MARBLE FALLS - The Ozona Lions season came to a halt Friday night.

The No. 4 state-ranked Shiner Comanches defeated Ozona 62-13 in the Class 1A Division 1 area-round playoff football game.

Ozona finished 9-3 after getting its first playoff win over Holland on Nov. 16.

"We knew going into the game with Shiner that their athleticism was scary. It was difficult to simulate that kind of speed in practice. As you would expect in the second round of the playoffs, we needed to have our best game of the season, but for whatever reason that didn't happen. Our effort was there, we just weren't locked in mentally and that lead to some uncharacteristic mistakes. I know and the kids know we were better than we finished," said Coach Ray Brown. "This is a great group

During the board's Nov. 20 regular meeting, new members Amy Newton and Orlando DeHoyos were sworn in, along with board members Grizz Medina and Dwight Childress who were re-elected on Nov. 6.

The board reorganized electing Ray Don Myers as president, DeHoyos as vice president and Medina as secretary.

The board honored outgoing members Tom Anderson and Harvey Sanchez. Anderson served on the board for 11 years and Sanchez four years.

Both men received plaques from the district and framed keys from the old primary and intermediate school buildings from Ozona Elementary School.

POLICIES REVIEWED

The board unanimously approved a motion asking the district's attorney Sara Leon, of Powell & Leon LLP of Aus-

tin, and district administrators to review the local policy pertaining to class ranking at Ozona High School.

Last year, the board voted on a change in the policy, which turns out has had some negative effects on students, said Superintendent Chris duBois.

"How they did their class rank was changed halfway during their high school career. We want to make sure everything is

fair to all kids," said David McWilliams, board member.

After Leon and the administrators review the policy, they will bring their findings to the board at a future meeting.

The board also reviewed two other district's policies pertaining to board meetings and consulting with the district's attorney.

Legislature should remember intent of open government laws

The 83rd Texas Legislative Session is just a few weeks away. Lawmakers already are pre-filing bills and committees are meeting to decide what issues they want to address. One of the issues that always gets plenty of attention and debate, just like balancing the budget and funding education, is the reach of the state's open government laws. We trust the legislators will remember why those laws are so important, and why they shouldn't be weakened. Fortunately, the Texas Open Meetings Act and Public Information Act are among the best in the country, and recently we've had attorneys general who have defended them well. Unfortunately, the laws are too often challenged by officials who consider them a nuisance, not a protection.

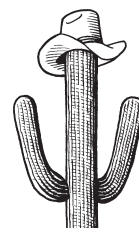

The Senate Open Government Committee met Monday to hear testimony from people who want the laws weakened, as well as those who wish to keep the public properly informed about what their officials and agencies are up to. Several issues come up virtually every session, including officials' desire to contain those who file, in their eyes, frivolous requests for public information. Changing technology also raises issues about the delivery and cost of gathering and delivering that information. Some issues include how long e-mails and other computer records need to be kept, and whether communications made on officials' private phones, computers or e-mail accounts, but that deal with governmental functions, should be subject to the law. While private property must be respected, it's obvious that officials should not be allowed to circumvent public scrutiny of their actions, deliberations and decisions simply by using their own communications devices. Officials and contractors often fight to keep information about contracts out of the public's eye. In some cases their reasons are valid, such as to protect trade

secrets or prevent people from trying to profit, at taxpayers' expense, from information on possible land purchases or incentives offered to attract business development. In many cases the decisions on such matters is subjective. Who's to say what requests are frivolous — a local gadfly who believes he's serving the community and keeping officials honest with constant requests for information, or the officials who must bear the burden of gathering the information every time a request is made? Must officials be able to provide information in any of several common formats that a requester might want, or should the people requesting the information be willing to acquire the software that can read whatever the agency or department provides? Ideally, the growing sophistication of computer software and data retention should make it easier for agencies to store greater amounts of information, and access it quickly — if it's properly planned and organized. Officials should keep this in mind when they are updating their records or software, and ensure that records can be accessed easily and efficiently, to ease the cost and time for both those providing the information and those requesting it. The value of public access to government information should be easy to see. Public records requests have helped people identify dangerous intersections and lobby for traffic signals that would make them safer. We trust that lawmakers will remember the principles behind our open government laws: The people have a right to know what their elected officials are doing, and how their tax dollars are being spent. Officials, and the clerks who have to gather the information, might not like the requests, but if those requests are reasonable they should be honored.

I'm always thinking up great ways to make money but I'm too busy making a living to get rich. But my latest idea is so good I simply must share it with you. I admit that a lot of my friends are hunters, and if that makes my light shine less brightly amongst the PETA crowd, then so be it. My camouflaged buddies tell me that, #1) it's getting harder and harder to find places to hunt and, #2) even if they are lucky enough to find a place to hunt, there are fewer and fewer things to shoot at. But that was before my really BIG idea: using livestock as game animals. I know what you're thinking: it's hard enough trying to keep your cowherd together with wolves, animal rightists, the government and enviros declaring them open game, without hunters shooting at them too. But what I'm proposing are two seasons for hunting livestock, dart season and paintball season, neither one of which should result in the death of your stock. Think of it as shoot-and-release hunting. I've seen ads for a company that sells rifles, crossbows, pistols and darts as a way to vaccinate your cattle from long range. This is great for people like me who aren't USTRC or PRCA ropers, are too cheap to hire any help, and are too lazy to saddle the horse and fetch the stock. Hunters could use these darts to hunt cows. Under my plan both dart and paintball season would last five months each, with a month in between to give your cattle a

chance to calm down before shipping and branding. (Now all we need is a way to brand our cattle from long distance!) Some might suggest that livestock are not wild enough to be good game animals but after being shot by sharp darts and splashes of color, your cows and horses should be wild enough to qualify as rodeo stock. They'll be harder to sneak up than a Chicago hit man. Believe me, deer hunting will not be able to compete with the thrill and difficulty of going for a South Dakota Grand Slam that would include a Brahma bull, Duroc hog, Southdown sheep and a Lipizzaner stallion. And you'll still get a chance for a traditional photo op if you act quickly and get the picture of you and your one ton range bull before the tranquilizer from the dart starts to wear off. Act too slow though and you may need some help letting your animal loose! Ranchers, just imagine, you'll get your cattle vaccinated and have the additional income from hunters and rodeo contractors. Anyone who wants the full hunting experience, camping out, freezing to death, getting bit by red ants and being shot at, ought to be willing to pay at least

\$1,500 for a horse, \$1,000 for a cow, and \$500 for a sheep and/or pig. A quickie hunt from the front seat of your pickup while you're checking your cows could be half price. From the hunter's perspective there are many advantages to my plan: you don't have to drag a deer carcass for three miles over rough terrain, there are currently no license or tag fees, (I'm sure that will change), and you don't have to go on safari to Africa. You'll still get to dress up in camo and go hunting at Cabelas for decoys, ammo, and artillery that you probably don't currently have in your arsenal. The best part is you don't have to dress out any game because you'll be given a complimentary pound of hamburger when the hunt is over. And who wouldn't rather eat beef than venison? If you think livestock are much too valuable to use as game I suppose we could substitute Hollywood celebrities and Washington politicians. Sportsmen are already shooting paintballs at each other, why not darts? A Hollywood Grand Slam might include a vegan chef (they're all over the place in tinsel town), a PETA member, an American Idol judge, and one of the Baldwin brothers. Even though there would no head to hang on the wall, which is very sad in the case of the Baldwin brothers, wouldn't you just love to put a dart in the rump of Simon Cowell, Piers Morgan or Andrea Mitchell?

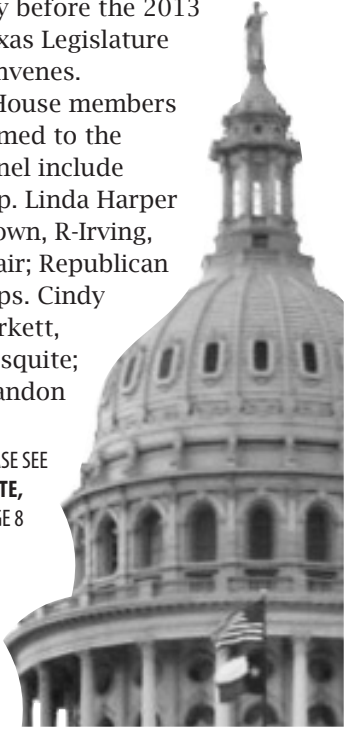
Board proposes budget for next biennium

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — To pass a budget bill is the Texas Legislature's main job, but it is the 10-member Legislative Budget Board's job to propose how much money the state may spend. At a Nov. 15 public hearing, the Board offered up a 2014-2015 two-year state budget capped at \$78 billion per year, observing the constitutional spending limit. Comptroller Susan Combs has another couple of months to share her revenue forecast with the budget-writing House Appropriations Committee and the Senate Finance Committee. The 83rd Texas Legislature is scheduled to convene on Jan. 8. Among a multitude of budget considerations are: (1) a state population projected to be greater than 27 million people; (2) the business climate; (3) public health; (4) public education; (5) public safety, law enforcement and prisons; (6) roads, highways and bridges; (7) local governmental institu-

tions, and more. Members of the Legislative Budget Board, to whom much is entrusted, are joint chairs Lt. Gov. Dewhurst and House Speaker Joe Straus, House Appropriations Committee Chair Jim Pitts, R-Waxahachie, Senate Finance Committee Chair Tommy Williams, R-The Woodlands, House Ways and Means Committee Chair Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville; and five appointees: Sens. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, and Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo; and Reps. Dan Branch, R-Dallas, and Sylvester Turner, D-Houston. Remember, however: the Legislature relies on the office of the state comptroller to do the critical job of forecasting the amount of revenue that will be available to pay for it all. Comptroller Combs and crew are busy looking at tax collections, non-tax revenue, unspent funds from the current budget and the option to transfer in billions of dollars from the Economic Stabilization Fund, known widely as the Rainy Day Fund. Five months ago, the governor and the Legislative Budget Board directed state agencies to find 5 percent in savings for fiscal 2014 and another 5 percent in savings for fiscal 2015. **SEQUESTRATION PANEL NAMED** House Speaker Straus on Nov. 12 named an interim panel to recommend ways Texas can prepare for what now is commonly referred to as the "fiscal cliff" — a mix of federal tax increases and spending reductions poised to take effect at the end of the year unless Congress takes actions to avoid the cliff. The panel, titled Interim

Committee on Texas Response to Federal Sequestration, will report its findings to the speaker by Jan. 7, the day before the 2013 Texas Legislature convenes. Bastrop State Park receives pine seedlings

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — For five years, the seeds sat on the top shelf of a refrigerated Brookshire Bros. warehouse in Lufkin, Texas.

The drought-hardy loblolly pine seeds had been a focus of the Texas A&M Forest Service Western Gulf Forest Tree Improvement Program since its inception in 1951. But demand for the seeds declined over the decades.

The seeds, 1,100 pounds of drought-hardy loblolly pine and 6,000 more of assorted varieties of the same species, had been stored so long, in fact, that in August 2011 geneticists began making plans to toss them into the landfill.

That plan changed the following month when the most destructive wildfire in Texas history ravaged Bastrop County and its renowned Lost Pines ecosystem. The 32,400-acre inferno

laid waste to the community, destroying 1,660 homes and killing 1.5 million trees.

On Tuesday, Nov. 27, the first shipment, 200,000 loblolly pine seedlings grown by ArborGen, a commercial nursery based in East Texas, arrived at Bastrop State Park. Another 200,000 seedlings, grown by the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry, will be delivered Friday, Nov. 30.

Texas A&M Forest Service's West Texas Nursery and the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center also grew seedlings, 25,000 and 30,000 respectively, that will be delivered as needed.

The first volunteer planting workday at Bastrop State Park is Saturday, Dec. 1. Private land planting begins Monday, Dec. 3.

A total of 550,000 seedlings will be planted in Bastrop over the next few months.

Meanwhile, tree experts are continuing to grow seedlings with plans to plant 1.5 million next year and another million the year after that.

Costs are covered by the Arbor Day Foundation, a non-profit organization that joined earlier this year with Texas A&M Forest Service and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to launch the Lost Pines Forest Recovery Campaign, a reforestation fundraising effort.

Tom Byram, a geneticist with the agency's tree improvement program, said there still was enough seed to produce about 14 million more loblolly pine seedlings, which will be more than enough to finish the project.

He also said that it could be 25 years before the 10-inch seedlings grow into pine trees.

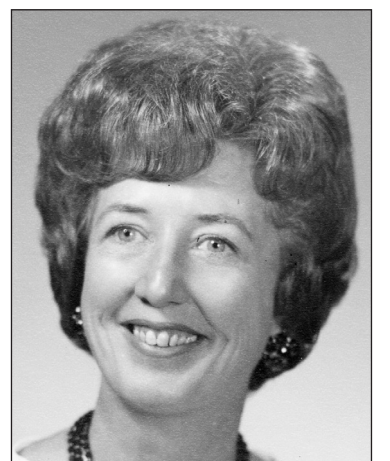

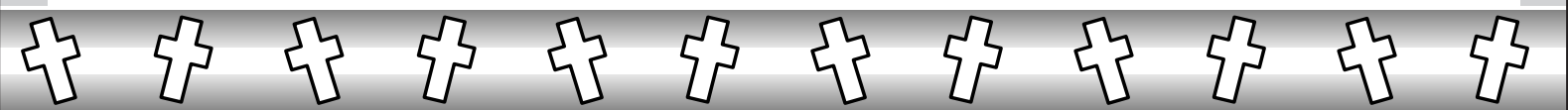

DeHoyos said he wanted to discuss the policy pertaining to board meetings about posting items to the agenda.

The district's policy states that "Before the official agenda is finalized for any meeting, the Superintendent shall consult the Board President to ensure that the agenda and the topics included meet with the President's approval. In reviewing the preliminary agenda, the President shall ensure that any topics the Board or individual Trustees have requested to be addressed are either on that agenda or scheduled for deliberation at an appropriate time in the near future. The Board President shall not have authority to remove from the agenda a subject requested by a Trustee without that Trustee's specific authorization."

In the policy about board members consulting with the district's attorney, the policy states that "The Board shall retain an attorney or attorneys, as necessary, to serve as the District's legal counsel and representatives in matters requiring legal services. Services to be performed and reasonable compensation to be paid by the Board shall be set forth in a written contract between the Board and the attorney or attorneys. In accordance with the written contract, individual Trustees shall channel legal inquiries through the Superintendent or Board designee, as appropriate, when advice or information from the District's legal counsel is sought. Staff requests for legal advice from the District's legal counsel shall be submitted through the Superintendent or designee. A report of legal advice received shall be presented to the Board when deemed appropriate by the administration or upon request of the Board."

DeHoyos said all board members should be aware of items that are discussed with the district's attorney.

"We need to be responsive to the constituents about what is being discussed," he said.

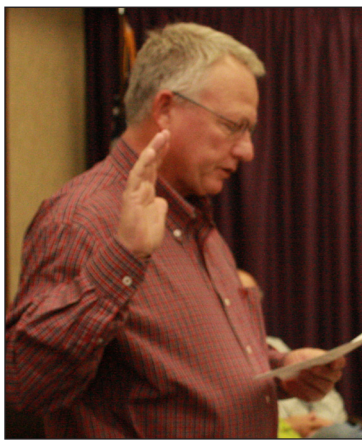
2013-2014 PRELIMINARY BUDGET

Concerned with costs in administration, DeHoyos said the board needs to review all administrators' contracts before starting budget discussions in the spring.

"I don't know the language in there. We need to get the ball rolling," he said.

McWilliams told DeHoyos that spending time with the district's administrators and seeing what their duties are on the job is also a good place to start.
