DISTRICT CHAMPS

Lions win, two Lady Lions advance

IRAAN - The Ozona Lions are district champions.

Monday the Lions brought home the championship trophy after blowing away the competition at the District 7-A Cross Country Meet in Iraan.

The Lions will now compete at the Region I Meet on Nov. 3 in Lubbock.

Coach Erik Thormaehlen said this is the first boys district cross country title in six years.

Omero Rodriguez was the district champion with a time of 18 minutes, 3 seconds.

He is the first individual boys champion since Roman Tambunga took the title six years ago.

"Omero did an outstanding job winning district by nearly a half-minute," Thormaehlen said.

All seven of the Lions finished in the top 11 of the field.

Also placing for the Lions was: 3. Josiah Jurado, 18:57; 4. Saul Vargas, 19:04; 5. Noe Medina, 19:09; 8. Ryan Porras, 19:43; 9. Alan Landa, 19:43 and 11. Alex Hopper, 19:46.

"The boys hard work over the course of the summer and school year has paid off well for them," Thormaehlen said. "I'm very proud of these guys."

Ozona scored 21 points with second place Van Horn scoring 73 points.

Witness gives details into murder

An argument over a cell phone charger led to one man's death and another being arrested for first-degree murder.



More details became available last week on the death of John Candelario Sepulveda, 31, of Weatherford, Texas, during an incident in northern Crockett County.

According to an affidavit for an arrest warrant filed in the 112th Judicial District Judge's Office, a witness, Sam Busher, saw James Wesley Sherrer, 27, of Grape Creek, run over Sepulveda. The Ozona Stockman acquired a copy of the affidavit through a Freedom of Information request.

"I have no doubt that this was not an accident because there is no way someone has time to start a pickup, put it in gear, floorboard it and never honk the horn or give any kind of signal and aim it straight for someone walking away. Wes (Sherrer) showed no hesitation whatsoever.

CENTER POINT - The Ozona Lions got off to a shaky start Friday night, but managed to quickly turn it around for a 35-12 win over the Center Point Pirates.

"Center Point had a good game plan coming in and they aren't without some good football players capable of making plays," said Coach Ray Brown.

The Pirates got on the board quickly scoring on their first possession in the first quarter and then again at the start of the second making it 12-0.

The Lions started making plays when Senior Alex Borrego took the ball and ran it 12 yards for the first Ozona touchdown. Tyler Galindo's kick was good to make it 12-7 with 5:45 left in the first half.

Senior Blake Morrow would then run the ball 17 yards on the Lions' next possession putting Ozona at the

Get out and vote

The 2012 November General Election Day is three weeks away, which means it's time for Crockett County citizens to get out and vote.

During the past weeks, The Ozona Stockman profiled the local contested races that Crockett County voters will decide on Nov. 6. Early voting started Monday and runs through Nov. 2 at the courthouse annex.

This is a critical time for voters. Locally, voters will be deciding which candidates should sit on our school board and represent us in Congress.

We are also deciding to will be the leader of our country the next four years.

When it comes to voter turnout, Texas ranks at the bottom. A Texas Monthly article states that over the past decade voter turnout in the state relative to the rest of the country has trended downward. Texas finally bottomed out in the last midterm election at the lowest rate of any state.

In 2010 fewer than one in three Texans eligible to vote cast their ballot. Fewer than one in four Texas Hispanics who were eligible to vote in 2010 actually did, the article stated.

That's why we need to start turning things around.

Many voters often have questions about their right to vote.

If a voter does not have their voter registration card, they can still vote by using their drivers' license or personal identification card issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety; a form of identification containing the voters' photograph; a birth certificate; U.S. citizenship papers; U.S. passport; official mail address to the voter, by name, from a governmental entity; copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document that shows the voters' name and address or any other form of identification prescribed by the secretary of state.

As a voter, people have the right to cast their vote in secret and free from intimidation. Once the bal-

lots are turned in, no one looks at them until they are ready to be counted, and most ballots are run through a computer to be counted.

Voters also have the right:

The right to a ballot with written instructions on how to cast the ballot.

The right to receive up to two more ballots if a mistake is made while marking the ballot.

The right to ask the polling place official for instructions on how to cast the ballot, but not for suggestions on who to vote for.

The right to bring an interpreter to assist you as you qualify to vote if you do not understand the English language.

The right to assistance while casting your ballot if you cannot write, see the ballot or understand the language in which it is written.

The right to bring written materials into the voting booth to assist you as you cast the ballot.

The right to vote at any early voting location in the county for elections conducted county-wide.

The right to report a possible voting rights abuse to the Secretary of State or to your local election official.

The right to cast a provisional ballot if your name does not appear on the list of registered voters, or you do not have proper identification.

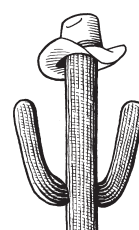
The right to file an administrative complaint with the Secretary of State concerning violations of federal and state voting procedures.

Some Sort Of Sign

Recently, I was working a charity auction when I asked a novice bidder if he wanted to bid again. He was trying to give me some sort of sign but I had no idea what he meant. Was he through bidding, did he want to cut the bid in half, or was he trying to tell me to go kill myself by slashing my throat? That's when it dawned on me: we speak different languages with our hands and need a universal system of gestures.

It's gotten out of hand. (Pun intended.) I was watching a football game when the referee made a holding call by grabbing his wrist and making a fist. I've seen the same sign used by a road-rage victim indicating he was going to knock my block off and, I swear, it's exactly the same sign my wife made when I accidentally vaccinated her in the wrist with 5-way vaccine. She held it against me for years but it must have worked because, to the best of my knowledge, she has never contracted leptospirosis or vibriosis. And you can hardly see the scar if she wears long sleeves.

I've seen rodeo cowboys point and look skyward just before they settle in on 2,000 pounds of trouble. It's as if the cowboy is asking God if he has a vacancy for one more.

It's also the same sign my mother used to make when she'd shake her finger at me right before swatting me with a yardstick, but it's also the gesture an observer might make if a grand piano was falling from the sky and was aimed right for you. It's at times like these

when hand signals need to be universally understood.

Another common sign is the one baseball umpires make when they call someone "OUT!" It's the same sign we'd make in the oilfields when we wanted the crane or A-frame operator to raise whatever it was he was tied on to. We've all seen exactly the same sign being used by a hitchhiker alongside the road, or by a big biker in a bar who is

telling you in his own unique style, "Let's go outside and settle this man to man."

In the NFL if the referee turns his arm in a circular motion parallel to his body it means to start the clock, and to an operating engineer it means start the machine. I used the same sign once when I tried to get some feeling back in my hand after my wife started pounding the post pounder before I'd completely removed my hand. She says it was an "accident" but I think it was just payback for the 5-way incident.

Then there is the gesture where fishermen hold their hands far apart to lie about how big the fish was they caught. Football referees make the same sign to show how much yardage is needed for a first down and I once used the same sign to show a Texas truck driver

how far back he needed to go until he nestled gently up against my loading chute that was only staying together because the termites were holding hands. I moved my hands closer and closer together and then I clapped real hard for emphasis right before he backed right over the loading chute.

Believe me, I gave that trucker a sign he understood!

If you ever have the need to tell a crane operator to raise the "headache ball" just make a circular motion in the air with your hand at head level. The problem is cowboys don't speak the language of operating engineers. I made this proper sign one time to a fellow cowboy when a horse fell on top of me and pinned my leg in a figure eight. But when I made the circular sign to the cowboy indicating he should "Raise the horse I think my leg is broken," he thought it meant "let's rope" so he went back to the barn to get his roping glove and good horse without ever lending an assist.

The point I'm trying to make is that we need some sort of a uniform system of signs that we all can understand. Oop's, I'm sorry but I must interrupt our little chat because my wife is making some sort of irritated gesture at me. I think it's either the "gather up and let's go shopping" sign, or, "You left the toilet seat up again." Either way my goose is cooked.

House panel to review what state does with revenue

AUSTIN — Money paid in state taxes and fees doesn't necessarily fund exactly what Texans think it will fund.

So, Texas House Speaker Joe Straus last week appointed an Interim Committee on General Revenue Dedicated Accounts as part of an effort, he said, "to make our state budget more transparent and accountable to taxpayers." The committee will report its findings and recommendations to the House in early January.

Straus explained that for more than 20 years, the state has allowed money that sits in general revenue-dedicated funds —nearly \$5 billion in the current fiscal biennium— to be used to certify the rest of the state budget.

State Reps. Drew Darby, R-San Angelo, and John Otto, R-Dayton will co-chair the committee. Darby said the state "should provide the services people and businesses expect on those taxes and fees dedicated for a specific purpose. Truth in taxation also requires that we bring these

revenues in line with fiscally responsible appropriations."

Straus also appointed to the committee state Reps. Rafael Anchia, D-Dallas; Larry Gonzales, R-Round Rock; Patricia Harless, R-Spring; Donna Howard, D-Austin; Jose Menendez, D-San Antonio; Jim Pitts, R-Waxahachie; and Sylvester Turner, D-Houston.

VOTING 'APPLICATION' DEBUTS

Secretary of State Hope Andrade on Oct. 3 announced the launch of SmartTXVoter, an English and Spanish language smartphone application "to help Texans stay informed about statewide voting information like registration deadlines, early voting dates and candidates or amendments on the upcoming ballot."

SmartTXVoter, viewable in English or Spanish, is formatted to be accessible for Texans

with visual impairments. The app is part of the "Make Your Mark on Texas" program meant to educate Texans about voting pursuant to the federal Help America Vote Act.

DROUGHT DISASTER CONTINUES

Gov. Rick Perry on Oct. 5 renewed —for yet another month— the emergency Disaster Proclamation he originally signed on July 5, 2011.

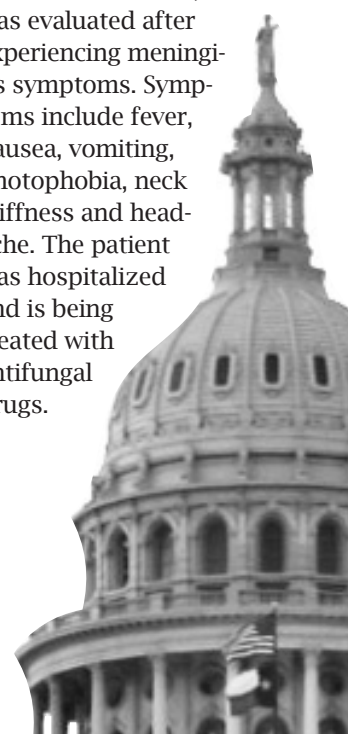
The proclamation certifies that exceptional drought conditions pose a threat of imminent disaster in specified counties in Texas. Some 138 of the state's 254 counties are named in the current proclamation.

MENINGITIS CASE CONFIRMED

The Texas Department of State Health Services on Oct. 12 announced it had linked one case of meningitis to steroid

injections produced by the New England Compounding Center.

The patient, an adult female from Central Texas, was evaluated after experiencing meningitis symptoms. Symptoms include fever, nausea, vomiting, photophobia, neck stiffness and headache. The patient was hospitalized and is being treated with antifungal drugs.

AgriLife Extension Service has the answers

The Texas AgriLife Extension office can find the answers.

During the Ozona Chamber of Commerce's Educational Luncheon last week, Crockett County Extension Agent Chase McPhaul and Bill Thompson with the Texas AgriLife Extension Service in San Angelo spoke on the service's programs.

In Crockett County, McPhaul spoke on the predator program supported by the county and how the office helps educate the community through producers and landowners.

"Things like this are why Crockett County has sheep and goats," he said.

Rainfall and drought are still major topics in the county. McPhaul said the office is teaming up with Ozona Middle School for a rainwater harvesting and greenhouse project.

He also said while state and federal budget cuts keep specialists from coming as often, the office still tries to provide information.

"We can help educate in any way we can," McPhaul said. "We call on specialists

to get advice and get information out."

Thompson specializes in agriculture economics.

He spoke of several programs the extension service provides throughout the state, including courses on beef cattle, range development, agriculture economics and drought planning.

Specialists in all of these areas can be found through-

out the state, Thompson said.

With budget resources tight, Thompson said the service is holding more webinars to present its programs.

He also said the USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service is a good partner in communities like Ozona to provide top notch range management expertise.

"Everything boils down to the almighty dollar," he said.

"Everyone's situation is different."

During last year's drought, Thompson said he conducted 19 different workshops pertaining to drought.

"By in large nobody has a formal, written drought plan. I'm an advocate of sitting down and putting a plan on paper," he said. "It takes some stress and emotions out of the plan."

Thompson also spoke on rainfall insurance, which is something he advocates for landowners and livestock producers.

In 2011, around 43 percent of Texas was covered by rainfall insurance. This year, that number has risen to around 73 percent.

"Last year was a horrible drought. Everyone bought insurance this year. On average, it seems to be working to producers' advantage," he said.

There is no doubt in my mind that this was an on-purpose act and I think it was out of sheer anger," Busher stated in the affidavit.

Sherrer has been charged with first-degree murder, which is punishable by five to 99 years in prison if convicted.

The affidavit, filed by Texas Ranger Tod Reed, details out how the Sherrer and Sepulveda's brother, Isai Sepulveda, had an argument the morning of Oct. 6 over a cell phone charger in the EOG Bunkhouse located just east of State Highway 163.

Isai Sepulveda contacted John Sepulveda and let him know about the fight.

The affidavit states that John Sepulveda "went into a serious rage" and started talking to Sherrer on the radio about how the two men were going to fight on location. The area the men met at was on the Linthicum Ranch.

Busher then stated that when the men met John Sepulveda was constantly screaming for Sherrer to get out of his vehicle.

Busher called Isai Sepulveda, who asked Busher to

break the two men up, the affidavit stated. Busher then asked the two men to "cut out the child's play and get back to work" and that if they wanted to fight they could do it on their own time.

Both men agreed and John Sepulveda turned his back on Sherrer and started walking off.

Busher stated that he started back to his own vehicle. He heard Sherrer's vehicle, turned around and saw Sherrer driving the truck straight for John Sepulveda, the affidavit stated.

Busher yelled to warn John Sepulveda and then saw Sherrer's truck hit John Sepulveda.

The affidavit describes in horrific detail how John Sepulveda's body was dragged by the vehicle as Sherrer never hit the brakes and drove at a high rate of speed.

"Wes (Sherrer) went and made a circle, a big wide swing, still spinning the tires the whole time, like he was still floor boarding it the whole time," Busher stated. "I was afraid Wes (Sherrer) wasn't going to stop so I put myself between John and Wes's truck waving my arms and yelling for Wes to

stop because in my mind I was thinking if he saw me he might stop."

The vehicle stopped 15 feet from John Sepulveda's body and Busher.

"You would think this all happened real fast, but it didn't. I had time to let go of my door handle, and hang up the phone Isa and run a good 20 or 30 feet to John who was on the ground," Busher stated.

Busher stated he immediately called 9-1-1.

Sherrer put the truck in park and get out screaming and crying "I'm sorry, I didn't mean to," Busher stated.

Busher stated he has known Sherrer for about three months and that they have been roommates for two months.

"I know Wes has a terrible temper and can be set off very easily. But his temper doesn't usually last long and then he's apologizing for it later. In the case of him and John, I thought this would be the case, everyone thought that. But it wasn't the case. I didn't think Wes was capable of doing something like this, I wouldn't have had him around my wife and baby if I had thought he was," Busher stated.

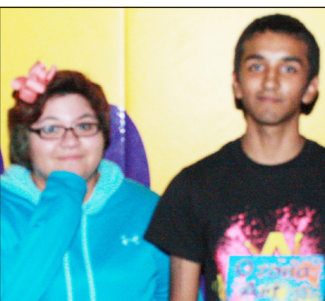
