR MANAGEMENT BOARD

The Sheep and Goat Predator Management Board will mail ballots this week to elect three producers to represent sheep and goat raisers in its 111-county area.

In addition there will be a vote for an increase on the refundable assessment from \$.30 per head to \$1 per head. Ballots must be returned to the Board office by the midnight Oct. 26 deadline.

All sheep and goat raisers who reside in one of the three districts are eligible to vote in the upcoming election.

The Texas Commodity Referendum Law, which governs the producer board, requires biennial elections. Ballots must bear the signature and address of the voter, and indicate production totals.

Sheep and goat producers nominated for the three open positions on the nine-member board are: District 1 Curry Campbell; District 2 J.R. Evans; District 3 Allen Belk or Kevin Herring. These producers completed a nomination

form with ten qualified sheep and/or goat producers supporting their nomination, and returned the completed form by the Sept. 26 deadline. They will each serve a six-year term.

have sheep and goat production and reside in one of the districts may obtain ballots at the local county extension offices, the Sheep and Goat Predator Management Board office at P.O. Box 3543, San Angelo, Texas 76902-3543, or by calling 325-659-8777.







Lions finish strong at Round Rock

The Ozona Lions competed at the McNeil Invitational last Saturday and finished in 15th place out of 43 teams.

They were the second fastest 1A team, behind Port Aransas.

"Port Aransas has been to state the last three years and has finished as the state runner-up the last two years. The Ozona boys were (on average) 22 seconds behind Port Aransas, giving them a great idea about how much improvement is needed to get into the state medals," said Coach Erik Thormaehlen. "The McNeil Invitational is one of the most competitive meets of the season. Over 3,500 runners come from all around the state to get a chance to preview the state course at Old Settlers Park in Round Rock. Only about 1,000 of those kids will have a chance to actually run at the state meet in November, but many coaches make the far trek in order to try and give their kids a bit of an advantage in the event that they qualify

for the state meet." Individual results for the Lions were: Omero Rodriguez 17:28, 27th place (out of 365); Josiah Jurado 18:03, 56th place; Saul Vargas 18:28, 89th; Noe Medina 18:40, 115th; Alex Hopper 19:44, 186th; Alan Landa 21:02, 275th; Ryan Porras 21:17, 283rd and Chris Cantu 21:19, 285th.

"Omero Rodriguez ran a great race in an intensely crowded field of runners. Saul Vargas was running right next to two boys from Wall that collided and went to the ground. Saul had to think and act quickly to avoid joining the pile-up, which is a great experience to have as the Lions prepare to enter other crowded races in the future. Josiah Jurado continued his steady improvement navigating through the field of runners to an impressive finish in the field of 365," Thormaehlen said. "Noe Medina had a nice race as well, pushing hard in the middle. Alex Hopper, Alan Landa, Ryan Porras, and Chris Cantu also competed well for the Lions and gained invaluable experience."

The Lions will now begin a month of grueling training, in order to attempt to improve their times to return to the state meet for the first time since the Ozona Lions won the gold medal at the 2004 UIL State Meet.

"Overall, the experience for the boys that this meet provides will be of great benefit for this year and years to come, as many of these boys should expect to be at Round Rock throughout their high school careers competing in high stakes competition," Thormaehlen said.
